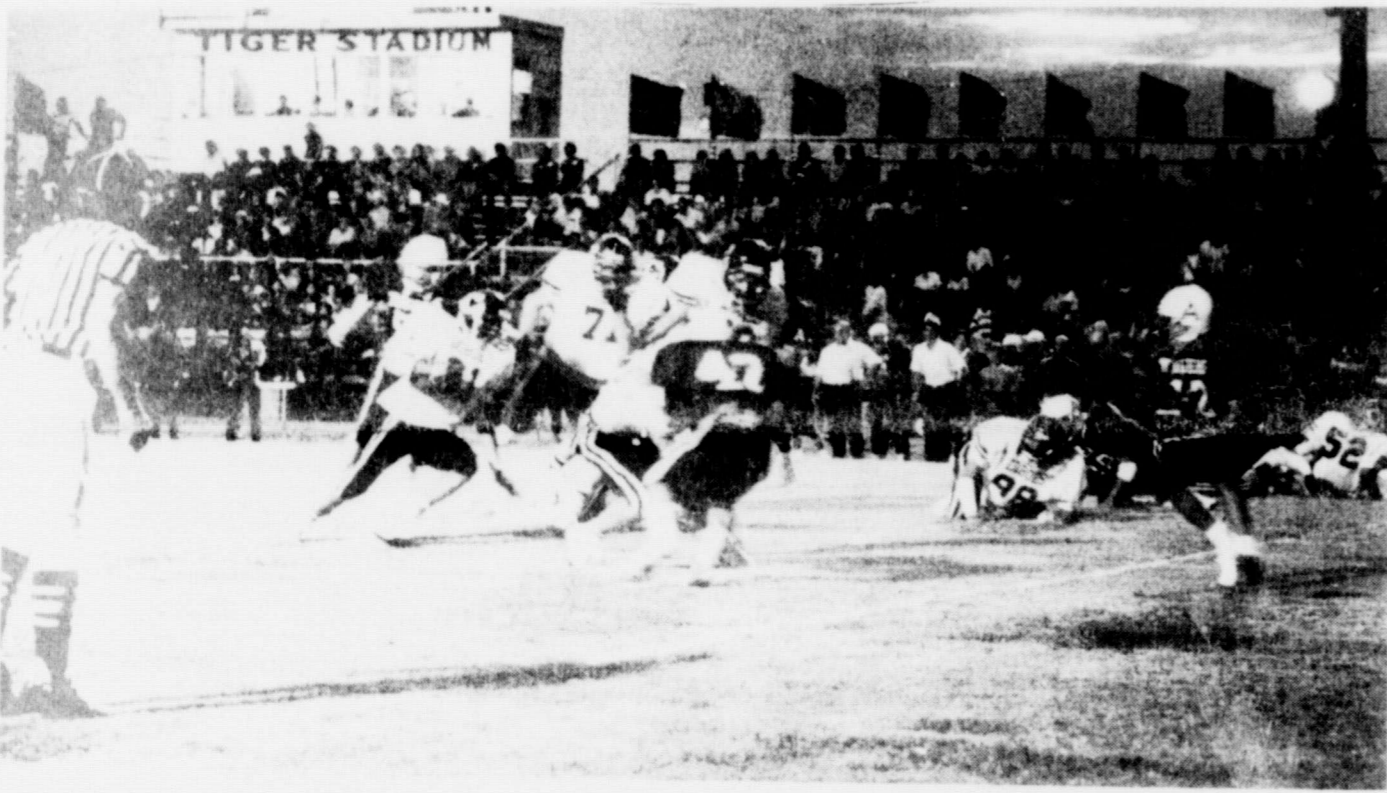

Cisco Loboes Beat Anson 25-to-19 Friday



LOBO TOUCHDOWN!!



The Mighty Fighting Winning Loboes are back! The Cisco High School Varsity football team won their first game of the season when they played the Anson Tigers last Friday night in Anson. The score was 19-to-25.

The Loboes were rated 4th in the 13AA District Conference, but according to Coach Buddy Sharp, they will be a very competitive team this year. And this seems to be true, with the winning score of Friday's game and how they also played well in their two beginning scrimmages against Santo and Baird.

The Loboes will play Merkel, there, this Friday night, with the game beginning at 8:00 p.m.

In the Anson game, Anson won the coin toss and pushed the ball down to the 45-yard line and Mike Beauchamp ran in to make their first touchdown with 10:24 left in the first quarter. The PAT was good making the score 7-to-0.

When the Loboes were in control of the ball they moved the ball on down the field to the 1-yard line. David Zell ran the ball in to make the first touchdown for the Loboes with 1:05 left in the first quarter. The PAT was no good.

Neither team was able to

make a touchdown in the second quarter and the score at halftime was 7-to-6 in favor of Anson.

With 7:58 left in the third quarter, Matt Goosen intercepted an Anson pass and made a 33 yard run to make a touchdown for the Loboes. The Loboes tried for two points but it was no good making the score 7-to-12.

With 9:48 left in the fourth quarter Anson's Billy Scott made a 5-yard run for their second touchdown of the game. The Tigers tried for a pass, but it failed which brought the score up to 13-to-12 in favor of Anson.

Several people started leaving the stadium, when the time began running out, but the Loboes weren't finished yet. Lobo David Zell made a touchdown from the 2-yard line with only 1:47 left in the game. The pass for the extra points failed making the score 12-to-18 in favor of Cisco.

With only 40 seconds left in the game quarterback Jarrod Jeffcoat threw a 30-yard pass to Kody Wallace to make a touchdown for the Loboes. Kevin Kirk kicked the PAT to make the score 13-to-25 in favor of the Loboes.

But Anson wasn't threw yet. With only 24 seconds left

CJC Wranglers To Play Blinn JC

A traveling squad of some 69 members of the Cisco Junior College football team will leave at 10 a.m. Thursday

for Brenham where they are scheduled to meet Blinn JC in a football game at 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

Coach Rick Frazier said his Wranglers would be in top physical condition as nobody suffered injuries in the Cisco 34-to-0 victory over Panhandle State JV here last Thursday night.

The CJC coaches were well pleased with their offense that produced 440 yards. Pike Martin and James Darby divided time at quarterback and had 14 pass completions in 30 attempts with only one interception. Cisco had 231 yards rushing and 220 yards passing.

