KEEP COOL! With These Summer Dessert Secrets



WHEN it's ninety in the shade right after breakfast, the very thought of planning dessert for dinner makes you shudder. But you can laugh at scaring temperatures if you plan the week's dessert ahead of time. Make up a chocolate sundae sauce on baking paper and store it in your refrigerator until wanted, either for ice cream, cottage pudding, or for a simple milk pudding. And with a surplus supply of cookies to round off a fresh fruit dessert, you've no longer any emergency to meet.

Chocolate Sundae Sauce
1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
1/2 cup shredded coconut
Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Add salt and vanilla. Fold in chocolate, then coconut. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased heavy paper. Bake in slow oven (325° F.) 20 minutes, or until done. Cool 5 minutes before removing from paper. Makes 2 dozen 1 1/2 inch macaroons.

Coconut Macaroons
5 tablespoons granulated sugar
1 tablespoon flour
2 egg whites
1/2 teaspoon vanilla or almond extract
1 cup shredded coconut
Sift together sugars and flour. Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; then add sugar mixture, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Fold in flavoring and coconut. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased heavy paper. Bake in slow oven (325° F.) 20 to 25 minutes, or until delicately browned. Makes 18 macaroons.

BOOM GOES ON IN WORLD SALE OF SCRAP IRON

NEW ORLEANS, July 2 (AP)—Between 5,000 and 10,000 tons of scrap iron are being shipped from this port every week, according to estimates. The metal goes to Italy, Japan, Poland, Belgium, England, Germany and Mexico.

Huge piles of scrap iron, copper, brass, aluminum and tin cans can be seen here one day, but they are gone the next. Relatively high prices are being paid by foreign nations and the junk business has brought boom times to thousands.

Today great combines and syndicates have been organized to handle the nation's cast-off metals. These combines work through the parent company down to the rag-a-muffins of the alleys who wander through the back streets picking up iron, cans, brass and copper to sell for a few nickels to the local agent. The agent in turn sells it to a trucker. The trucker hauls it to the company dump and again sells it for a good profit.

Goes for Armament
The "junkers" know, and admit, that a great part of the metal they sell is going to be used in the manufacture of munitions—which some time might be used against this country. But, they say, they must make a living.

Iron is bringing around 9 1/2 cents a pound in New Orleans. Brass and copper bring as much as 14 cents. Aluminum sells for about the same.

Scrap iron collected from as far north and west as central Oklahoma, and as far east as Mobile, Miss., eventually reaches the docks here.

Freight agents are glad to get cargoes of scrap for their vessels. The rate is high—as much as \$11 a ton, and a ton of iron takes far less space than a ton of cotton which pays about the same rate.

So great has been the demand for tin in Italy that one enterprising dealer sold a load of dismantled taxi-cab doors to the Italian government. The doors were loaded into an Italian freighter without having the wood upholstery or broken glass removed.

best price. Before being loaded aboard a freighter the metal must be conditioned. Conditioning consists of cutting the metal into pieces not more than five feet long, 18 inches wide and 1 1/2 inches thick. Steel rails, ship plates, railroad wheels and parts, form the most lucrative items of the trade, but iron bolts, discarded nails, pipes, radiators, all go into making up a full cargo for a freighter.

Particularly pleased are ship agents when they can carry a full cargo of scrap. One voyage out of New Orleans to Japan paid \$80,000 in freight rates. Such cargoes are loaded by the shipper, with freightage paid by the consignee. The consignee also unloads the cargo.

Rising foreign prices have made it possible for the "junkier" to salvage many iron objects formerly not considered worth the effort. One dealer bought an old war-time iron ship, weighing about 100 tons. The vessel had never been completed, had been towed into the Rigolets below New Orleans and used as quarters for a bridge crew. Later the dismantled ship burned. He realized a profit of about \$800 on the ship. He purchased it cheap, cut it up, hauled it to the dump and sold it as No. 1 iron.

Tin Can Compressed
Tin cans are being hauled from municipal trash heaps and smashed by a giant compressor into compact suit-case-size parcels for cargo. The tin brings a high price in foreign nations.

