## Commissioners' Court Discusses Roof Issues and Budget

Bailey County's commissioners' court met on Monday to discuss the budget for FY 2014-15. Judge Sheri Harrison first told the court of the Gift Certificates she received for county employees who participated in the Healthy County Pedometer Activity. There were ten participants that received \$50 gift certificates and eleven participants that received \$25 gift certificates. The county will receive half of the monies from each of the gift certificates that will go back into the Healthy County Fund for other planned county activities. The judge encouraged the commissioners to "lead by example" and suggested that the commissioners participate in the county

activities. The court then heard proposals from two roofing companies for a new roof for the courthouse. Both roofing companies discussed a new foam roof for the courthouse. They each explained the process of a foam roof and how it would benefit the courthouse by saving on utility expenses. Each company had previously examined the current roof on the courthouse and discussed some of the problems the current roof faces. Each company explained how a foam roof would work to correct the current problems. The warranty that each company offers as well as references from each company was then discussed as the commissioners asked questions.

The Judge looked into the current budget and explained that the cost

of the new roof would be able to be paid for in the current year's budget. A decision on the proposals was made after the two companies concluded their presentations. Harrison will notify the winner of the bid.

Sheriff Richard Wills then gave a report on the status of the number of inmates housed in the jail. The number of inmates from Curry County has dropped and Wills stated that he was looking for those numbers to increase when the new budget for Curry County goes into effect. Wills then discussed what other counties had inmates being housed in Bailey County. Wills then explained that he had looked into other counties with a large number of inmates

## Bailey County History Falls Piece By Piece

Imagine a warm spring day in what would become Bailey County, an elm tree began growing.

It would be another 13 years before the county would be formed... 18 years before the Muleshoe Journal graced its readers with local news... a growing piece of county history that predated the hospital that ultimately resulted its fall.

On Monday and

Tuesday, July 28-29, the mighty elm that has towered over the entrance to the dining room of the Muleshoe Area Memorial Center for decades fell piece by piece to the chainsaws of Thompson's Tree Removal Service of Lubbock.

After years of pondering what to do about the tree, due to a large tree root that had damaged the dining room's floor and foundation, the hospital district's board ordered

the tree's removal, a "maintenance item" that seemed to draw more attention from employees of the hospital than the community.

After the main branches were trimmed away, and the trunk itself was cut, Lee Thompon confirmed the tree's age through account of its growth rings as being 108 years.

## Retiring? You have a choice to make on Medicare

When you retire and qualify for Medicare at 65, you'll need to decide how you'd like to receive your health care benefits.

Because you'll be new to Medicare, you may not realize you have two options.

One is to join the government's fee-for-

service program that's existed for 49 years. The other is to buy a Medicare Advantage plan from a private insurer.

The choice may seem bewildering at first, so let's go over each option.

With traditional fee-for-service coverage, you may go to any doctor, hospital or other provider that accepts Medicare. Medicare pays the provider a

fee for the service you receive. Once you meet your annual deductible, Medicare typically covers 80 percent of the cost for your care.

You have a few choices for covering the other 20 percent:

- You may use your retiree health plan from your former employer, if you're retired and have such a policy. Some retiree plans may cost

less or provide more benefits than other supplemental coverage.

- You may qualify for Medicaid, if you have limited income and savings. Besides helping with your out-of-pocket costs like deductibles and co-insurance, Medicaid may pay for your monthly Medicare premiums.

- If neither of those applies, you may buy a "Medigap" policy from a private insurer to cover what Medicare does not. There are 10 kinds of Medigap plans, with different benefits, so you'll need to decide which is best for you.

If you choose the traditional fee-for-service program, you'll probably also want to buy a prescription drug plan to go with your other coverage.

remains the favorite among people wanting the broadest possible access to doctors, hospitals and other providers. When coupled with a supplemental plan, it also makes your health care costs relatively predictable.

Still, 30 percent of Medicare beneficiaries—including 29 percent of Texans with Medicare—now prefer to get their health care benefits through a private insurer. The number of people buying private Medicare Advantage plans has tripled over the last 10 years.

With Medicare Advantage, insurance companies contract with the government to provide care. Every private plan must cover all the benefits that

that once used Bailey County to house their inmates and hopes they will start again.

Judge Harrison explained that the ambulance service collections had been very low. She explained that the director contacted the collections agency used and suggested that "Someone was not doing their job." Since then, the issue has been taken care of and there should be an expected spike in collections for the ambulance service.

