Muleshoe continues work to prevent cancer

You may have noticed the recent cancer prevention messages in your church bulletin, flashing on a marquee or when you visited United Supermarkets, LLC.

These are all part of a campaign to help prevent cancer in Muleshoe. This campaign is based upon the fact that over one half of all cancers are preventable by behavior.

That's right, if you, your family and your friends work at prevention,

you can substantially reduce cancer risk here in Muleshoe.

The idea of the campaign is to help you learn what can be done to prevent cancer and encourage all of us to adopt healthful lifestyles.

The three main preventable sources of cancer are obesity, tobacco use and sunburn. Each of these can be prevented by doing or not doing certain things, but often needed changes are somewhat challenging to do.

Little efforts to accomplish these things and developing good habits can go a long way. A neat potential thing about this effort is that you can do your part in your family and groups to get the message out and encourage healthy living.

To reduce the risk caused by obesity, the key is, unsurprisingly, to consume fewer calories and exercise more.

As part of the campaign, experts in nutrition will be presenting food tastings in Muleshoe for healthy eating.

United Supermarkets has been putting up green "Cut Your Risk, Boost Your Health" labels, identifying foods that are both economical and healthy using the innovative NuVal system.

A little change like

selecting a healthier food or choosing to walk regularly will help.

For sunburn, the equation is easy. Don't get sunburned.

Experts have shown that even one sunburn event, by itself, significantly increases skin cancer risk. In essence, if you are going to be in the sun for more than 15 minutes, then use sunscreen or wear a wide brimmed hat (yes, cowboys know to wear the right kind of hat), a long-sleeved shirt, and long pants.

We all know tobacco use is bad for us. Do your part to support those trying to quit, and know there are support groups and other resources to help quit.

By the way, chewing or dipping is almost as bad as smoking, so look to cut back how much you use by starting to chew gum instead.

This campaign brings together community leaders in Muleshoe to work with researchers from Texas Tech University and Texas

Muleshoe Mules pluck Bushland Falcons, 41-7

The Mule defense was well prepared for the high flying Falcons of Bushland as they swooped into Benny Douglas Stadium Friday night.

The Falcons were riding a tailwind of victories and were highly rated by many in the media.

The Mules fired a shot on their opening drive that may not have been heard around the world but it sure reverberated all through District 2-2A. Ray Martinez returned the opening kick 23 yards to the Mule 33.

"I can not say enough about the performance of the kids tonight" said Mule coach David

Wood. "They came out ready to play and their concentration limit was at an ultimate high. I can only think of one mental break down tonight."

and they have been doing that to teams this season. We played our game of the year to date."

"We keep reminding the kids of how tough this district is and that any team can beat you at any time. We only have to look a last year to see what can happen. At times the district race seemed like a roller coaster ride."

"When you look at

how we played tonight versus how we played last week it is like night and day. We just need to be ready to play every week."

Beau Avila served up first down tosses to Saul Elizalde for 12 yards and Ryan DeLeon for 10 more. A face mask penalty advanced the Mules to the Falcon 33.

Junior Baca took the hand off from Avila and raced through a huge hole the Mule offensive line had blown through the Falcon defense. He went untouched for 33 yards for the Mules first touchdown.

The Mule defense virtually kept the Falcon offense off the field by allowing them only four first downs, one TD and 113 total yards of offense.

The Mules had clipped the Falcons wings to the tune of 41-7 by the time

"We supplement the

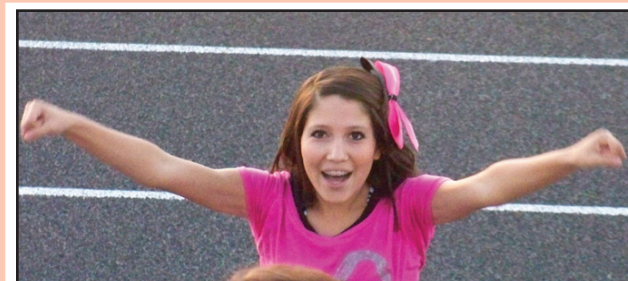
groceries they already have," Jay said, referring to the local food pantry's efforts to serve approximately 200 area families.