Jerry Childress, 5-10, 252, defensive tackle from Belton, was named Wrangler Defensive Player of the Game by the Wrangler coaches. He had six tackles and one sack plus a lot of assists. The Wrangler defense set a new school record by recovering seven fumbles in the game. They held Panhandle to seven first downs with 89 yards rushing and 37 yards passing.

An auction will be held during the day at the church with many items to bid on.

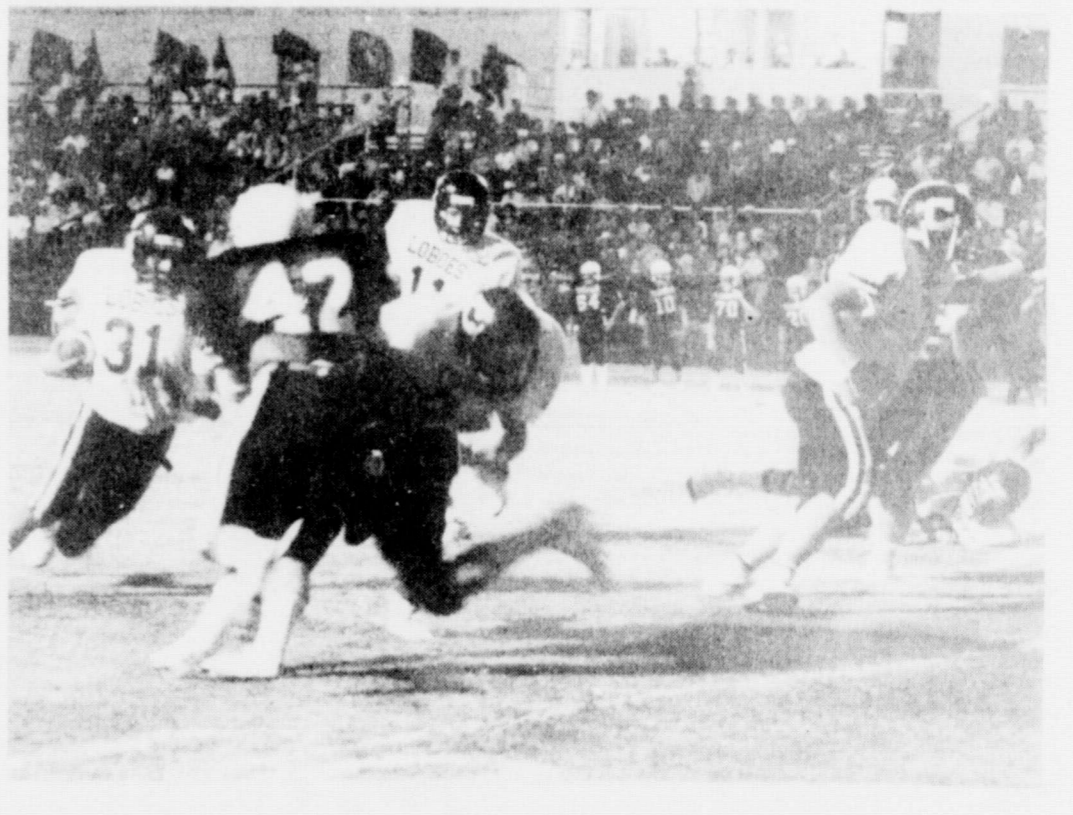

New Playground Equipment To Be Built By Volunteer Workers

The Cisco PTO will be working with volunteer workers to help build safe and educational playground equipment that is also fun for the students. They will begin the building project on September 12, and will complete the project on September 19. The project will allow the Cisco Elementary School to have approximately \$40,000.00 worth of equipment for about \$3,000.00. The Cisco PTO raised the \$3,000.00 in its fund raising drives during the last school year.

Letters asking the citizens of Cisco to donate some of the items the PTO will need will be sent out in the near future. The materials do not necessarily have to be new, since many of the materials that will be donated, can be recycled.

Members of the PTO board reported that if anyone cannot donate any of the building items needed, they can use everyone's help with the work. They will be setting posts on Saturday, September 12, between 8:00

a.m. and 7:00 p.m. On Friday, September 18, they will work from 5:00 p.m. to dark and on Saturday, they will build from 8:30 until 6:00. If needed they will work on Sunday, from 1:30 until 5:30 p.m. Everyone is urged to sign up for a work time, even if they are unable to work for the full time.

The playground consultant is Shirley Coleman, of Bronte, Texas. She is the elementary school principal in Bronte.

Shirley is the co-ordinator of the whole thing and will be here in Cisco to help work with the citizens to show everyone how to put the equipment together. Shirley has worked with 10 elementary schools across Texas to help build playground equipment. Shirley said she likes to do these as fun. She taught at Sul Ross University for two years in playground building.

Shirley is a good friend of Gienita Denison, Cisco Elementary Kindergarten teacher.

Some of the equipment that will be used to build the

playground equipment are, back hoe, tractor with post hole digger (60 post holes will be dug on Saturday, September 12), 1/2 inch electric drill, 2 small hand drills, chain saw, circular saws, hand saws, levels, T squares, chalk line and measuring tapes, pipe threader and cutter, 1/2 inch bits- extra long, counter sink bit- 1 inch, hammers, screw drivers, wrench and socket set, 5 to 6 heavy extension cords and 2 to 3 splitter boxes, wood chisel and planer, wrenches, cement mixer, shovels, wheel barrow, rakes, hoes, ladder-free standing, bolt and chain cutter. The PTO ask that everyone have their name on their equipment.

Fishing hours will be from 6:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. All members of the Eastland Bass Club will be weighing in

between 2 and 3 p.m. to better prepare for the visiting anglers.

Diet And Cancer May Be Related

The government estimates that 35 per cent of all cancer deaths are related to what we eat. This may seem like a startling statistic, but it actually translates into some encouraging news. The National Foundation for Cancer Research says that by

following a few dietary guidelines, you and your family can dramatically reduce your risk of cancer.

While no food can cure cancer by itself, the following contain nutrients and vitamins which can have anti-cancer properties:

Brussels sprouts, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, lettuce, leafy green vegetables, whole grain breads, whole grain cereals, cabbage, tomatoes, citrus fruits, and yellow vegetables.

Americans tend to eat too many fatty foods, which can contribute to breast, colon and prostate cancer. By cutting down on fats, you will also avoid obesity, which increases the risk of many forms of cancer. Eat lean meats, fish and poultry.

Incorporating high fiber foods regularly into your diet seems to guard against cancer of the colon. Fiber is readily available in bran cereal. Fresh fruits and vegetables are another good source.

