Dear Club Member:

With our present average yield of cotton for Eastland county only 86 pounds per acre and a very short morning starting at 9 staple on the average, I believe that you 4-H club boys could carry on cotton demonstrations that would be of value to your community and to Eastland county.

We have worked out a plan whereby a sponsor will be given tto a 4-H club boy to loan him money or a three-acre cotton demonstra-The sponsor will loan the 4-H club boy money to buy good seed, treat the seed, fertilize, dust for the otton Flea Hopper and Boll weevil. This cost is not to exceed \$5.60 per acre or \$16.80 for the three-acre emonstration. The 4-H club boy will give the sponsor a note for the net amount and then after the erop is harvested the boy will pay off the note to the sponsor.

We will try to get machinery to ust your cotton for these two inects mentioned above.
