The Pleasant Hill Extension Homemakers Club Holds Meet

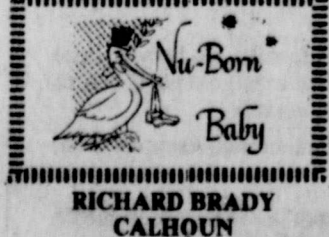

But he bought it after the owner said, "I'm tied down here to this glorified boarding house when I ought to be out there in the oil field making real money."

About the Mobley, Hilton also said, "The Mobley in Cisco, my first love, was a great lady. She taught us the way to promotion and pay, plus a lot about running hotels. She was indestructible the ideal hotel to practice on. L.M. Drown and I did just that."

"It was at the Mobley that I tried out two principles that have been basic in every one of my subsequent operations from Waco to Istanbul."

In his acknowledgments for the book, Hilton stated, "My greatest debt, however, is to each individual who has ever been my guest in any hotel—whether in Cisco, Texas, New York or Istanbul—and to all those who will be my guests in the future. Without each and every one of them there would be no story to write."

The Mobley is still standing and was bought last year by a Houston trust. It is not known what the trust plans to do with the hotel.

Conrad Hilton, Hotel Magnate, Bought His First Hotel In Cisco

Conrad Hilton, the small boy who became a 235-hotel magnate opened his first hotel in Cisco, Texas. When he died of pneumonia late Wednesday in Santa Monica, California, his name had become a synonym for hotel. He was board chairman of a hotel chain estimated to be worth more than half a billion dollars.

The 91-year-old hotel magnate, who was born on Christmas Day in San Antonio, New Mexico, died at 10 p.m. Wednesday, three days after entering St. John's Hospital, said Jacques, Cosse, spokesman for the Hilton Hotels Division of Hilton Hotels Corporation.

Although his eldest son, 50-year-old Barron, is president of Hilton Hotels Corp., the lean 6-foot-2 elder Hilton remained active in the business.

"He was working right up until just before Christmas," Cosse said. "He was ill and went into the hospital just before the holidays and then went back into the hospital three days ago."

Although a New Mexican by birth, Hilton came to the West Texas oil fields during the boom of 1919 and opened his first hotel in Cisco. That was the Mobley, located at Avenue D and Fourth Street, a structure that was sleeping oil field workers in three shifts. Hilton invested his life savings of \$5,000 in the Mobley.

The two-story, red brick Mobley Hotel contained 50 rooms. In his autobiography, *Be My Guest*, Hilton recalled, "The Mobley, when I first saw it, looked like a convenient place to sleep. Nothing more."

His biggest satisfaction came when the Waldorf-Astoria in New York joined the Hilton chain in 1949, making him the No. 1 American hotelman.

The creation of Hilton International was highlighted by the construction of the Caribe Hilton in 1949. In the next decade, the Caribe Hilton's profits made possible eight more international hostels from Mexico City to Berlin. Hilton International's properties—owned, leased or managed—had grown to more than 50 hotels by the early '70s.

Hilton's continental U.S. collection had expanded to include 185 hotels. Hilton's international operations are basically a lease arrangement with little

do with the hotel. From his success in Cisco, Hilton bought a series of small hotels in Texas and finally built his first one in Dallas.

The first building to bear his name as a Hilton Hotel was in Abilene: the current hotel Windsor at North Fourth and Pine. The Windsor operated under a lease with the Hilton name from its opening in 1927 to 1945.

Hilton also had hotels in Fort Worth, Dallas, Corsicana, Waco, Marlin, Plainview, San Angelo, Lubbock and El Paso. The Hilton Hotel in San Angelo is not the Cactus Hotel.

The real test of Hilton's business acumen came during the Depression, when 81 percent of the nation's hotels fell into bankruptcy. At one point, he was \$500,000 in debt with no income.

