

Contributions Needed For Insect Control

The City Council reports a good number of the citizens have contributed promptly and generously to the spraying program for insect control. While the first spraying did not get the results that were expected, plans are for the City to be sprayed at least one more time and two more times during the summer if funds are available.

Many citizens have failed or neglected to make their contribution to this project. The cost of the entire program is small in comparison to the cost for the care of one case of polio not to mention the suffering and anxiety that must be endured with it.

Citizens not having made their contributions may make possible the continuation of the insect control program in Stratford by promptly sending their contributions to the City Secretary. An assessment of \$5.00 for each home was taken as a basis for financing the insect control program.

July Is Ideal Shrub Pruning Weather

If you plan to cut back overgrown trees or shrubs, do it now or wait until winter. Large limbs removed later may lead to winter injury.

Miss Dorothy Dixon, Home Demonstration Agent, says cutting back a plant during the growing season starts new growth and this new growth does not have time to harden before frost. Then the tree or shrub is killed back. Heavy frost often kills large shrubs or even trees.

Fertilizing and watering in late summer stimulates new growth, adds Miss Dixon, and this growth may also be damaged by cold weather if it doesn't have time to harden before the cold weather hits.

Badly injured plants may not die but they will look sick for a year or more. Blooms and fruit may be light on the injured plants next year.

Miss Dixon says cut the limbs off smoothly. Don't leave stubs. A tree or shrub will heal quickly if the cut is smooth but a limb will not. That may take years and it leaves ugly lumps along the trunk branches.

Investigate thoroughly anyone who represents himself as an expert and wants to trim your trees and shrubs in late summer or early fall. She says some plants can survive such rough treatment but all of them will not.

Dead limbs may be cut off at any time without risk. Injured or diseased limbs may need to come off even at a risk, but she cautions, always use a sharp pruning saw and if the wounds are covered with clear shellac, they'll heal faster.

Hill Puzzles Canada
HALONQUIST, SASK.--There's a sinking hill in this district, forty miles southeast of Swift Current, and it seems to be disappearing fairly fast. One old-timer said that in 1909 the hill was normal except that livestock shunned it. In 1911 the hill began to crack up and portions sank from six to eight inches. Now a valley three-quarters of a mile long and 50 feet deep has developed.

One engineer surmised that a vast bed of quicksand may lie underneath the ground. Others suspect underground water erosion.



STRIKE SLOWS

India Nears Gandhi Goal

NEW DELHI.—Mohandas K. Gandhi, a kindly little man of peace, has attained in violent death goals he missed with his preaching of love. He was slain more than a year ago. His India and Pakistan are learning to dwell as peaceful neighbors. The fanatical religious warring between Hindu and Moslem in the two dominions has largely subsided. And India, as he desired, is

building patiently as a democratic secular state instead of the rightist religious government his assassins wanted.

People Want Justice

What Gandhi would have said about any effort to punish his slayers will be debated in India for a long time. But the people have raised no question that justice should take its course.

Bloody rioting between the Hindu and Moslem populations of India and Pakistan had become commonplace when Gandhi was shot down. He was walking to his prayer meeting place here to continue his crusade for communal peace, when three shots were fired into his body.

The crime occurred as India faced

critical times and issues.

There was talk of war between the two new dominions, created when British crown rule of India ended and the country was divided in August, 1947. Refugees crammed the cities, calling for the blood of people of the opposite religion. Hindus had fled Pakistan, and Moslems from India—12 million of them.

Economy Shaken

The economy was shaken on both sides of the border.

Not all of the headway in the past months came about as Gandhi would have done it. There was more rioting, but it ebbed steadily. The police and military crushed it with their guns, bayonets and clubs. Organizations preaching religious hatred were outlawed and harried out of existence.

Under leadership of two staunch friends, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and Governor-General C. Rajagopalachari, India has come far to give Gandhi in death a peaceful land.

A cease-fire agreement arranged with United Nations assistance, stopped the fighting of Indian and Pakistan troops in the neighboring state of Kashmir. In conference, leaders of the two countries agreed to strive for amicable settlement of this and other issues.

