Dust storm hits Bailey County

In April 2010, Muleshoe residents Glen Williams and the late James Wedel regaled the nation with their memories of the West Texas Dust Bowl.

"The wind started blowing, the dust started blowing, and you could hardly see in front of your face... Static electricity was flying around. It was hard to breathe. I tell you, it was awful scary," Wedel was quoted as saying in the news story written by Brian Winter of USA Today.

Had he been around Muleshoe Monday afternoon, Wedel might have felt at home, with the skies above Muleshoe experiencing a blanket of dust that roared in from

the west. Although no damage — other than some tree limbs and one cable line down, has been reported to the Muleshoe Police Department due to the storm, Police Chief Brian Frieda said area drivers called the police department seeking driving advice.

He said they were warned to slow down, but not to stop in the middle of the road, and to use both their headlights on low beam and hazard lights.

Individuals who did experience property damage from the dust storm are encouraged to contact the police department to provide information for the

Sen. Seliger speaks about state, local issues

State Sen. Kel Seliger covered a wide spectrum of issues during his town hall meeting in Muleshoe on Thursday, Oct. 13.

With topics ranging from budget issues, and especially how they relate to public education, to the recent changes in highway speed limits, the Dist. 31 senator discussed what is being done at Austin and provided

answers to some of the questions raised by local constituents.

Seliger described the state's current budget as "painful," and admitted that the legislature didn't

give issues such as the growth in Texas' student population, inflation and the decrease in property tax appraisals sufficient consideration when developing it.

"We were having to make the sort of decisions that people in the State of Texas make every year... when it comes to what their family's wants... their family's needs, but the figures don't add up with the money available," Seliger said.

"If ever there was an economy that needed economic stabilization, this one did," the senator said.

"We tried to help public schools," he said. While the initial budget cut nine billion dollars from public education, Seliger said, by the end of the legislative session \$5.6 billion had been put back in.

He talked about his

The Muleshoe High School varsity were able to "mulehandle" Friona's Chieftains on the gridiron Friday night, but according to the numbers received from the Texas Comptroller's office, the battle at the cash register tells an entirely different story.

According to this month's sales tax allocations, Friona has seen an 18.69 percent

increase in total sales tax collected year-to-date compared to totals from the same period in 2010, representing a total of \$311,126.74, and placing it at the top of the list of 10 area municipalities compared by the Muleshoe Journal.

At the bottom of the list, with a 3.15 percent increase in sales tax collected year-to-date, is Muleshoe.

Muleshoe's only conciliation is in the

actual dollars collected, which shows the Bailey County seat collected \$444,104.70, an increase of \$13,564.11.

In actual dollars, Littlefield — which placed third in the year-to-date comparison, pulled in the most at \$752,342.18, an increase of \$103,241.92.

It should be noted that of all the municipalities compared monthly, Littlefield is the only one with a 2 percent

tax rate, all others have a rate of 1.5 percent.

Second place, went to Earth with a 17.2 percent increase.

In the monthly totals, Littlefield captured first place, with a 32.16 percent jump in sales tax dollars, representing a cash increase of \$19,309.77.

Friona took second in the monthly race for sales tax dollars with a 24.85 percent increase, representing \$6,680.01,

Super news from MISD

The second annual Stuff the Bus Food Drive has concluded, and it was such a blessing for Muleshoe ISD to be asked again to take part in the Stuff the Bus Food Drive for our Bailey County Food Pantry.

Each campus was asked to promote the food drive this year, and boxes were delivered a week before the final collection drive day.

Each campus had a competition to see which grades could donate the most cans of food. Students, faculty, and staff all participated in the Food Drive. All of the boxes of cans were collected by Muleshoe High School football players on Friday, Oct. 7.

This year, the community of Muleshoe collected approximately 17,650 pounds of food! The bulk of this food will be used to fill the Christmas boxes in December to help feed about 200 local families. The rest of the food will be distributed by the Food Pantry to local families over the next several months.

The specific MISD totals are:

- DeShazo Elementary — 1,436 cans of food. The fifth grade winning class collected 164 cans; fourth grade winning class, 89 cans; and third grade winning class, 161 cans.

