Meth, Cash Seized In Muleshoe Raid

A raid by local law enforcement officers yielded a large amount of drugs and cash according to Bailey County Chief Deputy Julian Dominguez.

On Thursday, May 29, a little after noon, officers with the Bailey County Sheriff's Department and the Muleshoe Police Department served a search warrant at 1511 W. Ave. B, the residence of Raul "Rudy" Gonzales, Jr., 45, the culmination of



"Rudy" Gonzales a two-year investigation into suspected drug activities. "The sheriff (Richard Wills) has made drug investigations a priority," Dominguez

said, adding that Gonzales has "been a thorn in the side of local law enforcement for awhile."

At the time of the raid, Gonzales — who was arrested on drug-related charges, and an unidentified woman was at the residence.

According to the chief deputy, Gonzales has two previous drug convictions.

Along with the cash and a substance believed to be methamphetamine, the officers seized

School Board Approves Proposed 2014-15 Tax Rate

The Muleshoe Independent School Board's board of trustees set the proposed tax rate for the 2014-15 school year during an early morning meeting Tuesday.

Based upon preliminary property values received from the Bailey Central Appraisal District, the proposed rate is \$1.35 — which is the same rate approved for the



2013-14 school year.

This proposed rate reflects a maintenance and operations rate of \$1.04, and an interest and sinking fund (debt service) of \$0.31, and is

based upon preliminary property values of \$243,914,809 for Bailey County, along with the portion of Lamb County located within MISD — \$12,151,490, for a total of \$256,066,299.

According to MISD Business Manager Daniel Harper, this proposed rate is significantly lower than the 2005 tax rate

Why The Double Standard?

For those unaware, on May 26, White House officials reportedly released the name of the Central Intelligence Agency's section chief in Afghanistan... a major mistake to say the least, and a potentially dangerous error.

And while President Barack Obama has asked the White House's chief attorney to investigate the incident, there seems to be a vastly different atmosphere

'The West Wing' And 'What A Friend We Have in Jesus!'

It's Christmas at the White House, and those entering find their eyes treated to festive decorations and their ears filled with the music of the season.

Most folks are enjoying the spectacle. But not Josh Lyman, deputy chief of staff in the Bartlett administration.

Josh's nerves are about as frayed as they can get. Though he is well on his way to physical recovery from wounds received weeks earlier during an attempt on the life of the president, it's becoming obvious — except to him — that his emotional recovery is far from complete.

Josh's friends and coworkers are worried about him already, but when in the Oval Office he actually snaps verbally at Pres. Bartlett, Leo McGarry, chief of staff and a father figure to Josh (and the other staffers) sees that he needs help.

On Christmas Eve, Josh finds himself in a Leo-mandated session with a psychiatrist specializing in post-traumatic stress.

That's the storyline for a great episode of *The West Wing*. I love the series, though I've wondered why. I like Pres. Bartlett, though I can't imagine I'd have voted for him.

I like the series in spite of, not because of, the political views of its main characters, though now they seem "middle of the road" to what we've seen in real life.

I like the incredibly well-written, smart dialogue. I feel complimented that those making the series, unlike the producers of most of TV's vast vapid wasteland, assume that some folks watching might be more intelligent than your average rutabaga.

I love the series because of its amazing setting but mostly because it centers on the human relationships between its characters. I like Leo McGarry, more and not less because he is flawed, a recovering alcoholic who genuinely cares for those who work with and for him.

surrounding this incident compared to a similar incident in 2003 involving the Bush administration.

After the 2003 incident, the CIA reportedly contacted the US Department of Justice requesting a criminal investigation into the incident,

resulting in both an FBI investigation and the seating of a grand jury with the appointment of special counsel to head up the investigation.

What concerns us is the appearance of a double standard in how the two incidents have been handled to date.

Where there were howls for blood following the 2003 incident, with a subsequent civil suit that alleged the involvement of former Vice President Dick Cheney, we would be tremendously surprised if such actions followed the most recent incident.

Oh, and let's not

forget the movie!