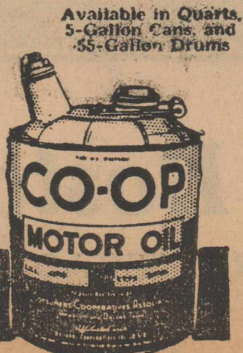

Mathematician Declares That Gamblers Can't Win

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Your wife cashes in on a horse because she likes the color of the jockey's jacket. You collect nonnegotiable tickets because you follow breeding lines.

Ever wonder why? A man who has been studying gambling for 15 years says he's found out it's because "you just can't win."

Feeding slugs into his own slot machine, Dr. Ernest E. Blanche said: "It's mine and it's honest, but it pays me only 70 per cent." Dr. Blanche, a 36 year old mathematician, once wanted to be a physician. Instead, he has been diagnosing the probabilities of gambling success.

He aims his preaching against gambling from the practical rather than the moral viewpoint. "People don't want to be told they can't win," he says. "My theory is that they'll always lose if they stay at it. The ones who can't be convinced are the ones I'm trying to reach."

Some of his conclusions: You've got one chance in 17 of making four straight passes with the dice, shooting for 7, 11 or your point.

If it's eight straight winning throws, the chances are one in 287. If it is 10, you have one chance in 1,181—unless the dice are crooked.

From the mathematical standpoint, he says he has tried all the angles—from roulette to hunting the red centered piece of candy that

would entitle him to a free peppermint stick.

His own home is a cache of gambling equipment—all experimental and some of it phoney. He says he has been kicked out of some places merely for taking notes.

NEW DISCOVERY

Less Needle For Diabetics

CHICAGO.—A new combination of standard insulin gives persons with severe diabetes more freedom from the hypodermic needle and more so-

cial freedom, a Northwestern university medical specialist has said. The mixture uses two portions of "regular" insulin to 1 portion of "protamine" insulin and is known as "2:1 mixture."

tested the mixture on more than 500 severe diabetics and that 90 per cent of them needed only one injection a day in contrast to three or more injections sometimes necessary for severe diabetics. Like other insulins, the new mixture may be injected by the patient.

Program for Patients The new combination usually is administered in the morning, although the most severe cases require two divided doses a day.

Under the older system thousands of diabetics were obliged to give themselves as many as 20,000 injections in twenty years. With the new mixture the figure is cut to 365 per year, or only 7,300 in twenty years.

The 2:1 mixture is more effective in its results, Dr. Colwell said. Because it provides a smoother balance between insulin action and body utilization of eaten food it avoids two opposite situations, he added. In one, reactions to insulin are felt during the night when blood sugar falls too low because of insulin action. In the other, blood sugar level is too high during the daytime because of slow insulin action.

These faults in insulin therapy were discovered after experience by severe diabetics with protamine insulin, the first long-acting insulin to eliminate frequent injections. In insulin of this type a simple protein is mixed with insulin to slow it down.

Some Old Disadvantages However, severe diabetics sometimes suffered unconsciousness and convulsions during the night when they were using it. During the day action of the insulin was inadequate to let the body handle normal food intake.

"Regular" insulin acts to cut down the blood sugar very quickly and it is this type which necessitates frequent small doses. The new mixture combines regular and protamine insulins.

So far the new product has not been manufactured on a large scale, but progress is being made toward that objective.

