Sun Spots Mean Warmer Summer, Says Astronomer SAN DIEGO, Cal. (U.R) __ Sun

spots indicate that the north-ern hemisphere will experience warmer than average weather this summer and a wet winter, according to Dr. Clifford E Smith, professor of astromony at San Diego State College.

"Sun spots come and go in cycles," Dr. Smith said. "Every 11 years they reach a maximum. number, and during that time the sun is much warmer. The spots do not cause the warmth, but there is a correlation.

"When the spots reach maximum number, our summers are warmer, more water evaporates and a heavier rainfall is experienced the following winter The present cycle of sun spots will reach a maximum early in

Dr. Smith described sun spots as great whirling masses of charged particles, some of them more than 60,000 miles in diameter. He said they are not at-tached to the sun but drift across

He places the blame on anyone who attempts to frustrate his will in thee matter.

English whose sway over the sea was unquestioned. And this bold statesman may be right. We think he is right. While England halts and ponders Mussolini will = proceed to send soldiers to Spain just as he did in Ethiopia. He defied the world to stop him and the world trembled and took the dare.

And the serious thing is that once the war starts, all the world will be drawn in-even Uncle Samuel, despite our good intentions to stay out. No man or country lives alone.

But out of all the bloodshed and suffering will arise a freer people. It is a fearful price to pay but it seems no other nation save America is able to settle its troubles by sit-down strikes and conferences. Others must fight. A big victory for education of the masses.

But here in Cisco we are peaceful and watch development of matters of direct interest to ourselves. We are concerned about the Bearman townsite oil test in South Cisco and a few watch the shallow oil test west of Cisco which is just spudding.
