| The State Bar of Texas Board of Directors concluded a three-day meeting there Saturday by postponing until next month any action on its financially troubled Texas Law Center <br> The board was scheduled to decide how it would pay the $\$ 3.9$ million balance of an interim construction loan due Dec. 31 <br> It was hoped the $\$ 7.7$ million facility in Austin which was dedicated July 4 . 1976. could be financed through contributions of lawyers and foundations. <br> However, the fund-raising drive suffered a near-fatal blow in July when the Internal Revenue Service reversed an earlier ruling and held contributions to the law center were not tax deductible <br> Board members determined Saturday a discussion of alternatives would be impossible without knowing the results of a challenge to the IRS ruling The financial status of the law center is expected to come up again at a spe- |

CHRISTMANN of Lubbock, president of the Texas Independent Producers \& Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO), says President Carter was hitting below the belt when he said his energy proposals had bogged down in Congress because of a powerful oil lobby seeking to line its own pockets through hred decontrol of oil and gas prices. "The plain and simple fact is that the President's proposals are unsound. and the Senate is creating a situation in which a sensible energy policy can result," Christmann said recently in a formal TIPRO response to Carter's criticism. "If the President's program is enacted into law as passed by the House, it will only have to be corrected later, providing there is time before the nation goes down the drain," he said. Christmann believes the program constitutes littue more than a giant tax bur- den on consumers, and does nothing at all to increase the energy flow. It's to this consumer pressure that senators have listened, and not to the oil lobby as the President would have us believe," Christmann said. COOL FALL WEATHER NEED NOT put an end to the enjogment of root
crops and greens fresh from the garden. In fact, the onset of cold weather will improve the flavor of the root crops. Crops such as turnips, beets, carrots, parsnips and radishes will grow on growth of letuce, coliardsand mustard into the late fall by erecting simple plas tic shelters over the rows.
Hard freezes will damage the expowed crowns of root crops. A course mulch
should be spread at least two to three inches deep around the base of the puants. should be spread at least two to three inches deep a round the base of the planti
and mounded up around the crowns to insulate them trom the cold. Then whenever you want some of your carrots or turnimp for the table, just
out to your garden, kick the mulch away and diz up the number you need.

TO PRESERVE GOURDS, STORE THEM in a cool, ventilated location seeral weeks after harvesting until they are thoroughy dry. II you want a ceear