The Depression over, Hilton branched out in the late 1930's in time to capitalize on the World War II boom, and in 1942 he entered the New York hotel field. In 1945 he bought Chicago's Stevens Hotel and Palmer House. Another prestigious hotel he acquired was the Town in Los Angeles.

or no equity interest in the hotels. Ownership of real estate is a much larger factor in domestic operations.

Known to employees as a gentle executive, Hilton was boyish, candid and trusting, with a hard streak of practicality and the ability to turn a shrewd deal.

"Connie," as friends called him, credited his success mainly to opportunities he saw lying in front of people who were looking elsewhere.

For example, in 1942, he bought Waldorf-Astoria Corp. bonds with a face value of \$500,000 for \$22,500 or 4 1/2 cents on the dollar. Later he sold these for \$412,000.

In 1949, he acquired operating control of the fashionable Waldorf-Astoria for \$3 million.

He hired hotel managers who knew the business and did not concern himself with operating details. But he insisted on increased financial returns, the guest for which he called "digging for gold."

Work was said to be the great love of his life. Hilton's marriages to Zsa Zsa Gabor and Mary Barron ended in divorce. Miss Gabor said she visited him in the

hospital shortly before his death. Hilton is survived by his third wife, Mary Frances, who he married in 1976; two sons, Barron Hilton, president of Hilton Hotels Corp., and Michael Eric Hilton, a corporation vice president in Houston; and a daughter, Francesca, of Los Angeles. A third son, Conrad Nicholson Hilton Jr., known as "Nick" as former husband of actress Elizabeth Taylor, died of a heart attack in 1969.

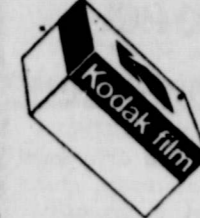

GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

The new year began with lots of bad weather. County stockmen, who have already reduced cattle herds to the lowest level in several years, are wishing they had even fewer cattle to feed. The water supply is also very critical in some areas of the County. Many large stock tanks in the eastern part of the county are dry or almost dry. With livestock feeding so critical now stockmen should separate dry cows and those with calves if at all possible. Supplemental requirements of these animals differ greatly. If adequate amounts of low quality hay or standing forage are available, the

nutrient most deficient in the diet of a dry cow is protein. Under these conditions, a high-protein, natural supplement is often the cheapest means of supplementation. The amount of supplement required might range from less than 1 lb. to 2 lb. per day depending on the quality of forage available. Liquid supplements and protein blocks may be applicable, especially if their convenience is considered important. On the other hand, a cow with a calf is usually deficient in energy, or simply fuel to

operate, as well as protein. Here a medium protein (15-25 percent crude protein), medium to high energy supplement is often most feasible. Liquid supplements and protein blocks are generally less desirable under these conditions for cows with calves because of their low energy content. Applicable classes of supplements are range cubes and mixtures of oilseed meal and grain. A common mix of the latter type would contain by weight 1/4 to 1/3 oil meal and 3/4 to 2/3 grain. Anywhere from 3 to 6 lb. per day

of such supplements may be necessary. The appropriate amount of feed would vary according to the quality and quantity of hay or grass. Eastland County pecan growers won two blue ribbons, seven red ribbons and seven white ribbons at the Central Texas Regional Pecan Show in Dallas recently. James Alexander of Rising Star won second places in the John Garner class, the Brake

class and the Texas Prolific class. He won third in the Kincaid class. The Lone Star Pecan Orchard of Rising Star won first with Success. Second with McCulley and third with Apache pecans. Charles Walker of Eastland won three third places in each of the Barton, Comanche, and Imperial classes. Dan Childress of Cotton-

wood won a second in the Cherokee class and a third in the Sioux class. Acres of Joy Orchard of Rising Star won a second in other Shelling Varieties with a Cape Fear entry and third in the Western class.

Roy Roberts of Olden won first in the Stuart class and John Brumley of Rising Star won second in the Halbert Class. The two first place entries will compete in the State Pecan Show in July.