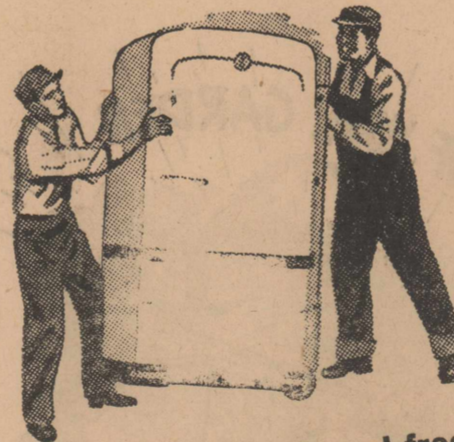

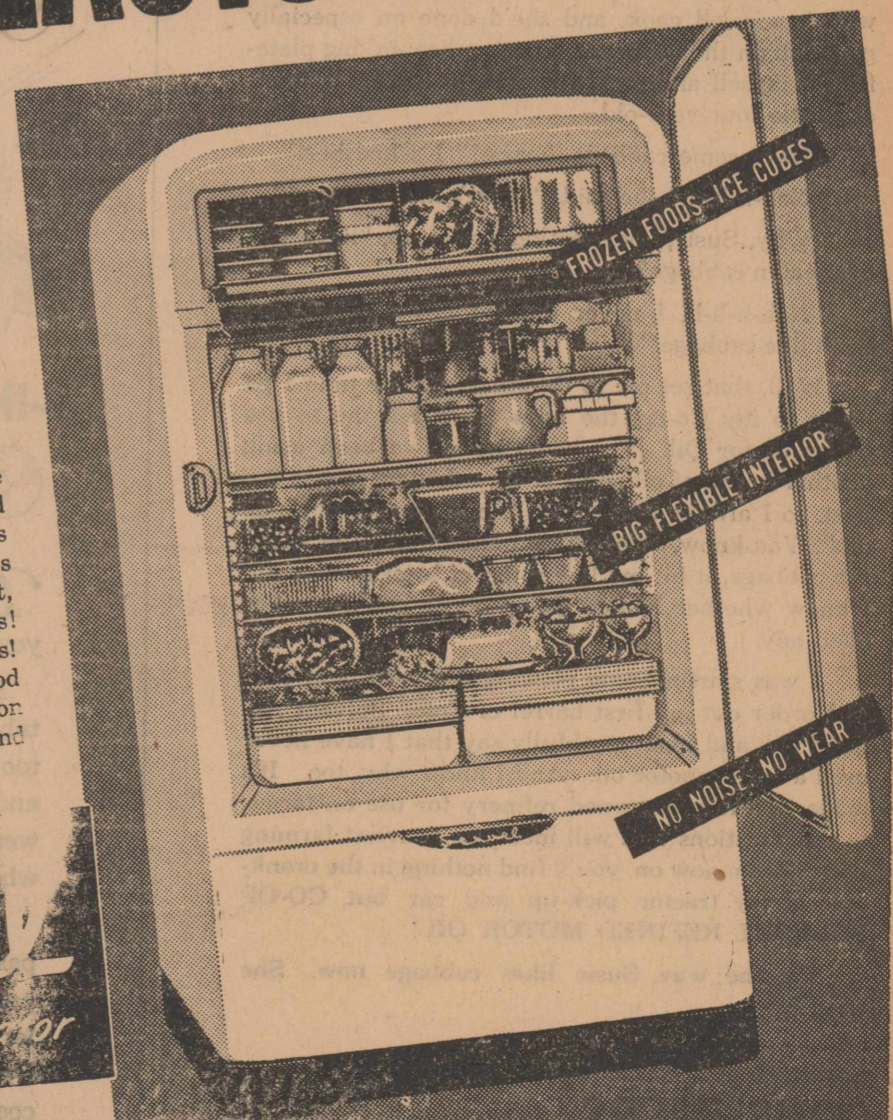

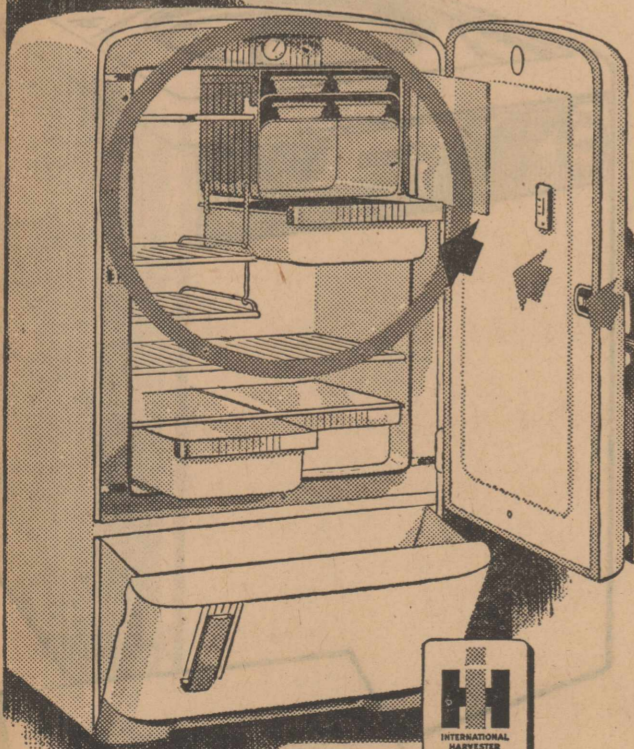

Fake Money Floods U.S.

WASHINGTON.—Two huge counterfeit rings, one in New York and one in Chicago, are flooding the nation with bogus \$10 and \$20 bills representing millions of dollars. Disclosure of the existence of two

rings was made by the Secret Service after the Federal Reserve Bank of New York announced that a "substantial number" of nearly perfect copies of bank notes were circulated throughout the Greater New York area in the biggest counterfeiting operation in the United States in 14 years.

Bank officials warned shoppers, merchants and commercial banks to watch sharply for the bogus bills.

Rings Are Separate

The New York bank officials said fake money also had been found in Chicago, but a secret service spokesman here said there was no connection between the two operations. He said the \$10 and \$20 bills passed out by the Chicago gang are not like those discovered in New York. If the two rings were working together, there would be no point in their using different plates with which to print their "money."

The Secret Service said the spurious New York bills had not been circulated beyond the New York

area as far as it knew, but the Chicago ring had outlets in nearly all parts of the country.

The Chicago gang was said to have been active for several months. At first its product was found only in the Midwest. However, evidence of its operations has been found in Pacific Coast States, along the entire Eastern Seaboard and in the South.

Relatively little of the bogus money had turned up in Chicago, officials said. Two passers were under arrest, but the ring can not be broken until the printing machinery is discovered. While the New York bills bear the symbol of the Chicago Federal Reserve stamp, printed in Chicago, a Secret Service spokesman said.

First in New York

The federal reserve bank in New York said commercial banks were taking daily losses from receipts of the fake bills. The counterfeit currency first was detected in New York when employees of the reserve bank there were sorting notes issued originally in Chicago for return to Chicago.