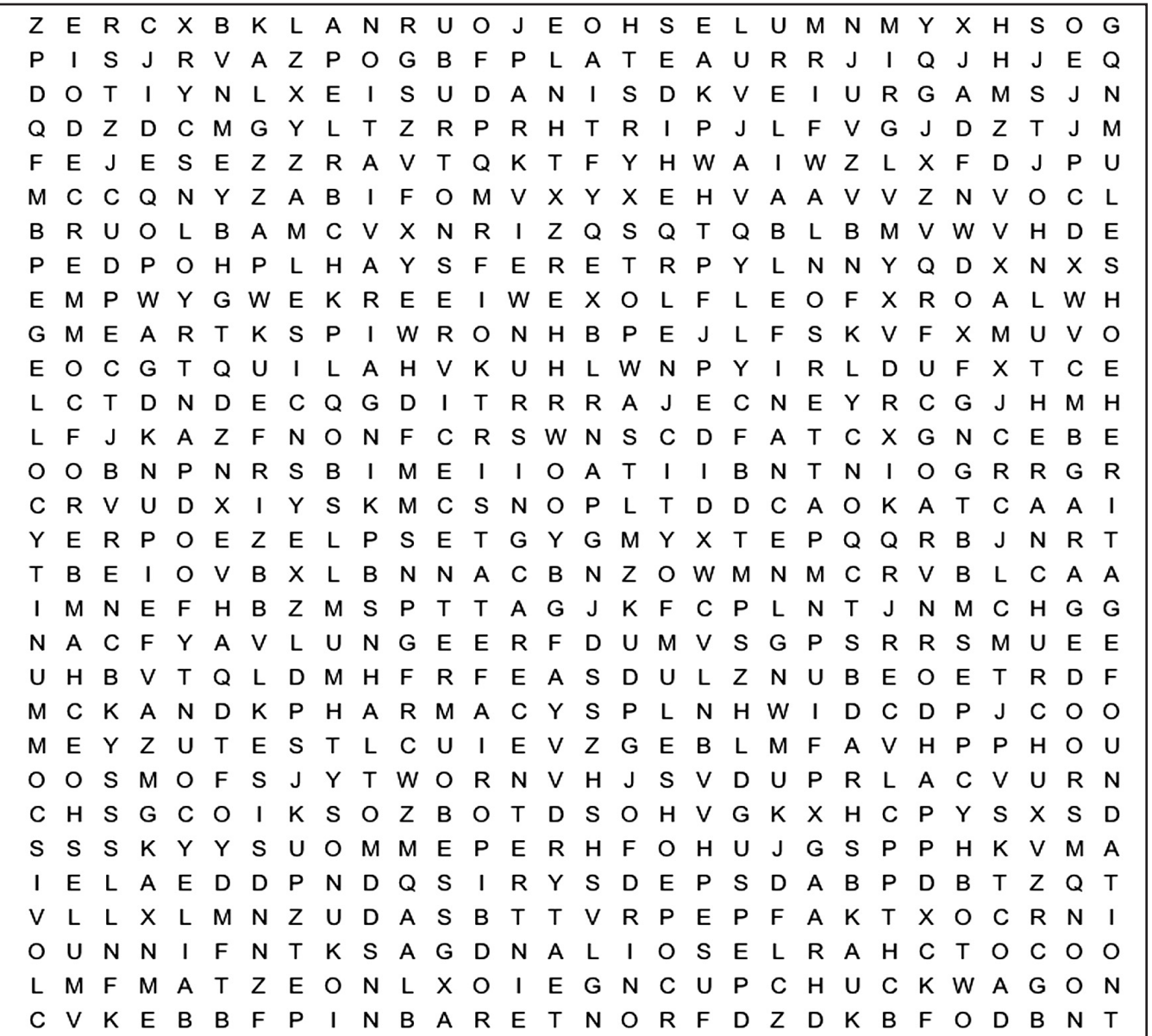

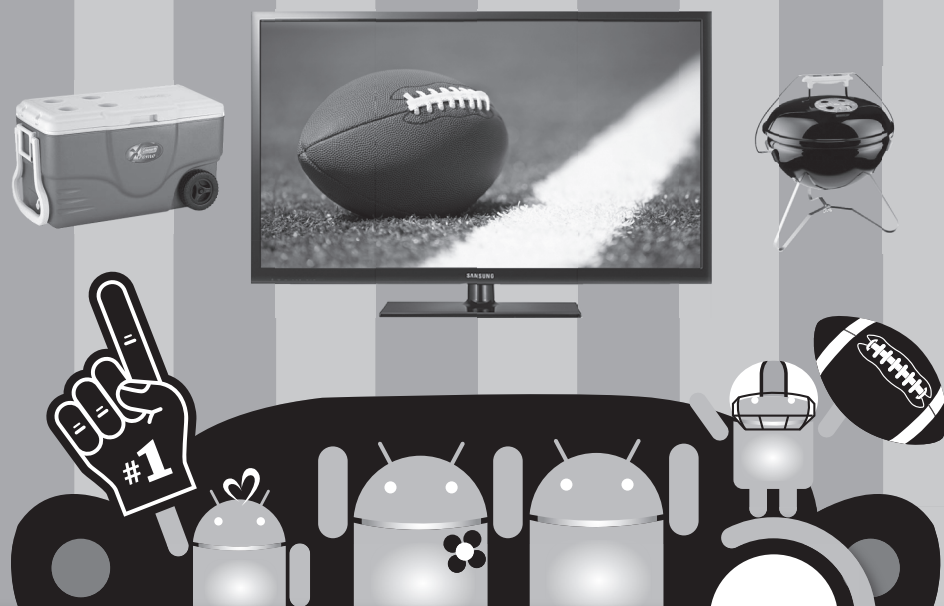

Continued from page 1 much of its supplies, doesn't have many of the items needed.

"Last year," she said, "it looked as if we were going to run out of food."

This need sparked what can only be described as an amazing locale effort that "Stuffed" Muleshoe Independent School District's large activity bus... twice.

More than 30,000 pounds of food was donated in last years efforts, according to Jay.

"We got there and loaded food for two hours with food that had already been purchased," she said.

Among the things she learned last year, Jay told the rotarians, was "think big... and don't be scared," and that "God will provide" through the community of Muleshoe.

"Everybody was so excited," she said about last year's effort, but a similar effort is needed this year.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

October is Breast Cancer Awareness month, an important reminder of one of the leading causes of death in women.

If caught early enough, breast cancer can be treated, but there is still no cure for this disease that will affect one in eight women every year.

Join the breast cancer fight and use these resources from USA.gov to help spread the word:

- Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths among women in the United States, preceded only by lung cancer. Breast self-exams and mammograms are very important to help find breast cancer early, when it is most treatable.

Mammograms are x-rays that help find tumors and tell the difference between healthy and cancerous tissue.

- It is important to be checked for breast and cervical cancer no matter what else is going on in your life.

If you are busy, or having financial problems, the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP), provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), provides free or low-cost breast and cervical cancer screening services to women in all 50 states, as well as some U.S. territories and Native American tribes.

You can also find a NBCCEDP screening provider near you.

- Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention and Treatment Programs (BCCPT) through Medicaid are available to eligible women diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer through the state NBCCEDP screening program.

You may be eligible even if you have a higher income.

B for border: A mole with edges that are blurry or jagged.

C for color: Changes in the color of a mole,

including darkening, spread of color, loss of color, or the appearance of multiple colors such as blue, red, white, pink, purple or gray.

D for diameter: A mole larger than 1/4 inch in diameter (about the size of a pencil eraser).

E for elevation: A mole that is raised above the skin and has an uneven surface.

the final horn sounded.