- D i l l m a n Elementary — 1,425 cans of food. The PreK winning class collected 60 cans; Kindergarten winning class, 110 cans; first grade winning class, 68 cans, and second grade winning class, 188 cans.

- MHS — 613 cans of food. The winning class was the Seniors, who collected 273 cans.

- Watson Junior High School — 130 cans of food (and they are still collecting). The sixth grade was the winning class, collecting 90 cans.

Congratulations to all of these winners. April Smith did an outstanding job organizing and coordinating the Muleshoe ISD part of the Bailey County Food Pantry's Stuff the Bus drive again this year.

support for certain amendments intended to help public education, which didn't receive the support of other Republican legislators, adding that he didn't feel it was a "Republican vote."

It was... putting the medicine where the most hurt was, basically," Seliger said.

"The intentions of those who voted against me were just as good as mine... they just happened to be wrong," he added.

Also regarding education, the senator talked about efforts to help public schools by letting local school

districts "run their own affairs."

Seliger talked about giving school districts the freedom of spending their funds on either computers or textbooks, and he talked about state-wide testing, and his involvement in the changes being made.

While the senator said he was opposed to changing education targets, he recognized that some testing was needed. But he added, "Tests need to meet the needs of the state and the school district educating the kids."

"The fundamental reason the kids are there is to learn, not to test," Seliger said, at one point

referring to a proposal to increase testing days from 21 to 45, which he said was "absolutely ridiculous."

He also described "No child left behind" as a nonproductive program that hurts school districts instead of helping them.

"They ought to do away with 'No child left behind,'" Seliger said. "It adds nothing in terms to an accountability system that requires or recognizes performance in a an independent school district."

Concerning nursing homes and the crises brought about by cuts to Medicare, the senator said Medicare and the state transportation

department's issues were things that needed to be addressed.

Concerning all of the economic, budget and financial issues before the state, Seliger said "A whole lot of money would solve all our problems... but the people don't want to be taxed more."

The senator talked about the illegal immigration problem, which he said "boils down to border security," and described it as "a national issue about which they aren't doing a very good job."

He said it didn't matter which state illegal immigrants initially entered, a lot of them would be coming to

Texas, because it is where the jobs are.

Muleshoe Area Hospital District board member Bill Liles attended Thursday's meeting, and spoke about the hospital district having to spend approximately \$18,000 for redistricting.

"We're already being hurt enough from cutbacks in Medicare," Liles said.

The only public entity in Bailey County that wasn't faced with large redistricting fees was the Muleshoe Independent School District.

It was explained earlier in the meeting that Superintendent Dr. Gene Sheets had traveled to Austin and used software at the Capitol for redistricting instead of contracting with various law firms.

statistical weather report that will be filed.

According to the police chief, his department had about a four minute warning before the storm hit, but they were able to warn emergency management in Lubbock County, which allowed it to activate its emergency operations center.

totals for October's allocations was Earth.

The October allocations reflect sales tax collected by local merchants in August, and received by the State of Texas in September.

According to Texas Comptroller Susan Combs state sales tax revenue in September was \$1.76 billion, up 11.8 percent compared to September 2010.

"Texas sales tax collections have now increased for 18 straight months," Combs said. "All sectors showed

increases in September, led by business spending, especially in the oil and gas-related sectors. Consumer sectors like restaurants and retail trade were also up.

"The recovery in Texas has brought sales tax collections almost back to peak 2008 levels, however the near-term outlook remains clouded due to the uneven performance of the U.S. economy," she said.

Combs will send September sales tax allocations totaling \$505.2 million to cities,

counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 13.9 percent compared to October 2010.

"When a strong man armed keepeth his place; his goods are in peace," Luke 11:21 "But when a stronger than he shall come upon him and overcome him, he taketh from him all his armor wherein he trusted, and divideth his spoils."

The first time I ever heard this quoted was by former Pres. Dwight Eisenhower at a news conference. And that was more than 50 years ago.

He was first elected in November of 1952 and took office in January of 1953. Eisenhower was a man of faith, and a man of prayer.

If I remember correctly, immediately before taking the oath of office he called for a pause and said a prayer. And shortly thereafter he joined the Presbyterian Church.

