

Ralph Waldo Emerson once said, "Nothing can bring you peace but the triumph of principles". Do we admire or gather inspiration from any of our heroes, poets, or philosophers because they were first seeking security for them-sselves? James Byrnes in a speech at the last Conference of Southern Governors is re-ported to have said, in effect, that the people who settled this country did not come here to establish a government. They came to escape the tyran-nies of government. They were not seeking security, but an opportunity to enjoy freedom-the freedom of selfdevelopment and accomplishment. Today the spirit of selfreliance is unfortunately departing; too many want to lean upon the government; too many are thinking of security instead of opportunity.
TOO MANY "DEPENDANTS"

Who or what has encouraged his leaning, this moral weakness in the United States? Our government itself is encouraging it in every new proclamation. It urges more aid to farmers, more loans to small business, more health insurance and employment security. Each and every suggestion amounts to a promise to spend more as a charity to support this group or that-out of the peoples own hard-earned tax money. More- Aikin school laws. over, may I ask if the politicians nation, or to get the votes?

What happens when a man knows he's going to be supported whether he does a good job or a poor one? He loses all incentive to excel. The public must realize by now that too many of their government's employees feel "secure" in their jobs. Yet, they don't have to produce anything which must stand factory or retailer's or consumer's inspection. Even more discouraging is the attitude of some of our youth in the schools. A friend of mine, who is a teacher, says that healthy young men, in their early twenties, claim to be interested only in jobs which will offer them old age pensions and other benefits. As Americans, they should be ashamed of themselves. They should be looking toward jobs where there's a chance to work up, to earn advancement in an incentive system, not in a "sure thing" system. Pension systems should boom Florida and California real estate; pensions may help level retail sales over a period of years; but most pension systems will never increase the total national

Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to Presidents, said in a recent speech that we are swapping our inde pendence for a "false gospel of security", that the greatest threat to our freedom is "too much government". waged intensive campaigns to get children in school and keep them there, Sturgeon said. Schools have expanded or insti-

tuted classes in shop work to interest older children. Classes for handicapped children

have increased 50 per cent. They, like many other special school services, were made possible by allocation of state funds under Gilmer-

But even with the increase in attendance, there are still approximately 150,000 children of school age in Texas who are not enrolled, Sturgeon said. These are children whose parents are starting them in school a year late or older children who do not enter high school.

One of the most serious problems confronting school districts is lack of classroom facilities, according to Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Surveys by that organization and state school officials show that 50 percent of the school districts this year increased their classroom facilities. Many others will add classrooms during 1950 and '51, Tenny-

"These necessary additional facilities will be made available due to increased revenue obtained by the schools through the new and equitable laws which produce more School terms of six weeks to funds, from both state and local

Needs of Corn



Corn needs plenty to eat and drink to produce high protein vields.

You can get extra pounds of protein and more bushels per acre, too, with a well-rounded bill of fare based on good soil management. University of Illinois research men proved that in tests on a number of experiment fields.

H. J. Snider of the agronomy staff reports that good soil management increased the corn's protein content by nearly a pound per bushel. Corn grown on well treated land averaged 5.6 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 10 per cent of the total weight. Corn on untreated soil averaged only 4.8 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 8.5 per cent.

The well managed land had the benefit of liming and rotation built around well-fed deep-rooted legumes. The organic matter added by the legumes built good soil structure and tilth, improved the drainage and increased the soil's water holding capacity. That made it easier for corn roots to get at plant nutrients, oxygen and mois-

The fertilizer treatment included pkosphate and potash where needed. Oh soils requiring more nitroger than the legume crops provided, nitrogen fertilizer helped increase the corn's protein content. Snider says good soil management not only improved the corn's feeding value, but improves yield.

121/2 Million Fewer Mules And Horses in 30 Years

Today there are 71/2 million head of horses and mules on farms in the United States, a decrease of 121/2 million in the last 30 years.

Experts estimate that it took about 24 million acres of crop land to feed these 121/2 million animals. That amount of land, released to yield food, would provide for 11 million people. The horse population of the United States is expected to drop further.



TCA is particularly useful for the eradication of Bermuda and Johnson grass from fence rows, roadways, small spots in fields, and areas that are inaccessible for machinery. However, the cost of the compound prevents it being used for eradicating grass from large areas.

Normally some drying of plants can be seen in about 24 hours after the spray is applied, says Thornton, and most of the plants that are going to die will be dead within a week after being

sprayed.

If a rain occurs immediately after the spray is applied, some of the TCA will be carried away in runoff water, some will leach out through the soil, and the per cent kill will not be as high

TCA may affect the growth of plant life for 90 to 120 days after the date of application. The chemical action varies with different species of plants, and rainfall shortens the effective period of influence.

TCA proved to be very efficient for the eradication of Johnson grass in a thet run at the Blackland Experiment Station, Temple, Texas, and in tests run at experiment stations in other states. At the Blackland station, sodium TCA gave a 90 percent kill in 21 days





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

VALUABLE FACTS ABOUT MILK

May fish and milk be eaten safely at the same meal?

There is no reason why these 2 foods should not be eaten together. In fact, many common dishes are made of fish and milk—for example oyster stew, fish chowders and creamed

May milk and acid fruits be eaten together?

Yes. The objection often raised to taking milk and acid fruits at the same time is that the fruit causes the milk to curdle in the stomach. As a matter of fact, the first process of normal digestion is curdling, and the combination of acid fruits and milk is therefore favorable to good digestion.

How much milk should adults and children have daily? Every child needs a quart or more of milk every day, and

adults need at least a pint. Can other foods take the place of

No. Milk contains more of the food elements which the body needs daily than any other food. For example: calcium is the mineral necessary for strong bones and teeth. To obtain the amount of calcium which is present in one quart of milk a person would have to eat 39 eggs or 27 pounds of potatoes or 28 oranges or 71/2 pounds of carrots.

Is the need for milk ever outgrown? No. Children need large quantities of milk because it is

the best food for promoting health and growth. Adults need milk to maintain sound health—and to stay youthful. Why is milk necessary for tooth and bone development?

Milk is the richest, most dependable source of calcium. Calcium and phosphorous, both found abundantly in milk, are responsible for the hardness of teeth and bone,

What is homogenized milk? - Homogenized milk is whole milk which has undergone a

process which breaks up the globules of fat in the cream and distributes the futterfat evenly and uniformly throughout the milk. Nothing is added, and nothing is taken out. The result is smooth, rich-tasting milk. The butterfat cannot separate from the milk and rise to the top. What is pasteurized milk?

Pasteurized milk is safe milk. It is milk which has been

heated to destroy any harmful bacteria, if by chance they are present, then cooled and bottled in sterile containers. The temperature at which milk is pasteurized is far below the boiling point.

Does pasteurization affect the food value of milk?

Pasteurization has no significant effect on the food value of milk. Tests have shown that children grow just as well on pasteurized milk as on raw




