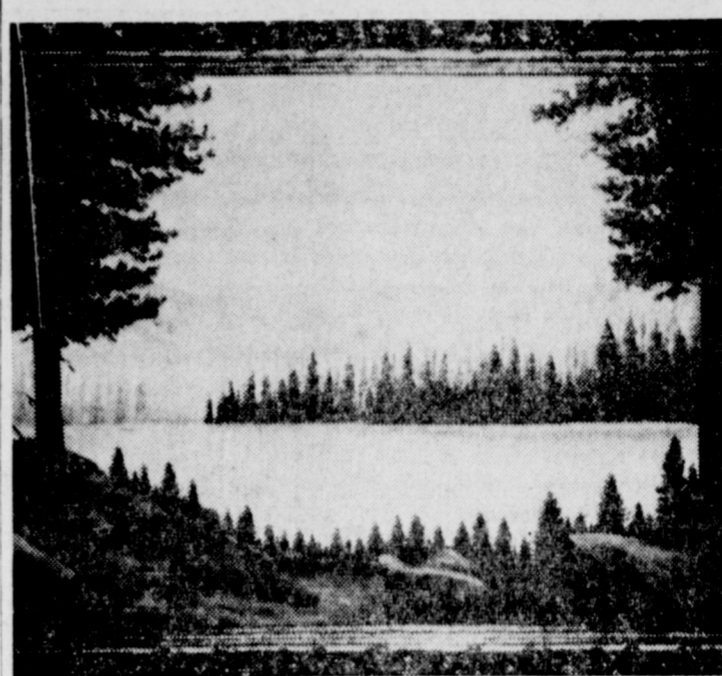
Where geography got out of control was when we didn't stop with 13 colonies, and here we are about to take on outer space.

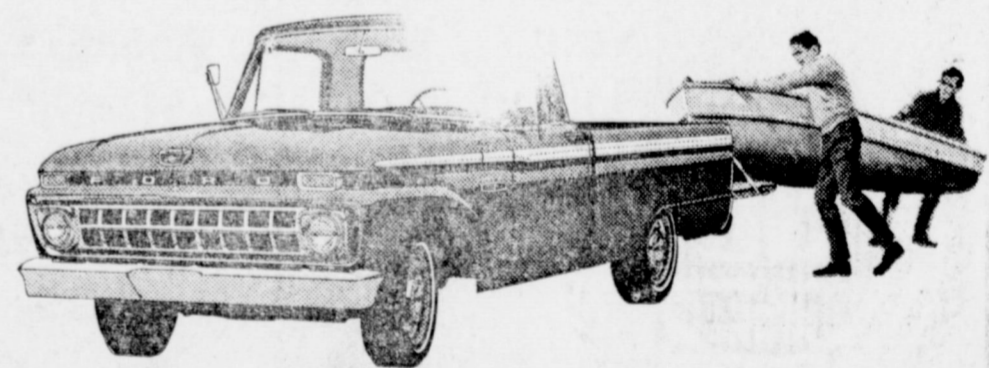

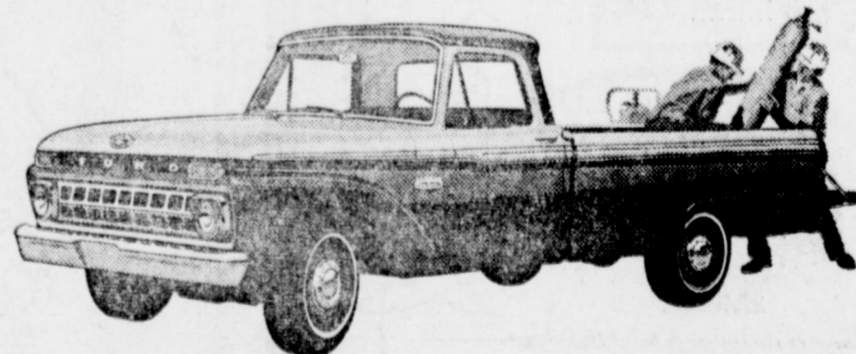

In Christ was invested the power, first, to lay down His life, and, secondly, to take it up again. This is the Easter season, the time we commemorate the resurrection of our Savior. But equally important with His coming forth from the tomb was His "power" to "lay down" His life.

