



An eligible voter is defined in the Act as a "person who has the legal orequitable right as owner, tenant, share-cropper, or otherwise crop year. to produce cotton on any cotton farm, or part thereof, in the United States for the crop year 1935-36."

According to that, any person ligible who signed a 1934 and 1935 cotton acreage reduction contract as well as any person who is or wa ligible for tax exemption certificates in 1934. Any other person is comprehensive topographical and eligible who presents proof that he seological survey of western states owns and has a present right to produce cotton on a cotton farm, or being urged by Harold B. Shepard any person who signs and files a witnessed statement that he has planning board. made arrangements to produce cotton on a cotton farm in 1935 entering into a lease or share-croping agreement.

If ownership and the right to produce cotton on a cotton farm are eld jointly by two or more persons, all such persons are entitled to vote. the term "cotton farm" means any farm on which cotton has been produced commercially one or more ears since 1927. Individuals who are in doubt about their eligibility to ote can obtain information from the community committee which will have a list of eligible voters.
