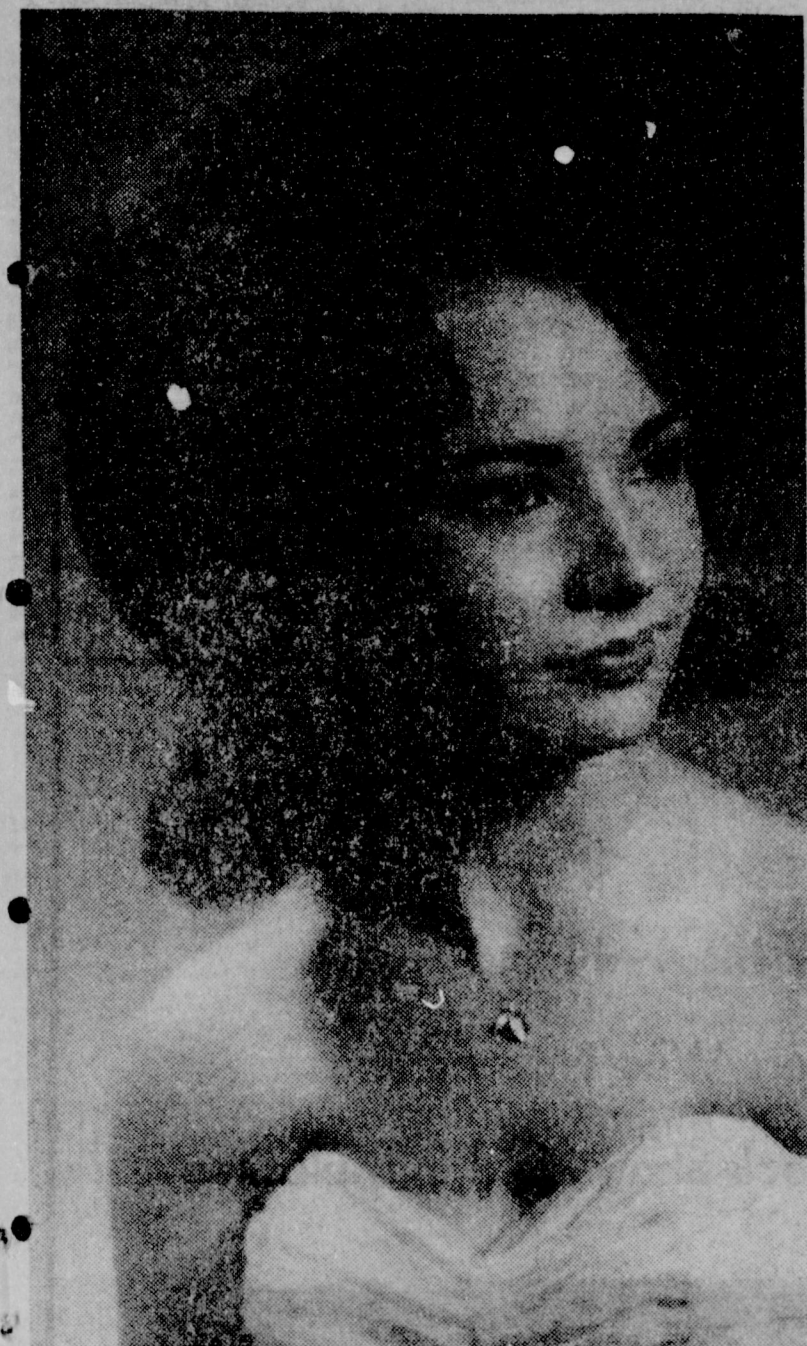

## Carl L. Houston Participates In Navy Exercise

USS PERKINS (FHNC) - Carl L. Houston, electrician's mate second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Houston of Route 5, Muleshoe, Tex., is participating aboard the destroyer USS Perkins in a coordinated U. S. Nationalist Chinese amphibious exercise called "Operation Backpack" being conducted off the coast of Taiwan.

Backpack is an exercise to test the amphibious capabilities and readiness of the forces of the Seventh Fleet and the Nationalist Chinese Navy. The exercise, with over 40,000 men and 143 units participating, will culminate in an amphibious assault on beaches of southern Taiwan, and will demonstrate the effectiveness of the United States Seventh Fleet to rapidly move a significant combat force to a troubled area in order to assist an ally.