Bushland's running back, Gerald Reyna, moved the chains on the Falcons first play with a 19-yard gain.

The Mules smothered a screen play for just a two-yard pick up and swarmed Reyna on second down sweep for one yard. A pass left the Falcons one-yard short of a first on the Mule 36.

The Falcons stayed in the spread on fourth down and Avila blitzed from his linebacker spot and sacked the Falcon quarterback, Taylor Cornelius, for a three-yard loss and the Mules took over on downs.

A rare Mule miscue on the night gave the Falcons the ball back on the Bushland 24. An intentional grounding penalty cost the Falcons 10 yards and a down. Two incomplete passes forced a punt.

The two teams exchanged punts before the Mules got started on their 40 with 4:22 left in the opening period. A screen pass to DeLeon was good for 21 yards to the Bushland 38.

Saul Elizalde had to climb a ladder to pull down Avila's pass at the Falcon 29 and reached the 19 before being dragged down.

Avila started right, drew in the defense and then made the pitch to Issac Baca and he raced 18 yards down the Mule sideline to pay dirt. Elizalde's kick pushed the Mule lead to 14-0 with 1:21 left in the first period.

Early in the second period the Mules stalled out on the Falcon 36. Facing fourth and 18 needed for a first the Mules lined up in the spread as if they were going to go for the first down.

Instead Avila pooched a kick over the defense and Elizalde raced down field and slapped the ball away from the end zone and the ball was killed on the one-yard line.

Adelaido Godinez picked off a Falcon pass at the Mule 49. I. Baca took a pitch from Avila through a monster hole for 21 yards to the Falcon 30 and then he broke through the middle for 12 more yards.

Avila hit Caleb Wood on a flag patten from eight yards out for the Mules third TD. The Mules led 20-0 with 5:53 left in the half.

The Mules' second miscue of the night was a picked off Avila pass at the Mule 20. Three plays later the Falcons were in the Mule end zone for their only time of the night. A pass from Cornelius to Tanner Climer put the Falcon points on the board with 4:15 remaining in the half.

The Mules were not finished with the first half. The Mule defense forced Bushland to punt and the ball rolled dead on the Mule 30.

Avila connected with Elizalde for 13 yards and then scrambled for nine yards. Avila was hit late after throwing a pass and a flag was thrown. The Mules pulled out all the stops on first down at the Bushland 41.

Avila rolled left as if starting an option play but DeLeon took off from his wide receiver position and raced back toward Avila to take a pitch. DeLeon pulled up and fired a missile down field that sailed just out of the reach of the defense and fell into the hands of Elizalde waiting at the five.

Elizalde dragged his defender five yards to the end zone. He then booted the point after to extend the Mule lead to 27-7 at the intermission.

The Mules scored twice more in the second half.

It took the Mules 10 plays to march 50 yards. Avila found Godinez open over the middle with a 12-yard toss with 3:37 left in the third period. The Mules led 34-7.

Junior Triana jumped on the loose ball after a Falcon fumble at the Bushland 12. Caleb Wood was calling the signals for the Mules and connected on a toss over the middle to Elizalde. Juan Guerrero booted the point after to cap the night's scoring.

The Mules rolled up 432 yards of offense with

223 coming on the ground and 209 through the air. Beau Avila connected on 16 of 30 passes for 169 yards and tossed two TDs. He rushed 18 times for 69 yards.

Issac Baca carried 17 times for 114 yards and a touchdown. Junior Baca carried six times for 48 yards and one TD. Caleb Wood connected on two-of-three passes for three yards and a TD. He also caught three passes for 33 yards and a touchdown.

Ryan DeLeon tossed one TD strike for 41 yards and caught seven throws for 86 yards. Adelaido Godinez caught two passes for three yards and a score.

The Mule defense held the ground game of the Falcons to 25 yards on 14 tries. Bushland was 16 of 42 passing for 86 yards for a total offense of 108 yards.

Avila led the Mule defense with 12 tackles, four tackles for losses, two quarterback hurries and pulled down one interception.

