Boydston Hardware Is Under New Ownership; Ribbon Cutting Held

When was the last time you walked into a store and spotted a windmill for sale? Or where was the last place you knew you could shop to locate screen door corner braces?

Well, you can find both of these items at Boydston Hardware at 210 Market St. in Baird.

Boydston has come under new ownership and that was marked with a "Red Ribbon Cutting Ceremony" in front of the store, on Thursday, February 19.

New owners are Steve and Lynette Bowen. On hand to help the Bowen's with the ribbon cutting were members of the Baird Chamber of Commerce, previous owners Eugene and Diane

Bell, and fellow local merchants and well wishers.

The Bowens took over the store only on January 1, but have resided in Baird for 20 years. Steve is retired from the Texas Department of Transportation.

The store stocks a wide variety of items: from decorative yard windmills to paint. It also carries plumbing and electrical supplies, gardening supplies and tools, as well as fishing and sporting related goods.

"From what people tell me," states Steve, "Boydston has been in continuous operations since 1885, and I hope to keep it in operation for years to come for the people of Baird and the

surrounding area."

Steve also added that he sees the store growing and adding new items so to meet his customers needs and demands.

One of his goals for Boydston Hardware? "To have it become the fly fishing headquarters of West Texas!"

Steve and Lynette are excited about their new store and invite all of their friends to come and visit them at their new business.

Truck Wreck February 21

El Paso resident Gerardo "Gerry" Galvez, 31, remains in serious condition today in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene after surviving a tremendous truck wreck last Saturday, Feb. 21.

The wreck took place on the westbound lane of I-20 at the top of the hill between Clyde and Baird near mile marker 305. Department of Public Safety reports state that Galvez was in the sleeper of an 18-wheeler when the vehicle, driven by John Michael Petty, 32, also of El Paso, hit a slick spot and he driver lost control.

Petty was treated and released on Saturday.

About 150 feet of guardrail was damaged in the wreck and the trench made by the jack-knifed 1996 Freightliner tractor-trailer rig is still quite apparent.

The truck was owned by Menlo Logistics of Redwood City, Ca., and was on its way to El Paso.

The Baggage House Restaurant

(Editor's Note: This is the first of what we hope will be a continuing column to visit and acquaint our citizens with the businesses and people of Baird and our surrounding area.)

Baird's history is emphatically tied to that of the Western railroad. The old "iron horse" did much to put our town "on the map". Nowhere is that heritage more apparent than at The Baggage House Restaurant!

One of the oldest buildings in Baird, the former Texas and Pacific structure once housed the baggage and suitcases of people traveling to Baird. Today, it accomodates locals and vistors alike as a pleasant stop for a good meal in a historical setting.

The Baggage House Restaurant opened its doors January 2 of this year and is owned by Lee Roy and Nola Oliver, together with their son, Rick Oliver.

Lee Roy and Nola

are well known in the Callahan County area as they have resided here since 1978. Lee Roy is "semi-retired" from C & W Leasing in Abilene, and Nola has previously worked in Clyde at the Village Market, and been a pre-kindergarten teacher at "Grandma's House." Rick is an experienced restaurant manager with years of training and experience at Dos Amigos and La Bodega in Abilene. He has returned to Baird from the Northeast part of the country where he continued to be involved in the restaurant business.

The Olivers are quite proud of their new eating place and have many plans in the works for making it even better.

The building, located at 225 Chestnut, had been opened previously as the Iron Skillet Restaurant and the Olivers credit K.D. Griffin and Emma Bringham for the work done in creating the restaurant's unique Western/Texas look.

Not only is the building unique, but so is the food. The Baggage House specializes in bar-b-que and steaks. All the meat is cooked using mesquite wood fueled grills and cookers. Other items available include chicken fried steaks and catfish---with an "All You Can Eat" catfish night on Friday evenings.

The eating place is open every day except Monday's. (Check their ad in this paper for exact times.)