The commercial banks which sent the fake money to the Federal reserve bank, not realizing that it was no good, were "out" the amount represented, a spokesman for the New York federal reserve said. He said that the member commercial banks were losing money every day because they could not trace the counterfeit currency.

He said the "money" has been turning up in substantial quantities in New York. He declined to reveal how much had been found, but said

fake money had been coming in every day.

Officials estimated the amount of bogus money in the hands of the public might run in to "millions of dollars." They said the last big counterfeiting ring, operated by "Count" Victor Lustig in 1944, flooded the Midwest with \$2,500,000.

Big Name Horses Are on Trial

By GRANTLAND RICE

THE NEXT FEW days and weeks of racing will find a flock of celebrities in the headlines. Their names will include Citation, Coaltown, Capot, Ponder and a few more.

There have been three big feature races with the same weights so far—the Derby the Preakness and the Belmont. Capot not only won two out of three but also ran 1-2 in each start. Capot's on top—but he still has a battle left.

There is no longer any question now that Olympia could pick his own pace in the Belmont, but some horse with speed had to go after Olympia in the Derby. Capot was the only horse with the speed to challenge which in turn cost him the race.

If the Greentree horse could win the Preakness and Belmont because there was no pacer to kill off first, he could surely have taken over the Derby under similar circumstances.

But for all that, Ponder was the surprise horse of both the Derby and the Belmont. He will still be dangerous over any stretch of ground beyond a mile, especially at a mile and a quarter or a mile and a half.

His form from two-year-old class has bounded far up and if Capot falls away later on, it is quite likely that Calumet's stretch runner will move up.

