NEW TAX LAW COMPARED WITH PRESENT IN PROPOSED BILL

oil tax now maintains a minimum of two and three-quarter cents a barrel, and the bill proposes a minimum of three and a half cents a barrel. DENTON YOUTH WILL RUN IN SUGAR BOWL

DENTON, Oct. 14.—Wayne Rideout, who last year made cinderpath history for North Texas State Teachers College by defeating Don Lash of Indiana, national two-mile champion, will be pitted against the Hoosier star in the two-mile race again this year at the Sugar Bowl Carnival January 2 in New Orleans. Coach Choe Sportsman announced today.

In last year's New Orleans meet Rideout clocked 9:03, shattering the old Southwestern A. A. U. record of 9:15 and giving the Lanky North Texan the honor of running the second fastest two-mile race ever reeled off in America. Lash's time is only five seconds over the American record of 8:58.4.

Running against Rideout and Lash will be Rice, national collegiate champion from Notre Dame. The mile race will find Blaine Rideout, Wayne's twin brother, matched against the nation's three top milers, Glenn Cunningham, Archie San Romani and Gene Venske. San Romani will be favored by virtue of his undisputed victories over his arch-rivals, Cunningham and Venske on northern boards last spring.

Blaine's outstanding performance last year was at the Texas relays where he showed his heels to Venske in a surprise win. The time was 4:20 on a slow track.

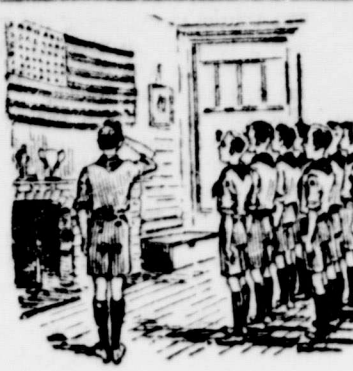

State Theater on Its Second Tour

SEATTLE, (UP)—Washington's noted theatrical group—the Washington State Theater—will enter its second year with the start of the fall season.

The troupe is the only one of its kind in the United States and is currently the center of nationwide and international attention as a project without precedent in English-speaking countries.

The "theater on wheels" finished a successful season last year. It is sponsored by the Washington State Department of Public Instruction.

The company is motorized, the personnel traveling in cars. Settings, costumes and complete lighting equipment is transported in 10-ton trucks.

One hundred performances were staged during the State Theater's first two tours with Shakespeare's "The Comedy of Errors" and Talbot Jennings' Northwest drama, "No More Frontier."

Shakespeare's riotous farce, "The Taming of the Shrew," will be the vehicle for the fall tour this year. Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer" will be offered in the spring, directors said.