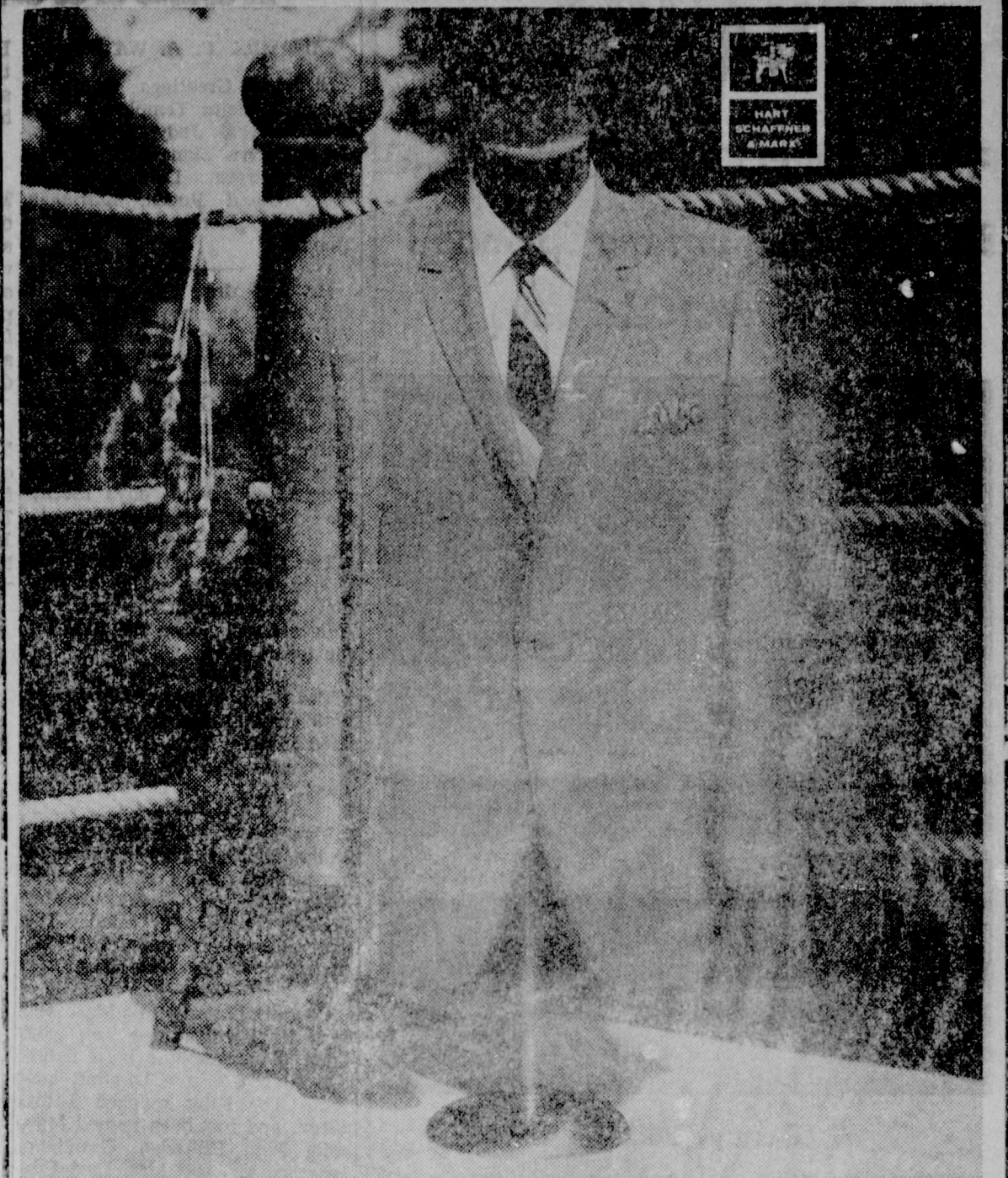

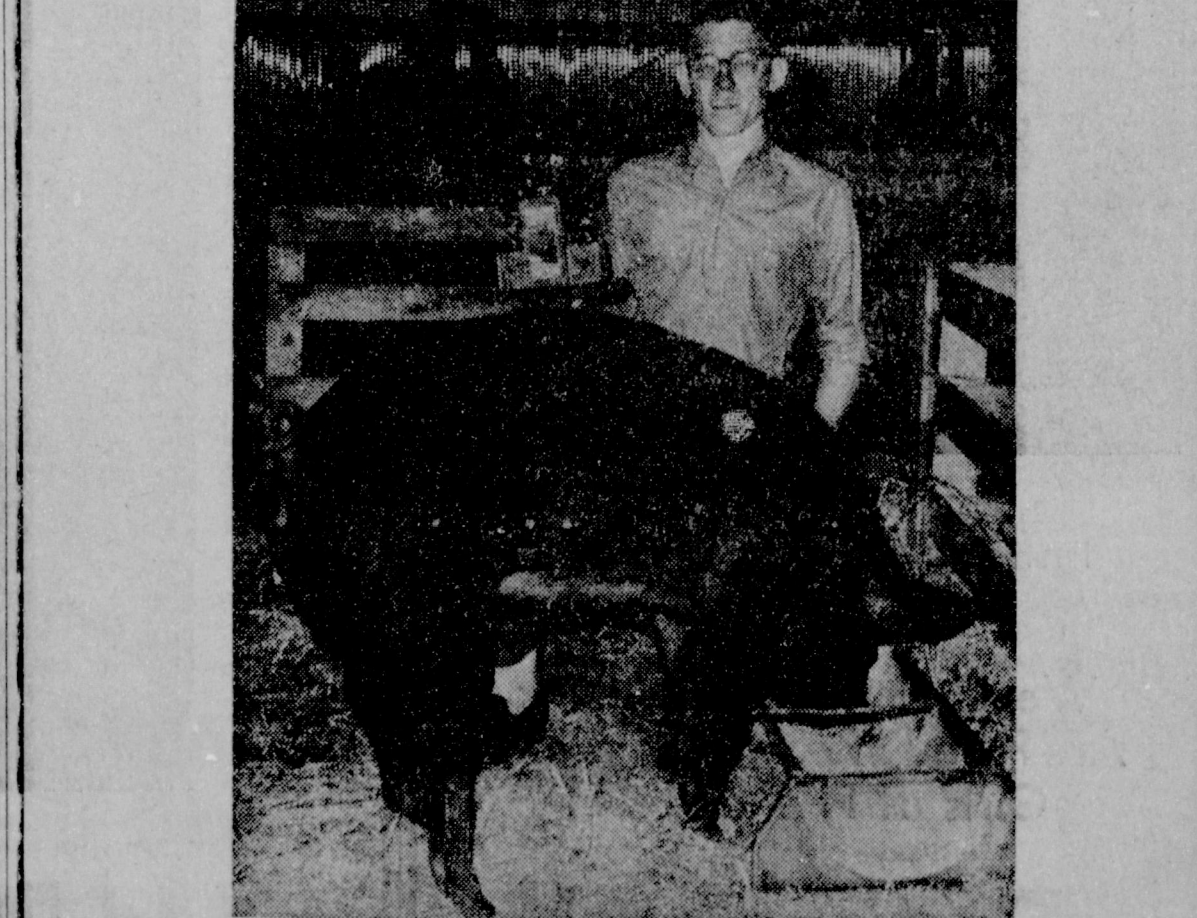

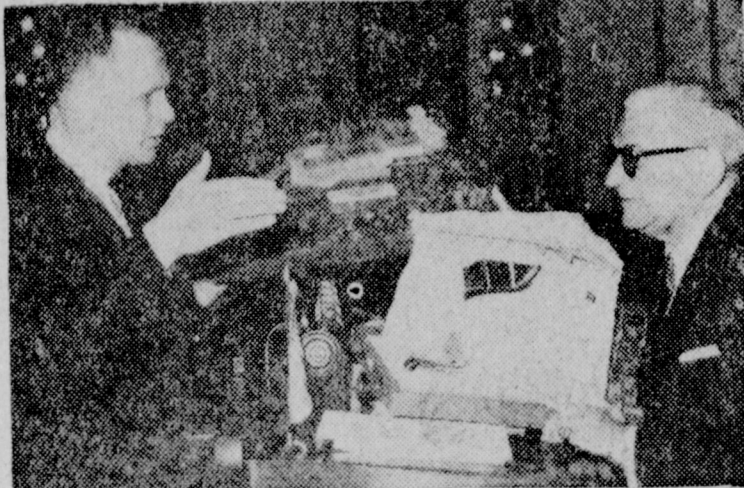

The program has been authorized by the House of Representatives, and is awaiting Senate action now that committee hearings there have ended.

## U. S. Establishes New Emergency Broadcast Net

An imminent or actual attack on the United States would find the Nation better prepared than ever to get official information and survival instructions to the people through the Emergency Broadcast System (EBS) established by the Federal Communications Commission.

EBS allows selected AM radio stations to continue broadcasting on their normal frequencies and with regular power even after an attack emergency is

### In an Emergency . . .

If there is a nuclear attack on the United States, or the imminent threat of one, tune your standard AM radio to your local stations at their normal places on the dial until you hear the one that is part of the Emergency Broadcast System. That station, which will identify itself by location but not by call letters, will be on the air with official information, news and instructions on things you and your family can do to survive. Be sure you are prepared for an emergency by getting a battery-operated radio and spare batteries.

declared in order to get vital warning and survival information to the public. It would carry essential news and official information from the President and officials of Federal, State, and local governments.

EBS SUCCEEDED the old CONELRAD system on August 5 after the Department of Defense determined that the continued operation of the Nation's broadcasting stations no longer constituted a significant navigation aid to enemy bombers and missiles. The new EBS system permits stations to begin broadcasting emergency information almost instantly after an attack warning is received.

Stations not affiliated with EBS, and all FM and television stations, would go off the air. Some of these facilities will be incorporated into future refinements and extensions of EBS.

To assure that vital emergency broadcasting is not interrupted by fallout sufficient to force evacuation of the stations, the Office of Civil Defense, Department of Defense, is providing fallout protection, emergency generators, and emergency radio program links to selected emergency broadcast stations.

