CLYDE WINS SECOND PLACE AT DISTRICT MEET THURSDAY

CLYDE — The Bulldogs scored 103½ points in the District 8AA track meet at Comanche last Thursday to finish as runner-up behind Coleman's 125 points. The Bulldogs nosed out meet favorites Cisco and Hamilton, who finished 3rd and 4th with 95 and 79½ points respectively. Comanche had 63 and Eastland took 25 points.

Rick Loper pole vaulted 12'6" and Paul Beeman raced the 100 in 102 for first places, and David Dunn threw the shot 47'8" for 2nd place. Timmy Payne took 2nd in the discus with 130', and Beeman ran the 220 in 23.7 for another 2nd. Chuck Swofford had 10'6" in the pole vault. Loper, Swofford, Beeman, Dunn and Payne will be in Odessa this Thursday, at 4 p. m., as qualifiers for the UIL Region meet.

Johnny York captured two 3rd places with 129'7" and 45'10" in the discus and shot put. Gary Barr and Jimmy May took 5th places in the shot and discus with 43'2" and 119'8". The mile relay team of Mike Bennett, Johnny Tucker, Selan Canada and Fred Lipham took 3rd in 3:37.3, while Lipham took 3rd in the 440 in 53.2; Tucker was 4th in the 880 in 2:07.7, and Canada was 4th in the 120 high hurdles and 5th in the 330 intermediate at 16.5 and 42.8 respectively.

The sprint relay team of Bennett, Beeman, Lipham and Jack Longbotham ran 5th in 46.2. Johnny Arms high jumped 5'4"

for a 5th place and James Stevens was 6th in the 100 in 11.0. Richard O'Shields and Kent Johnson were 6th and 7th in the mile in times of 5:03.3 and 5:08.2. Mike Bennett took 6th in the 330 hurdles in 43.8 and Loper got a 6th ribbon in the high jump at 5'2".

Other 7th place finishers were Beeman with 18'10" long jump and Kim Harless with 17.0 in the 120 hurdles.

In the Junior Division, Clyde placed 3rd with 81 2/3 points behind Comanche and Eastland. Winning first places were Ronnie Dunn and Curtis Chiappone in the shot and discus. Chiappone also took two 3rd in both hurdles events, and Greg Atkinson placed 6th in both hurdle events. Dunn ran 4th in the 100 yard dash and Russell Bland ran 5th in the 660. Bill Holley took 4th in the 1320 and Billy Dugan captured 3rd in both the high jump and long jump. The 1320 relay team of Chiappone, Bland, David Self and Mark Tollet ran 4th and the 440 relay team of Dunn, Self, Hurlley and Bland took 5th place.

The entire 40-man squad of Clyde tracksters gave a great effort, as more than half of the boys performer their best times and performances of the season. Great senior leadership was provided by Loper, Barr, Bennett, Dunn, Canada and Payne who were making their last district performance as Clyde High athletes.

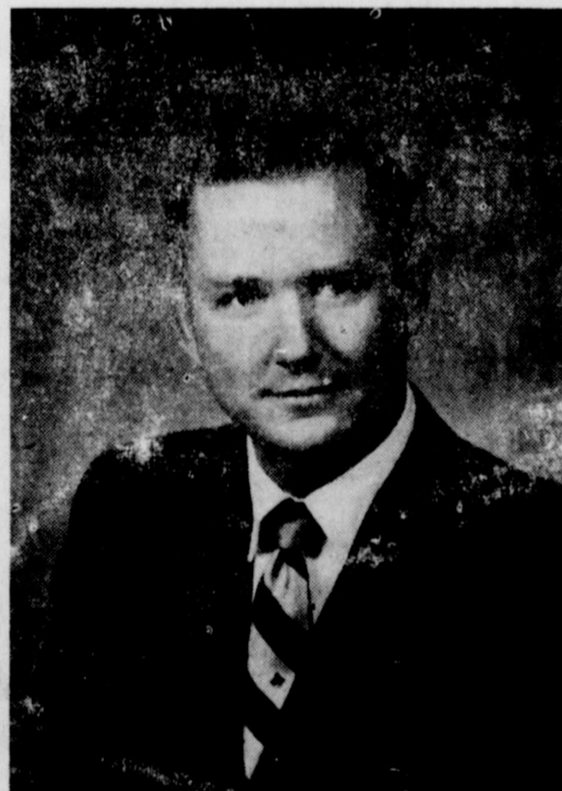