Smoked, salty or nitrate-cured foods should be eaten only in moderation. People who eat these foods frequently have a higher rate of esophagus and stomach cancer.

Creating an "anti-cancer" diet is an easy, effective measure that anyone can take. It not only makes good sense, it's good science.

The National Foundation for Cancer Research is a private, non-profit organization based in Bethesda, Md. With the help of donors nationwide, it has allocated more than \$50 million to basic cancer research over the last decade.

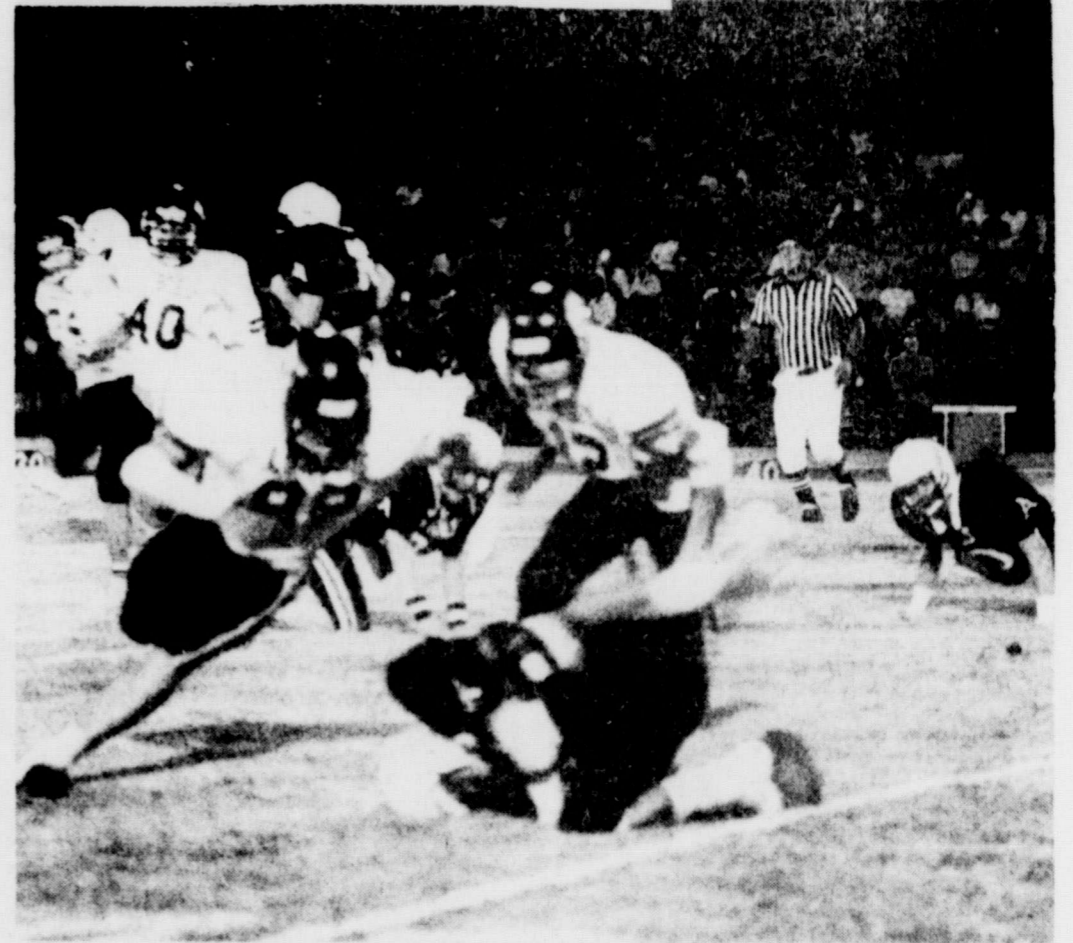

'Incubators' Can Help Small Business

COLLEGE STATION--Community leaders in Texas searching for ways to improve their economies might focus more on assisting "homegrown" businesses, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service official.

"A business incubator may be exactly what is needed to help new businesses get started," says Dr. Don Stebbins, a community development specialist. "An incubator can offer affordable rental space, shared services and management support."

Most new jobs in the United States are created by small businesses, notes Stebbins. Unfortunately, their failure rate is about 80 percent during the first four years.

"The main purpose of business incubators is to reduce that failure rate," Stebbins points out. "Although it's too early to measure long-term success, early results are promising."

Poor management has been consistently identified as the major cause of small

business failure, says the specialist. Therefore, he expects that management training and support, rather than reduced start-up costs, will be the most lasting form of assistance provided by incubators.

"In a highly competitive economy, good management and marketing are as important to business success as having a good idea or skill," Stebbins points out. "It's especially frustrating when aspiring entrepreneurs work exceptionally hard but still fail because they didn't get the right help at the right time. Well run incubators can really help the individual."

Legal advice and counseling or training in marketing, financial management, personnel management, business planning, taxes and record keeping, and long-range planning are usually included in the management support package offered to tenants.

Stebbins encourages communities to give serious consideration to establishing an incubator. "I believe that recruiting outside industry,

particularly to small Texas towns, is going to be more difficult," he says. "Many towns are going to have to rely more on self-help, and an incubator is an innovative example."