Eisenhower did those things, not for show purposes, but because he

honestly sought divine guidance. And that is not the only time he sought it.

I remember his giving us an account, similar to that when he was on the field of battle in World War II, and he called on the Lord for guidance.

General Eisenhower was in charge of the Allied Forces in Europe during World War II. All the Allied forces had

been driven from the continent of Europe, and he had been given orders to retake our position.

So he had assembled a brigade of all the service men needed, and the equipment — air planes, boats, ships, tanks and artillery with troops, sailors, officers and all other needs, and they were ready to move at whatever time the

And he said he remained pretty well in his office waiting for word from the weatherman that it was clear and would remain so for sufficient time to cross over.

Eisenhower said when he got the word, as a final thought before giving a "Go" signal, he went outside and walked around observing things, and he said a sincere and emotional prayer to try to make certain the time was right.

Now you know the story, the time was right. They moved and landed on the continent in what I would say was one of the best and most important operations of history.

Those were trying times with me. It wasn't that I doubted our power to win the war, or had any reservations about out winning it, but that was the first time I had seen our country at war.

We had to have ration coupons to buy gasoline, automobiles, tires and other pieces of equipment, food items such as sugar, coffee and other things of that nature.

One thing I learned was; don't be too quick to pre-judge people. I had never done that kind of work, so I was a bit reluctant to call on certain ones. But every person I called on bought a war bond. And some bought what was then "a good many of them."

I was encouraged by the spirit in which people responded—every one of them. Of course we were at war, and they wanted to make a contribution. We had a bond drive every six months.

The relations I established with the people were of great value later when I ran for county commissioner. In fact that was one reason several people asked me to run.

And others, as I handed

out cards would say, "I didn't know you could do anything but sell war bonds."

As I said I believed I have learned quite a bit about life, and the opportunities that often come our way. But I do not lay claim to any divine calling.

However I do plan to write a little more about myself, as to the things I have done, and how they come about.

I was asked recently "if you had your life to live over what changes would you make?"

My answer was "I would not become involved in so many things at once, but would concentrate my efforts more objectively. But I would not make very many changes."

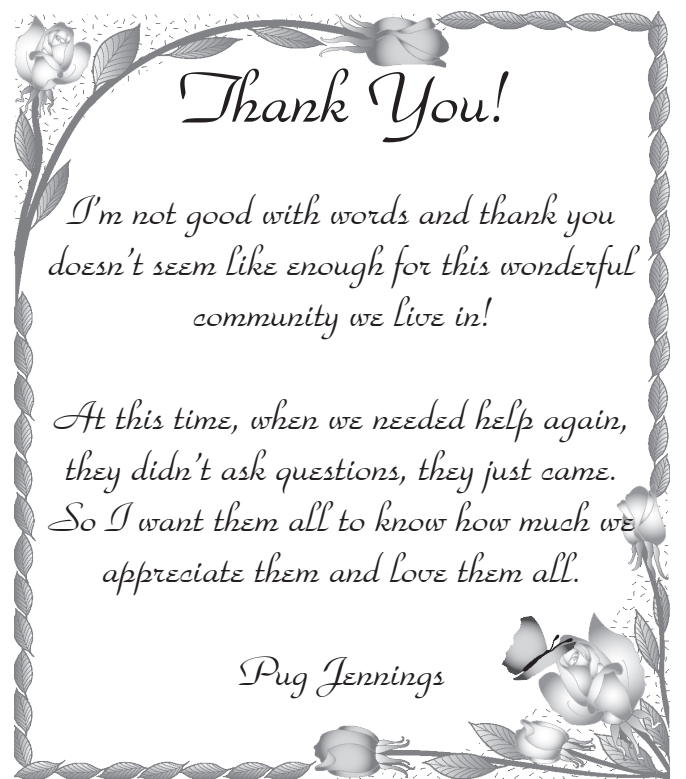

is a result of that hard work the kids put in to getting ready. We took the battle to Friona tonight on both sides of the ball and it paid dividends for us."

"I could not have been more proud of the kids and now we will start getting ready for Littlefield in the morning."