A compressor for such work costs about \$35,000 and must have a tremendous market to enable the operator to show a profit for its operation.

Foreign markets are paying as high as \$17.50 a ton for New Orleans iron and steel. Prices for copper and brass are based on the need of the nation buying the material. Fabulous tales have been told of prices obtained for a cargo of brass for use in the manufacture of cartridge cases.

GERMAN FLEET LIKELY TO GET DREADNAUGHTS

SAN DIEGO, July 2 (AP)—Germany may soon will abandon its famous "vest-pocket" battleships, according to a high naval officer.

Instead of the 10,000-ton craft, which many experts once thought would revolutionize naval construction he would ever, the Reich, in the near future will re-enter the world naval armament race by the construction of full-sized battleships.

Rear Admiral Robert Wittcoff-Emden, naval attaché to the German embassy in Washington, made that statement while inspecting the U. S. Navy bases at San Diego.

Wittcoff-Emden believes the practice of building the smaller-sized men-o-war soon will be forgotten. He explained that Germany undertook the construction of such ships only because it was forced to such

action by the Treaty of Versailles. Forged by Necessity: The Versailles Treaty placed a limit on the size of German warships and we found it necessary to build greater strength and speed into our 10,000-ton cruisers, which have been termed vest-pocket battleships," Wittcoff-Emden said.

It was the Deutschland, one of the Reich's vest-pocket fighters, which was bombed by Spanish Loyalist planes while on patrol a few weeks ago, resulting in the shelling of Almeria by the German ships as an act of reprisal.

Continuing his discussion of the vest-pocket type battleships, Wittcoff-Emden explained the ships do not provide enough "elbow room" for absolutely satisfactory operation, despite the stories of their great efficiency, and concentrated power.

Cites British Agreement
"Since our naval agreement with Great Britain last year we are allowed to construct ships with more elbow room, so we are going in for the full-sized battleships again," the admiral said.

Wittcoff-Emden refused to discuss the size of the details of the full-sized battleships he said his nation would construct.

It is believed, in naval circles here, however, the Reich soon will construct battleships of the 35,000-ton class such as are to be built by the United States.

The German naval expert also refused to comment on the U. S. government's efforts to limit the size of guns on the capital ships of the world powers to 14 inches.

FAMILY UNITED AFTER 30 YEARS

CLEVELAND, July 2 (AP)—Jay M. Miller, of Monterey Park, Cal., returned after three lonely decades to Cleveland hoping there was some person left whom he knew at one time, that would help him find his daughter.

It was a despairing thought that out of 1,250,000 people living in

greater Cleveland, he was looking for a blonde woman with the "biggest smile you ever saw," and to add to Miller's disadvantage he hadn't seen his daughter in 30 years.

New 60, Miller had left his family some 30 years ago. His daughter was 10 then. "I was just a young fellow with ideas of my own when I left the little girl, and her mother. I'm sorry I left," Miller said.

He went from door to door along the street where the family had lived, inquiring hopefully as to whereabouts of the daughter and her mother. There were no familiar faces or names. Homes had been torn down over the years. No one could help the old man.

Miller finally appealed to a Cleveland newspaper to aid in his difficult search. "I'm getting old," he said sadly, "and I wanted to see her. He was almost ready to give up when Mrs. Stanley J. Newman saw a picture in a newspaper and recognized it as that of her first husband.

They were beginning to give up hope of finding him, when Miller arrived at Mrs. Newman's home. He had been visiting friends in Tiffin, O., and the mother and daughter just missed meeting him. The excited Mrs. Newman called her daughter and the family was united once again.

