

Things One Remembers

There are many simple things that could be done to reduce automobile accidents.

Recently, I saw a small trailer with lumber in it tear loose from the pleasure car that was towing it. It dashed out into the oncoming traffic, then slued around and ran into the bank on the side of the road where it broke loose. It missed oncoming cars by a split second, and came just as near causing a wreck with the car that was following

The trailer had been fastened to the pleasure car bumper (which was never made to haul a trailer) with an insecure bolt that simply joited out. It was only a miracle that it did not cause serious or fatal accidents. The owner of the trailer refastened it to the bumper with some baling wire and started out again.

What excuse is there for laws or regulations governing automobiles, that permit such potential death-dealing contraptions on the highway? A traffic officer would immediately stop a driver without a license plate. Why should not laws be passed whereby a traffic officer would stop every car towing a trailer that did not have some form of identification attached showing that it complied with rigid regulations as to its safety, and arrest the driver?

This is merely one potential law to aid in automobile accident prevention, that could be as easily enforced as automobile licensing requirements.