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

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 104 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide a guarantee for the Texas grain warehouse self-insurance fund. The guarantee of the fund may not exceed \$5 million, and when the fund reaches \$5 million, the guarantee will cease. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the surety of a grain warehouse fund to be established by the grain industry for the protection of farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 60 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit rural fire prevention districts in counties with populations over 400,000 to levy a tax at a rate not to exceed six cents (\$.06) per \$100 property valuation for the district, if the voters of the district approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum property tax rate that may be adopted by certain rural fire prevention districts, but only if approved by the districts' residents."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 48 proposes a constitutional amendment to extend the school ad valorem tax exemption for elderly persons to the surviving spouse of a person receiving the exemption. If a surviving spouse is at least 55 years old at the time of death of the person receiving the exemption, ad valorem public school taxes could not be increased as long as the homestead remained the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to limit school tax increases on the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person if the surviving spouse is at least 55 years of age."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to create programs and make loans and grants of money for development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment, stimulation of agricultural innovation, promotion of agricultural enterprises, and development of transportation and commerce. Bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes must be approved by the voters in the political subdivision seeking such funding sources.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide assistance to encourage economic development in the state."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment to permit the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to contract with the Texas Turnpike Authority and to contribute money to the costs of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges of the Authority. The amendment would authorize the governing body of a county with a population over 400,000, a county adjoining such county, and any city or district located in or partially in such county to make agreements with the Texas Turnpike Authority and levy ad valorem taxes to pay part or all of the principal and interest on Turnpike Authority bonds and to pay maintenance and operating expenses of the Turnpike Authority, if the voters approve the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing agreements between the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority and the governing bodies of counties with a population of more than 400,000, adjoining counties, and cities and districts located in those counties to aid turnpikes, toll roads, and toll bridges by guaranteeing bonds issued by the Texas Turnpike Authority."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to establish three separate development funds. A Texas product development fund could be established to aid in the development and production of new or improved products in the state. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$15 million of general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas small business incubator fund could be established to foster and stimulate the development of small businesses in the state. Small businesses operating under the program would be exempt from ad valorem taxation. The amendment would authorize the issuance of up to \$10 million in general obligation bonds to provide initial funding for the program. A Texas agricultural fund could be established to promote the production, processing and marketing of agricultural products produced primarily in Texas by small Texas agricultural businesses. The amendment would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$100 million outstanding at one time to carry out the agricultural fund program. The legislature could require review and approval of the issuance of bonds and the use of bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to be used for loans to local governments for acquisition, construction, repair, renovation, and equipment of public facilities or for grants to local governments for planning public facilities. The amendment would also permit the issuance of revenue bonds for the same purposes to be repaid from excess revenue from repayments of loans made under the amendment and from other revenues pledged to the retirement of revenue bonds. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance certain local public facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 56 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to be used to acquire, construct, and equip new correctional institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions or to repair existing institutions. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the projects to be financed by the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to corrections institutions

and mental health and mental retardation facilities."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that a state legislator is eligible to serve in another state office even if the compensation of the office was increased during his legislative term or even if the appointment is made in whole or in part (including Senate confirmation) by the legislature. The legislator could not, however, receive the increased compensation approved during his legislative term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a member of the legislature is eligible to be elected or appointed and to serve in a different state office but may not receive an increase in compensation granted to that office during the legislative term to which he was elected."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Subsections (d) and (e) of Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all tangible personal property except structures which are used as residential dwellings and property held or used for the production of income. This exemption would be in addition to the personal property homestead exemption already established by the constitution. If the legislature authorizes the exemption of additional personal property from taxation, under this amendment, local political subdivisions may pass resolutions providing for taxation of such property unless the property is exempt from ad valorem taxation under another law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1, Subsections (f) and (g) of Senate Joint Resolution 12 propose a constitutional amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation goods, wares, merchandise, and ores other than oil, gas and petroleum products. These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a married couple to agree in writing that all or part of their community property will become the property of the surviving spouse if one spouse dies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to hold community property with right of survivorship."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the creation of special districts to provide emergency services. The commissioners court in a county participating in a district could, upon approval of the voters, levy an

ad valorem tax of up to ten cents (\$.10) per \$100 valuation of the property located in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow for the creation and establishment, by law, of special districts to provide emergency services."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases. Under current law, only criminal defendants are allowed to appeal. This proposed amendment would allow the legislature to pass laws granting state prosecutors the right to appeal in limited circumstances.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment giving the state a limited right to appeal in criminal cases."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Gregg County and transfer the duties of that office to the county auditor or an elected official designated by the commissioners court. The amendment would also abolish the office of county treasurer in Fayette and Nueces counties if a majority of the voters in those counties vote in favor of the amendment. In Fayette County, the functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county auditor or the officer succeeding to the auditor's functions. In Nueces County, the powers, duties, and functions of the treasurer would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Gregg, Fayette, and Nueces counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the commissioners court in a county with a population of more than 150,000 to establish more than one Justice of the Peace court in each Justice of the Peace precinct, i.e., to provide for the election of more than one Justice of the Peace in each Justice of the Peace precinct.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that certain justice precincts may contain more than one justice of the peace court."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to define by law those municipal functions that are governmental and those that are proprietary. This authorization would apply to laws passed by the 70th Legislature, 1987, and by future legislatures in regular or special session. A municipality is liable for damages arising out of acts committed under its proprietary functions, but not its governmental functions. Definition of such functions by the legislature would clarify the liability of a municipality in civil lawsuits filed against it.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to define for all purposes the governmental and proprietary functions of a municipality."

PROPOSITION NO. 18 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts. Financing of a jail district could be accomplished through the issuance of bonds and other obligations, or by levy of an ad valorem tax on property located in the district if the qualified electors of a district approve an ad valorem tax or bonds secured by a property tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation, and financing of jail districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund undertakings related to a superconducting super collider research facility sponsored or authorized by the United States government, and to make appropriate grants for such undertakings."

PROPOSITION NO. 20 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for mobile offshore oil and gas well drilling equipment. The tax relief would be limited to equipment that is being stored while not in use in a county that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico or on a body of water that is adjacent to the Gulf of Mexico.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide ad valorem tax relief for certain offshore drilling equipment that is not in use."

PROPOSITION NO. 21 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative involvement in the executive branch of government by permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives in the membership of an agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch of government and performs executive functions. Under current law, the legislature is not allowed to exercise any powers in executive matters under Article II of the Texas Constitution, which provides for the "separation of powers" into three distinct departments.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to include the speaker of the house of representatives or the speaker's appointee in the membership of an executive agency or committee."

PROPOSITION NO. 22 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 53 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the term of office of a gubernatorial appointee to a vacancy in a state or district office to a partial, temporary term if the appointment is made on or after November 1 of the last year of the governor's term and the governor is not reelected. Under this amendment, the legislature may provide that the tenure of such an appointee would end sooner than the term would normally expire.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the authority of a governor to fill vacancies in state and district offices during the end of the governor's term if the governor is not reelected."

PROPOSITION NO. 23 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in water development bonds. Of the \$400 million authorized, \$200 million would be designated for conservation and development of water resources, \$150 million would be designated for water quality enhancement, and \$50 million would be designated for flood control. The amendment also authorizes the legislature to provide for review and approval of the issuance of the bonds and the use of the bond proceeds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$400 million of Texas Water Development Bonds for water supply, water quality, and flood control purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 24 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a county to use county equipment and personnel to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity if the commissioners court finds that the work will not interfere with the performance of county work and approves performance of the work. The governmental entity must be located wholly or partly in the county, and the governing body of the governmental entity must file a written work request with the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit a county to perform work, without compensation, for another governmental entity."