Adelido Godinez was in on seven tackles, had an interception, broke up three passes and recorded a big hit. Matt Ambriz made four stops, had one quarterback hurry and a special teams tackle.

I. Baca made four tackles and Guerrero had three tackles, one stop for a loss and one quarterback hurry.

Shawn Atwood recorded two tackles, one tackle for a loss and one sack. Alex Vidana recovered a fumble.

The Mules will put their 2-0 district record on the line Friday night in Slaton when they attempt to cage the Tigers

Superintendent discusses school property taxes

Most of you will receive your property tax bills very soon, if you have not already received them. Most of you will see an increase in your taxes.

That won't surprise many people. But there are a couple of things that will surprise you. You may be surprised to learn that, other than our debt service taxes for our bond election, the school has not raised taxes since 2005; and this year, we are lowering our debt service tax rate.

The reason for the increased tax bills is that most appraised values went up this year. You may be "most" surprised to learn that Muleshoe ISD does not receive any increased revenue from your increase in property taxes.

That's right. When you pay more this year in school property taxes, the school does not see any of that increase! All

increased school taxes go to the State of Texas. Muleshoe ISD does not see any increase in revenue from the increase in your school taxes.

I know. It's hard to believe, but the State of Texas passed a law that says our revenue per student cannot be changed. Our property taxes can increase significantly, or even decrease, and we still get the same revenue to pay all of our expenses.

The state makes sure we have the same revenue, whether our property taxes go up or down.

That will be especially hard to take for farmers this year. Even with such a terrible year for farmers, most farmers will pay more in property taxes.

The property tax for

farmers is generally based on a five-year average, which does not count this past summer; and the average for the past five years was pretty good. So after one of the worst years in history (if not the worst), farmers may still pay more in taxes.

Most farmers will say, "At least the increase will go to help our school."

But it won't. The school will not realize any increase in revenue from the increase in school property taxes.

I know you think I am making this stuff up. But I'm not. Our revenue has been frozen since 2006; and this year, for the first time in modern history, our revenue was decreased by well over \$500,000.

Even more incredible about this crazy state funding scheme is that some schools were frozen at much higher revenues per student than other schools.

If Muleshoe ISD received the same

revenue as a wealthy school with the same number of students, we would have about \$6 million more in our budget every year to pay teachers and provide equipment and supplies for our students.

Students in Muleshoe deserve the same educational opportunities as students in wealthy schools.

How can Texas claim it wants a world-class public school system and then fund its schools at close to the lowest level of all states in the nation?

Texas must decide that public education is a priority that must be adequately and equitably funded to achieve a world-class education for its children.

Sudan defeats Tahoka in 'classic matchup' game

Both sides held their breath as the center snapped the ball.

With three seconds left on the game clock and inches from scoring the tying touchdown, everyone knew that this was it.

As one of the games to watch, the Sudan Hornets faced the Tahoka Bulldogs in a classic matchup between two winning teams this season. And, the hype matched the performance as the Bulldogs and Hornets battled it out to the absolute last seconds of the ballgame.

Tahoka started out with a quick score as Bulldog Quarterback Zach Garcia through a 66-yard touchdown pass play to Preston Hammonds with a 11:15 left on the first quarter clock. The PAT kick by Cristian Ramirez was good leaving the Bulldogs ahead 7-0.

Sudan would answer at the end of the first quarter with a pass from Osmar Diaz to Dayton Fisher to end a five-play, 69-yard drive. Cesar Medrano's PAT kick was no good leaving the Bulldogs ahead of the Hornets with a score of 6-7.

The Hornet defense became a wrecking machine as Sudan stopped Tahoka from scoring during the first half of play. Then Sudan would take advantage of the field positions and momentum to score three more times before halftime.

On the first touchdown of the second quarter, Hornet Bill Nolte received a hand off from Diaz and ran 34 yards for a Hornet touchdown. Diaz connected with Richard Montez for a 2-point conversion leaving the Hornets in the lead at 14-7.