Public Service Announcements Take Satirical Look At Cults

Take a little Steve Martin, add a dash of Woody Allen, squeeze in a little Erma Bombeck and you've got the latest public service radio announcements from the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission in Fort Worth.

Stan Freberg, satirist, is the voice and writer behind the spots which take a satirical look at cults.

"Through these spots Freberg points up some of the silliness and absurdity within the human-potential movement," said Claude Cox, marketing director.

"Baptists are greatly concerned about the so-called self-improvement movement and we felt the need to challenge it," said

Paul M. Stevens, Commission president. "Some of these are a racketeering of the human race."

Cox said these spots are really "Audio essays" aimed at young adults who are trying to find escape in life.

"The three essays, 'California Tracts And Transcontinental Meditation,' 'Werner Von Ersatz,' and 'Maharishi Cosgrove,' have been mailed to over 7500 radio stations in the U.S."

Stevens praised Freberg for "pioneering in the use of humor and wit to breathe life into radio and television announcements."

"Mr. Freberg has served Christianity in a unique

manner through the broadcast medium. His creative and refreshing material has yet to be equaled in audience outreach and listener impact."

"Actually, I didn't do these audio essays for any religious organizations. I did them for the Lord. It was one of the greatest challenges of my life, not just as a writer or producer, but as a Christian," said Freberg.

Several years ago Freberg produced Christian awareness spots for the Presbyterian church. In 1976, the Radio and Television Commission presented him with the Christian Service Award.

The son of a retired Baptist minister, Freberg said he wanted to try to strike a responsive chord in people who wouldn't listen to a religious message.

The self-help movements are easy to satirize because they have so little sense of humor. They are so serious...sitting ducks for a satirist," said Freberg.

In one essay Freberg speaks of a man named Maharishi Cosgrove who got into the self-awareness movement by opening up a meditation booth in a shopping center, next to a delicatessen.

Freberg said, "The deal was, you give the Maharishi your salary for a week. In return you receive a sheet of the world's most beloved chants and a choice of inner calm or cole slaw."

"We are now in a 'me' generation where many people are turning their interests upon themselves instead of their fellowman," said Stevens. "Jesus said that we are our brother's keeper."

"If we satirize the 'new' religions which urge people to think always and first of their own fulfillment, welfare and comfort...we will be able to talk about the self-foregetfulness that goes with loving Christ more than self," said Stevens. "This is the single most needed message of 1979."

There will be a Dance Friday and Saturday, January 5 and 6. Present will be Bob Burgess and the West Texas Wranglers. It will be at 100 Market Street, Baird, Texas of the May Hotel.

President Carter Proclaims Blood Donor Month: Urges Public Support

President Jimmy Carter has officially proclaimed January 1979 "National Volunteer Blood Donor Month," according to a joint statement issued by the American Association of Blood Banks and its Abilene member the Meek Community Blood Bank now in its new location at 1825 Hickory. Reduced Federal Excise Taxes To Save Bells \$21.1 Million

Reduced federal excise taxes will save Southwestern Bell customers in Texas an estimated \$21.1 million in 1979, according to Herb Bowen, vice president-customer services.

"Beginning January 1, the federal excise tax on telephone service will be reduced from four percent to three percent," Bowen said. "Under a schedule established by federal law, the tax will continue to drop one percent each year until it expires January 1, 1982." Congress first imposed the

excise tax on a limited basis during World War I. Although repealed briefly after the war, it was reinstated during the Depression and has continued since then on a more extensive basis.

During the 1940s and 1950s, the rate was as high as 15 percent on local service and 25 percent on Long Distance service. From the mid-1950s until 1972, it was 10 percent on most local and Long Distance services. In 1973, and each subsequent year, the rate has been reduced by one percentage point.

Although the total farm population declined during the 1970-'75 study, the number of people living on farms with annual sales greater than \$40,000 increased by 76 percent, said demographer Vera J. Banks of the department's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service (ESCS).