In the meanwhile it will be interesting to see when and where Citation will run again. Jimmy Jones says the champion is ready. "We have been in no hurry," Jimmy says, "to get him working too soon with Coaltown on hand. There is nothing to be gained by running Citation against Coaltown."

Whether or not Citation is ready, Calumet has no great worry with Coaltown, Ponder and Wistful on hand.

It is only natural that Chicago should get the call with these standouts, due to the matter of weight assignments. If Calumet can get her stars in at 130, it would be rather foolish to take higher weights.

In the meanwhile Hollywood

Park is quite anxious to know what Calumet will do about the \$100,000 Gold Cup race on July 16, where Coaltown and Citation can get in at 132 pounds. The hitch here may come from Ben Jones' statement that 130 pounds is all that any horse should carry. The extra two pounds would make little or no difference, but it might leave an opening for increased weights later on.

In any event the next few weeks should be replete with interesting turns, now partially covered by the fogs. Citation, especially, is due to break into the headlines soon.

Make The Target A Barn

So far this has been a formless baseball season in the main and the main reason is quite evident—the pitching.

It isn't so much a matter of the base hits and runs that have been accumulated. It isn't so much a matter of the home runs driven in winning flight over the fences or into the stands. It has been largely a matter of bases on balls.

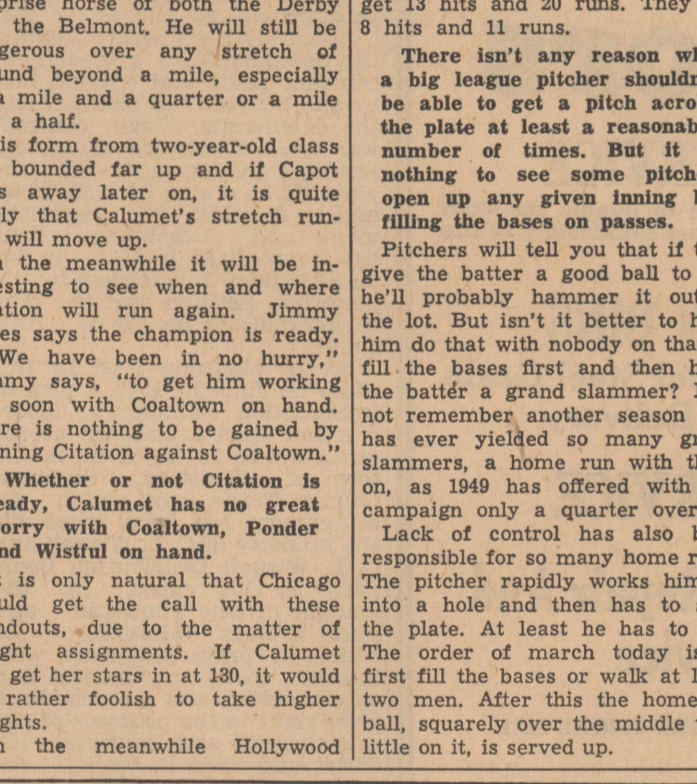
I can't recall a season where so many passes have been issued day after day. Eight—10-15-18 or 20 have been on the menu. Teams get 13 hits and 20 runs. They get 8 hits and 11 runs.

There isn't any reason why a big league pitcher shouldn't be able to get a pitch across the plate at least a reasonable number of times. But it is nothing to see some pitcher open up any given inning by filling the bases on passes.

Pitchers will tell you that if they give the batter a good ball to hit, he'll probably hammer it out of the lot. But isn't it better to have him do that with nobody on than to fill the bases first and then hand the batter a grand slammer? I do not remember another season that has ever yielded so many grand slammers, a home run with three on, as 1949 has offered with the campaign only a quarter over.

Lack of control has also been responsible for so many home runs. The pitcher rapidly works himself into a hole and then has to split the plate. At least he has to try. The order of march today is to first fill the bases or walk at least two men. After this the home-run ball, squarely over the middle with little on it, is served up.