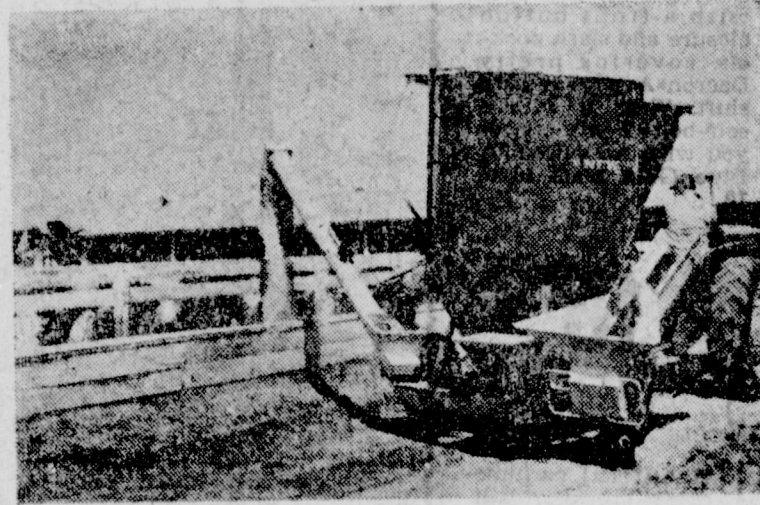

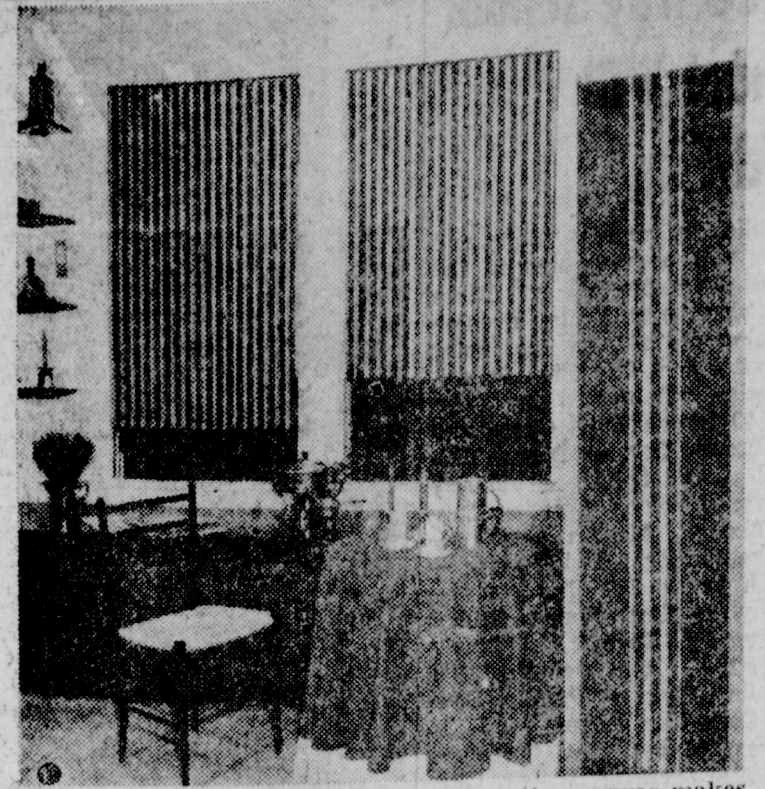

**IT'S THE LAW**  
in Texas

**NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?**

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it — but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to his share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

**HISTORY OF WILLS**

Courts see that your intention of "will" as to property is carried out after you die. Before then you may revoke or change it any time.

The passing of property to heirs is one of man's oldest transactions. As far back as the Egyptian, Assyrian and Jewish civilizations, we have wills written and witnessed on papyrus, clay tablets, etc. In one will an early testator left some of his property to his wife and named a guardian for his children.

The Hammurabi code (2100 B. C.) permitted a father by deed to favor his son. Under early Roman law the head of a house could tell the patrician assembly his wishes, but later Roman law favored a written will to keep the testator's plans secret until death. It also favored having a firm record of his wishes, not resting on memory.

By 2100 A. D., England, where we got our law of wills, was quite well advanced. The church courts (like our probate courts) supervised disposition of property according to a "testament" of how the testator wanted his property to go.

Church courts supervised personal property (movables like armor or personal effects); land was passed on by wills which the king's court handled. Hence today we speak of "last will and testament" since English courts came to pass on both real and personal property, so that one court could handle the whole estate.

English church courts had "executors" who carried out one's testament. To die "intestate" (without a testament) was almost like dying unconfessed. Sometimes the church in the interests of a man's soul could give some of the man's goods to others besides his family. Then, a now, one property had to be left to the surviving wife and children.

By the time of the American Colonies, the laws were well settled, and law courts, rather than church courts, administered and distributed estates here.

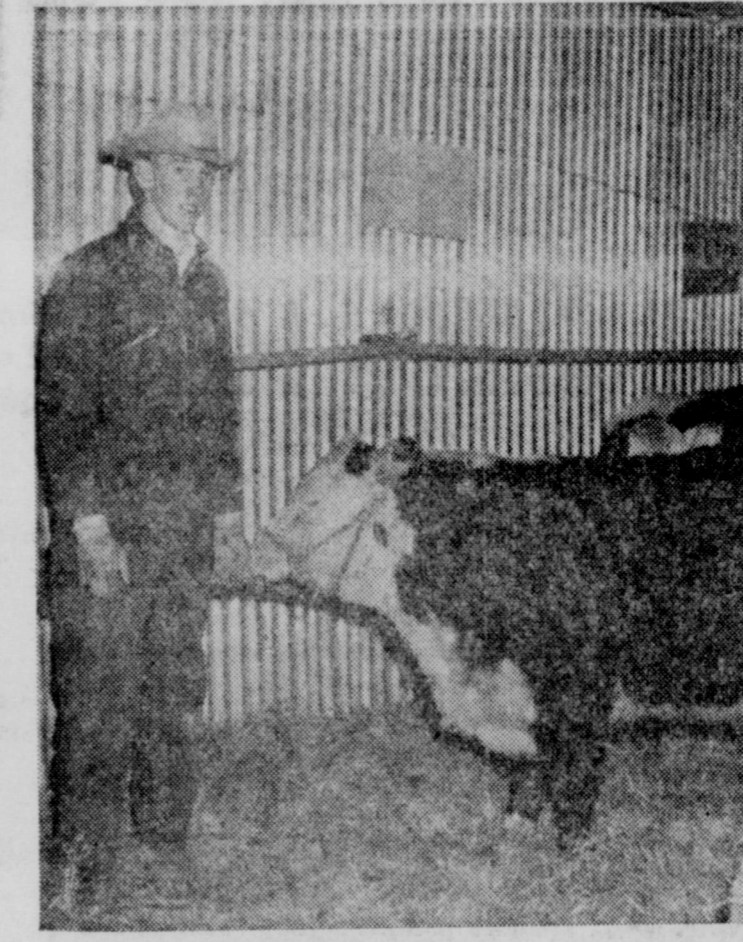

### Congressman Pool Has Largest District

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The man who represents the largest district in the 88th Congress, Congressman at Large Joe Pool of Texas, has done some figuring to show how many of his colleagues in the House represent unusual fat or thin districts. Associate Justice John Harlan of the Supreme Court, in his dissent in the recent decision of the Court that 398 districts were "unconstitutional" under the Court ruling.

Pool's figures are not identical with Harlan's. "If we were to disqualify Congressmen representing districts whose population was 10 percent large or smaller than the state average, we would disqualify 236," Pool said. "If we allow a 20 percent variation either way, only 125 Congressmen are sitting in violation of the new ruling. And if we take the compromise figure of 15 percent which has been suggested, 173 would be disqualified."

