FEW ON OFFER FOR FINAL DAY OF WEEK--STEERS CLOSING FIRM.

MORE SHORT-FEDS COMING

Western Receipts Drop Off--Cows and Heifers Uneven for Week--Medium Cattle Higher--Stock Cattle Are Irregular.

Around 500 cattle came in today but few of these were on the market. Killers had nine loads direct from another market and there were also seven loads of feeding cattle billed to country points, leaving only a load or two of mixed stock on sale. Business was of too limited an extent to judge conditions of the trade by and notably it was a nominally steady day.

DITCH SCHEME REVISED. Kansas Irrigation Project Finally Goes Into Use.

Topeka, Kan., Oct. 25.--The dream of P. Soule, engineer of the country north of Dodge City, Kan., the rich prairie, a valley of gardens did not come true while he could see it, but they have just been realized by others.

A big dam has been constructed across the Arkansas river a mile west of Ingalls and the water from the river will be augmented by water from the underground.

Water was turned into the ditch last week and it will irrigate from six thousand to ten thousand acres of land in Gray and Ford counties.

The ditch is completed now from the dam a mile west of Ingalls, to a point in Ford county two miles west of Soule College.

Within a few days the ditch will be opened to a point north of Dodge and the water will be carried on east to where the ditch crosses the railroad under the state forestry station.

The big pump west of Ingalls is supplying the ditch with a stream of water twenty feet wide and three and a half inches deep in addition, nearly half of that amount is supplied from the river, although the river was low.

The season, however, there is an important source of supply which has not been available before. This is the supply which can be furnished by the new pumping plant.
