



Heighten Flavor of Beets

Most of us use raisins and dates in puddings and cakes but do you know that hot boiled beets gain interest and provide extra nourishment if served with a sauce to which raisins have been added? The small seedless raisins are delicious in either a lemon or orange sauce.

The flavor of hamburg steak is greatly improved by the addition of a few raisins. Chop raisins finely and work well with meat. Although the protein content of raisins is much lower than that of beef, their iron content compares favorably and they are inexpensive and highly nutritious.

Many salads are made more appetizing and nourishing by the addition of dried fruits. Raisins added to raw vegetable salads or fruit salads increase their food value. Prunes are good with a cabbage salad and are often combined with cream or cottage cheese and nuts. Dates make a delicate salad stuffed with cream cheese and served with a French dressing made with orange juice.

The sandwich fillings made with dried fruits are numerous, limited only by the cooks' ingenuity.
