Callahan County Youngsters To Receive Calf Saturday

Saturday at 1 p. m. the climax of an exciting story will be reached when H. N. "Pat" Patterson, Baird Cafe owner, places into the hands of the county 4H club boys and girls and the F. F. A. members, a very special rope, the end of which will be attached to a blue ribbon steer.

Last May, Patterson entered a nation wide contest sponsored by Swift and Co., honoring their retiring Vice President, P. C. Smith. The contest emphasized the selling of beef and veal with judging to be done by experts in the field of promotion from the University of Chicago. With the competition nation wide in scope no one dreamed that a little fellow in a little town way out in the middle of West Texas would come up the winner. Certainly Bradford Burkhead, head of Swift and Co., in Abilene, didn't realize the possibilities of a man with a dream or he'd

never have made his joking remark to Patterson, "You win that calf, Pat, and I'll ride him down the Main Street of Baird." Patterson won the calf and (you guessed it) Burkhead has his work cut out for him. Patterson is holding him to the bargain made back in May and Burkhead agrees that you just better not underestimate a man with a determination like Pat's to win.

Patterson's dream when he entered the contest, was to win the prize steer and present it to the children of his county to help them finance a permanent home for their Junior Livestock Show held each year. The show attracts hundreds of youngsters and facilities for it are urgently needed. Glen Green, county agent, spoke for the four V. A. men, Claude Rock, O. B. Edmondson, "Red" Barron, and E. L. Reese, when he summed up the reasons for encouraging boys and girls in livestock rais-

ing with, "You never hear of much delinquency or other problems of our age when there is a boy on a rope with a calf at the end of it."

Saturday at 1 p. m. will be dream-come-true time for Pat Patterson when he receives the Prize Calf from Swift and Co. and presents it to the youngsters. It will be a great time for the young people too who see in the animal a step to accomplishing their live stock show barn project—and for Burkhead! Well, happy landing, fella!

A down town street parade is planned for Saturday afternoon. The parade will feature the calf in the position of honor with Swift officials, representatives of the county's civic organizations, and the 4-H and F. F. A. members taking a happy second place. Parade is scheduled for 1 p. m. sharp and a short program will follow.

Baird-Clyde Game Saturday

The Baird Bears play host to the Clyde Bulldogs Saturday night in their annual homecoming game. The Bears will pit their undefeated record against the twice beaten Bulldogs, however past scores can be thrown out the window when these two old rivals meet. The Bears have beaten Cross Plains, Woodson and Trent while Clyde has beaten Roby and lost to Rochester and Rule. The Bears have a slight edge in offense while Clyde has been able to hold their three opponents to total of only 28 points on defense while Baird has given up 30 points.

Both teams will have experience back from last years team with Baird being able to field 6 starters from last years team and Clyde 8 starters. Baird will have 6 seniors in their starting lineup while Clyde will probably start 8.

Clyde will be playing under a new coach in Ed Farmer who was assistant at Clyde last year replacing Don Allen.

Both teams will about equal in weight in both the line and the backfield. Baird should be at full strength for the first time this year with all of the minor injuries beginning to heal and with defensive half-back Mike Odom ready to go at full strength for the first time this year. Baird will be able to rest at least 4 boys on defense including all of its backfield. Odom and Ross Odell will play at defensive backs while Wayne Boyd, Dale Coley and Harvey Christensen will start in the backfield along with Terry Joy regular quarterback.

Game time is at 8:00 at Bear stadium.

About Your Health . .

A man in La Pryor in Southwest Texas reports finding 64 dead cotton rats in a single night on the lawn of his home, apparently killed by his dogs. In Crystal City the cantaloupe crop has been severely damaged by rats.

From Austin comes reports of rats in back yards where none have been seen before, and of mice in suburban homes. In Abilene and Wichita Falls increases in rat and mice populations have been noted. Farmers southwest of San Antonio have experienced serious losses to small grains, peanuts and tomatoes due to rodent depredations.

What's behind these unusually high rodent populations? It is impossible to give a definite answer, but State Health Department and Fish and Wildlife Service investigators feel increased rainfall had a lot to do with it.

Rains caused dense vegetation growth where rats and mice could take cover and raise young, safely hidden from natural enemies. Also, farm crops have been good, providing a ready source of food.

State and local health departments have made intensive field

investigations, and laboratory tests have been made on live and dead specimens of rats and mice. This conclusion has been reached:

There is no evidence at this time of a specific threat to public health. At present the problem seems to be more of an economic and nuisance nature.

While this conclusion is reassuring, it does not mean rodent-borne disease outbreaks are impossible. Rodents can serve as reservoirs for various diseases transmissible to humans, and are hosts to a variety of disease-carrying parasites such as fleas.

Here are some things homeowners can do to control rats and mice around their property:

Search for and close up all portals of entry. One Austin man looked for days for an opening to his house large enough to admit mice. He finally found it—a half-inch space around the pilot control on the floor furnace. A piece of hardware cloth or steel wool make good blocks for places like this.

Set traps and practice scrupulous home and premise sanitation. Get rid of all grass, stacked lumber or anything else that might harbor rodents. Bites of rodents or their fleas should be reported to local health authorities.

