More Funds Available For County Resource Assc.

The Eastland County Resource Association heard great news at a meeting Tuesday, Nov. 21.

Director Corrie Cowley told the group that an anonymous donor had given \$500 to be used for chronically ill and disabled children's services. This is one of the needs the community-service Association has assisted with.

The \$500 will go into a special fund for transportation and other costs related to the medical care for Eastland County ill or disabled children.

Corrie Cowley also told of a meeting of the County Resource Association Executive Committee. A recommendation was made that the Association set up a voucher system at various local stores, so people can go there to have critical needs filled.

This measure was voted on and approved by the members present. Persons with special needs are usually directed to the Association by other agencies.

Corrie Cowley also announced plans for a membership fund-raising letter to go out to the area from the Association.

Peggy Roberts, Director of the Multipurpose Center, brought the group a current report on the work and needs of this agency.

She said she had only a few needs now for winter clothing - more sweaters, sweat suits, and children's shoes. She explained that many elderly people wore sweat suits

during the winter for warmth, so these were in much demand.

She reminded those present that the Multipurpose Center, located at 204 N. Lamar, serves the whole county. The Food Pantry, operated by volunteers, is an important part of the Multipurpose Center. Mrs. Roberts asked Lois Robinson, one of the Food Pantry Board members, to tell about current needs.

Mrs. Robinson said that the community was really generous with donations for the Food Pantry. A recent Stew and Cornbread Supper had brought in extra funds to help purchase staple foodstuff. Members of the Board as well as non-members donated time to prepare and serve the food. A lot of food was donated for the supper, as well as tickets purchased and cash donations given.

Recently the Eastland Boy Scouts made a Food Drive in the City. They brought the Food Pantry 19 sacks of food, 3 boxes, and \$14 in cash donated, Mrs. Robinson said. The boys did a great job on the drive.

She added that lots of Churches have been donating supplies to the Food Pantry.

Right now one of the main needs of the Food Pantry is meat, Mrs. Robinson stated. If anyone has any extra deer meat to donate, that would be fine. The Food Pantry has a small freezer where this can be stored. The Pantry is open

Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m.

Another report came to the Resource Association from Cherre Livingston, who works with the Headstart Program in Cisco. She said the 20 children in Headstart are learning a number of things that will help them in school. They are also getting some of their dental and medical needs met.

Sometimes they have parties in the school, and merchants have donated things for these special occasions.

Mrs. Livingston said parents of the children made quilts for nap times at the school, but they are still short six quilts for the children to cover with. She invited all interested people to visit the Headstart classroom at 901 W. 7th in Cisco - and the school hours are 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. weekdays.

Pharmacy Topics

Smoking directly affects cholesterol levels, says the American Health Foundation. Tests indicate that each cigarette per day raises total cholesterol by half a point; quitting brings it down again.

People who take aspirin and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs in arthritis-fighting doses are more likely to be hospitalized for ulcers, the British Medical Journal reports. (The Food and Drug Administration now requires warning of this on labels.)

Instead of surgery to remove gallstones, doctors at Mayo Clinic have been injecting ether into the gallbladder to dissolve the stones.

Combination of medications seems to slow the progress of diabetic kidney failure and may even prevent it. Reported in the British Medical Journal, the treatment uses captopril, an antihypertension drug, and a thiazide diuretic. United States tests are starting.

Liquid dosages of acetaminophen should not be used interchangeably. Drops for babies have 500 mg. per teaspoon, children's elixir only 160 mg.

"Men Must Understand One Another Before nations Can" People To People

(ED. NOTE: Isn't it nice) to think that maybe a seed planted 15 years ago by a bunch of Texas newspaper people in Communist Europe might in some way today be helping Democracy bloom in that area? It was a cold, cold war in progress in 1974 when Gaynell and I were among a Texas Press Association delegation visiting the Soviet Union, East Germany and other points in Europe. The late president Dwight Eisenhower is founder of People-to-People (which is still active today). More of their slogan reads: "If people get together, so eventually will governments." The following are snippets of our observations as we recorded them at the time and following trip.)

GAY NELL:

The contrast between the countries of the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe to Western Europe is incomprehensible—even after being there.

We realized how much the Western nations and especially the Communists are in the dark about many newsworthy events that happen within the Communist world and elsewhere.

We truly believe that the people of all the nations we visited want peace. There are controversies as to how to achieve it. To the Communist, socialism is the only answer. To Western Europeans, either "detente" or a stronger anti-Communism movement is the answer.

To the United States, all of this may be a warning: to strike a happy medium between "detente" and a stronger awareness of the ultimate Communist goal of

control through socialism, therefore exercising a stronger anti-Communism position.

American citizens can't be too patriotic in view of the threat that exists just a few jet miles away in the form of the Soviet Union and its East Europe Communist puppets.

The difference in ideology is simply a matter of whether one believes in a free or a slave state.

The "workers' paradise" of the U.S.S.R. and East Germany is a bondage of minds behind a wall of shame. We saw a little more than they wanted us to, and talked to enough people to believe that all people want peace—but we are now more convinced than ever that the Soviet's one goal is to socialize the world.

For America: I may take the spirit of "Remember the Pearl Harbor" or even "Remember the Alamo."

"To be born in America is an accident, to live in America is a privilege. To die in and for America and to leave it to our children is both a duty and responsibility."

These parting words by a "People-to-People" representative in a briefing before we left Houston for Amsterdam have rung loud and clear throughout our entire tour, especially in the Soviet Union.

After spending eight days in virtual isolation of news from the "Free World," our hearts breathed a sigh of relief upon entering Berlin and tuning into an English speaking military radio station with world and U.S. news each half hour.

