## Lack Of Water Specter In Rural Living

THE BENEFTTS of living Autside Lubbock include lower taxes. There also may be the liability of a lack of usable water.
A prime example is Carrisle, a tiny village just west of Lubbock:
Most of Carisle's water comes from privately owned wells, which in times past
have produced plenty of water from the Ogallala Aquifer. But now some reidents say they are pumping more sand than water. Faced with a maior now some residents say they are pumping more sand than water. Faced with a major problem, they have
turned to the eity and asked to have Carisisle annexed, says Jim Betram, Lubbock city plan
So far, water problems have been unique to Carlisle, but city planners and area
water authorities say other home buyers settling in rural Lubbock County may face similar problems in a few years.

One is called monochromatic, which means using different shades and tints of one eolor throughout a room, with the possible addition of some black, white or new-
rals A monockromatic foom might have, le's say, basically green plus light greens and dark greens. The next category is what are called analagous or related color schemes. That is,
using colors that are sideb-byide on the color wheel. For example, a room done this way could have reds and oranges, or greens and blues. Then there is the complimentary or contrasting color scheme where you use col.
ars that are opposite each other on the color wheel soch as red and green or yeliow and divelet.
The fourth category is called triad which uses not just two, but three basic colors same room. You can do a beautiful fob with any of the above classifications depending on