To say that the current President and his administration — albeit tarnished by problems regarding Obamacare, the IRS' attacks on conservative organizations and its continuing efforts to devalue US citizens' Second Amendment rights — remain the darlings of the nation's predominately liberal national media is a given.

But at what point does equal treatment come into play? No doubt some would even laugh at such an expectation.

Certainly some may claim the first incident was "retaliation," while the second was merely an accident, but without a similar investigative effort, how can we be sure?

equipment and supplies consistent with the manufacture and distribution of illegal drugs.

Although no firearms were located in the residence, Dominguez noted that a large amount of ammunition was also discovered in the house, which may lead to additional charges since it is a violation of both state and federal laws for a convicted felon to possess ammunition. Gonzales is being

held on a \$150,000 bond.

"It all went really smooth," Dominguez said about Thursday's operation.

An investigator with the District Attorney's office also assisted in the warrant service.

Dominguez urges county residents suspecting drug activities to contact either the Bailey County Sheriff's Department at 272-4268, or the Muleshoe Police Department at 272-4569.

Graveside services followed Monday at Muleshoe Memorial Park Cemetery.

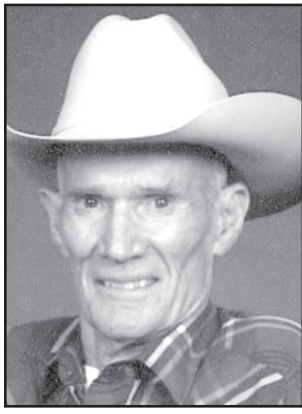
The family received friends on Sunday, June 1, at Brooks Chapel in Canyon.

USDA Awards Funds To Prepare Farmers For New Farm Bill Programs

On May 29, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is awarding \$6 million to universities and cooperative state extension services to develop online decision tools and other materials and train experts to educate producers about several key farm bill programs.

The new Web tools will help farmers and ranchers determine what participation in programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill will mean for their businesses. "Helping farmers and ranchers understand new Farm Bill programs and what the programs mean for their families is one of USDA's top priorities," said Vilsack. "With the resources we're providing, university experts will help ensure farmers and ranchers are highly educated as they make critical decisions about new programs that impact their livelihoods. The new tools that will be developed will empower farmers and ranchers to select the plan that best fits their unique needs."

MAEF Supports Local Education

The Muleshoe Area Educational Foundation hosted Communication, Conflict & Customer Service: A skill Building Workshop on Wednesday, April 30, at the Bailey County Electric Community Room. Eighty-six employees from the City of Muleshoe, Bailey County, Muleshoe ISD, Muleshoe Area Hospital

District, and Bailey County Electric, as well as employees from area cities attended the training. Julie Gerstenberger of Levelland, South Plains College, was the instructor. The Muleshoe Area Educational Foundation is interested in meeting the educational needs of the community and the surrounding area.

Upcoming classes being presented include a Basic Pistol Class, and a Concealed Handgun Class. Individuals who are in need of training, are urged to contact the foundation. The foundation offers support to the Muleshoe Center of South Plains College for classes offered through South Plains, but also provides classes which aren't for college credit.

Protecting Your Identity Security

In light of recent NSA and IRS scandals, it's clear that concerns by Americans about overreaching data collection by the federal government, violations of privacy, and discrimination are justified. Now it's time to add the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) to that list. The CFPB already maintains individual data about more than 10 million Americans — but now it aims to collect even more personal and financial details, all without our consent. I've voiced concerns about their lack of accountability to the taxpayers and the lack of congressional oversight. Now I'm also worried about the security of this data, and how we can fix it when Congress has almost no management authority over the CFPB. In January, I asked CFPB Director Cordray about data security. At

that time, he responded that they weren't collecting any personal data that could identify individuals, so there wasn't real risk to data security. However, now the Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA), which partnered with CFPB to maintain the National Mortgage Database, has announced it will collect personal details like religion, credit card info, phone numbers, and email addresses. We can't allow a government agency like the CFPB to continue to operate without oversight. That's why I've introduced a bill to hold the CFPB accountable to taxpayers. It removes the CFPB from under the wings of the Federal Reserve and makes it an independent agency reporting to Congress. The bill also

saves your tax dollars by requiring the CFPB to follow the regular budget process just like all other federal agencies and departments. My colleagues and I on the Financial Services Committee are watching the CFPB, and I'll keep you updated on my efforts to keep your data secure. **Responding to VA Misconduct** Over the past month, we've heard too many reports about misconduct and neglect in the VA healthcare system. Last Wednesday, our worst fears were confirmed. The VA Office of the Inspector General (OIG) released a preliminary report substantiating claims that VA executives have been cooking the books to conceal actual wait times for veterans' care at the Phoenix VA.