Banks said in 1975 farms with under \$2,500 in annual sales contained a third of the U.S. farm population, or about 2.8 million. This compares with 3.6 million in 1970. Operators of these farms usually earn most of their money income from off-farm sources.

In 1975, two-thirds of the

total U.S. farm population lived on livestock and cash-grain farms.

Keeping Well

HIATUS HERNIA

Hiatus hernia, or diaphragmatic hernia, is a very common condition. Many people have a small hiatus hernia and never have any symptoms. This hernia is a condition in which part of the stomach goes back up into the chest. This usually happens because the opening in the diaphragm (the muscular layer of tissue that separates the abdomen from the chest) through

which the esophagus passes dilates and allows the upper part of the stomach to protrude up into the chest. Sometimes the esophagus shortens and the stomach goes up with it; at other times, the stomach goes into the chest by the esophagus (a para-esophageal diaphragmatic hernia).

These hernias are usually seen on x-rays taken when barium is swallowed to x-ray the stomach, some of these

hernias are small, others are very large. Some patients have no symptoms from their hernias, but other patients may have difficulty getting their food to go down. At times food will lodge in the larger hernias and cause pain, vomiting, etc.

Actually the most common symptom associated with a hiatus hernia is burning in the chest (under the sternum) and pain which may hurt through to the back of the chest. These symptoms most commonly come on at night after the patient has been lying down awhile. These symptoms are caused not by the hernia itself but by

acid from the stomach flowing back up into the esophagus and causing irritation (esophagitis). These hernias cause a loss of the normal muscle action at the junction of the esophagus and stomach which prevents acid and other stomach contents from going back up into the esophagus. This so called "incompetent sphincter" muscle must be repaired if the surgery for a hiatus hernia is to be successful.

Many patients with a hiatus hernia having these symptoms can be treated successfully by elevating the head of their beds about eight inches. This prevents

the stomach acid from going up into the esophagus while the patient sleeps and will allow the irritated esophagus to get well. Certain medicines are also given to help the irritated esophagus.

If elevation of the head of the bed does not stop the symptoms or if the patient has a hernia which interferes with the food going down, then surgery is necessary.

Surgery is very successful if the stomach is replaced in the abdomen, the opening in the diaphragm around the esophagus tightened, and some procedure done to prevent the stomach acid going up into the esophagus.

Water Into The '90s
Taken from a 1969 report by the West Central Council of Governments for the Farmers Home Administration: about Municipal Services:

Water Supply & Treatment
The City of Cisco currently receives its raw water supply from Lake Cisco, located approximately four miles to the North. The current dependable yield of Lake Cisco is estimated to be 700 ac.-ft.-year, but is projected to decline to approximately 500 ac.-ft.-year by 2020. Based on the demand projections shown in Volume I of this report, the City of Cisco's current water usage is approximately equal to or slightly greater than the dependable yield of Lake Cisco. Immediate construction of the proposed rural water service areas satellite to the City of Cisco will worsen the situation.

Due to these limitations in the firm yield of Lake Cisco, it is proposed that a supplemental supply line for the importation of water from Lake Leon be constructed. The geographic location of the existing Cisco water treatment plant coupled with the economies realized by treating large volumes of water at one location, indicate that the supplemental supply should be previously treated at the Eastland County Water Supply and Improvement District's facilities prior to importation. An appropriate balance between local treatment capacity and importation was determined to be the development of peak local treatment capacity of approximately 2.3 MGD and construction of a treated water supply line to carry a maximum of 0.7 MGD.

Based on a field inspection and the results of a study conducted by Rady and Associates, Inc., Consulting Engineers, the 40-year old treatment facility was determined to be deficient in the following aspects: 1) no filtration is provided, 2) sludge removal and chemical addition facilities are inadequate, 3) flocculation equipment is inadequate. The requirements for additions to the existing treatment facilities are predicated on these treatment inadequacies rather than on limitations in capacity.