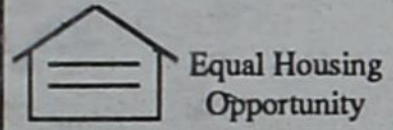

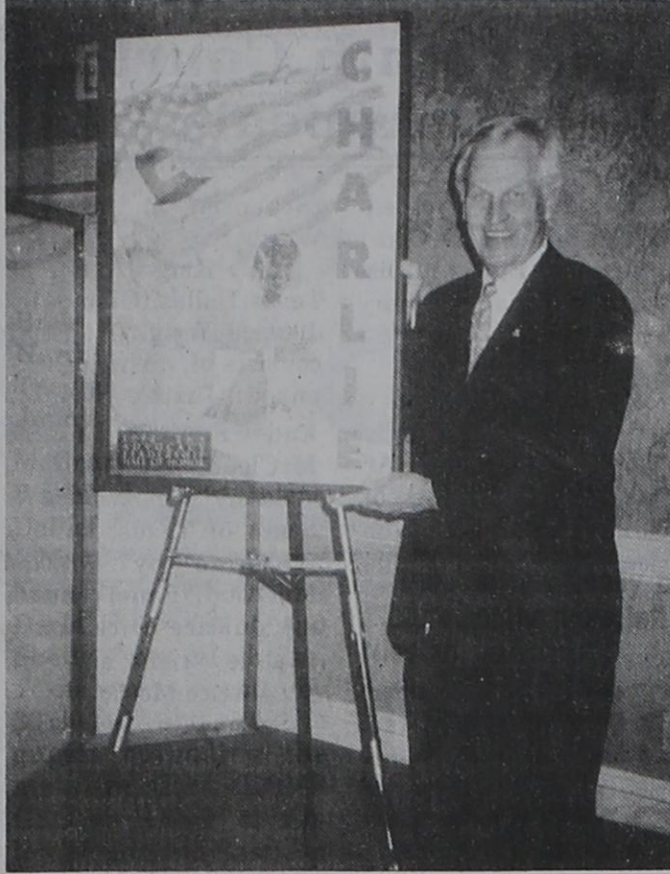

Stenholm Receives THA Advocacy Award Feb. 2

Rep. Charlie Stenholm (D-Stamford) was inducted into the THA-The Associate of Texas Hospitals and Health Care Organizations' Advocacy Leadership Hall of Honor during a special award presentation and reception on Feb. 2. The advocacy award honors public officials who have made career achievements toward improving health care in Texas. Approximately 100 Texas health care advocates attended the ceremony in Washington, D.C. The award was presented to Rep. Stenholm by Donald L. Stewart, chairman of the THA Board of Trustees and president of Columbia/HC's South Texas Division in Corpus Christi. "Rep Stenholm is an invaluable leader in the U.S. House of Representatives. Throughout his career, he has worked to protect and improve health care by developing sound public policy that is in the best interest of the people of Texas and our nation," said Stewart. "He has the skill, integrity and courage needed to serve in this important role," he added. During the award ceremony, Michael C. Waters, FACHE, president and chief executive officer of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene, presented Rep. 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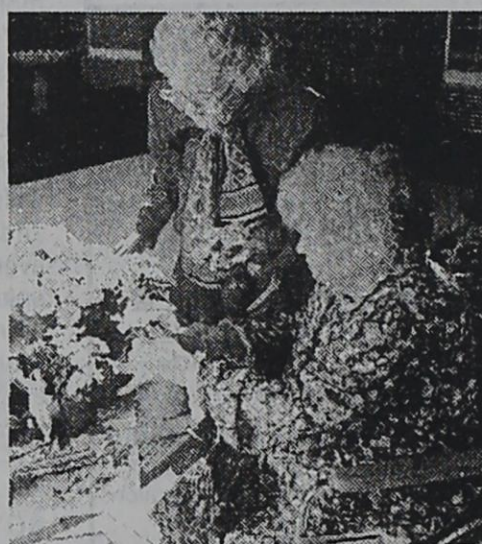
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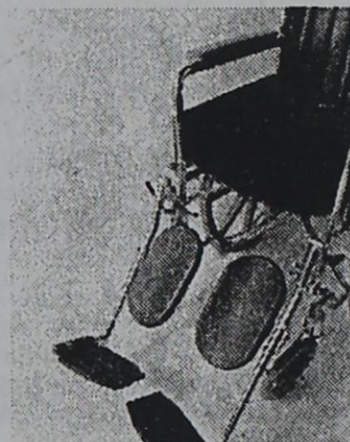
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
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MORE TAX-CUTTING IDEAS FOR 1998

In my previous column, I discussed several new tax provisions for 1998, and I encouraged you to start planning as soon as possible. In this column, I focus on new rules for individual retirement accounts (IRAs). Once again, it pays to start planning early.


New for 1998, the Roth IRA could be worth investigating. Contributions to a Roth IRA aren't tax-deductible, but principal and earnings are never again subject to tax. As a married couple, you qualify for a full contribution to a Roth IRA if your income is \$150,000 or less (\$95,000 or less for singles).

If you already have an IRA, you may be eligible to roll it into a Roth IRA without incurring an early withdrawal penalty, although you must pay regular income tax on whatever amount you choose to roll. For rollovers made in 1998, the income tax can be paid in four annual installments. Rollovers in later years will be hit with the full tax bill all at once.

