



There is one thing that more doctors should firmly impress on young parents. This is that as soon as an infant old enough and strong enough to creep he must be protected from various dangers. A sturdy, lively baby that can get about on the floor should not be left alone in a baby carriage or high chair or lying on a table. Sure as shooting, he'll fall off sooner or later and sometimes such falls result in death or at least physical injuries. Also, a healthy, normal or prune. A tragic incident in New York recently was the drowning of a creeping infant in a bowl of steaming soup. The mother had placed on the floor a crockery bowl about one foot in diameter and six inches deep. It was filled with hot soup which she wanted to cool. She left the room for a brief errand, but in that few minutes the creeping baby got to the bowl and fell in. It was dead before the mother got back to the room. Year after year there are tragic stories of infants scalded to death or drowned in just such unforeseen but inexcusable accidents. There is no need to go in a continual panic. Babies seem to have charmed lives or true guardian angels most of the time. They survive many tumbles and misadventures. But there are certain precautions which should never, under any circumstances be neglected if the baby is to be protected from the occasional strange accident.


