


Bovina Nips Lazbuddie

Bovina stunned the Lazbuddie Longhorns Friday night, when the high-rolling 'Horns traveled to their neighboring town. By the time the Mustangs got through, they had left the scoreborad showing 25-0, as the powerful Longhorns were defeated in an upset game.

Dale Gilbreath, Mustang quarterback, completed 14 of 30 passes for 292 yards for four touchdowns and extra points.

Lazbuddie dropped to a 3-1-1 record for the year, as Bovina upped their season record to 4-1.

The Longhorns were held to 10 first downs, 71 yards rushing and 14 yards passing, while Bovina amassed

Social Promotion 'Out' For Schools

Some students who will be expecting to be passed to the next grade just to get them through school may be in for a rude awakening. Muleshoe School Superintendent Harold Horne has issued the following warning to students who may be failing and to their parents:

"State officials, our community, our Board of Trustees, and all school personnel are extremely interested in improving the quality of instruction in our schools. We want to make sure that our students get a full dose of instruction each day. We have to contend with both student and parent apathy."

"The Muleshoe Schools are setting class standards and will not pass students who do not meet these standards of achievement. In other words, the school will not pass students just because they attended school and tried hard. There will be NO social promotion. It is educationally unwise to pass students to higher levels when the behind each year become totally confused and lost. Our teachers have mor responsibilities to our students under the system of NO social promotion." "If a student is failing,

students just get further

the parents should be contacted. Parents are urged to keep up with the progress of the students, to visit with the teacher and principal. It is a known fact that students who have parents who are really concerned with children's school work will most often have success in the school."

"Several programs are available to help students who cannot meet class standards, our Special Education Program may be helpful. The student will have diagnostic testing and an individual educational plan can be set up for those who qualify for Special Education.'

"Very often, students who are failing can be helped in Remdial Reading and Math programs. Some

4-H Mulligan Stew; **An Aid To Nutrition**

Television and classrooms will team up again in the Texas South Plains during October and November, providing youths in fourth through sixth grades a two-pronged program to help them learn about nutrition while

For six weeks, the fastpaced color television production of "Mulligan Stew", produced by 4-H. will be broadcast each Sunday afternoon on KAMC TV, Channel 28. Classroom projects the following week will emphasize key points about nutrition which were presented during that

week's broadcast. Students from the rooms of Mrs. Costen, Mrs. Rudd and Mrs. Allison at Mary DeShazo Elementary School in Muleshoe will be participating in the "Mulligan Stew" 4-H project.

In all, 71 students will be learning about nutrition in Muleshoe through this program. This is a very innovative way to reach youngsters and teach them the value of good nutrition through 4-H work. At the end of the series, these students will receive a 4-H certificate stating that they have completed the "Mulligan Stew" training.

Other areas of the Panhandle will be participating in this project also. The program will be broadcast again, starting October 25 from Channel 4 in Amarillo. These programs will be aired every Saturday beginning at 12:30 p.m. and

'Ag-Use' Decreases Some Farm Taxation

Ranchers and farmers who did not take advantage of the declared "ag use" certification are finding themselves on the short end of the stick with school tax declarations.

This year, with the implementation of the Tax Relief Amendment, ranchers and farmers in this area can receive an "Open Space Land" valuation, based not on the land's fair market value, but on the land's productivity value. This is the value than an agricultural producer would pay to purchase the land and use it for agricultural purposes.

However, many farmers did not sign up for the new program, and this year, as taxes increased, the agricultural producer has found himself paying higher taxes. At the same time, farmers who did sign up for the ag use designation, have found in most instances, that their taxes have been lowered.

Under the admendment, only the land need qualify. This is not an exemption, but is a special valuation statute, creating a new or special kind of market value with which to replace the fair market value rather than creating a value to be subtracted from the fair market value.

For instance, one farmer north of Muleshoe has found his school tax reduced by \$.85 per acre for his 1980 tax. With 160 acres of prime irrigated farm land, his taxes for 1979 were \$553.87 for the land only. After he signed his ag use certificate, his tax for 1980 on the same land was \$416.75. In 1979, his valuation of the land only was \$57,100.00. This was increased during the reevaluation this year to \$91,690.00. However, with the ag use certification, he was taxed only on \$49,030

On a comparable, 160 acre farm west of Muleshoe with a valuation of \$55,100 acre, because he did not apply for ag use. In the revalued at \$107,840. His. school taxes increased by a total of \$382.17 from the \$534.47 in 1979 to the assessment of \$916.64 for his 1980 school taxes.

After declaring his ag use, a farmer with a 160 acre irrigated farm east of town has also found his school taxes reduced from 1979. His 1979 tax on a valuation of \$47,360, was \$459.39. This same farmer received a tax bill of \$344.25 for 1980 school taxes even after his land was re-valued at \$75,200. His ag use valuation was \$40,500.

A dryland farmer, with 160 acres south of Muleshoe, had a school tax bill of \$139.68 for 1979, on his land valued at \$14,400. For 1980, his land was revalued at \$19, 250, but he received a tax bill of \$88.65 on his 10,430 taxable acres.

Rosalie Powell of the city/school tax office at the Muleshoe City Hall said a dryland farmer does not receive the same tax break as an irrigated farmer. The production value of the land is determined on expenses to produce the crop, thus the irrigated farmer, with the higher expenses, receives the larger tax break under the Tax Relief Amendment.

On a dryland farm in southwest Bailey County, the farmer with 177 acres had a 1979 school valuation of \$16,980, and a tax bill of \$164.70. With the Revaluation, his land value was increased to \$25,500. However, he was taxed on \$22,830 valuation at \$194.05.

Also in southwest Bailey County, a 164 combination irrigation, dryland and pasture farm with a '1979 valuation of \$27,270 and a tax of \$264.51 was revalued at \$51,530. Of this, \$34,030 was taxable for school taxes at \$289.25.

Last year, the school tax rate was \$.97 for every \$100 valuation and this year, following the re-valuation, the tax rate is \$.85 per \$100 valuation.

Also, the city tax was \$.66 per \$100 valuation prior to the reevaluation and is \$.60 per \$100 for this taxing year. .