Then again upon arrival in New York, our hearts were

made grateful for a safe return to our country.

The joy welled higher, despite the tiring 24 hour day (we left Madrid at 2:15 p.m., arriving New York at 3:45 p.m.—gaining seven hours there and another hour in Texas) as we arrived in our own state of Texas via New Orleans.

Needless to say the big moment came when we flew over beautiful Eastland County and Lake Leon and were reunited with our children and family at the local airport.

People-to-People is not a regimented organization. It encourages you to merely carry out one of the finest duties a citizen can possibly perform. It is to make others in other lands understand that we are peaceful and to gain from them the conviction that they are likewise peaceful and want to know more about us.

What I am trying to say is that each of us can join People-to-People very profitably. Each of us can find a friend. Or we can do something to support those who are trying to make friends because there is reward in the satisfaction that you have done something to remove the misunderstanding, suspicion, and prejudice from this world. Because, you see, everyone who has traveled extensively knows this—that no people wants war.

Every single people in the world, including the Red Chinese, do not want to be marched up to the battleline and be mowed down and lose their lives.

Why, then, we ask with people sharing this common and noble aspiration, why do we have misunderstandings? Well, it comes about unquestionably by our parochialism, brought about possibly by false political leaders who either misunderstand others or misinterpret the opinions of others and the feelings of others to us.

Fishing Outdoors

by Terry L. Wilson

Our water temperatures on area lakes are dropping into the low low 50's. This should tell us two things, its time to slow your baits down and its jig and pig time.

As water temperatures cool a bass will become somewhat less active and especially won't chase a bait that's far off. So we as anglers should make an extra effort to cover every few inches of the water we are fishing. And cover it slowly as if you were dragging bottom for a lost rod. The rewards can be even greater.

The need to work slower at this time is the main reason I choose a jig as my attack bait. This lure can be worked at any speed or even as a dead bait. When using the dead bait method, pork will give the bait a very subtle movement without moving the jig itself.

A popular question I'm asked is what weight jig am I using? I personally use the lightest weight the fishing conditions (wind, cover and bait speed wanted) allow.

Color to me is important only in my mind. I'm sure in clearer water than I fish that properly matched jig and trailer colors do become important. I stay with black and chartreuse or black and blue when using rubber jigs.

My hair jigs I use black and red also.

If you are a long time reader of "Fishing Outdoors" you know how much I depend on a jig in my fishing, not only in the winter. One of the few times I don't fish 90 percent with a jig is Spring. I'll swap off to a worm or craw-worm.

Since we all know how cold it is these days on the lake let's don't forget to carry some

extra clothes just in case.

The Eastland County Bass Club board of directors did vote to have the final tournament of 1989, December 2, 1989 at Brady Lake as I suspected last article. This move was made at the request of anglers who have been attending monthly club tournaments often.

Don't forget December 7, 1989 will be the most important club meeting you could attend. If you are considering joining the E.C.B.C. for 1990 you should come to this one. Elections for the 1990 year will be done and there will be

lots of discussion concerning proposed changes. So if you have some ideas why not come sit in. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the Eastland National Bank Bld. See you all there.

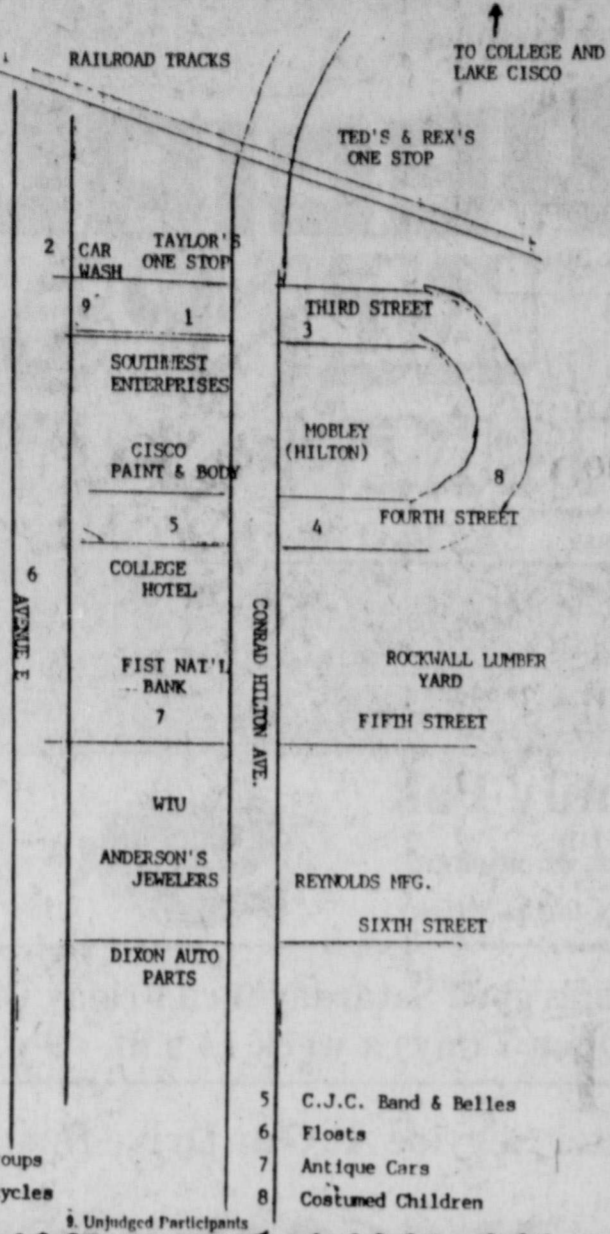

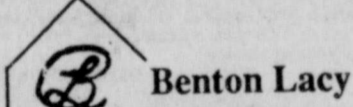