PROPOSITION NO. 25 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to authorize Randall County to levy a tax for the benefit of the Amarillo Hospital District. Any such tax could be levied only on property located outside the City of Amarillo and outside the South Randall County Hospital District. The tax could not be more than 75¢ per \$100 property valuation and would be effective only upon approval by the voters in the area to be taxed. If the tax is authorized by the Legislature and approved by voters, the Amarillo Hospital District is to serve residents of part of Randall County. If a tax is levied under this provision, Randall County must repay the State for the cost of publication of this amendment.

The proposed amendment also permits the legislature to authorize a hospital district to change its boundaries or jurisdiction if the district was created or authorized by a constitutional provision that includes a description of the boundaries or jurisdiction of the district. Any change in the boundaries or jurisdiction of such a hospital district would become effective only upon approval of the voters in the district.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve certain residents of Randall County, to authorize Randall County to provide financial assistance to the district, and to authorize certain hospital districts to change their boundaries or jurisdiction with voter approval."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 1

Senate Bill 86 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition passes, the Governor will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The State Board of Education shall be composed of members who are appointed from districts instead of elected, with equal representation throughout the State of Texas."

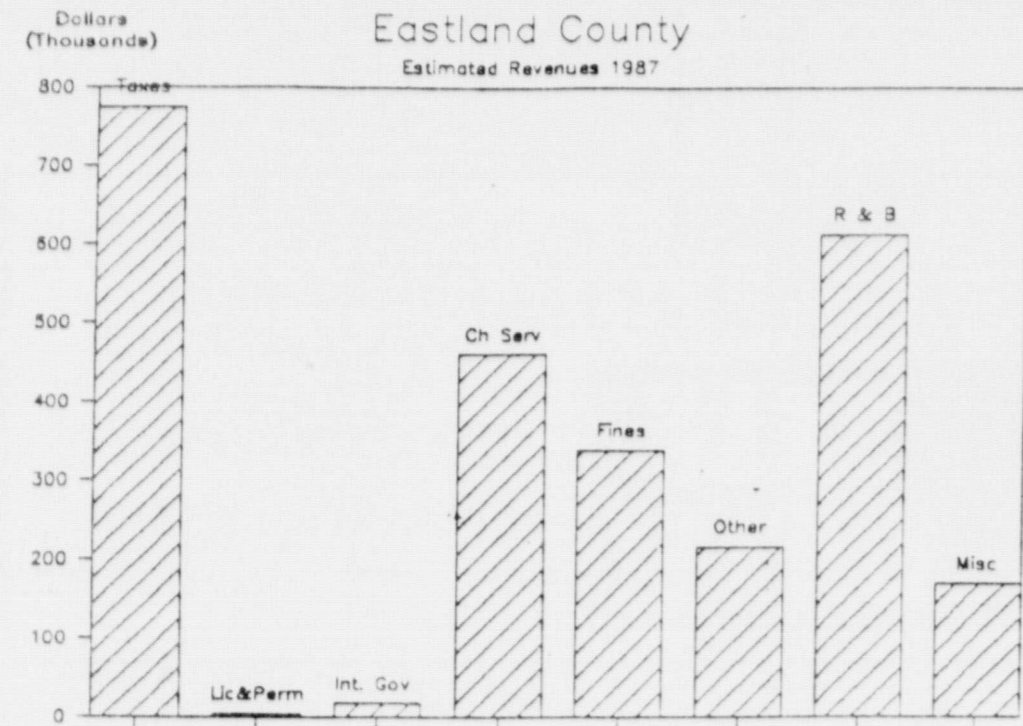
EXPLANATORY STATEMENT FOR STATEWIDE REFERENDUM NO. 2

The Texas Racing Act submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutuel wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If pari-mutuel wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on pari-mutuel wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.

The referendum will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The legalization of pari-mutuel wagering under the Texas Racing Act on a county-by-county local option basis." (7-10, 117)

CATEGORIES:

- Taxes - general tax revenue.
- Lic. and Perm. - Marriage License, beer, wine, boat, etc.
- Int. Gov. - Intergovernmental revenue from the state, fees on mixed drinks, Court service fees, etc.
- Ch. Serv. - Courthouse services of many kinds. They range from the County Judge's Probate fees to County Clerk's recording fees, financial statement fees, Probate fees, etc. There are auto registration fees, title application, Dist. Clerk's fees, and fees from Law Enforcement Departments.
- Fines - Fines and forfeitures, including County Court fines, District Court fines, and J.P. Court fines.
- Other - County Clerk Certified copies, Sheriff's Bond fees, interest on certain funds, etc.
- R&B - Road and Bridge fees collected on Road taxes, auto registrations, special R & B Auto Tax, etc.
- Misc. - County farm, other revenue sources not covered in above.

The Eastland County Commissioners Court has a number of decisions to make before the beginning of the next fiscal year on Oct. 1 - and most of them involve finances.

With estimated County revenues around \$2,800,000 (about the same as last year) the Commissioners are facing requests totalling \$3,100,000 or more from all Departments.

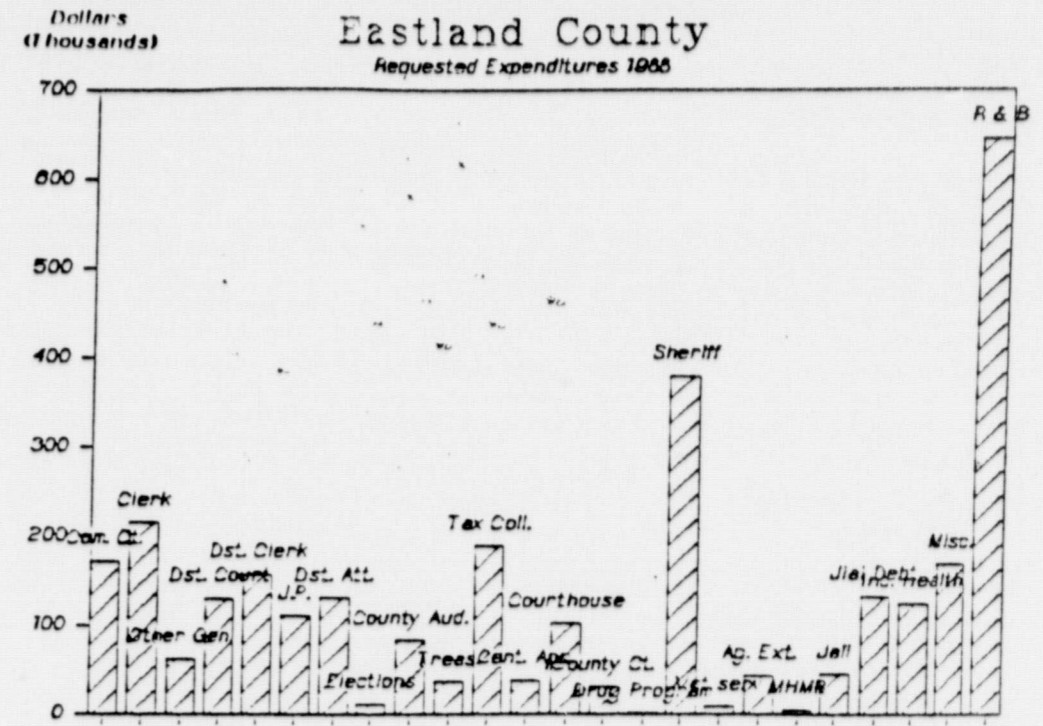
These include salary raises - large in some cases - hikes in the cost of insurance, a large raise in indigent health costs, the price of sophisticated office machines, and fees for attorneys, including those Court-appointed.