Though the improvements proposed in the Rady and Associates report were developed for a nominal 1.5 MGD capacity, the resulting facility would actually be capable of a peak production approaching 2.25 MGD. Therefore, it is recommended that these proposed improvements, coupled with construction of a supplementary supply line prior to 1980, will adequately provide for the needs of the City of Cisco and the proposed rural water service areas. A summary of these improvements and their associated capital and operating costs is presented in Table II-48. The proposed additions to the existing water treatment facilities are graphically depicted in Figure II-154.

Water Distribution

The existing water distribution system was found to be adequate to meet domestic and fire protection needs in most sections of the City. However, additions as shown in Figure II-152 are recommended to enhance fire protection in several peripheral areas. Additionally, the existing 0.5 MG of elevated storage should be expanded by a 125,000 gallon increment. The possibility of reactivating an existing, unused elevated storage tank should be considered to assist in meeting this requirement.

Future system expansions should include additional mains to provide fire protection to growth areas on the periphery of the city and an increase in high service pumpage. If the proposed future expansion in high service pumpage is confined to the present pump station, the need for additional ground or elevated storage is not foreseen. A summary of recommended improvements, both immediate and future, is shown in Figure II-152, with associated costs tabulated in Table II-50.

Water Collection

The City of Cisco's wastewater collection system is deemed adequate in those areas where service is currently provided. However, it is recommended that additional sewers be constructed to provide service to the following areas: 1) new additions in the southwestern portion of town near the hospital, 2) an area immediately south of Cisco Junior College, 3) developments in northeastern Cisco, and 4) a neighborhood adjacent to the old petroleum complex. Additionally, a limited number of certain older portions of the system. Implementation of these improvements should be considered as an immediate requirement.

The projected population increases for the City of Cisco will undoubtedly require future additions to the wastewater collection system. The required future improvements include a collector system to provide service for a neighborhood immediately west of Cisco Junior College. Service to this area will require a lift station and force main to transport the collected flows to the gravity outfall main leading to the wastewater treatment plant. Additionally, approximately 1,800 ft. of the outfall line leading the wastewater treatment plant will require expansion to meet the needs of the projected population growth. The recommended improvements, both immediate and future, are graphically summarized in Figure II-153, with associated capital costs presented in Table II-50.

Wastewater Treatment

The existing wastewater treatment facilities consist of a large, covered Imhoff Tank followed by an "activated sludge" aeration basin which has no provision for the recycle of a sludge. This system is singularly inefficient and it is doubtful if renovation would be effective even with major modifications. It is therefore recommended that the existing facilities be abandoned and that modern efficient secondary treatment facilities be constructed at the first opportunity. Several alternative treatment by constructed at the first opportunity. Several alternative treatment schemes could provide the required degree of treatment. The candidate systems range from highly compact, sophisticated "activated sludge" or trickling filter units, to a less expensive facility utilizing waste stabilization ponds, but requiring considerably more area. The final decision must be based upon a judicious consideration of initial capital expenditure as opposed to projected land values. The estimated capital and operating costs of four candidate waste treatment systems are presented in Table II-49, with the most attractive alternative schematically depicted in Figure II-154.

EASTLAND

Water Into The '90s
Taken from a 1969 report by the West Central Council of Government for the Farmers Home Administration: about Municipal Services:

Water Supply and Treatment
Treated water for the cities of Eastland, Ranger, Carbon and Olden is currently supplied from a central treatment facility located south of the City of Eastland, the ultimate source being Lake Leon. The treatment plant is owned and operated by the Eastland County Water Supply and Improvement District. Existing facilities include two 50 foot diameter clarifiers, 720 square feet of rapid sand filters, and an 80,000 gallon clearwell. Chemical coagulation, flocculation, and chlorination are also practiced. The treatment plant has a rated capacity of 3.5 MGD with production allocated equally between the cities of Eastland and Ranger. The facility is attractive and apparently is well-operated and maintained.

