Legislator Kills Houston Engineer Today

QUINN MAKES BOND, ASSERTS WAS ATTACKED

AUSTIN, May 14 (U.P.)—Representative B. E. Quinn of Beaumont, member of the Texas legislature, shot and killed Herman Hicks, 41 Houston civil engineer in a downtown hotel early today.

Quinn was charged with murder and released under \$1,000 bond after making a statement to police. He said the shooting followed a scuffle in his hotel room when two men whom he did not know attacked him because of complaints he had made to the hotel clerk.

Hicks' companion, John Sterrett, Oklahoma City oil operator, denied to newsmen that they attacked Quinn.

"He came to his door waving a pistol after I had knocked a couple of times," Sterrett said. "Hicks was leaning against the wall in the hall, eating a sandwich. He didn't say anything at all, and all of a sudden the gun went off and Hicks was dying."

Quinn said a group of men had been roistering in a hotel room down the hall and he complained twice to the management. At 4:30 a. m. he said the two men knocked on the door of his room shortly after he had telephoned the hotel desk the last time.

"When I opened the door slightly and asked who it was," Quinn related, "they pushed open the door and attacked me. I was in my night clothes and barefooted, but I managed to shove them into the hall."

Quinn said he seized a small pistol and as the men rushed back into the room and began beating him he swung with the weapon. It was discharged, he insisted.

A bullet pierced Hicks' neck and he died within a few minutes. Quinn dressed quickly and surrendered to officers.

Hotel officials said neither Hicks nor his companions was registered, and apparently were visitors at the room of another hotel guest.

Malady Turning Man to Stone



Holding up hands and arms which have gradually hardened and grown almost useless in the last two years, Luther Barrett, 42, Chattanooga "stone man," is pictured above. DUKE, FAMILY DEADLOCK IS ROYAL VICTORY

LONDON, May 14 (U.P.)—Sources close to the British court reported today that the deadlock between the royal family and the government over attendance of royalty at the wedding of the Duke of Windsor to Mrs. Wallis Warfield, apparently has ended in a compromise tantamount to victory for the royal family.

There was no confirmation of the report, but it was said that the duke and duchess of Kent will depart shortly "for Europe" to visit Princess Paul of Yugoslavia, sister of the duchess, but would stop off for the wedding.

As a concession to the government, it was added, the Duke of Kent, youngest brother of Windsor, might not be best man.

CHILDREN "ADOPT" SHIPS LONDON (U.P.)—More than 400 schools in Great Britain have each adopted a ship. This new and absorbing interest in the lives of British school children is the result of the activities of the newly-formed British School Adoption Society.

BRITISH SHIP THOUGHT HIT BY SUBMARINE

VALENCIA, Spain, May 14 (U.P.)—British and Spanish loyalist authorities opened an investigation today of a mysterious explosion which crippled the British destroyer, Hunter, killed perhaps 8 of its crew, and wounded 20.

First reports were that the destroyer, steaming off Almeria on patrol duty, struck a mine. Unofficially loyalist sources believe the ship was struck by a torpedo, fired by a German submarine. It was denied that there were any mines in the Almeria area.

The official news agency quoting "rumors" that the Hunter was either mined or torpedoed by a German submarine commented "the latter appears authoritative."

Olden High School Class 'B' Champs

A clipping from Denton has this to say regarding Olden's high school athletes:

Olden high school's athletes of Eastland county, defending champions, retained their laurels Saturday afternoon at North Texas State Teachers College field as they carried off the State Class B track and field meet championship, in the seventh annual Interscholastic League carnival. Some 350 athletes from State Class B competed in this seventh annual meet.

Anderson, a rangy dash and hurdle ace, paced the West Texas squad to its victory, compiling 18 of Olden's 21 points. He accounted for one of the three new State Class B records set in the meet as he cleared the low hurdles in 25.2 seconds, three-tenths seconds under his own record. He was first in the 220-yard dash, second in the high hurdles, second in pole vault and third in broad jump.

TONY MOORE SPIRITED AWAY FROM MAN MOB

WACO, May 14 (U.P.)—Tony Moore, 26, negro porter who admitted the slaying of Frank Bradfute, mid-dieged Thornton merchant, was taken from jail here today by officers for removal to a city more distant from Thornton.

Officers were believed en route to Austin with Moore. A mob of 50 men searched the Groesbeck jail for him earlier today.

NEGRO MADE COMPLETE CONFESSION MEXIA, Texas, May 14 (U.P.)—Tony Moore, negro porter, was charged with murder in connection with the slaying of Frank Bradfute, 52, storekeeper, and the wounding of Mrs. Bradfute at Thornton Monday.

Sheriff Luther Fimmons arrested Moore Tuesday night.

Ray Lewis, County attorney, said the negro had made a "complete confession." He said Moore told him he entered the Bradfute home to obtain money.

THREE STATES ARE SEEKING TRIPLE SLAYER

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., May 14 (U.P.)—Lester Brockelhurst, self-identified triple slayer was held in county jail on a pistol possession charge today, while three states sought him for murder.