The Commissioners must also deal with the cost of transporting prisoners and keeping them in other county jails. Costs are apparently also up on maintaining unpaved county roads.

The only Departments (wholly county funded) which reportedly did not ask for salary raises are the County Treasurer and County Auditor's office.

County Judge Scott Bailey reported during a Commissioners meeting several weeks ago that if the County overspent its income by \$300,000 for three years it would be broke. So the Commissioners will be attempting to sort the needs from the wants among Department requests.

The next regular Court meeting will be Sept. 14, beginning at 10 a.m. A final budget may be approved at this time.

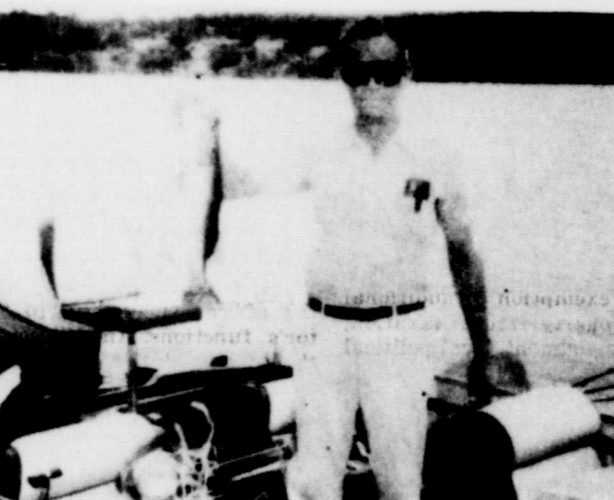
The Commissioners are working on the budget, and it is not known how much of it will be approved.

Some items listed for consideration on this budget are so small that it is difficult to register them on the graph. These include County Libraries, \$1,500, Child Welfare, \$2,000, Lunacy, Rural Fire Protection, etc. These are lumped under "Other general", or "Misc."

The small category listed as "Jail" includes janitorial supplies and other jail needs. "R&B" means "Road and Bridge", or funds set aside to maintain rural roads. "Courthouse" includes the maintenance of this building, its utilities, etc.

Adult and Juvenile Probation is included under "Misc." in this graph.

Children Need Social Security Cards

As more and more records are being kept which affect people in so many areas, there is a growing need for accurate information. In order to remove doubt and to prevent abuse, the information about a person needs to be provable. This has resulted in a greater demand for certified documents and Social Security cards. Birth certificates are now being required in Texas to show proof of citizenship for employment, for entering school the first time, for applying for Social Security, AFDC, passports and retirement benefits, and even for playing Little League baseball. Death certificates are needed for insurance and estate settlements. If you need such a document, the first question may well be, "Where do I get one?" The answer is not a simple one.

These events should be recorded at both the Bureau in Austin and at the local office where filed. Unfortunately, they are often on record at just one location. Certified birth certificates are required; hospital birth certificates are unacceptable. The local filing office for birth and death certificates has changed through the years as the laws have changed, leading to confusion. Eastland County people in rural areas and in cities other than Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger have always filed these documents with the County Clerk. People living in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger filed these documents with the County Clerk from 1903 until 1930 and from 1940 until 1950. Between 1930 until 1940, and after 1950 these documents were filed and are still being filed at city offices in the three cities. Death certificates are filed where the death occurred, not where the person is buried. Since 1966 marriages and since 1968, divorces have been placed on record in Austin. Mistakes are sometimes made on birth certificates, the sex or name listed may be wrong. These certificates are not changed but can be amended to show the correct name, sex and etc. If it happened before 1903,

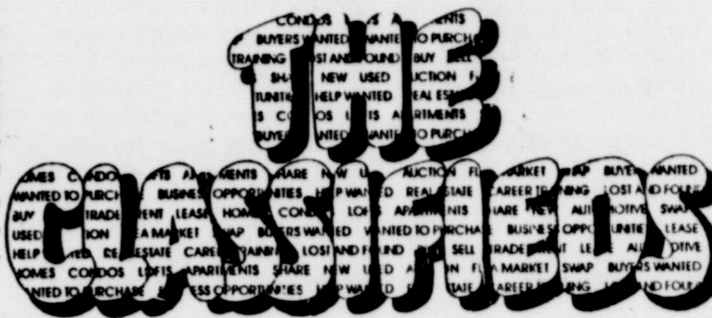
only a delayed certificate can be obtained. These were first obtained from a county judge on the basis of peoples statements. That process proved to provide unreliable certificates, so in the 1950s the place of application was changed to Austin and laws against giving untrue information in obtaining a certificate were stiffened. Old birth records list very little information and may take months to receive as they are not on computer, and in the 1930s not many people bothered to file them. Recent certificates are usually recorded on computers and are informative about the person's parents. The county clerk can provide information about acquiring certificates from other states. Birth certificate and first copy death certificates fees have been raised to \$7.50 beginning Sept. 1. Additional death certificates requested with the first copy are \$2. The I.N.S. law and greater demand with reduced funding has thrown the Bureau in Austin behind on meeting requests, but certificates on record there may be obtained in person or by mail at the Texas Dept. of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics, 1100 West 49th Street, Austin, Texas 78756-3191.