As the Budget Workshop began for the 2014-15 FY Judge Harrison explained that

the evaluations have been down by almost \$6 million dollars. The Judge then clarified that the Minsa lawsuit was not ongoing, but was affecting the county because of the lowered evaluation of \$4 million dollars. "Minsa is not an ongoing lawsuit. It's finalized, but we're seeing the effects of it."

The court then looked at increasing the budget of the ambulance service by \$40,000. This increase is to cover the cost of a new ambulance. Harrison discussed how the county's budget is set up and how it could not

cover the entire cost of a new ambulance in one budgeted FY. Grants to cover this cost are also being looked into and a decision to increase the budget will be made at a later date.

A new vehicle for the county Extension office was discussed and the decision was made not to buy a new vehicle but to increase the amount of monies for repairs.

A 3% cost of living raise was added to the proposed budget for cost increases in the county. This percentage is comparable to surrounding counties.

The court continued to work on and make necessary changes to the proposed budget.

In other business the commissioners' court:

Approved an easement to bury a 6 inch irrigation pipe starting at the intersection of CR 203 and CR 1048

Approved TPERs Plan Provision for 2014 at 5.81.

Adopted the county health care insurance at a 2.9% increase for a total of \$669.62 per month, however, the county will receive \$37,570.04 check back in distribution to go back into the general fund.

traditional Medicare covers. In some cases, Medicare Advantage plans may offer extra benefits, like routine hearing or vision care.

Many plans charge a premium on top of the \$104.90 you'll pay each month for Medicare's medical insurance, but there's no need to buy a supplemental Medigap policy. Likewise, most Medicare Advantage plans include drug coverage with their other benefits.

The premiums, deductibles and co-payments will vary from one Medicare Advantage plan to another. But all plans, by law, must have annual limits on their overall out-of-pocket costs.

Unlike the traditional

fee-for-service program, most Medicare Advantage plans require you to go to doctors and hospitals within their network of providers or pay more for getting care outside the network.

Still, the private health plans have been especially popular among people with low to moderate incomes. They provide relatively affordable supplemental coverage, with lower premiums than those for Medigap policies.

So, which is better -- the traditional fee-for-service coverage or a private Medicare Advantage plan? That depends on your own circumstances and preferences. What's best for one person may

not work as well for someone else.

To find out more about your options, you can visit [www.medicare.gov](http://www.medicare.gov) and browse through the "Medicare and You" handbook. The website will also give you detailed information about the Medigap and Medicare Advantage policies available in your area.

Becoming informed will help you select the health care option that best fits your needs. It will also help you avoid mistakes that may cost you money.

One final note: If you're turning 65 and continuing to work, you still need to consider Medicare as you approach your birthday and qualify for the

health care coverage.

The best way to begin is to contact your company's human resources department to determine how your current employer-provided insurance will fit with Medicare's coverage.

## 2014 Property Tax Rates in COUNTY OF BAILEY

This notice concerns 2014 property tax rates for COUNTY OF BAILEY. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

## Neugebauer Statement on House Passed Border Crisis Bills

## Weather Whys: Yes, It Can Rain Fish – And Frogs

Q: We know it's not possible to rain cats and dogs, but sometimes you hear about frogs and other animals coming down from the sky. Is this possible?

A: It is, and it's happened many times throughout history, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "There are reports of it raining frogs, fishes and even snakes going back almost 2,000 years," McRoberts says. "In the past 300 years, many of these have been carefully

documented and witnessed by hundreds of people. Most of these have involved frogs and fish, but others have seen such things as corn, snakes, flowers and other materials. In 1873, it was reported that parts of Kansas City were covered with frogs that had dropped from the sky. In 1997, a Japanese fishing vessel was sunk by one of several cows falling from the sky, in an almost unbelievable tale that was later verified by the Russian

Air Force."

Q: What causes these things to fall from the sky?

A: The most generally accepted answer is that small creatures, such as fish or frogs, are sucked up high into the air by either very strong thunderstorms or tornadoes, McRoberts explains. "Over the ocean, a waterspout—a tornado that forms over water—can produce strong enough winds to carry small fish into the air. There are instances of some of

these creatures being carried long distances because there was no water nearby. Maybe one of the strangest occurred in 1877 when The New York Times reported that several small alligators had fallen from the sky onto a South Carolina farm, and in August of 2001, the Wichita, Kansas, area experienced rain mixed with cornhusks, some of them 30 inches long."