The Mules kicked off to start the game to a Friona team that was coming off an upset of the Bushland Falcons a week earlier. The Chieftains lost four yards on their first three plays and punted to the Mules.

The ball rolled dead on the Friona 49. The Mules sent two receivers wide to each side of the field and then ran an inside receiver screen. Beau Avila baited the Friona defense into the Mule backfield before dumping the ball over their head to Issac Baca.

The Mule offensive line built and impenetrable wall around the left side. I. Baca made the corner and cut up field behind a block behind a block from Adelaido Godinez and raced 49 yards to pay dirt and the first of his four touchdowns.

Saul Elizalde tacked on the point after for a 7-0 Mule lead with 9:24 left in the first quarter.

The Mule defense seemed to know exactly which play the Chieftains were about to run and were waiting for them in at the line or in the Friona backfield. The Mules backed Friona up two yards before forcing the second Friona punt.

The Mules second drive stalled on the Friona 21 but the Chieftains went three-and-out and their third punt of the opening quarter rolled dead on the Mule 36. Avila connected with Godinez for an 18-yard gain to the Friona 46.

Elizalde made the grab for a five-yard gain to the 40. I. Baca made the corner and cut up field. Junior Baca blocked the final Chieftain that had a shot at his brother near the Friona five. I. Baca could have walked the final five-yards for his second TD. Elizalde's kick gave the Mules a 14-0 lead with 2:39 left in the first quarter.

The Mules forced Friona to punt for the fourth time of the opening period and Ryan DeLeon made a fair catch on the Chieftain 46.

Caleb Wood ran a crossing pattern over the middle and Avila hit him for a 21-yard gain. Elizalde gained seven on a screen pass to the Friona 18. J. Baca picked up two yards on the final play of the first period.

When the first 12 minutes of play ended the Mules had held Friona to a total of zero yards of offense and I. Baca had rushed for 46 yards and caught one pass for 49 yards and scored two touchdowns.

The Mules scored for the third time on the first play of the second period when Avila faked to J.

Baca and kept through the left side. He scooted the final 11-yards to pay dirt and Elizalde's golden toe pushed the Mule lead to 21-0.

The Mule defense continued to control the line of scrimmage and forced Friona to punt for the fifth time of the game.

DeLeon fielded the line-drive punt on his knees at the Friona 40.

Five plays later Avila was back in the end zone on an eight-yard run with 9:16 left in the half. Elizalde added the point after for a 28-0 Mule lead.

Friona got untracked on offense and scored on their next series when Francisco Martinez scored on a two-yard run. Diego Licerio booted the extra point and cut the Mule lead to 28-7 with 6:19 left in the half.

It only took the Mules two plays and 59 seconds to get the seven points back. Avila connected with I. Baca with a 10-yard toss at the Friona 40 and he out ran the defense to the Friona end zone. It was a 50-yard pass and run and Elizalde added the point after to give the Mules a 35-7 advantage with 5:20 remaining in the half.

Friona appeared to be on the war path and answered quickly with Licerio scoring on a three-yard run and kicked the point after to cut the Mule lead to 35-14 with 2:39 still on the clock.

The Mules kept the heat on and scored on four plays. I. Baca galloped the

final 55-yards through the left side of the line for his fourth TD of the first half.

Juan Guerrero kicked the point after with 1:09 on left in the half. The Mules led 42-14 at the intermission.

The Mules marched 75 yards in a minute and 19 seconds to start the third period. Avila threw a strike to DeLeon in the end zone. Guerrero's kick was good and the Mules led 49-14 with 10:41 left in the third period.

Caleb Wood completed three of five passes for nine yards, rushed three times for 19 yards and caught two passes for 39 yards. Carlos Sosa carried twice for six yards and scored one TD.

Saul Elizalde made six catches for 83 yards and Ryan DeLeon had five for 82 yards and one touchdown. Adelaido Godinez rushed twice for one yard and one TD and caught three passes for 34 yards.

The Mule defense held Friona to 249 yards rushing on 50 attempts and just two completions

on 11 tries for 15 yards for a total offense of 264 yards. Matthew Ambriz led the Mule defense with 11 tackles, one quarterback hurry and broke up a pass.