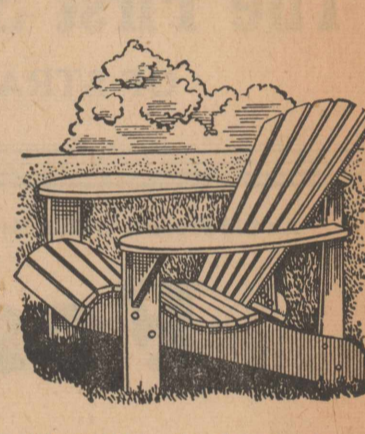

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Truman Asks 45 Millions to Spread U.S. 'Know-How' Throughout World; A-Bomb Urged as Defense Weapon

U.S. KNOW-HOW: Share for World

Back in January, President Harry Truman delivered in his message to congress, a multiple-point program. In that program was mentioned "point four"—one of the proposals he made and one which raised some eyebrows and set off no end of speculation on "when and how."

"POINT FOUR" was a proposal to share United States "know-how" in varied fields with other friendly nations of the world. In that proposal, the President asked congress to go along with a plan to let such nations in on how the U.S. does things economically, mechanically, industrially.

After speculation died down there was nothing more said about "point four" until recently. Then, President Truman told congress exactly what he wanted. First, he asked for 45 million dollars to help the backward countries of the world through U.S. aid.

CALLING that a first step, he listed some other factors also as "preliminaries." These included: Technical assistance to be provided through the United Nations or directly by the United States. Private investment to turn undeveloped areas into producing for the world economy.

Authority delegated by the congress to the President to give him power to administer the program and authority to delegate it to the secretary of state and to other government officers as he deems appropriate.

"WE are here embarking on a venture that extends far into the future," he told congress. He added that "grinding poverty and the lack of opportunity for many millions of people in . . . certain regions . . . constitute the greatest challenge of the world today."

A-BOMB USE: Limits Asked

How would idealism fare against expediency in the matter of atomic bomb use in a war crisis?

That was a question with which congress was being asked to deal. Senator Flanders (R., Vt.) asked congress to declare the atomic bomb as a weapon of defense only for the free nations—not to be used unless an aggressor hurls it first.

TO RISK a masterpiece of understatement, that could be a most dangerous policy as even a child could see. Give an aggressor first shot at us with the bomb before we retaliate? Some critics of such a plan might reasonably demand: How silly can you get?

An enemy equipped with enough bombs, and permitted first drop, could put this nation, or any nation, in such a fix that there'd be no use and no opportunity to retaliate with the bomb.

From here it looks as though Senator Flanders may have nothing but his trouble for his work.

FLANDERS explained his plan as one which he believed might speed the United Nations' efforts to write an agreement on world-wide control of atomic energy.

Asked whether his plan might not arouse criticism that this country is denying itself its foremost weapon, the senator replied, "I don't think we should sell our immortal souls to the devil."

But in the American concept, stemming from 1776, to sell one's freedom to an enemy through non-use of the bomb might be tantamount to the situation which the senator finds distasteful.

ECONOMY: Warning Sounded

President Truman's administration was coming in for some criticism as a result of the current bipartisan economy drive in congress. Senator Aitken (R., Vt.) warned that if the drive succeeds, it will put a powerful political weapon in President Truman's hands—and in an election year, at that. Aitken argued that it would be tantamount to handing the President a two billion dollar campaign fund for the congressional elections next year.

FIFTY-SIX senators—21 Democrats and 35 Republicans—have signed a petition to take up a resolution which would force Truman to balance the budget by cutting federal operating appropriations from five to 10 per cent in the fiscal year.

DANGER OVERLOOKED

Plaster of Paris Held Infection Source

Plaster of Paris, in use all over the world for decades without sterilization, contains actual dangers of infection, according to Prof. E. G. D. Murray and Dr. G. D. Denton of McGill University.

The familiar white material used primarily as a cast for broken bones has long been overlooked as a source of infection, the university men said. A man in a Montreal hospital died unexpectedly after a knee operation, over which two successive leg plaster casts had been used. The medical men became suspicious of the plaster. Both casts had been thrown away, but Professor Murray investigated plaster taken from original tins. He found gas gangrene germs in 24 of 30 cans. Tetanus was found in two of the cans.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Why Church Music?

