MICHIGAN TRIES OUT AUTOMATIC PAROLE REVIEW

JACKSON, Mich., Oct. 20 (U.P.)—Inmates of the world's second largest prison, the state prison of southern Michigan near here, received a "new deal" with the establishment of a new three-member parole board.

There are 4,226 inmates confined here in a penal institution second in population only to that at San Quentin, Calif., which has a smaller plant.

Volume of Work Increased "No one commissioner could ever do justice to three state prisons, because he didn't have time to review cases carefully and study personalities at the rate of 75 a day," Moore explained.

Under the old system of applying for parole, prisoners suffered the disappointment when they were turned down after being encouraged by attorneys and net result was discouragement.

Both Gov. Frank Murphy and Hilmer Gellett, his correction director, spoke of "uneasiness and the feeling of favoritism and privilege" which they said existed among prisoners under the old system.

Moore said he considered post-prison supervision an "absolutely essential phase" which will be handled under the new five-member state correction commission.

Field Men Vital "We are going to train men to work in every part of the state," he said. "Men released from prison must have a human touch within three weeks. It's impossible to scare or preach folks into being good, and former inmates are no exception."

Moore, state director of prisons, who worked for the Federal bureau of prisons for seven years organizing probation and parole systems in each of the 48 states, said field men will determine the following before prisoners are released.

- 1. Is his home respectable? 2. Has he a bona fide proffer of work? 3. Is some person in the community willing to be interested in helping work out the ex-convict's relationship with society upon his release?

Define "Critical Period" If these questions are satisfactorily answered, Moore explained, then the field men will provide the necessary "human touch" during what he termed the "critical period" of three weeks after release.
