FEW STEERS SHOW UP TODAY AND MARKET WAS WITH-OUT REAL TRY-OUT.

BUTCHER STUFF ACTIVE, FIRM

Moderate Run of Cows and Heifers Taken at Week's Highest Level -Stocker and Feeder Outlet Unchanged.

No change in prices was reflected in the smail .oiume of steer business transacted here this morning. Gen-eral receipts were estimated at 400 head and out of this number there

and western steers are closing steady to strong with a week ago and in some instances a 10c advance is quotable. This applies, broadly speaking, to all steers with a selling value above \$7.00. Steers selling below the \$7.00 mark have had good call the greater part of the week and the general run of such offerings are selling at an advance of 10 @15c over last week, with spots on some of the western contingent selling around and under \$6.25 considered 25c higher than a week considered 25c higher than a week ago. COWS. BULLIS AND MIXED.

There was a fair run of butchers' stock on sale today, considering the size of the general cattle run. Offerings met a fairly actide demand at steady prices, in comparison with yesterday, and the supply was bought up in good season. Bulls and veals were unchanged.

Cows and heifers have sold freely all week and sellers have succeeded in forcing an advance in rates on the general run of female killing stock. Vigorous demand from all quarters in connection with light receipts made possible a higher set of figures. The general run of cows are selling fully 10 @ 15c higher than a week ago. Canners shared in the advance of 10 @ 15c, with a good many sales quotable 20c highthan last week. Keen demand for canning stock has been a prominent feature of the week's market. Trade sessions fully regained and are quotable and last week. Keen demand for canning stock has been a prominent feature of the week's market. Trade in helfers has had a distinctly higher trend all week and prices are 15@25c better than a week ago, and largely 50 @75c higher than the low period two weeks ago. Quite a little business was done in good helfers and mixed yearlings at \$7.00 @7.65, with a few choice up to \$8.50. A good share of the pretty good helfers sold at \$6.25@6.75, with a rather plain class going at \$5.25@5.75. A few extra choice heavy cows sold at \$7.00 @7.25, but \$6.00@6.75 bought a very good class of corn-fed cows. A spread of \$5.00 @6.00 caught most of the useful grass and short-fed cows, with plain killers holding around \$4.65@5.00 and cutters largely at \$4.40@4.65. Most of the canner cows sold at \$8.75@4.25. Good butcher bulls, selling from \$5.00 upward, are closing 10@15c higher than last week, with no improvement quotable on the plain bologna and feeder classes. IMPARTING FRAGRANCE TO TEA

Species of Jasmine Flower Used by the Chinese to Give Beverage the Desired Aroma.

It is estimated that the Chinese consume annually five pounds of tea for each member of the population. It grows in small patches around the homesteads, plantations being practically unknown. The leaves are picked by members of the family and dried in the sun, being subsequently handed over to the middlemen, who subject them to the process of firing. In the case of green tea the leaves are roasted almost immediately after they are gathered, and dried off quickand squeezed. There are usually three pickings early in April, when the leaves are covered with a whitish down (a limited output known as pekoe); toward the middle of May and again in August. Brick tea is made by pressing the damp tea in a mold long and about one inch thick. The fragrance of all scented tea is not natural, but imparted by firing the leaf with a sort of fasmine flower, called by the Chinese "mok-lee." In inferior teas the scenting flower is strewn over the top of the tea when packed and removed after a day or two. Flowery pekoes are white, velvety tipped teas with no fragrance and are unfermented.

How Hot is Lava?

To ascertain the temperature of lava as it is emitted from a volcand has baffled many scientists. The Roman academy has just published the results of the investigations made by Giovani Platania during the erup tion of Etna last year.

The eruption began September 10 and the scientist was unable to approach the -mountain for ten days when one crater was still in action He camped as near as he could to this crater, close to a stream of lave

flowing about a yard a second. Using the new "telescope pyro meter." he got temperatures for the surface of the lava flow of all the way from 1,040 to 1,420 degrees.

A second series of observations taken at a distance of a dozen feet, gave figures as high as 1,500 degrees The estimates are that the incan descent lava, as it comes directly from the crater, has a temperature not less than 2,200 degrees.