An analysis of the projected demands on this treatment facility indicate that approximately 5 MGD

of the capacity will be required following implementation of the recommendations for regional water distribution proposed in Volume I of this report. These additional treated water requirements result from: the construction of six proposed rural water service areas, increased demands in existing rural systems, the provision of a supplemental supply to the City of Cisco, and growth within the cities of Eastland and Ranger. Additionally, the total requirement is projected to increase to approximately 7.4 MGD by 1990. Based on these projections, it is recommended that treatment capacity be initially expanded by construction of a 2.0 MGD treatment module with provisions made for a similar expansion of 2 MGD in the early 1980's.

The initial construction phase is envisioned as including augmentation of the existing raw water line from Lake Leon, one appropriately sized flocculator-clarifier with associated chemical handling and rapid mix facilities, approximately 400 square feet of high rate multi-media filters, and additional chlorination equipment. Concurrent with construction of the initial expansion, laboratory and administrative facilities should also be modernized and existing treatment units renovated as required. To reduce construction costs, the second stage of expansion should be programmed as a duplicate of the initial phase. The estimated capital and operating costs associated with the proposed improvements are presented in Table II-49. A schematic diagram of recommended construction is shown in Figure II-158.

The high service pump station associated with the treatment facility has the capability of supplying Eastland and Ranger either in combination or individually. This pump station is rated at 4 MGD at a total design head of 300 feet. In spite of differences in supply line characteristics, the facility is capable of furnishing the two cities in proportion to their demand, each city receiving potentially in excess of 1.7 MGD. The 14 inch tank situated in the western portion of the City when pumped at a total dynamic head of 300 feet. This supply line was found to be adequate for the present and projected needs of Eastland. However, full utilization of capacity will require additional pumping facilities at the treatment plant. These additions should be matched to additions in treatment capacity, with an ultimate expansion to 7.5 MGD recommended.

Water Distribution

The City of Eastland's water distribution is deemed adequate to supply all present domestic needs. Some additional mains, however, should be added at this time to secure credits for fire protection and service should be extended to the proposed wastewater treatment facility. The recommended immediate additions are shown in Figure II-156. Future additions should be primarily oriented towards the improvement of fire-fighting capabilities, as growth outside the present limits of the distribution system is not anticipated. The proposed future water distribution mains are also shown in Figure II-156. The estimated cost of these improvements, both present and future, have been in Table II-50.

Rising Star

Water Into The '90s
Water Supply and Treatment
Rising Star is supplied with water from thirteen wells drilled into the Trinity formation, of which only four are ordinarily used to supply the community. From available data, it has been estimated that the present wells are only marginally capable of dependably supplying the community's estimated peak day usage. Based on the data available, it is anticipated that Rising Star will continue to rely on ground water supplies similar to the existing

system. Also investigations indicate that Rising Star should begin immediately to augment its present well supply with a view to double the present capacity by the end of the study period. The estimated cost development of the necessary additional wells, together with other pertinent data, has been shown in Table II-48.

Water Distribution

The present water distribution system for Rising Star is considered adequate for the domestic needs for the service area. However, considerable areas east of U.S. Highway 183 are not presently provided with fire flow capability. It is therefore recommended that mains shown on Figure II-170 be added immediately in order to provide fire protection for these areas.

In the future, additional ground storage and high service pumpage will be needed in order to deliver the increased supply capacity to the community distribution system. Also, some additional mains should be added to further strengthen the fire flow capability of the system. It is anticipated that most of the future growth for the community will occur in areas presently served by the existing system. However, should areas develop outside of the present service area, these should be provided with domestic and fire flow service. The recommended future improvements are also shown on Figure II-170. The costs of the recommended improvements has been estimated as shown in Table II-50.

Wastewater Collection

The present wastewater collection system for Rising Star is considered to be adequate to serve the community's current needs and will probably continue to serve without need for expansion during the study period. However, should areas of growth occur outside of the present service limits, wastewater collection lines should be extended. The present wastewater collection system is shown in Figure II-171.