Lesson for July 17, 1949

WHY church music? Hymn books are expensive, learning new hymns is a bother, choirs are a lot of trouble. Most preachers need more time for their sermons; why not cut out the music and let them have fifteen minutes extra? No sir; it won't do. Say what you please, the average church-goer knows better than that. He may never have thought it out and he might not have heard of the word "hymnology," but Mr. Average Churchman likes music in the church, even if he never opens his mouth himself.

Liturgy

SINGING in church was not invented yesterday. In the Psalms, as in our own hymnals, some of the poems were originally written and intended for use in public worship. The word "liturgy" simply means the order of manner of service, and all churches have liturgies whether they give them that name or not.

Our familiar "Holy, Holy, Holy," was written for use in an early morning service; "Bread of the world" was written as a Communion hymn; "Break Thou the Bread of Life" while often used at Communion was no so intended, as you can tell by reading it carefully; it was meant for use just before the reading of the Scripture.

"Day is Dying in the West" is best used in an outdoor service. "Ivory Palaces" was written one Sunday afternoon in North Carolina for use in an evangelistic meeting that night. It might interest you to learn that your own hymnal and see how many hymns were written purposely for church use.

Songs of the Temple

THREE liturgical Psalms are our lesson selection. Use your imagination when you read them. As you read Psalm 24, think of a great procession marching through the streets of Jerusalem on a holy day and approaching the tall temple shining on the city's highest hill. Singing as they climb, perhaps one part of the congregation sings the question: "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? Who shall stand in his holy place?" Perhaps another group of voices takes up the answer: "He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart . . ."

As the great gates swing open, the chant rises: "Lift up your heads, O ye gates!" for the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords, is marching.

The little kings (in Israel and over the world) have come and gone; only the Lord of Hosts is the King of Glory. Singing the glory of God brings it before the mind far better than reading about it in a book!

Then the 64th Psalm is taken from what they called the "Chief Musician's Collection," evidently a part of what we now would call the choir library. It is the song of a man who loves the church and loves the people whom he finds there. Psalm 95:1-7b is also obviously a song for public worship, and still is sung every morning in churches around the world.

The Best is Not Too Good

IF in ancient times when God's people were learning to sing, the noblest poems of inspired men were set to the best music available and used for the honor of God and the help of man, then surely Christians ought to do no less.

If you had a friend coming to see you, one whom you respect and wish to honor, you certainly would not set the table with all the chipped-up old kitchen china and you wouldn't put wilted flowers on the table and you certainly wouldn't keep the radio tuned to the tin-pianest trash you could find on the dial.

No, if you have anything for him you want it to be of the very best. Why not so with God? The house of God is no place for cheap, bad music, jingly meaningless rhymes instead of noble hymns and psalms, tiresome grind-organ tunes or jazzy swing stuff instead of music that has real power and beauty. If non-sense is bad in a sermon, it is worse in a prayer and worst of all in a hymn. If mere noise is bad in a sermon, it is worse in a prayer and unbearably bad in a hymn.

Soap Holes Found Value in Disguise

Produce Magic Mud With Multiple Uses
Ever since Belle Fourche, S. D., was a rip-snorting cattle town at the end of the old Chisholm trail its residents have been damning the "soap holes" that plagued the area.

Fast-riding cowboys often took a nasty tumble in this super-slippery mud and cattle were forever getting bogged down in them.

But now, like a man discovering his hives are really a blessing, Belle Fourche has found its soap holes are one of its biggest assets. Every one of them is filled with a magic mud called bentonite. It's an odorless, tasteless, soapy mud with a thousand uses and scientists are thinking up new ones every day.

Most of us already are using it a half dozen times a day, but almost nobody has heard of it. Men use it in shoe polish and hand cleaners. Women use it in face



Bentonite is the most absorbent material found in nature. When moistened it swells to several times its normal size. This quality makes it useful in waterproofing housing foundations and many other industrial uses.

powder, lotions, beauty creams. Bentonite also is found in many types of paint, plaster and cleaning agents. It's handy for filling holes in giant dams and for casting moulds for molten metal. Forced down thousands of feet into the earth this magic mud lubricates the drills in oil wells and sends the debris up to the drillers.