Pool said that all of his figures included both Michigan and Wisconsin, states which have recently redistricted, but whose present delegations were elected before redistricting took place.

Pool, who represents 10,116,000 people who live in a "district" which at one point is 801 miles from north to south — the air distance from Atlanta to Omaha — and 773 miles from east to west has words of advice for Congressmen who may be elected at large this year as a result of failure of their states to redistrict:

"If you can afford a plane, it will help. If you can't, a new set of automobile tires would be a good investment. And while you are having your picture taken for campaign posters, ask the photographer to make you a new picture of your wife and children, because until the campaign is over, you won't see very much of them."

"Running an at large race is hard in many ways," Pool said. "But once it's over, you'll be glad you had the chance. You'll finish by knowing more about more people than you ever could otherwise. And that is, after all, the best thing about politics."

staffed by 7300 people serving in almost every part of the free world. Almost 200 of them are from Texas.

The Senate has approved a bill authorizing an increase in money for the Peace Corps from \$96 million to \$115 million.

With this increase we will raise the number of Peace Corps workers from 7300 to 14,000 by June of this year, by which time the Peace Corps will be nearing its fourth birthday.

Where will they serve?

By August 31, 1965, the Peace Corps will have 5,900 workers in Latin America, 4,250 in Africa, 2,150 in the Far East and 1,700 in the Near East and South Asia.

You will note that the Peace Corps is planning to double its operational power without doubling its budget. This is being done because the Peace Corps, still a fairly young organization, is learning how to cut down on operational costs.

For example, there are fewer Peace Corps employees in Washington than there were a year ago. Supplies furnished Peace Corps volunteers in one area are being re-used in other areas. Printing, telephone and travel costs have been cut. And the Peace Corps expects countries making use of our volunteers to put up a bigger share of the cost.

The Peace Corps is staffed 40 per cent by women and 60 per cent by men. Most are teachers or community development workers. Some volunteers have special technical skills. This is a good way to utilize some of the fine young minds of America.

The 88th Congress and this administration are seeking other ways as well. The Senate has passed the Youth Conservation Corps Act, now pending in the House, to provide work for young people between 16 and 22.

They would work in conservation, development and management of natural resources and recreational areas, such as our great national parks.

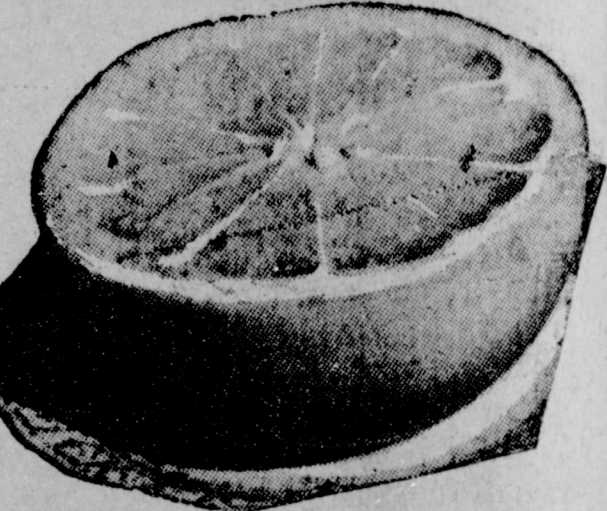

those who requested it — asking for opinions and comments. The answers were pretty quick in coming. Most Texans with whom I talked and with whom I corresponded in the form in which it was reported to the Senate. Many had suggestions on how we could improve the measure. Some didn't feel that they liked the measure very much, but were willing to take it in preference to nothing. And although they didn't think it was perfect, they thought that perhaps his was all they could get and would prefer to go ahead and let this one go by.

In view of all this, though, I am sponsoring several amendments that would improve the bill. The major amendment simplifies the entire cotton act by establishing the loan rate at the world price and setting equalization payments to producers to protect their income.

This would have the effect of moving cotton in normal trade channels rather than storage warehouses, and it would also protect the income of farmers during a period of transition toward a free market.

I believe that this would be far easier to administer and would be more economical for the taxpayer. It would help all segments of the cotton industry. And it would not provide for what we might call a five-sided subsidy as would be the result of the present bill. Only one subsidy would go directly to the producer to protect his income.

I have offered other amendments designed to improve the bill. One amendment I offered would

Following is a transcript of Senator Tower's report on H. R. 6196, the farm bill. In it the Senator gives his views on the legislation as it came to the Senate, and comments on some amendments he prepared for introduction.

There has been some discussion in the Senate this past week of H. R. 6169, or the farm bill. By the time you hear this, we may have disposed of the measure; we may have debated it formally on the Floor; or we may still be involved in a procedural wrangle; or we may be on civil rights. At the time this program was being recorded, I couldn't predict exactly whether or not we were going to take up the farm bill during the week.

As the bill came out of the Senate Committee, it contains provisions dealing with both wheat and cotton. It has two principal sections. In my opinion, this is exceedingly unfortunate.

The section dealing with wheat was added in the final days of committee hearings on the measure, and is similar to one that is bottled up in committee in the House of Representatives. As the bill was sent to us from the House, it did not contain a section on wheat; thus, the wheat

provision has never been considered by the House.

Too, the section dealing with cotton has been changed from the way it left the House.