Boys and girls, ages 4 to 18 years, who want to register must bring a photostatic copy of their birth certificate. This will be the only day of registration for both fall and spring seasons. If a person desires to play in the spring season only, he or she must register on September 12, and indicate that is when he or she desires to play. For individuals who cannot make registration on September 12, applications are available at Play-Off Sports in Eastland thru September 18th. No applications will be accepted after September 18. The player fee is \$12 per person, and covers both or either fall or spring playing seasons. This fee is to be paid at the time of registration. All soccer games will be played in Eastland. However all practice sessions will be held in the player's hometown.

SUNDAY, SEPT. 13, is officially Grandparents Day (and the official opening day of NFL), so you might want to remember your grandparents in a special way for their day.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 12, is Cong. Charles Stenholm FUNDay at Ericksdale, and friends and supporters will want to attend.

TICKETS ARE still available for the Woody Herman Thundering Herd Concert to be held Saturday, Sept. 26 to officially re-open the Majestic Theatre in Eastland. (Tickets may be secured at the banks and savings and loan offices in the county as well as at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

IT IS HOPED that Woody Herman himself will be present but, given his age and physical condition, there's no guarantee. BUT, THE HERD will be in concert, so there's no reason not to attend. The Herman Sound will have proper representation in the newly-refurbished historic theatre.

At 74 years old, Herman is not young, and is not well - so it may be physically impossible for him to be here - but there's one thing which might influence his decision to be here: his close friendship with Eastland Band Director and Mrs. Phil Hewitt. Guesses are that if he is in any condition at all to travel, that he will make this "rig."

A USA TODAY writer recently said of Herman: "They call him 'the road father.'"

At 74, Woody Herman, with his Thundering Herd big band, still plays an average of 27 halls and ballrooms in as many cities each month. So extensively does his crisscross the country - the only major bandleader from the 1930s who still does - that he has barely spent 40 months in the Hollywood Hills home he bought 40 years ago.

He can't even take a vacation without getting on the phone to his agent to scare up some isolated gigs. "I'm so used to being involved with moving every day, after four or five days I wonder what to do with myself," he says during a stopover here.

His 50th anniversary year as a bandleader was particularly busy, first with a new album and then on July 16 with a special Hollywood Bowl concert featuring the Ebony Concerto for clarinet, which Stravinsky wrote for him.

The traveling gets more difficult every year, he admits.

"But music is a great escape. As long as you're playing, nobody can get to you - about anything. If you're an independent kind of person who values freedom in music, the best existence is to be on the road. If you stay in one area you'll soon be playing the music somebody else wants you to play."

Herman has survived trials that would make most people want to escape the

music professional together. During a low period in the 1950s, he did State Department tours of remote countries in Africa for lack of better work. In the 1960s, he tried, with mixed success, to attract a new audience by playing rock-jazz fusion and sharing the bill with such rock groups as The Who.

Three years ago, he opened his own nightclub in New Orleans. It failed to turn a profit and shut down after less than a year. The same month, Charlotte, his wife of 46 years, died.

Then, late last year, the Internal Revenue Service auctioned off his home. He still owes \$1.6 million in back taxes, the result, he says, of trusting to finances to a personal manager whose "gambling became a disease."

As a tenant, he still lives in his house with his only child, Ingrid, who manages "what's left of my affairs."

"People ask me why I'm not depressed," he says. "Well, I've been living with it for 25 years."

Still, Herman gives benefit concerts without hesitation, says saxophonist Stan Getz. "He's an all-giving guy."

As a bandleader, Herman is more an athletic coach than a dictator.

That's one of the reasons his hands play so well, says Leon Breeden, professor emeritus of jazz studies in North Texas State University in Denton, whose students have often graduated to Herman's band. "It makes you want to play music when you respect the guy who is up there."

Herman's sound came from his four saxophone lineup, Breeden says. "The combination of three tenors and a baritone gave it a deeper sound. You didn't hear a high alto until Woody came in."

"He's a man of the present, not a man of the past," says classical clarinetist Richard Stoltzman, who has toured with Herman and was guest star in his Hollywood Bowl concert. "He could just play simple licks and get away with it, but all of a sudden, he'll play something really outrageous - without a net!"

Yet as a clarinetist, Herman has never been considered in the same class as Benny Goodman or Artie Shaw. Herman has always been particularly modest about it.

After hearing Stoltzman perform the Ebony Concerto, the bandleader exclaimed he's heard the solo "played correctly - for once."

But when dealing with nostalgia-minded fans, Herman isn't always so congenial. Band member Frank Tiberi has heard Herman rebuff requests for Glenn Miller tunes by saying, "I'll tell Glenn when I see him high in the sky."

"I try not to be snide," Herman says. "I'll play any music that I have been involved with or am halfway responsible for. I don't want to play somebody else's dirty laundry."

Herman admits he has always considered audiences "the great unwashed. But you can't play down to them. If you do, you may make a million dollars, but you've lost anyway."

"The youth is changing - they're open to jazz. But general audiences are still the same in America as they've always been. They come in with a hangover and say, 'Entertain me.'"

Has he ever come close to quitting? "Oh, once a week. But after a breath or two, you just keep going. I've had a very good career and a very enjoyable one. I'm in reasonable shape. And I'm still doing what I was doing as a kid. Not many people are allowed that."

Opportunities Await 4-H Volunteers

The new 4-H year is about to start, and the 4-H program offers unlimited opportunities for volunteers to help young people learn and develop.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System. It focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of boys and girls in the third grade to 19 years of age, says Crystal Akers Wilbanks, county Extension agent and 4-H program coordinator. Its aim is to help young people develop through practical learning experiences such as preparing a nutrition meal, building bookshelves or growing a vegetable garden.

Since young people do not develop their skills and attitudes overnight, they need and seek guidance from 4-H volunteers who can help them probe the "why" as well as show them "how to do it."

Helping youth develop, however, requires different kinds of leadership. Crystal points out. For those who prefer to work primarily with youth, 4-H offers leadership roles related to the organization, project or activity aspects of a 4-H group.

While the "organization leader" guides the overall operation of a 4-H group, "project and activity leaders" help boys and girls learn by involving them in a specific project, such as clothing, auto repair and bicycle safety, and related activities such as safety clinics, exhibits and local tours. These leaders may, in turn, be assisted by junior and teen leaders who work closely with an adult or teen advisor.

Volunteers who prefer to work primarily with adults, also, have a wide range of choices, explains Crystal. A 4-H project or activity chair-

man helps other leaders with a specific project or activity. A 4-H recruiter seeks out youth and adults interested in becoming 4-H members or leaders, then allows the 4-H organizer to help the new group get started. Volunteers also are assisted by the 4-H trainer who helps train other leaders in the area and by the 4-H resource person who secures special materials or people from the community.