Its new uses and increasing popularity for its older uses all add up to a boom such as Belle Fourche hasn't seen since the gold rush.

In the past 10 years the population has practically doubled and bentonite now pours \$600,000 a year into the town in the form of additional purchasing power.

Fifteen years ago Belle Fourche shipped out three carloads of bentonite. Last year its production was 6,187 carloads and this year they expect carloadings to go considerably higher.

Scientists say that bentonite, a strange mixture made up mostly of dust from prehistoric volcanoes, is found almost nowhere in the world except in the Black Hills of Wyoming and South Dakota.

It is the most absorbent material nature ever has devised, they say, and a half dozen teaspoonful will soak up a glass of water.

Insect Killers Made By Synthetic Means

New pyrethrum-like chemicals that kill insects have been made synthetically for the first time in the laboratories of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, it has been announced by the U. S. department of agriculture. The chemical makeup of the synthetic materials is almost identical with that of the insect-killing principle in pyrethrum, according to the chemists.

Bricker Asks Study To See if America Faces Dictatorship

DETROIT—A commission to find out whether the United States is rushing toward dictatorship has been suggested by Sen. John Bricker (R., Ohio). Bricker expressed concern that

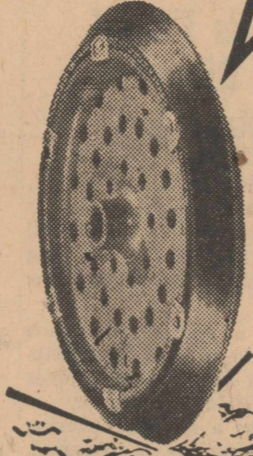

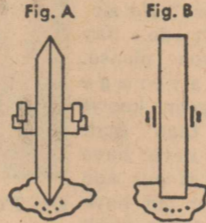

The proposed commission, patterned after the Hoover group which studied the executive branch, would study the division of powers between levels of government. It would also determine appropriate fields of taxation.

The senator said the commission should be composed of representatives from the three branches of federal government, from the state government and from the people.

The discussion brought out that constant growth of national government was due chiefly to failure of states to assume responsibilities.

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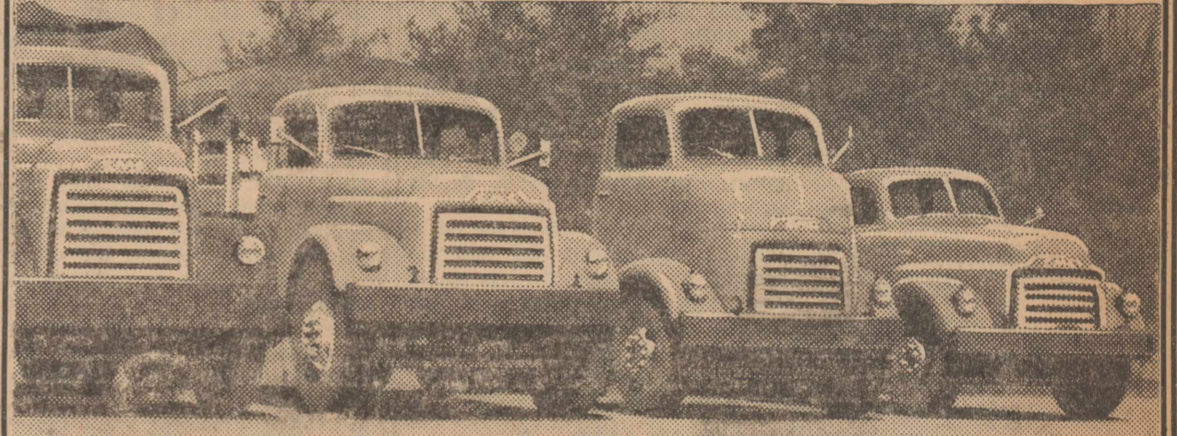
