TOTAL OF BUS Pagan Land Provides Easter Lily; Quest for Ideal Flower Continues

CINCINNATI, Ohio, March 25. (U.R)-Easter, it seems, has no lily to call its own. Botanists explain that a number of varieties have been honored in the past as "Easter Lilie," and the most popular today originated in the Himalayas-where Christianity is one of the least accepted religions. Florists recall that the first lily generally accepted for

Easter use was the Madonna, which also was called the Lent and Annunciation lily. That, however, gave way to species more easily grown in hothouses.

After the Madonna came the Lillium Hanissii, imported from Bermuda, which reigned for years, only to be replaced by the L. Longiflorum which was exported by Japan in its use of flowers and bulbs as an important portion of its program of industrial expansion.

Before today's favorite, Lilium Giganteum, was imported from Asia, and other Asiatic varieties have held Christiandom's fancy for brief periods. They included Multiforum, Formosum, from Formosa Island; Erabu and Vaughanii.

Florists believe it will not be long, in this country, at least, before the swing is to another variety of the bloom for Easter. Lilium Giganteum does not do well in most sections, although in England it often reaches the height of 10 feet .
