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Survey Includes 13,000 Acres

A selective survey of Bailey County cotton growers — a part of a larger survey covering the entire High Plains — shows that an average of 85 percent here have decided to go with section one of the new cotton bill and plant only their total original allotments.

Total effective allotment means total 1964 acres, including any acreage received under release and reappportionment.

By planting this amount the farmer will qualify for a base loan rate of 30 cents a pound. Lowered Supports

By adopting this planting policy the farmers have lowered price supports by 2.5 cents a pound.

Another 41 percent in Bailey County have decided to plant under the second section of the new bill, which will allow them to cover plant by 5 percent of the original allotment here.

More Complicated
This alternative is more complicated and the bill leaves several dangling ends. Under this choice the producer qualifies to the 30 cent loan rate on all production from his effective allotment, but is not eligible for price supports on the extra acre's production.

Bond
In addition a bond must be furnished to assure that cotton from this production will be exported only. Present world price for export cotton is 24 cents. It is expected to remain somewhere near this level.

June 1st
These operators will have to make application to and place bond with the county Agriculture and Stabilization and Conservation offices by June 1. Another one percent has decided to ignore all allotments. The survey was made by Paymaster Gin and included 100 Bailey County cotton farmers. The 58 percent represents 5,763 acres. The 41 percent represents 7,893 acres and the one percent represents 13.5 acres.

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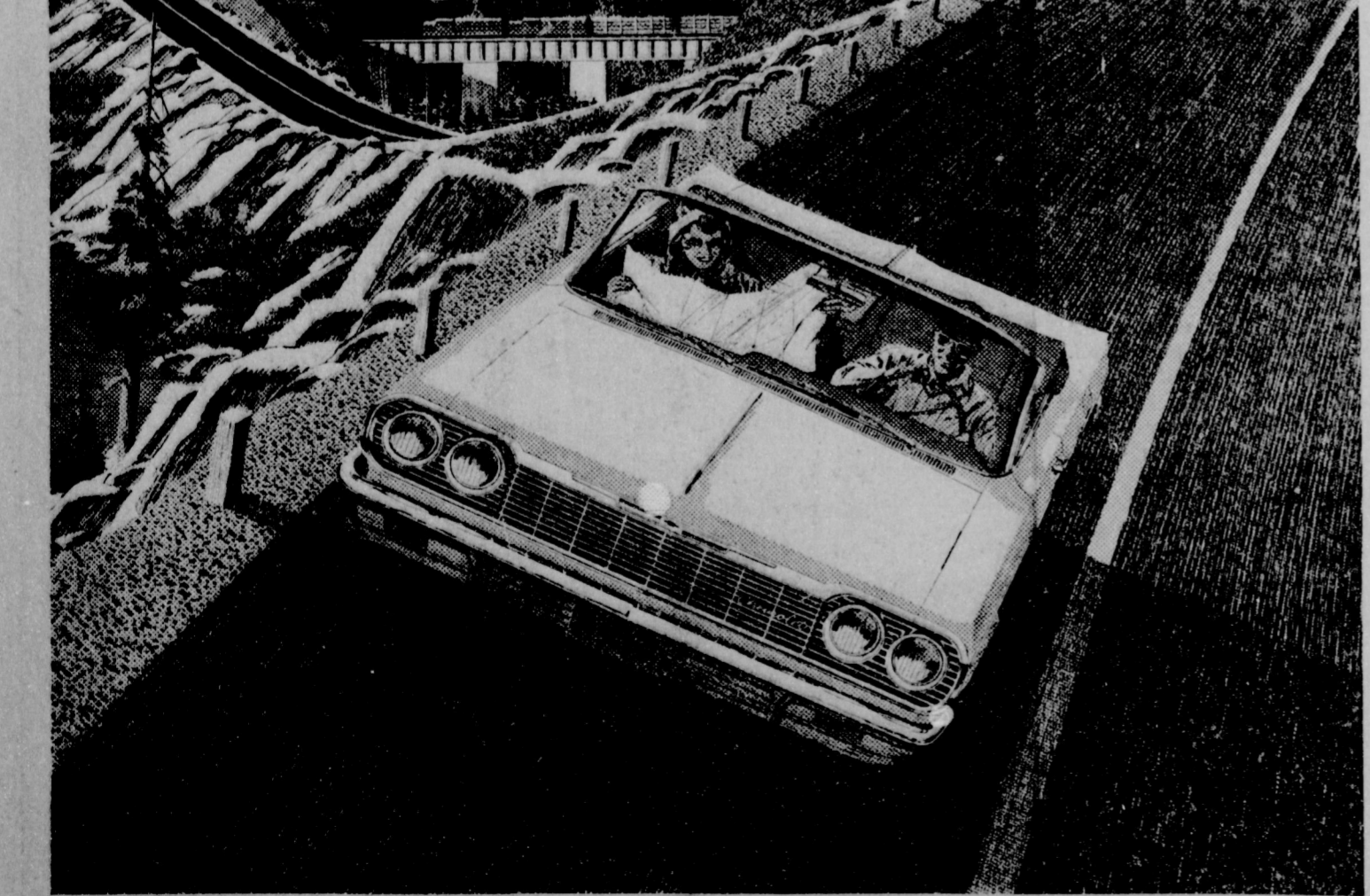

Herbert Martin Running For Asso. Justice Office

I ask you to elect me Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo. I make this request in the knowledge that the best interest of the Court and of the citizens of the district requires a change in the personnel of this Court.

I am a graduate of Lubbock High School and hold an LL. B. degree from the University of Texas School of Law. I have been actively engaged in the practice of law 29 years — 22 years in Lamb County and 7 years in Amarillo and the Panhandle area. By diligence and loyalty to my clients' interest, I have built an excellent law practice in both areas. My clients and my record in the Courts of this District are my best recommendations. I also served on the Court of Civil Appeals and as Associate Justice wrote 176 opinions of which less than 7 per cent were reversed. These opinions reflect the character of my judicial ability.

I served on this Court until December 31, 1956 and the docket was in good condition during that time.

The Court disposed of many cases transferred to the Amarillo Court from the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals. Although the number of cases before the Court have not increased, this condition no longer exists. Instead other Courts are having to assist the Amarillo Courts.

More important than the mere number of cases disposed of by the Court is the type of justice under the law as reflected by the Court's opinions.

As a member of such Court, I never have and I never shall subscribe to the proposition that justice under the law and a citizen's property rights should be bartered for political favors. No Court judgment should dissipate an elderly person's savings of a lifetime where the basis of such judgment is a strained and superficial ruling under a highly

technical theory not supported by the evidence. The personal rights of every citizen and the property rights of every citizen have always been a sacred trust of the Courts. This essential and vital element of our judicial system should not be lightly cast aside in order to favor a friend or political supporter. I am certain the present members of the Court with whom I would serve subscribe to the principles herein set forth.

I ask every citizen to support me on the principles enunciated herein. I particularly ask every citizen whom I have ever represented to give me in the coming campaign the same untiring loyalty and effort toward my interests that I have exhibited over the many years of my practice for their interests. I pledge to every citizen that their rights and property shall be secure under the law. It shall be my constant endeavor to write opinions of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals that shall be based soundly upon the law and the facts and shall reflect credit and honor upon such Court.