So here we have two sections of a bill that in my opinion had not been thoroughly aired in public to the extent that farmers were completely familiar with its content. For that reason, shortly after it came out of committee and was brought up on the Floor of the Senate, I raised an objection to the Administration's attempt to run the bill through the Senate in what I considered undue haste. I point out here that many of us tried to work out acceptable cotton legislation during the long, slow days of the First Session of this Congress. For reasons of its own, the Administration didn't see fit to push matter. It appeared to be more interested in other matters. Perhaps the Administration was still in a state of shock from being so thoroughly repudiated at the polls by the wheat farmers, but whatever the reason, they didn't see fit to move deliberately in the field of corrective agricultural legislation.

After my objections were raised, I sent copies of the bill to various interested Texans —

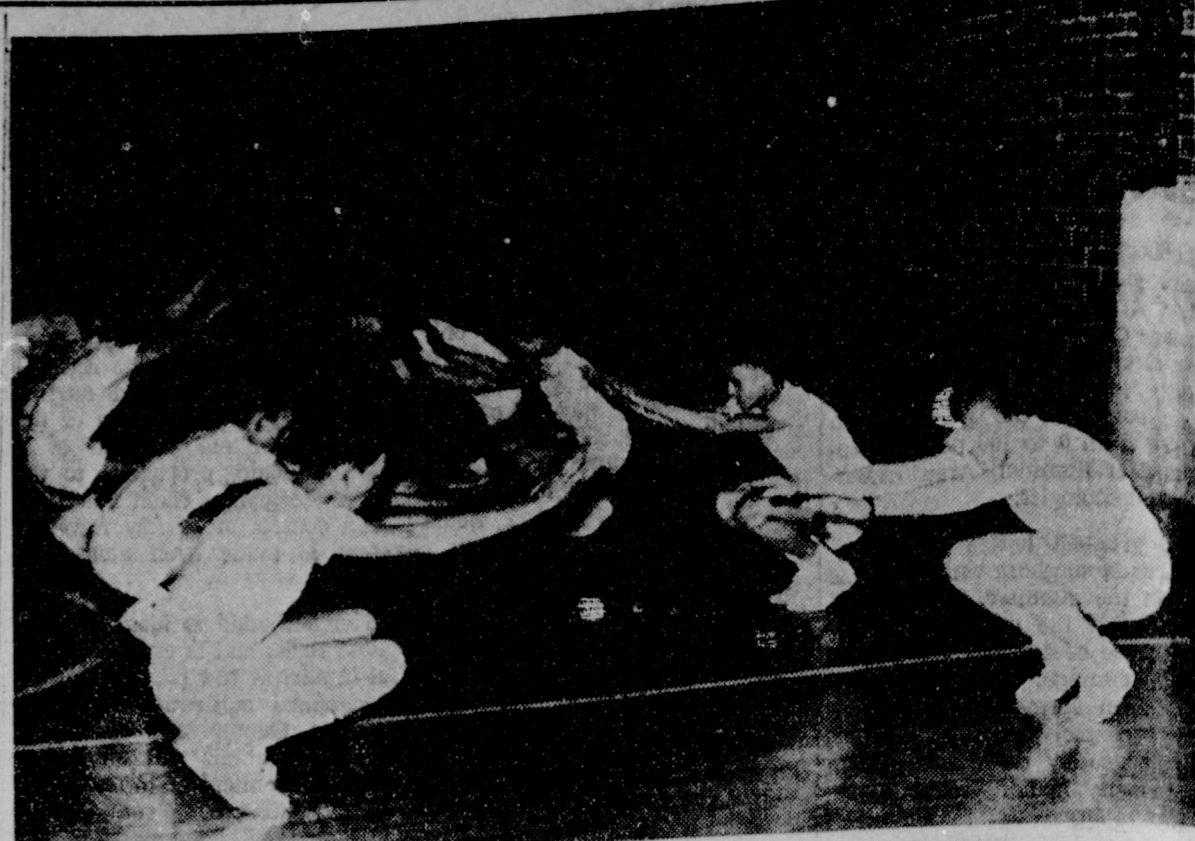

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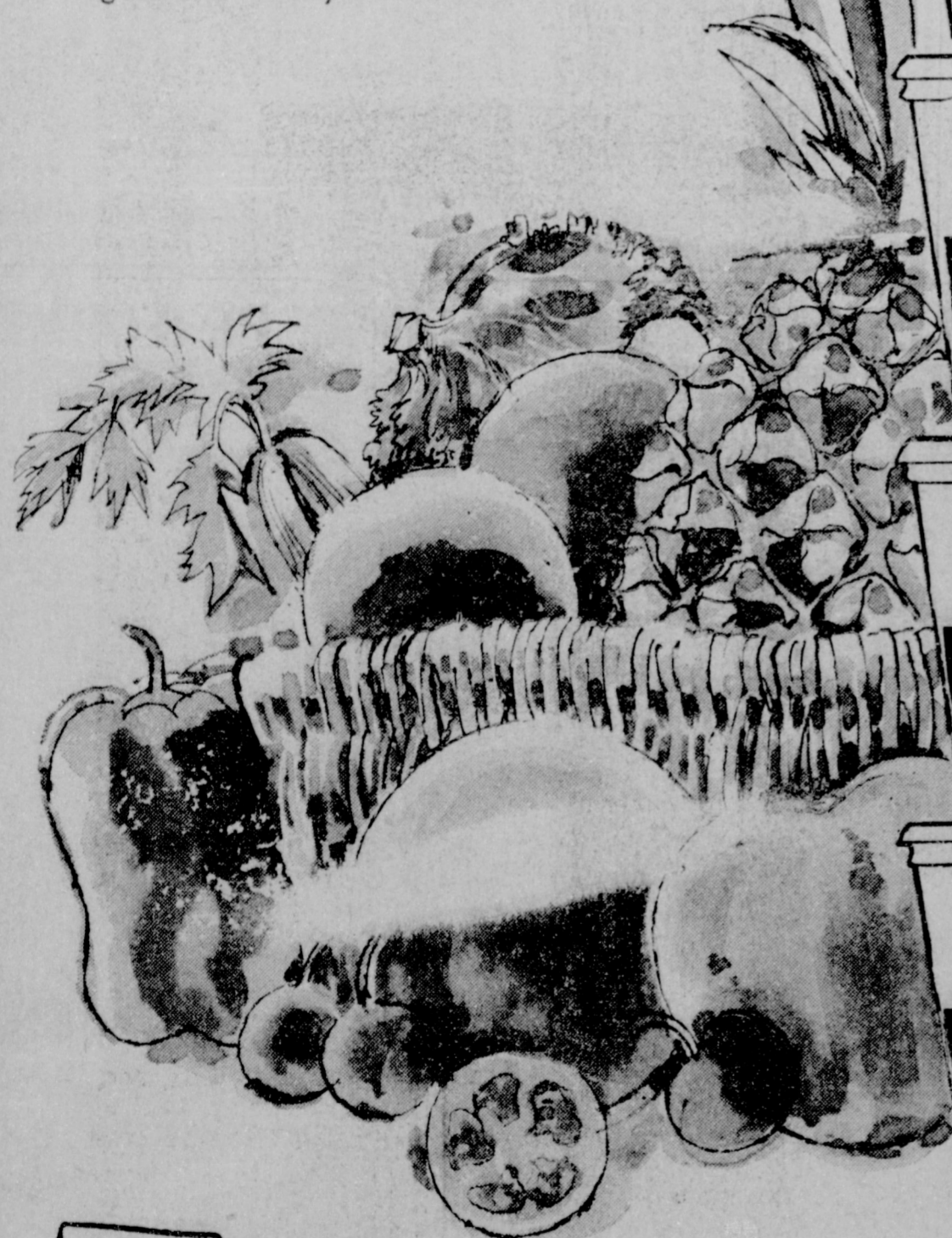
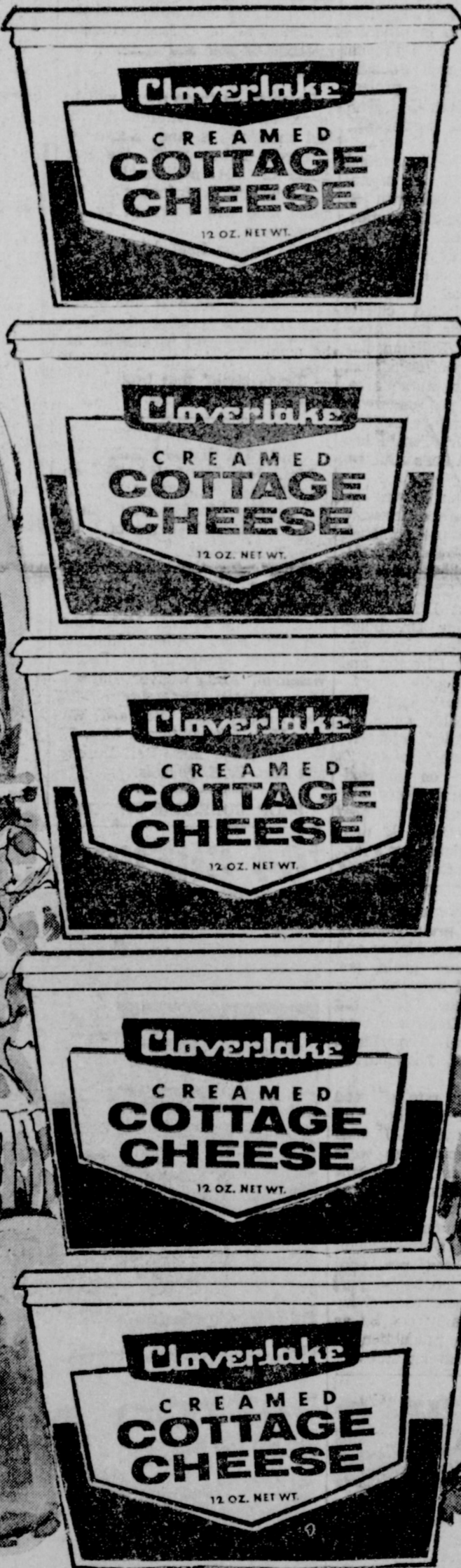

For many years the carp was considered absolutely worthless. It was rated as a pest that contaminated our waters and did no good whatsoever.

Then an angler caught one of these bronze-colored scrappers on sport tackle. That incident shed new light on the carp's personality. Anti-carp sentiment began to waver slightly. Maybe, just maybe, this carp wasn't as bad as most people led us to believe. When it comes to public relations, the carp is about the sorriest fish that swims. It has carried this stigma of being a pest for so long that it doesn't know how to act in its newest role, that of a sport fish. But many people don't cuss the carp anymore. They're too busy having a ball

catching it. Five years ago it was rare to see anyone fishing for carp; today carp fishermen are fairly commonplace on all our Texas lakes. There is good reason for this upsurge in popularity. A piscatorial survey in the Highland Lakes of Central Texas a few years back revealed, for instance, that the balance of fish population was something like 70 per cent rough fish and 30 per cent game fish.

This means, quite simply, that your odds of catching a rough fish are much better than a game fish.

Which brings us back to a much-debated question. Just what is a game fish? One that will hit an artificial bait? If this is

the true guidestick, then the carp can't be classified as a game fish. But on the business end of a fishing line, this stubborn battler does itself proud. It is a strong, grudging scrapper that doesn't know what the word "quit" means.

