Commissioned To Draft Noise Law

FORT WORTH (UP)—W. H. Gilmartin, assistant city attorney for Fort Worth, has been commissioned to draft some kind of ordinance that will quiet excess noise.

Barking radios, barking dogs, and crowing roosters were to be included in the ban. Radios at beer taverns situated in residential districts have caused most complaints, Gilmartin said.

The attorney indicated that the ordinance he offers will attempt to be some criminal legislation for enforcement by the police department. Texas courts have ruled that certain types of noises are "nuisances" and properly may be prohibited by law.

E. E. Marburger, President of the Mission Chamber of Commerce states that quite a number of school teachers are interested in the motor tour to Mexico City. On the road from Mexico City to Puebla an excellent view of Popocatepetl, an extinct volcano, is offered the tourist. Puebla is 83 miles from Mexico City.

The party also goes to Toluca forty miles from Mexico City for market day. Wares are spread out on the side walks. Indians bring in their fruit, carved wood work, hand made baskets, laces, moccasins, blankets and other articles of hand work. On this day the party goes through an old monastery 300 years old with catacombs, a beautiful garden and other things of interest.

Another side trip taken by the party is to Cuernavaca where the party visits Cortez's Palace, viewing the murals of Diego Rivera, dining on the veranda of Maximilian's Palace, strolling through the famous Borda Gardens and seeing the summer home of former Ambassador Morrow, where Charles Lindbergh first met Anne Morrow.

The party goes from Cuernavaca to Xochimilco of the Floating Gardens. Here they will all embark in crude gondolas for a ride through the canals. Native musicians in another craft floating along serenade the party. Beautiful flowers are given each member of the party. The remaining of the side trips is made to the Pyramids that were constructed two to four thousand years ago. In the city the party visits an old monastery where nineteen mummies are on exhibition. The Cathedral of Mexico, Chapultepec Castle, Oregon's Memorial, The National Museum, National Palace, National Fawn Shop, beautiful residence section of the city, and what ever points of interest in the city that time permits. Party leaves Mexico City for the United States on the morning of June 9th.
