'STRIKERS IN FOR FIGHT TO

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22(U.P. John L. Lewis today ordered his automobile strike lieutenants back to Detroit to intensify organization efforts after President Roosevelt indicated he would not intervene in the General Motors strike.

Lewis ordered a "fight to the finish" on the Detroit battle ground shortly after Mr. Roosevelt publicly rebuffed Lewis' request that the government aid the strikers by every "legal means."

The President's remark answered the barrage of charges and counter-charges by Lewis and General Motors spokesmen.