We have power to take other men's lives, as well as our own, but not the right to, except as

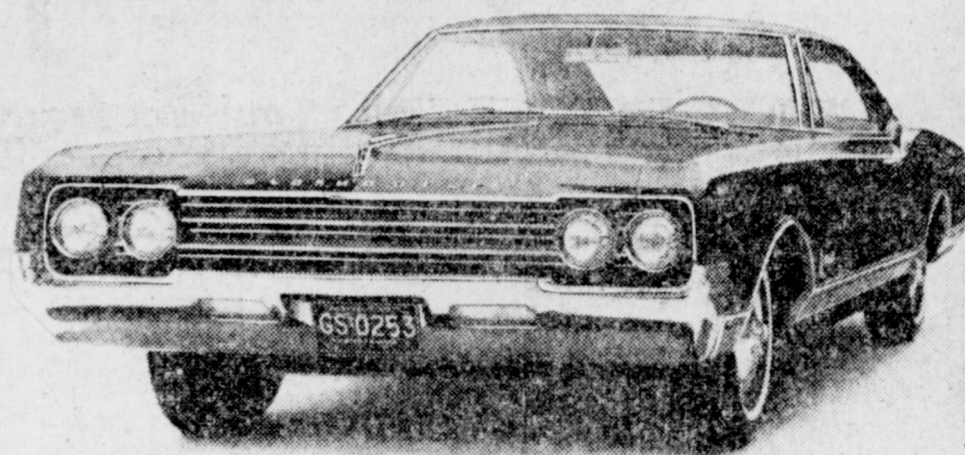
the law grants. No man had the power to take the life of Christ, until He laid it down. The Jews had tried to kill Him on various occasions but their schemes had failed. He was no ordinary man. He must voluntarily lay Himself down, or give himself to be crucified. There was also a day reserved for His death sentence, the 14th day of Nisan (April our Calendar). This was the day the Jewish passover lamb was slain and eaten. Christ was our passover lamb (1 Corth. 5:7). He was our sacrifice for sins.

Then, too, the day of the resurrection had been given in the Old Testament. The number three is the number of resurrection. We find this number many times in the Bible and there is always resurrection related to it. But the date of the resurrection was the 17th day of Nisan (April). This was the exact date Noah had emerged from the ark to begin life anew. It was also the exact date Israel had emerged from the Red Sea delivered from the pursuing armies of Pharaoh.

God's designs and plans for our redemption were long before we were ever born. The

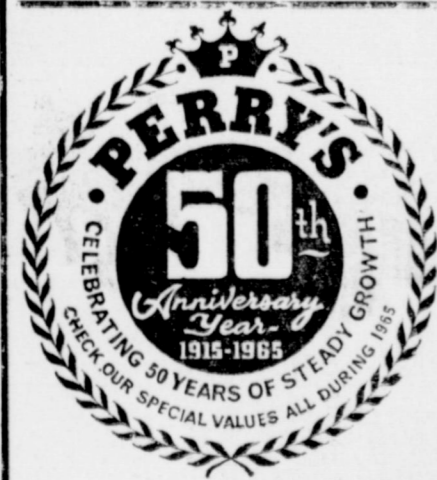

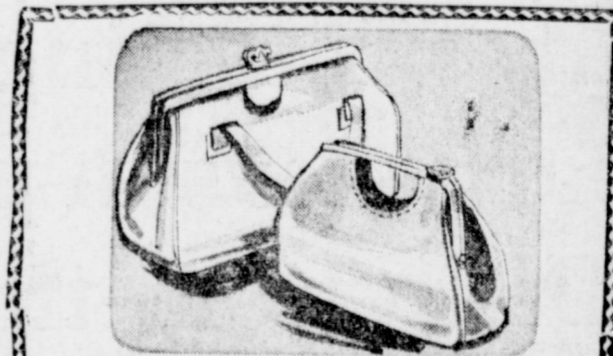

well last week in the interest of the junior college survey. They spoke to the board of directors of the Bovina chamber of commerce and to the Bovina Women's Study Club. Don Stone, president of the Bovina chamber, is expected to head the delegation from that town.
Davis and Williams also have carried the junior college programs, Frauwel and Sudan Rtaory clubs.

The expert from Austin will explain the exact procedure which will be necessary before the junior college project can be launched. In essence the junior college is an extension of the 12-year free high school but with a much greater curriculum. Its "district" also is considerably larger than that of a public school, but buses are operated in much the same manner as a consolidated school district. Tuition fees are small, much smaller than the sum, charged by the senior col-

leges, it was explained. Tonight's meeting is being set purposely late in order not to conflict with Maundy Thursday programs planned in several churches or the distributive education banquet in the high school cafeteria.
Dr. Colvert launched his survey of area possibilities; this morning and will conclude the survey by Saturday night. Friday noon he will meet with the junior college committee for a luncheon.
Dr. Colvert will make his sur-

vey and then will return to Austin to prepare a report. He will return later this spring to reveal the findings of the survey, and will outline step-by-step procedures and costs estimates. When he returns to make his report, a second public meeting will be called and if he thinks Muleshoe area can qualify for such a school, a campaign will be launched immediately to put the program into action.
The junior college program, Davis says, is growing rapidly. He pointed to three new junior college authorized by the legislature this month.