These are strictly preventive measures and do not imply the existence of rodent-borne diseases in epidemic proportions. State Health Department

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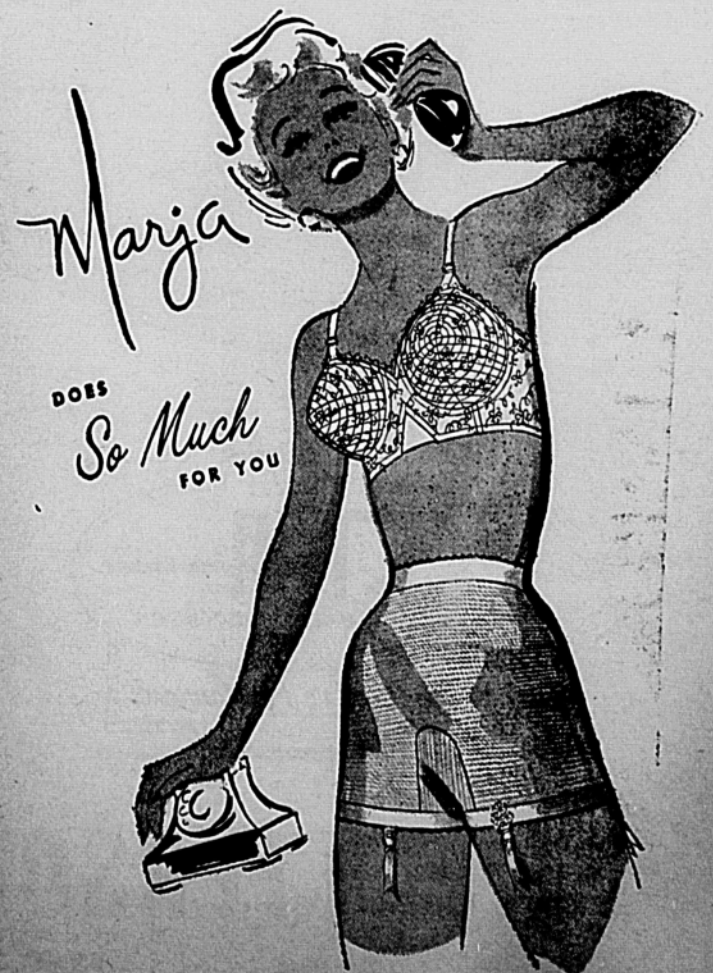
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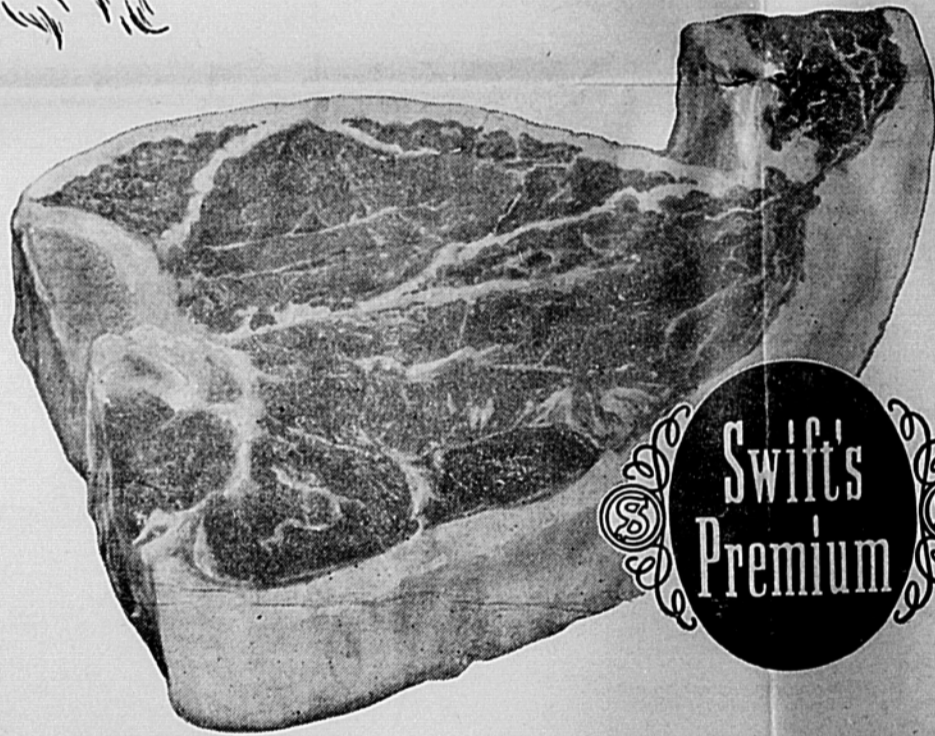
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Oplin Observations

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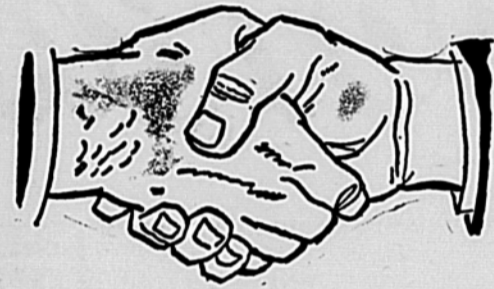