On the second touchdown, Nolte scored one more time on a quick run. The Hornets had great field position after a defensive stop. The PAT was unsuccessful by Medrano leaving the Hornets up 20-7 with 5:49 left on the second quarter clock.

Before halftime, Sudan's Diaz ran it in the end zone on a two-yard touchdown run with one second left on the clock. Diaz attempted a PAT 2-point conversion pass to Montez but was unsuccessful. The Hornets went in to the locker room with a halftime lead of 26-7.

Tahoka came out blazing to start the second half of play. Tahoka's Isiah Vega scored on a 4-yard run with 4:28 left on the clock in the third quarter. The PAT was no good giving a score of 26-13.

Tahoka scored one more time in the third quarter when Trai Smith carried it in on a 14-yard run. Tahoka's Ramirez fumbled the ball on the PAT and was stopped. The score at the end of the third quarter was 26-19 with the Hornets barely hanging on to their first half lead.

Tahoka once again took advantage of great field position after some mistakes by the Hornets. Tahoka scored with 5:36 left on the clock on a Ke'Shawn Hood one-yard run. The PAT kick was good by Cristian Ramirez. The Bulldogs and Hornets were tied at 26.

Momentum had shifted to the Bulldogs. The Hornets did not score on an offensive drive the entire second half of play. The Hornets tried to drive down the field, but the Bulldogs' defense stopped them.

With 1:03 left to play in the game, the Hornets needed a huge play on defense to turn the Bulldog tide back.

Tahoka was positioned on the 48-yard line. Tahoka Quarterback Garcia needed yardage

to keep their drive alive. Garcia threw down the field to Isiah Vega, but Hornet Osmar Diaz found himself in a perfect position to intercept the ball. Diaz scrambled down the sideline, avoided defenders, and scored a 48-yard touchdown. Medrano's PAT kick was good. The Hornets regained the lead with the score of 33 to 26.

The Bulldogs did not sit quietly on the sidelines. They came out wanting to win the game. It was a fight to the finish.

Tahoka drove the ball down to the goal line. The ball was placed on the six-inch line with three seconds left in the game. The last down of the play came down to who wanted to win the most.

Tahoka handed the ball off and attempted to jump over the pile. But, Hornets' Dayton Fisher and Richard Montez hit the runner at the same time forcing the Tahoka runner back to the line of scrimmage. The defense secured the victory for Sudan. The final score was 33-26.

With the win, the Hornets are 5-1 going in to district play this week while Tahoka fell to 5-1.

"The defensive effort was incredible," Coach Gordon Martin said. "The boys played disciplined defense versus the options game and came up with some big turnovers to give us the edge to win the

game"

Sudan's Bill Nolte had another impressive game. Nolte had two touchdowns along with 10 carries for 66 yards. Nolte also had an interception for 39 yards and had two unassisted tackles and one assisted tackle.

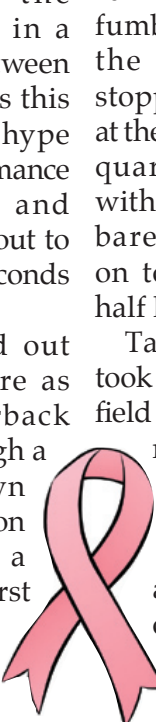
On receptions, Dayton Fisher came out with big numbers for the night. Fisher ended the night with three receptions