If you are interested in young people, want to share your talents and hobbies, and enjoy meeting other adults with your same interest, consider being a 4-H volunteer.

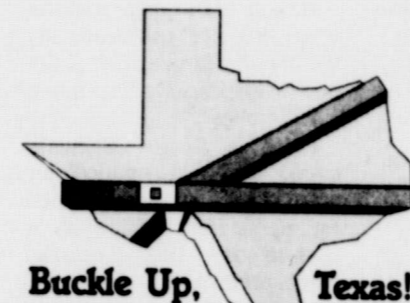

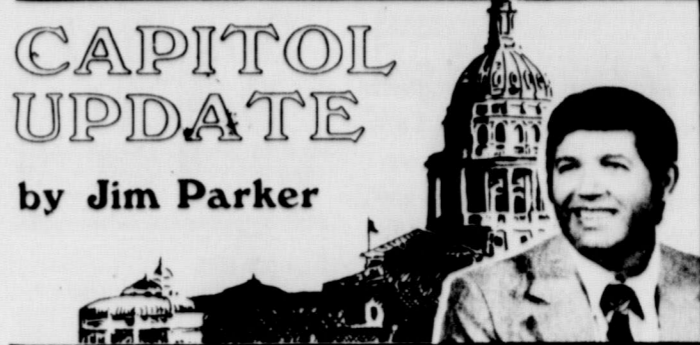

CAPITOL UPDATE

Did you hear a strange noise last week? If you did, that noise was a Texas tradition "biting the dust." Effective September 1, 1987, with no grace period, it is now a criminal offense to drink while operating a motor vehicle. Gone the way of the cowboy is the ability to stop and "grab a cool one" to drink on the way home.

For years there has been a clamor, especially among law enforcement officers, to prohibit drinking and driving and, when you think about it, it does make some sense. Given the statistics on alcohol-related traffic accidents and fatalities, we are probably tardy in taking steps to prohibit drinking while driving; but, as we so often do, we built some flaws into the program that, if not fatal to the program, cer-

tainly will cripple it.

The law, as written, applies only to the driver of the vehicle and does not apply to passengers which, in my opinion, likely makes it unenforceable in about 60 percent of the cases. Clearly, if you are driving down the road drinking an alcoholic beverage and you see a policeman about to stop you, you would hand your drink to the passenger if there is one. Also, you will notice the next time you go to your local convenience store that they sell wrappers with either velcro or magnetic fasteners that instantly turn your Bud-Lite can into a Coca-Cola can. It's still not against the law for law enforcement officers to observe you drinking from a Coca-Cola can even if the contents are 140-proof. The officer has no probable

cause to stop you because he cannot determine an offense is being committed.

Clearly, the better approach would have been to prohibit alcoholic beverages in the passenger compartment of the automobile. For reasons not fully understood by me, it appears that the State is not ready to go that far. I have a concern that the half-measure we have taken well divert already scarce police resources into areas where convictions will be extremely difficult and where, again, in many instances the law will be made a fool simply by the purchase of an inexpensive device to "hide the evidence."

I think Mrs. O'Leary's heart was in the right place the morning she went out to milk the cow. Still, her act resulted in the burning of Chicago. Often the legislature in its acts is not a great deal different than Mrs. O'Leary and her cow.

Sales of livestock are converted to dollars and the amount helps provide out patient treatments for the more than 11,000 handicapped children and adults who will be treated this year at the Rehab facilities.

The Round-Up idea began in Coke County back in 1960 on the late Conda Wylie's Fort Chadbourne ranch. He came to Shelley Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be cut from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses at the Rehab Center. This spontaneous gathering of livestock continues to be a vital part of the Center's annual budget which is generated by donations, gifts and third party reimbursements.

Since its establishment 34 years ago, WTRC has always aimed toward treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap. Treatment and diagnostic services provided include physical, occupational and speech therapy, audiology, orthotics, psychology, education, social services, and diagnostic clinics. Patients are admitted by referral, and are treated without charge except for braces and hearing aids.

Retirees Need To Apply for Benefits 2 Or 3 Months Before Retirement

People in the Big Country area who plan to retire at the end of the year should take some time soon to think about Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

A person should apply for Social Security benefits 2 or 3 months before he or she plans to retire. This way, benefits can begin shortly after income from work stops.

Before applying, a person should get the necessary evidence together, Hammons said. This will save time when you are ready to file your application. The first item a person needs is his or her Social Security card or a record of the number.

Next, proof of age is required. Preferred proof is an official record of birth or baptism recorded before age 5. If this does not exist, other proofs can be submitted. The people at the Abilene Social Security office can tell what kinds of other evidence can be used.

Records that might be used include: school, church, State or Federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passport, employment, military service, children's birth certificates, union, immigration or naturalization. This is not an exclusive list and other records may be acceptable.

Form W-2 or self-

employment tax return for the previous year should be provided. These are needed because recent earnings reports may not be in Social Security records.

A husband or wife who also plans to apply should have about the same documents. A marriage certificate may be required, but is not always needed. Information about any previous marriages is also needed.

Birth certificates of any

young, unmarried children for whom you are applying should be available.

Additional documentation may be required, depending on the particulars of certain cases. The people at the Social Security office will be glad to answer questions about retirement applications.

Dear Betty Crocker

Q. My muffins are often soggy? What's the solution?

A. Remove from muffin cups right away so they don't steam. Muffins are best served warm, anyway. Wrap leftovers tightly and store in refrigerator.

Q. Can I use my mixer for kneading bread dough?

A. When you use a dough hook on a standard counter-top mixer, the dough will be kneaded enough for satisfactory bread but volume may be lower than those kneaded by hand. Loaves mixed with a heavy-duty mixer will have higher volumes than with a standard model. Follow manufacturer's directions for best results.

A. How can I clean my wooden cutting board?

A. Clean wooden board surface regularly with a solution of one teaspoon chlorine bleach and 1/2 teaspoon vinegar to two quarts of water. Keep a plastic cutting board on hand to use with raw meat or poultry because the plastic is more easily cleaned.

Q. I'd like to know how to make flaky biscuits.

A. Use a pastry blender to cut in the shortening until the mixture resembles fine crumbs. The shortening surrounds particles of flour, creating layers. Then, knead the mixture lightly, ten times, to mix thoroughly.