The 23-year-old former Sunday school teacher, and his 18-year-old companion, Bernice Felton, were arrested by State Trooper Joseph Hunt on a "hunch." Absence of a license plate drew the trooper's attention to the car in which the couple was riding. When he ordered them to stop the girl attempted to throw out a revolver.

Brockelhurst, according to police, confessed slaying Albin Theander, of Stillman Valley, Ill., on March 31; Jack Griffith of Fort Worth, Texas, April 28, and Victor Gates of Little Rock, Ark., May 6.

Arkansas authorities arraigned a warrant for the arrest of Brockelhurst. An Illinois official was sent by plane to hold the youth for his statement. Texas authorities also sought him.

Assistant District Attorney Eli Gellert arraigned Brockelhurst before a justice at Dover Plains at 2 a. m. charging him with possession of a revolver without a permit. The girl, who said she was going to have a baby, was held on the same charges.

JACKSBORO MAN KIDNAPED NEAR MINERAL WELLS

TYLER, MAY 14 (U.P.)—Fred Wallace of Jacksboro reported to Tyler officers today that he was kidnaped near Mineral Wells today by two armed men, robbed of \$10 and released near Kilgore near 4:30 a. m. Wallace, a son-in-law of Sam Bean, former Smith County Deputy sheriff rode to Tyler to report the abduction.

He said he drove up to a night club at 1 a. m. and two men pointed a pistol at him. They got out near Kilgore and told him to drive toward Tyler.

The house resolution for adjournment will be ineffective unless accepted today by the senate.

General belief was that the senate would concur.

MOSCOW (U.P.)—In the first quarter of this year 32,632 births were registered in Moscow, against 18,246 for the same period last year. The number of divorces dropped by 61 per cent.

BEATS RECORD BRINGS VIEWS CORONATION

QUINCY, Mass., May 14 (U.P.)—Henry (Dick) Merrill landed his monoplane at the Squantum naval reserve air base at 2:40 p. m. Eastern daylight time (12:40 p. m. CST) today.

Merrill accompanied by his copilot John Lambie of Birmingham, Michigan, brought back pictures of the coronation from England for American newspapers. He and Lambie flew to England last week in 21 hours and 30 minutes.

At 12:40 p. m. the fliers had been in the air 22 hours and 27 minutes, beating the time of the only other flight of comparable distance from England to the United States by 16 hours and 24 minutes.

Merrill said he had followed an airbeam south of Boston, but was unable to pierce the thick fog and turned back. The airbase here was the first land sighted since he left England, Merrill said.



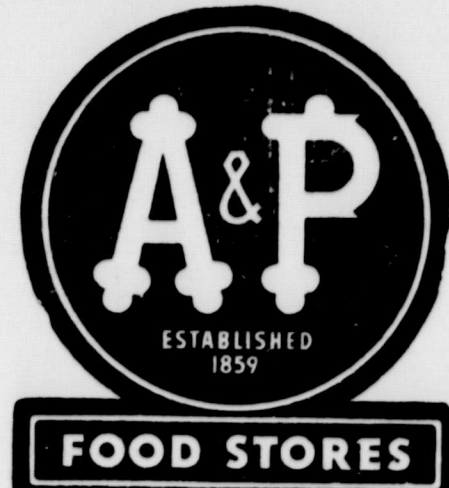

SPEED DRIVERS TO RACE DOWN HUDSON MAY 16

ALBANY, N. Y., May 14 (AP)—A record field of 130 outboard motorboats, representing the nation's speediest craft, will face the starter's gun in the 10th annual Albany-to-New York regatta on the Hudson River.

The Middle Atlantic Outboard Association, sponsoring the event, said entries from all parts of the county had been received and some of the outstanding drivers would compete in the 130-mile marathon.

Albany's yacht club, start of the race was bustling with activity in preparation for the race. Motors were being tuned up. Trial spins were made and last minute inspections completed.

Course Covers 130 Miles
The 130 miles of winding river to New York City is said to be the most dangerous and treacherous course in the world. The small craft, with an average speed approximating 40 miles an hour, have been zig-zagging in and about the yacht club pier the past few days.

Fewer than half of the 130 starters are expected to cross the finish line at De George's boat house at the foot of Dyckman Street, in New York City. Occasionally a driver is left stranded at the starting line because his engine failed to respond. Those fortunate enough to overcome this hazard may strike floating objects when only a short distance out of Albany and have to be "rescued" on the Hudson. Other unforeseen accidents usually cut the number to less than half at the finish.

Four Classes of Boats
According to the schedule of handicaps, announced by Commodore J. S. Y. Tyson, of Philadelphia, member of the race committee, the boats, comprising both outboard and inboard motors, have been divided into four classes—A, B, C, and D. Under race rules, the smaller outboard boats are allowed a time handicap at the start—that is, they may be several miles down the river before the larger, speedier craft are permitted to start. Time schedules are so regulated that, should all the boats finish, they would cross the line simultaneously.

They are flagged at the starting line according to their respective class, head downstream, with the Hearst Gold Trophy as an added inspiration for speed.

Thousands of spectators turn out for the race, lining the Hudson at vantage points along the route. Others attempt to follow in private motor launches.

One of the early entrants was Clayton Bishop, of Onset, Mass., last year's winner.