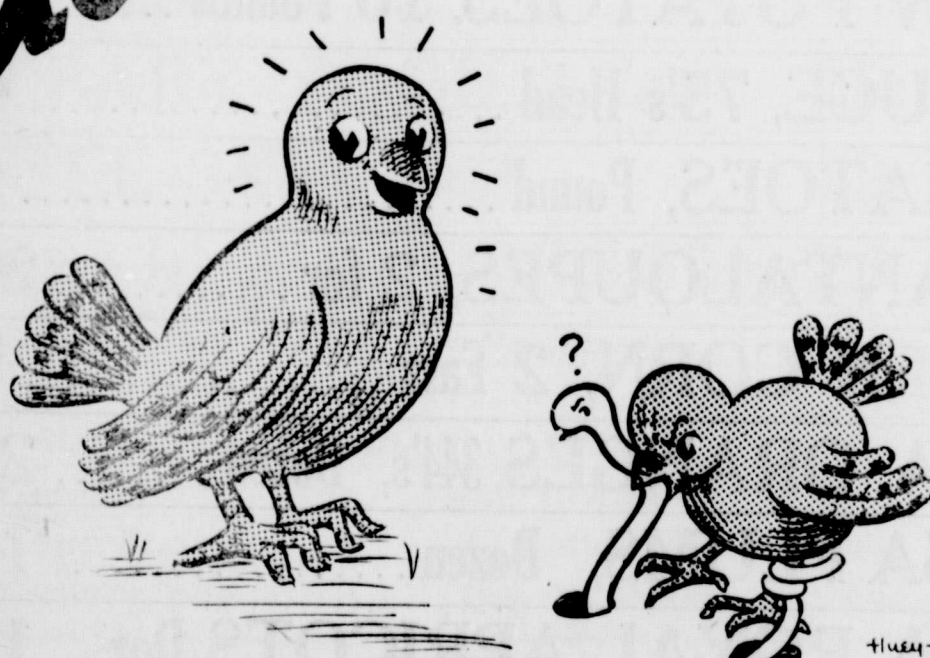

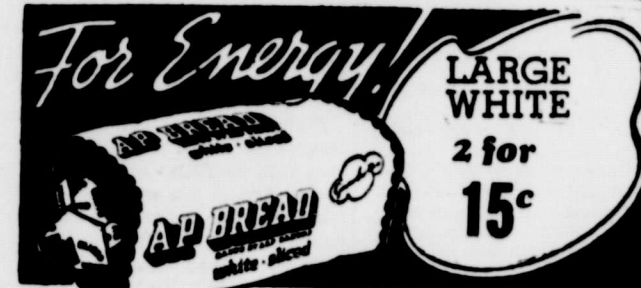

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — "Wingless airplanes" have been predicted for future U. S. Army aviation by Lieut. H. F. Gregory, air corps officer in charge of autogyro tests. Gregory visualized future army planes without wings and capable of flying as slow as 16 miles an hour. Gregory also said that "wingless" ships would be able to take off and land within a space of 100 yards or less. The autogyro expert said the army has been experimenting during the past year with the new ships that are kept aloft by vertical rotor resembling a windmill. Slow flying speeds of the new planes are expected to make them valuable for observation and gun-range directions.

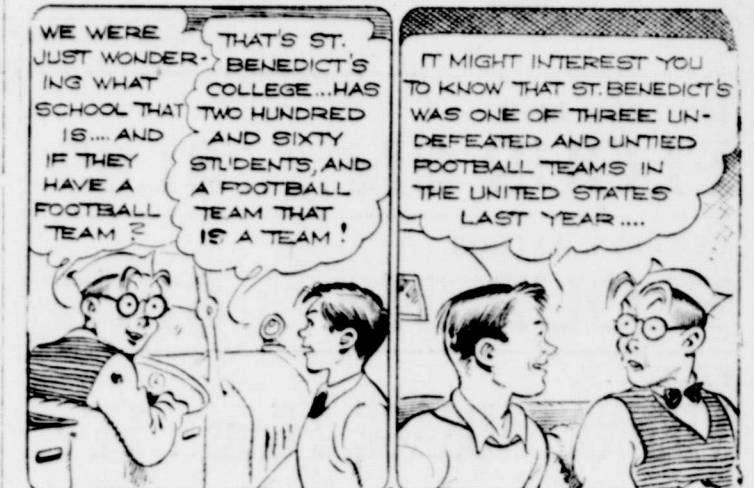