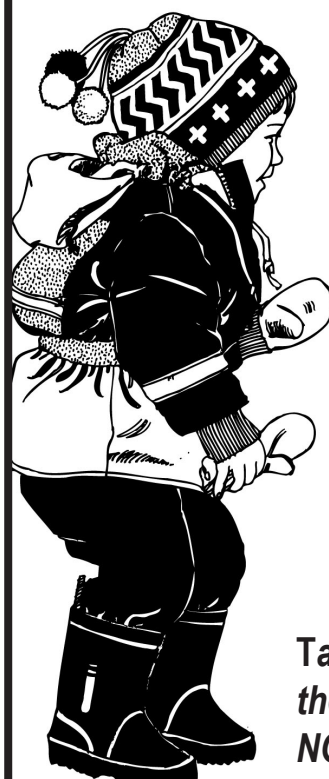

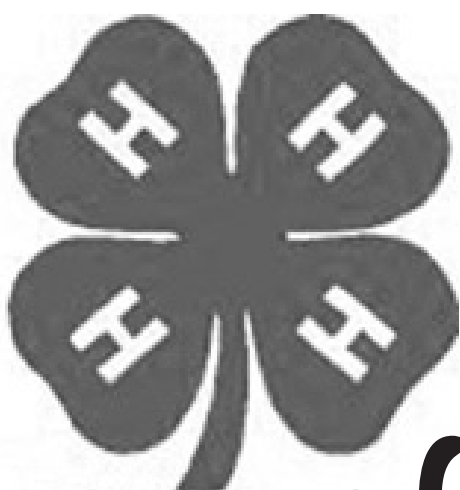

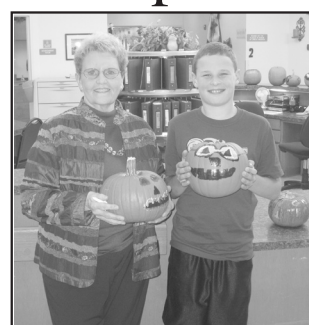

New clinical research studies underway for ovarian cancer

(NAPS) — Doctors around the globe are now recruiting women with recurrent ovarian cancer to participate in two new clinical research studies called Trinova-1 and Trinova-2.

Although there have been many treatment advances in recent years, up to 90 percent of women treated for advanced ovarian cancer will still experience a relapse of their disease.

“For women with recurrent ovarian cancer,

participation in a clinical research study may be an option to consider,” said Bradley Monk, M.D., a principal investigator for the Trinova-1 study at Catholic Healthcare West in Phoenix, Ariz.

“Women participating in these studies may receive an investigational drug which may help researchers find a new way to treat this disease,” he said.

In the United States, ovarian cancer is the fifth



leading cause of cancer-related deaths among women.

The purpose of the Trinova-1 and Trinova-2 studies are to find out whether adding the investigational drug AMG 386 to chemotherapy improves the length of time until the disease progresses compared to treatment with chemotherapy alone.

AMG 386, developed by Amgen, is an investigational new medicine known as an

angiogenesis inhibitor. Angiogenesis is the process the body uses to grow new blood vessels, which provide cells and organs with the nutrients and oxygen they need to thrive.

Cancer cells also require new blood vessels supplying oxygen and nutrients in order for tumors to grow.

Angiogenesis inhibitors are designed to stop the development of these vessels, starving the cancer and slowing or preventing tumor growth.

Participants in the study will receive treatment with either com.

chemotherapy plus AMG 386 or chemotherapy alone.

The studies are open to women 18 years of age or older who have been diagnosed with recurrent ovarian cancer and have been previously treated with chemotherapy for management of their disease.

Taking part in a clinical research study is voluntary and a personal decision that should be made after speaking with your doctor.

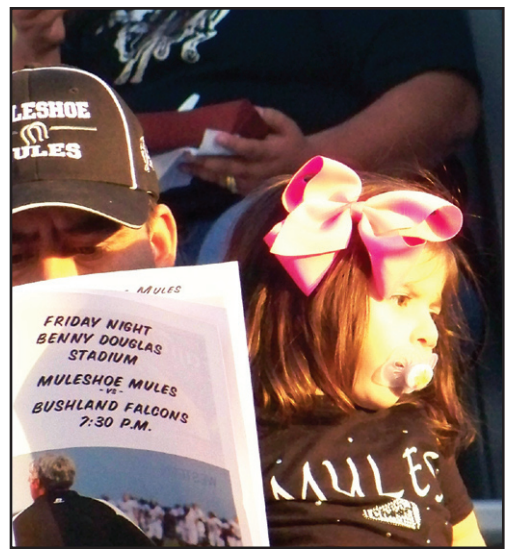