Wastewater Treatment

The existing wastewater treatment facility is relatively new, in good condition, and utilizes modern treatment concepts. They consist of primary clarification, contact aeration, final setting, chlorination, and appropriate sludge handling units. The treatment plant is deemed adequate to meet the current and projected needs of Rising Star. A rigorous maintenance program will be required to insure continued efficient operation. Implementation of an aggressive reuse program is also recommended.

Ranger

Water Into The '90s
Water Supply and Treatment
Taken from a 1969 report by the West Central Council of Government for the Farmers Home Administration: about municipal services:

Ranger is presently supplied with treated water through approximately four miles of 12 inch pipe line from the Eastland County Water District filter plant. This 3.5 MGD filter plant is more fully described in this report in the remarks under the City of Eastland. The present supply line, coupled with the 300 TDH pump station at the filter plant, is capable of delivering in excess of 3.4 MGD to Ranger.

It is anticipated that the present supply line is capable of supplying not only the present needs for Ranger, but all of Ranger's anticipated needs throughout the study period. However, immediate additions should be made to the filtration plant's supply line pump station and treatment units. Although it is not anticipated that Ranger will need to directly participate in the cost of the Water District's expansion program, the City's proportionate share of this cost based on usage has been shown together with other pertinent data in Table II-48. Actual reimbursement will most probably be accomplished through in-

creased water costs.

Water Distribution

The situation of Ranger in a pronounced valley with developed areas of the City on both sides of the valley, together with lower portions of the valley, while having many advantages to the City, presents distinct problems in water distribution. Basically, these problems can be characterized as the need to provide suitable pressure to adequately serve higher portions of the system without creating excessive pressures in the distribution system serving the low-lying areas. The complex reasons which have led to the present pattern of development will probably continue, at least in the immediate future, to preclude the development of areas which would allow the economic installation of a dual pressure level system (which would be the most economic answer to the water distribution problem, taken alone.) For this reason, it is anticipated that the five booster pump stations, which currently serve as a somewhat less desirable solution to the basic problem, will probably need to be maintained throughout the study period. Although the present distribution system is capable of providing domestic service in most of the neighborhoods of the City, some additional neighborhoods should be provided with domestic and fire flow service at the present line. The necessary mains are shown together with the existing distribution system on Figure II-160.

In the future, it is anticipated that an additional 25,000 gallons of elevated storage should be provided on one of the high points located in the southeast portion of the City near Interstate Hwy. 20. Also, it is anticipated that future mains should be added to further extend the fire protection capability of the present system as modified by the recommended immediate improvements. It is anticipated that these mains will serve to provide most of the domestic service needed by the projected expansion of Ranger's population. These anticipated future

additions are show in Figure II-160. The estimated cost of the recommended improvements, both present and future, have been listed in Table II-50.

Wastewater Collection

Present wastewater collection system for the City of Ranger is relatively adequate to serve the areas now provided with wastewater collection service. However, some additions to the system are needed in order to extend service immediately to areas not presently served, and to provide additional capacity at selected points along the outfall routes in the present system. The neighborhoods not presently serviced are primarily in the extreme west, and southeast of the City. It is anticipated that the area to the east of the City will require the installation of a pump station and force main in order to deliver its collected flows into the present wastewater collection system. The recommended immediate additions to this system are shown, together with the existing system, in Figure II-161.

In the future, it is estimated that some additional wastewater collection lines will need to be added to the system, in addition to the immediate needs, approximately as shown in Figure II-161. An estimate of the costs of these recommended improvements has been shown in Table II-50.

Wastewater Treatment

The existing wastewater treatment facility consists of an Imhoff Tank with associated sludge handling units and a fixed nozzle trickling filter. Although the trickling filter and Imhoff Tank are of sufficient size to theoretically accommodate the projected loadings, both units are structurally unsound, in a poor state of repair, and generally incapable of meeting present or future treatment demands.