At least 1,700 veterans seeking care at that facility alone did not get an appointment on the schedule or were omitted from the wait list altogether. On Friday, the Administration released a report that showed more than 60 percent of VA healthcare facilities manipulated wait times for appointments. This is shocking and unacceptable. Because of these findings, they're now investigating 42 more VA healthcare facilities — including the three locations in Texas I pushed the VA to investigate earlier this month. In response, VA Secretary Shinseki resigned last Friday after apologizing and taking responsibility for the misconduct under his leadership. I respect this decision, and I hope the VA will move quickly to bring in new leadership and change its culture and operations. I'm also encouraged that the Administration is seriously considering House-passed reforms to the VA, like making it easier for executives to be fired or demoted based on poor performance, and prohibiting performance bonuses for executives until 2019.

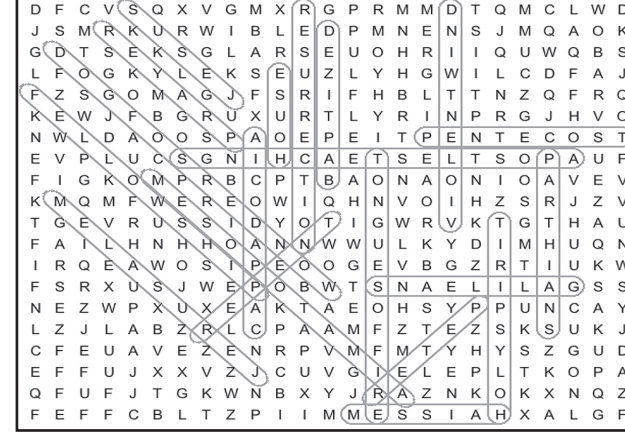

Continued from A4 very accurate about how long tornadoes are on the ground, and research shows that most tornadoes stay on the ground for less than 10 minutes. It's rare for one to stay on the ground for more than 10 to 20 miles," he says. "Perhaps the greatest example of a tornado staying on the ground for a long period of time was the famous Tri-State tornado of March 1925. It stayed on roughly the same path for an amazing 219 miles, from southeast Missouri, crossing over Illinois and finally ending in Indiana. Some reports have it on the ground for more than seven hours. After all was said and done, the

tornado was estimated to move as fast as 73 miles per hour in some locations, killing 695 people and destroying over 15,000 homes." Q: Do tornadoes ever change direction? A: They can move in any direction, McRoberts says, but most have a common path. "Most tornadoes move from the southwest to

the northeast, but not all do," he adds. "It used to be thought that all tornadoes moved to the northeast, but now we know that they can move in any direction. Tornadoes develop from severe thunderstorms, and they generally move in whatever direction that particular thunderstorm is moving."

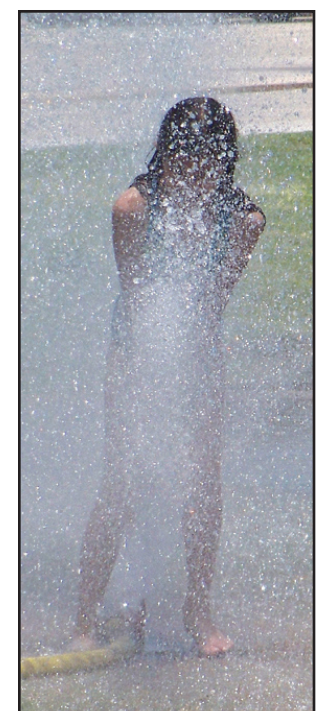