But just because they are plentiful doesn't mean they are easy to catch. Quite the contrary. Carp and its kissin' cousin the buffalo, can be just as ornery as a bass at times. The man who succeeds day and in and day out, of course, is the person who knows his ABC's of carp-fishing technique.

You don't have to travel far to find a supply of catchable carp. They are literally everywhere. All of our man-made lakes carry an astronomical population. So do our streams.

Only worry is getting them congregated in an area. This is best done by baiting. Most popular system is simply to scatter chunks of cottonseed cake in the water or anchor burlap bags of cottonseed meal on the bottom. Carp are attracted to the cottonseed.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (Reagan State Building, Austin) has two free booklets which give the lowdown on carp fishing. They are titled "What the Experts Say About Carp Fishing" and "Let's Go Carp Fishing."

In these booklets there are many recipes for concocting your own baits. But many commercial baits now on the market are just as good.

These dough baits are best fished on a tiny treble hook (about the No. 19 size) since the carp has a small, round mouth. Simply mold the bait around the hook, throw it out and sit back to wait. Carp fishing isn't a fast sport. The person who succeeds at it is long on patience.

A carp roots along the bottom, sucking up food with its round mouth. It will pick up a bait which is lying still on bottom but will ignore one that is moving at all.

A carp telegraphs it hit in a series of light taps. The secret is having a delicate feel, letting the carp get the bait fully inside its mouth before driving the steel home.

Any kind of tackle is suitable for carp fishing. A medium-sized spinning outfit seems to be the universal favorite.

Contrary to popular belief, carp aren't too bad on the dinner table. Secret is knowing how to

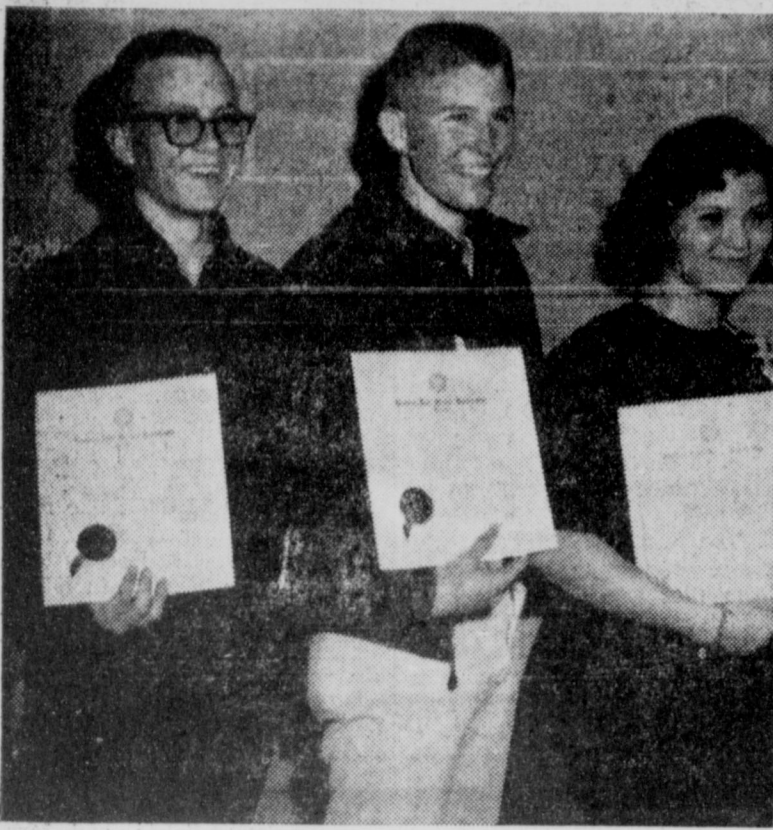

## The Sandhills Philosopher



Editor's note: The Sandhill's Philosopher on his grass farm raises an unhappy thought about the tax cut in his letter this week.

Dear editor:

I have never been caught standing in the way of progress — sitting, maybe, or lying down, but never standing — and therefore I don't want to be misunderstood when I say I have a question or two to ask about the big income tax cut Congress has just voted.

It's not that I'm not in favor of it, far from it. In fact, I'm not only in favor of this tax cut, I'm in favor of another one every year from now on. It should be a spring custom.

But I have been thinking about the cut, which will mean an eleven and a half billion-dollar saving to us tax payers, and I'm afraid Congress has forgotten something.

What I mean is, how many town and city governments, are looking the situation over right now and rubbing their hands and saying, "Let's see now, if Federal taxes are cut by eleven and a half billion, that means so many hundred millions the people of Texas will have to spend, and in view of the fact the state always needs more revenue, how's the quickest way to get hold of some of it?"

That's the flaw in the tax cut bill. What Congress needs to do immediately is call the bill back and put an amendment on it making it against the law for anybody to spend his Federal tax savings on increased state or local taxes. As the President himself said on television, the purpose of the tax cut is to increase

the people's spending power, and that's what I aim to do with mine. On a matter like that, I can cooperate 100 per cent.

As I understand it, it was the clear intention of Congress that if your tax cut amounts to say \$213.98, you're supposed to buy a washing machine with it, or make the downpayment on color T. V., or buy some new tires, or whatever, just so it stimulates the economy. But where would the economy be if Washington gives us eleven and a half billion to spend and the states jump in and sponge it up?

I'm in favor of giving this new notion a fair trial, and I hope the states will too. In fact, why don't states reduce their taxes too. Don't they want their economy stimulated?