Ryan Johnson made seven stops and one quarterback hurry and Adelaido Godinez made seven tackles. Issac Baca had seven tackles and one quarterback hurry. Saul Elizalde made six tackles and used a slobberknocker hit to separate a receiver from the ball.

Ryan DeLeon had six tackles, one tackle for a loss and broke up a pass. Beau Avila made six tackles and Shawn Atwood made five stops and two quarterback hurries.

Tony Molina had five stops and one quarterback hurry and Juan Guerrero made five tackles and one quarterback hurry.

Joey Guerra and Junior Triana were the special teams head hunters making three tackles each.

The Mules and Littlefield Wildcats are the last two undefeated teams in District 2-2A competition at 4-0.

Regalado burst through a hole in the right side for 36 yards to the Friona 27. Hurtado put a pass through a keyhole to Cage at the five and he scooted to the end zone. The Mules

The check presentation happened at the end of the ceremony, and the Sudan Student Council could not have been more pleased to have someone from the Chorus of

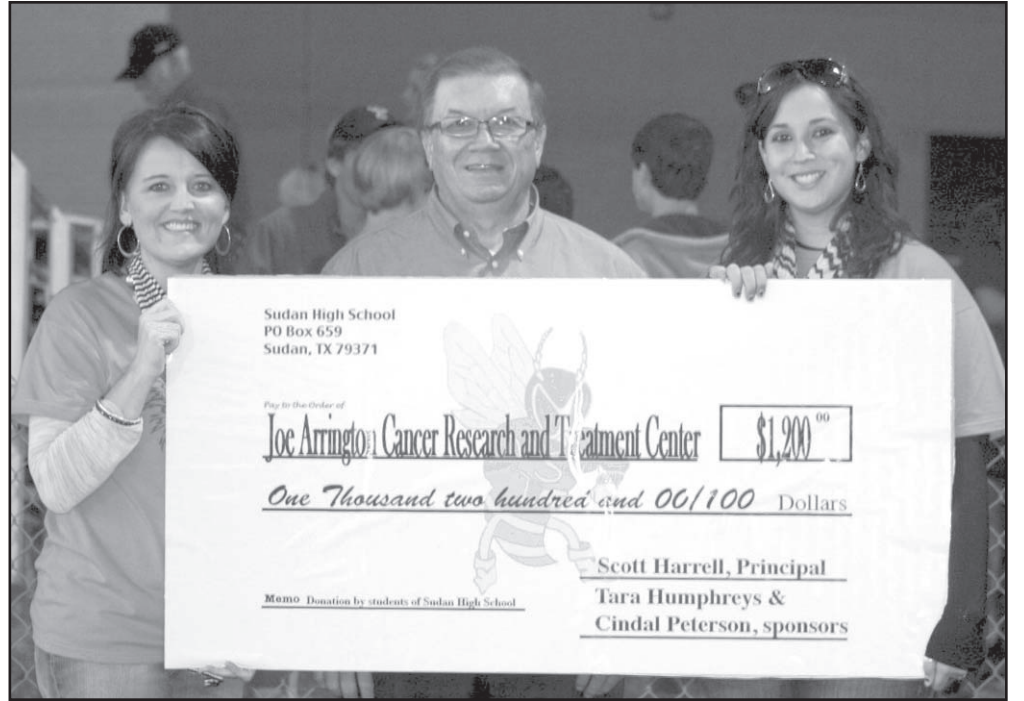
Angels there to accept the check.

Balloons were released to represent the many types of cancers, and those afflicted by the disease.

The Chorus of Angels is a part of the Joe Arrington Cancer Center in Lubbock. The JACC draws patients throughout the West Texas and Eastern New Mexico regions.

Initially, staff and physicians would put away small amounts of money in a drawer and give it to patients as needed for such things as gas and medicine.

In 1996, they crated the Chorus of Angels Fund as a patient assistance fund



administered through the JACC and the Covenant Foundation. It provides for extenuating expenses during the course of cancer treatment when no other form of financial assistance is available.

Food bank vouchers, hotel accommodations, prescription medication aid, gas vouchers or other hospitality arrangements during treatment are all available through the Chorus of Angels.

