Hutton explained that farm and ranch operators are required to make accurate reports of wages for their hired hands and to report their own earnings to the District Director of Internal Revenue for social security purposes. Good Farm or ranch records assure prompt and accurate payments of social security benefit to the farmer and rancher. These records do not have to be elaborate but they should show the various types of farm or ranch income and expenses.
