

The United Press and Associated Press were emphatic in their statements that the known dead were 425, yet newspaper editors placed in their headlines as high as 500 and even 600 dead in the list. But Saturday morning they were all back to normal with the statement, "Dead-425, all bodies recover-

A newspaper owes an obligation to its readers. It should not make random, unsupported statements of facts. Of course it may make observation and hope for things, but if it expects its readers to place reliance on its statements it should keep faith with facts, otherwise, its public may become like the boy who shouted wolf when there was no wolf and when the wolf finally came, no assistance was forthcoming, because his helpers had lost faith in his ver-
