### **LANDON WANTS** POWER OF FDR TO BE CURBED

M. Landon, pitular as head of the Republican party called last night on the 17,000,000 voters who supported him for president in 1936 to curb President Roosevelt's powers which, he said, had become too great.

Landon charged the president with violating the "letter and spirit of the Constitution" and with feeding on power like a Julius Caesar.

The supreme court enlargement plan, the appointment of Associate Justice Hugo L. Black, the NRA, the Social Security program, the Wagner Labor Relations Act, relief policies, the president's position on neutrality, government reorganization all were assailed.

As soon as Landon concluded Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, former administrator of the NRA spoke by radio from Washington and said that Landon's address failed to give the country "a middle course with sufficiently vigorous and convincing leadership to follow.







JACKSON, Mich., Oct. 20 (U.P.)-Inmates of the world's second larg est prison, the state prison of southern Michigan near here, received a 'new deal" with the establishment o fa new three-member parole board Warden Joel R. Moore believes.

There are 4.226 inmates confined here in a penal institution second in population only to that at San Quention. Calif., which has a smaller plant.

"Our inmates had their own blacklist of attorneys who oversold under the former system." Moore said, "but this is all a thing of the past under our new corrections law. No applications for parole can be made by either prisoners or by their attorney, but cases will be considered automatically upon expiration of

their minimum sentence." Moore said the new three-member parole board, supplanting the former single commissioner who recommended to the governor, was the chief item of interest to prisoners in the new law passed by the 1937 Michigan legislature. The board started operation the middle of Aug-




