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What's News Today!

The supreme court is expected to rule on the Wagner Labor Act today. This has to do with the sit-down labor move and will have a major effect in the court fight now going on regarding the retirement of judges at the age of 70 years.

Interlocking issues of the sit-down strike, the constitutionality of the Wagner Labor Relations Act, and the Roosevelt court reorganization will command Sunday to provide Washington with a week-end of important tension.

Today the senate will resume a growing bitter debate on the question of especially condemning the sit-down strike as illegal.

At noon the supreme court will meet and may announce its judgment on the validity of the Wagner act, a statute intended to promote collective bargaining and thereby prevent labor disturbances.

The court's decision on the administration's law is expected to have a profound effect upon the fight over President Roosevelt's bill to increase the membership of the court to a maximum of 15 unless income justices more than 70 years of age retire.

Many hours of a "savage debate," were predicted by the senate leaders before a vote can be reached on the sit-down issue. There was little doubt, they said, that ultimately the senate would adopt a fortnight declaration against this form of strike.

Diplomats said Sunday they had received reports that an Italian general named Bergozzoli had killed himself at Salamanka after receipt of a letter condemning him for the defeat of Italian troops on the Guadalajara front.

These reports said the home government had ordered several Italian officers held responsible for the Guadalajara retreat to be shot. Gen. Francisco Franco, the insurgent Spanish leader, however, refused to comply with Rome's demand for such action. Bergozzoli killed himself soon thereafter.

Texas may be the only state in the sit-down excitement in the oil fraternity since Governor Alfred has declared that Texas will not tolerate such actions in his borders. John L. Lewis is said to be using all available powers to organize his forces in Texas with Houston as a nucleus of operations. The American Federation of Labor is resisting the Lewis efforts in Texas.

So far Texas has had little personal contact with the striker in any form, being a non-manufacturing state but with the rise of oil manufacturing interests, she becomes of vast importance in this industry. Texans may soon be able to view the sit-down in action if Lewis and his confederates have the success here that they seem to have had in the north and east.

As coronation exercises approach and the event of the marriage of Duke of Windsor and Mrs. Wallis Simpson, is heralded, the front pages of newspapers all over the world will be occupied in a large measure for these stories. So many people are cleaning up their premises this week and some have been wanting a good white wash for their trees, we give formula for one that is said to last for five years. It will last when placed on out buildings and barns as well as on tile or plastered structures. Here it is:

- 50 pounds common lime
- 10 pounds salt
- 2 pounds alum
- 1 bar laundry soap
- 10 gallons water

To make whitewash, chip the soap into small thin pieces and dissolve in about two quarts of hot water, then make up the mixture to ten gallons with either warm or cold

water. Next add the lime, salt, and alum, and stir until the salt and alum are dissolved. Allow this mixture to stand in a wooden barrel or tub for 25 to 36 hours before using it. Then add enough water to make a thin creamy mixture and apply with a whitewash brush or spray pump. This mixture may be used on wood, brick, or plastered walls, just as any other whitewash is used.

The secret of success with this whitewash is to allow it to stand at least 24 hours before using. If handled in this way it gives a white glossy surface which sticks well and will endure a long time.

treat the seed, fertilize, dust for the Cotton Flea Hopper and Boll weevil. This cost is not to exceed \$5.60 per acre or \$16.80 for the three-acre demonstration. The 4-H club boy will give the sponsor a note for the net amount and then after the crop is harvested the boy will pay off the note to the sponsor.

We will try to get machinery to dust your cotton for these two insects mentioned above. No doubt there will be more boys interested in this cotton demonstration than we can get sponsors for. For this reason, even though you are interested it might be that we could not find a sponsor for you. If your dad would like to sponsor you, we would be glad for him to do so.

**East Texas Fiddlers To Appear at Athens**

Plans to entertain 20,000 persons in Athens on Friday, May 28, on the occasion of the Sixth Annual East Texas Fiddlers contest and Reunion have been made by the East Texas Fiddlers association. A program which calls for a number of added attractions including a full day's program of fiddle music, a display of Texas-made products in the show windows around the entire public square, a gigantic oldtime square dance and other features have been mapped by the directors of the association.