Next to the actual diagnosis of cancer, the biggest stressor for a patient is the worry over finances. Fortunately, the Chorus of Angels Fund has been a lifeline for those patients with the greatest need.

On average, the Chorus of Angels Fund provides more than \$8,500 in assistance to cancer patients each month.

If not for the Chorus of Angels Fund, hundreds of patients would not receive the care they need and many would not be able to complete their treatment.

September cattle on feed are up

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.9 million head on Sept. 1, up 14 percent from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was two percent higher than the revised Aug. 1 level.

Producers placed 620,000 head in commercial feedlots during August, up 15 percent from a year ago, but down two percent from the July 2011 total.

Texas commercial feeders marketed 540,000 head during August, up eight percent from last year and up 16 percent from last month.

On Sept. 1, there were 2.48 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 85 percent of the state's total.

The number on feed across the area was up 13 percent from last year and up two percent from the August total.

August placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 548,000 head. Marketings were totaled 481,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 10.7 million head on Sept. 1 of this year.

This inventory was five percent above Sept. 1, 2010.

PROCLAMATION BY THE Governor of the State of Texas 41-3282

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:
 WHEREAS, the 82nd Regular Session of the Texas Legislature convened in January of 2011 in accordance with Article III, Section 5, of the Texas Constitution and Section 301.001 of the Texas Government Code; and
 WHEREAS, during that session, the legislature approved 10 joint resolutions proposing 10 constitutional amendments by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of each house, pursuant to Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution; and
 WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of those resolutions and in accordance with the Texas Constitution, the legislature has set the date of the election for voting on the 10 proposed constitutional amendments to be November 8, 2011; and
 WHEREAS, Section 3.003 of the Texas Election Code requires the election to be ordered by proclamation of the governor;
 NOW, THEREFORE, I, RICK PERRY, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Texas, do hereby order a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the FIRST TUESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY IN NOVEMBER, the same being the EIGHTH day of NOVEMBER, 2011; and
 NOTICE THEREOF IS HEREBY GIVEN to the COUNTY JUDGE of each county, who is directed to cause said election to be held in the county on such date for the purpose of adopting or rejecting the 10 constitutional amendments proposed by 10 joint resolutions, as submitted by the 82nd Legislature, Regular Session, of the State of Texas. Pursuant to Sections 274.001 and 274.002 of the Texas Election Code, the propositions for the joint resolutions will appear as follows:

PROPOSITION 1 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran."
PROPOSITION 2 "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."
PROPOSITION 3 "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."
PROPOSITION 4 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area and to pledge for repayment of the bonds or notes increases in ad valorem taxes imposed by the county on property in the area. The amendment does not provide authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates."
Proposition 5 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund."
PROPOSITION 6 "The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."
PROPOSITION 7 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."
PROPOSITION 8 "The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open-space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."
PROPOSITION 9 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision."
PROPOSITION 10 "The constitutional amendment to change the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office."

The secretary of state shall take notice of this proclamation and shall immediately mail a copy of this order to every county judge of this state, and all appropriate writs will be issued, and all proper proceedings will be followed, to the end that said election may be held and its result proclaimed in accordance with law.

USDA allows haying of some CRP grasses

Kim Hanlin, executive director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Bailey County announced recently that the Texas FSA State Committee has the authority to approve, on a case-by-case basis, haying Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres that will be converted from a Lovegrass, Bluestem or

Klein grass to a native grass species cover. "Producers have until Sept. 30, 2012, to request approval for haying acreage that will be converted from a Lovegrass, Bluestem or Klein grass to a native grass species; however, haying must be performed outside of the primary nesting and

broodrearing season," said Hanlin. "It is important for producers to understand that this is not an extension of CRP emergency haying, this is a separate haying authorization," he added.

Producers who want to request haying approval must make an appointment with the Bailey County FSA

office and with their local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to update their conservation plan to include the new haying activity.

Producers can not start haying until they receive approval notification from the Bailey County FSA office.

Producers who receive authorization to hay

will incur a 25 percent payment reduction from their annual rental payment unless the reduction is paid in advance.

In addition, producers who receive haying approval will not receive cost-share assistance because haying is not

considered a component of seedbed preparation.
