



## TEXAS TECH BAND TO PLAY IN CISCO APRIL 13



LUBBOCK, April 10-Sixty members of the Texas Tech band and director D. O. Wiley will leave Lubbock Monday morning for a West Texas tour that will take them to Cisco for a concert April 13 at 7:45

The tour is an annual spring activity of the band and is the third of its kind since Wiley came to Texas Tech in the fall of 1934. In 1935 it played concerts in North Plains towns, last year it went south from Lubbock into the Permian basin section, and this year it moves into

the eastern portions of West Texas Reportoire of the band, most versatile of its kind in the state, includes 1937 high school band contest numbers, to be played in each city on the itenerary upon the request of local band officials

"In this way, we are bringing the band clinic idea right into each ity we visit," Wiley said.

Besides the contest numbers, the Tech musicians are carrying a library of concert pieces and noveltie that have scored hits from the South Plains to the West Coast in the past three years. The tour will see the band in its first appearance in new scarlet and black whipcord uniforms purchased in March.

Lovers of symphonic music and light music fans alike will find music they like when the Texas Tech band plays a concert in Cisco April 13 at 7:45 p. m.

Military airs and marches are no foreign to the 60 college boys on their annual spring concert tour and their reportoire includes 1937 high school band contest numbers. Last fall the musical aggrega-

tion, accompanying the Texas Tech Red Raiders to Los Angeles for the Loyola game, played for parades at the game in the Coliseum, and in formal concert in two high schools in the city. It was the band's third trip to the West Coast with the football team, and "rave" notices appeared in the Los Angeles Times and other Southland papers after each appearance.