It is believed that the costs associated with complete renovation of the existing facility and continued operation and maintenance would be significantly higher than those associated with abandoning the existing

facilities and construction of a new plant. The available alternative treatment schemes include the entire spectrum ranging from highly sophisticated, yet compact, activated sludge or trickling filter installations to relatively inexpensive waste stabilization ponds requiring a large investment in land. The waste stabilization pond alternative offers a low capital cost and low operating and maintenance expenses. However, if adopted, it is recommended that an aggressive reuse program be instituted. The estimated capital and operation cost of four suggested alternative treatment schemes are presented in Table II-49. A graphical interpretation of what appears to be the most appropriate scheme is shown in Figure II-162.

Carbon

Water Into The '90s
Taken from a 1969 report by the West Central Council of Government for the Farmers Home Administration: about municipal services:

Water Supply and Treatment
Both Carbon and the RWSA of Carbon are presently supplied with treated water by the Carbon Water Supply Corporation. Treated water is being purchased from the City of Eastland and transported by a six inch supply line with two booster stations. It is anticipated that this supply line capacity will continue to be sufficient throughout the study period. Eastland obtains its water supply in turn through a pipe line from the Eastland County Water District filtration plant, south of Ranger. This filtration plant treats raw water obtained from Lake Leon and pumps the treated water to both Eastland and Ranger. In the remarks under Eastland, this report has recommended the immediate expansion of this filtration plant, its supply line pumping capacity and its raw water supply capacity. Data pertaining to the water supply needs of Carbon, together with similar data for Eastland and the Eastland County Water District plant, are shown in Table II-48.

Wastewater Treatment
Carbon is not presently served with a community-wide system of wastewater collection or disposal. It is recommended that the installation of an appropriate system, such as that shown in Figure II-164 be considered an immediate needs. This need can only become more evident as the town continues to use its new and more plentiful water supply. Anticipated future extensions are shown on Figure II-164. The costs of such a system and its future extensions have been estimated as listed in Table II-50.

Wastewater Treatment
Once the proposed sewage system is under construction, suitable waste stabilization ponds can be designed, installed and operated to treat adequately the wastewater flows resulting. It is recommended that such a facility be installed in conjunction with a community wastewater collection system. The estimated cost of the proposed facilities are tabulated in Table II-49, together with other pertinent data.

Water Distribution

The water distribution mains serving Carbon are a part of the Carbon water supply system. This distribution system was completed quite recently and undoubtedly serves all of the residents now desiring water service. This system is deemed adequate for the town's needs at the present time. It is likely that towards the end of the study period a desire will arise to add to the present system's modest fire-fighting capability in order to obtain reductions in insurance premiums. It is suggested that a 25,000 gallon elevated tank and a six inch looped distribution system, together with this suggested addition, has been shown in Figure II-164. The cost of such an addition has been estimated as shown in Table II-50.

Wastewater Collection

Carbon is not presently served with a community-wide system of wastewater collection or disposal. It is recommended that the installation of an appropriate system, such as that shown in Figure II-164 be considered an immediate needs. This need can only become more evident as the town continues to use its new and more plentiful water supply. Anticipated future extensions are shown on Figure II-164. The costs of such a system and its future extensions have been estimated as listed in Table II-50.

Wastewater Treatment
Once the proposed sewage system is under construction, suitable waste stabilization ponds can be designed, installed and operated to treat adequately the wastewater flows resulting. It is recommended that such a facility be installed in conjunction with a community wastewater collection system. The estimated cost of the proposed facilities are tabulated in Table II-49, together with other pertinent data.

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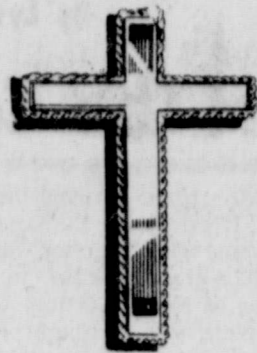
A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK
