

Currently, according to the county judge, about 55 individuals are on the Meals on Wheels program, costing an average of \$4,500 per month, not including the containers which are provided to the hospital's kitchen by the county program.

Of that expense, the program receives a \$1,300 per month subsidy from SPAG.