You might also find a traditional IRA more attractive in 1998 than in prior years if you are covered by a retirement plan at work. You can now make a full IRA contribution if you're married and your joint income is \$50,000 or less (up from \$40,000 under prior law). The corresponding income limit for singles covered by a company retirement plan is \$30,000 (up from \$25,000 under prior law).


Prior law treated both spouses as plan participants even when only one spouse has an employer-sponsored plan at work. The 1997 law changes that. Now a spouse who isn't covered by an employer plan may make a deductible IRA contribution of up to \$2,000 even if the other spouse is covered by a retirement plan. However, once joint income reaches \$150,000, the deductible contribution starts to phase out and is completely eliminated at \$160,000 of income.

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales said last week that Gov. George W. Bush and state legislators are delaying the settlement with the tobacco industry and withholding money that should be going to children's health care.

"The money is sitting in the bank. Thousands of children are sick. Let's get that money to the kids," Morales was quoted in the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Under federal law, Texas' \$15.2 billion settlement with cigarette makers could become effective Feb. 23, a date 30 days after U.S. District Judge David Folsom approved it. According to Morales, Texas could begin using the money that day, to extend health insurance

to 72,000 poor children across the state.

Bush and the legislators rebutted Morales' assertion, saying that state law, which requires the Legislature to appropriate money before spending it, prevents them from immediately spending it. Legislators must write a new state budget when they convene in January 1999.

"It's not up to Morales to decide how to distribute that money. The money will be distributed through the appropriations process," said Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Marble Falls. Fraser is one of seven state senators who have filed a motion to prevent expenditure of the settlement.

Test Preparer Lauds Program
A new Texas A&M program that doesn't require the Medical College Admissions Test for some students has drawn praise from a company that prepares incoming students to take standardized tests.

Paul Cohen, a spokesman for Princeton Review, said the MCAT and other such tests are poor indicators of a student's ability.

"If these tests really measured how well you were going to do in medical school and law school, you couldn't take a test-preparation course and go up 6 points. We don't make our students better doctors or lawyers. We make them better test-takers," Cohen said, adding that

he believes the tests are racially biased.

The A&M program, which addresses declining minority enrollment, recruits students from areas with large minority populations. It offers guaranteed admission to the A&M medical program to applicants who maintain a high enough grade-point average in an approved curriculum.

TAAS Guides Shipped
Copies of a study guide to help students pass the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exit exam have been shipped to high schools across the state.

The "Working Through TAAS" guides cover the same skills that are taught in school and tested on.

Education Commissioner Mike Moses said, "The new guides will help the students be better prepared for the TAAS when they take it again next month."

High school students must pass the TAAS to graduate. They may take it up to eight times starting in their sophomore year.

TAAS guides — designed to help parents tutor their children over the summer — will be available in June for students in third through eighth grades.

Austin Seeks Rail Funding

Austin's transit agency is preparing a proposal for \$100 million in federal money for a light-rail passenger service. This spring, Congress is to decide what projects get funded.

Also competing for federal funding is the Austin-San Antonio Corridor Council, which wants to build

a commuter rail line connecting San Antonio and Round Rock.

Both projects address the need to relieve ever-increasing traffic congestion along Interstate 35.

Presently, Dallas is the only other Texas city with light-rail service.

Other Capital Highlights

■ The University of Texas board of regents has approved the construction of a \$40 million dormitory to open in the fall of 2000. The cost is estimated at \$40,000 per bed for 1,000 students or \$45,000 per student if it is built to house 800 students.

■ The Texas Supreme Court ruled Feb. 13 that Dallas Area Rapid Transit can withhold records requested by *The Dallas Morning News* in the 1997 death of a 9-year-old girl. The child was crushed beneath the rear wheels of a DART bus as she was returning from school. The matter now goes to the

appeals court.

■ Concerned about low pay and high turnover of nonteaching staff, University of Texas faculty voted to donate a portion of next school year's raises to the staff. The move will provide about \$300,000 more for staff.

■ The Texas attorney general's office is conducting an investigation into Microsoft Corp.'s business practices, but a state district court judge ruled last week that the computer software giant can maintain agreements it has with other companies to keep some information about their dealings secret.

■ The Texas Department of Public Safety is warning owners and players of "eight-liner" casino-style gambling machines that they could face criminal charges if found using or operating them. There are an estimated 20,000 such machines in Texas.

Dr. B.J. Alexander, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs at the University, released the names of students honored during the
