





Fishing prospects are excellent for three species of bass at Possum Kingdom Reservoir, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife

Biologists using electroshocking gear to temporarily stun fish found significant increases in number and size of largemouth, smallmouth and spotted bass in a 1989

survey, compared to an identical survey conducted in 1987, according to biologist Bruce Hysmith of Denison.

The per-hour catch rate during surveys increased from 24 largemouths in 1987 to 126.5 in 1988; spotted bass from three per hour to 12.5, and smallmouths showed a gain from 0.5 per hour to six during the same period.

Reproduction and survival. of young largemouth bass apparently was excellent during the past two years. because 50 percent of our catch were less than eight inches long and 22 percent were between eight and 12 inches long. Hysmith noted, "Also, the percentage of largemouths 15 inches and larger more than doubled, and a five-pound, 21-inch largemouth collected in 1989 was around two pounds heavier and three inches longer than the largest collected in 1987."

Hysmith theorized that three factors have contributed to Possum Kingdoms fisherys improvements. "One factor is the 1.6 million Floridastrain largemouthes the department has stocked between 1973 and 1978," Hysmith said, adding that samples during 1987 indicated that 70 percent of the largemouths in the lake were either Florida bass or offspring of the fastgrowing Florida strain.

Another possible factor is the 14-inch minimum length limit and five per day bag limit established for bass September 1986, which afforded extra protection for the larger bass.

A third possible reason for the resugence may surprise some fishermen. Hysmith said,"Lowering off the water level in 1987 for dam repairs may have made more prey fishes available to predator fish such as bass, allowing faster growth rates. Then the lake came back up in the spring of 1989 and forage fish such as threadfin shad and bluegills had a bumper spawning season."

Hysmith said Possum Kingdom has entered the trophy bass derby, with two largemouths over 13 pounds caught in 1986 and a 16 poun-

Troopers assisted in stopping a vehicle which resulted in the arrest of two major drug dealers and the seizure of



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

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#### **Texas Leads All States** In Number Of Worker Deaths

According to officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), more than 700 job-related deaths occur yearly in Texas, more employee deaths than are reported in any other state.

These fatalities and the thousands of injuries suffered by Texas' workforce have creaed a crisis, affecting the state's health care, insurance, and regulatory systems. In response, the state's lawmakers are proposing reforms throughout the Texas workers' compensation system.

However, Dr. Robert Bernstein, Commissioner of Health, has said, "In the search for a better workers' compensation system, thus far the greatest emphasis has been placed on containing costs. There needs to be more attention given to increasing worker safety and on preventin injuries.'

A recently completed TDH study is perhaps the most accurate measure to date of the number of the state's occupational deaths. The federally funded study compared fatality information from four government sources to reach its conclu-

In addition to its own collected data, the department's Occupational Safety and Health Division used records from the Texas Industrial Accident Board, the U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics to create a single list for the

1986 calendar year. eliminating After duplicated cases, victims of heart attacks, and other illnesses not directly related to workplace incidents, the study confirmed that 715 people died in 1986 because of traumatic events traced to

their work.

The study's results were consistent with the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health's finding that Texas sustained more job-related deaths than any other state, with an average of 725 such fatalities each year between 1980 and 1985. Jerry Lauderdale, Oc-

cupational Safety and Health Division director, said, 'These numbers are alarming. But the most disturbing fact is that many of these deaths and countless other occupational injuries and illnesses could be prevented by relatively inexpensive safety measures."

He added, "We think our study will be invaluable to lawmakers, as they meet again to try to solve the state's crisis over workers' compensation. One of the greatest stumbling blocks they have is a lack of reliable numbers. We think we have supplied some solid data, not only to underscore the urgency for greater safety for workers in Texas, but to show where the safeguards are needed.'

The TDH study categorizes fatalities by type of accident or illness, county, industry, occupation, age group, gender, race, and either public or private sec-

Lauderdale said that TDH has been unable to conduct a similar study of on-the-job injuries since 1976, when the department's state funds for tracking occupational injuries were deleted.

'The only other state authority directly concerned with on-the-job injuries is the Industrial Accident Board, which oversees workers' compensation claims. Only about two-thirds of Texas' 300,000-plus employers participate in the workers' compensation program, and no

one really knows how many injuries go unreported." According to Lauderdale, TDH has authority, when invited by the employer, to inspect worksites for hazards,

and help employers eliminate those hazards. 'We have no direct enforcement authority against violators of federal regulations. Even if we did, we have only 17 safety and health consultants on staff for the whole state. The U.S. Department of Labor has said that staff should number at least 100, just to make routine inspections."

Lauderdale said that the state allocates only about \$200,000 yearly for his program. That funding is supplemented by a 90 percent federal match.

"Clearly more funding, people and authority are necessary if we are going to reduce the number of fatalities and injuries in this state's workplaces." Lauderdale said. He added that, "Not only are people being killed and injured at an alarming rate each year in Texas, but also the costs for their care have skyrocketed beyond amounts their employers and insurance companies are able to pay.

The State Board of Insurance confirms that although employers paid premiums in excess of \$2.96 billion last year, the insurance companies paid out some \$3.16 billion in worker's compensation claims. Some insurance companies now have ceased to offer workers' compensation plans, while others have asked for a dramatic increase in their rates.

The result is that an increasing number of injured employees and the survivors of those who are killed on the job are not being compen- . sated. "Many of them have no recourse but to rely on public assistance to meet their expenses," Lauderdale

'One solution to the problem of rising insurance rates is injury prevention. Where effective prevention programs are in place, deaths, injuries, and premium rates go down. The state of Oklahome, for example, suggests that such programs can reduce claims by as much as 50 percent," he add-

To prevent the spread of brucellosis, TAHC regulations require ranchers to have cattle tested before they are exhibited or sold. Exempt from the regulation are ranchers who show or sell cattle certified by the TAHC to be free of the disease.

which veterinarians accredited by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and the TAHC receive the kits and are permitted to use them at farms and ranches. In all other

states, test supplies are restricted to livestock

Cattle that have negative results on the card test are allowed to be sold and moved without restrictions. However, if confirmation tests detect infection, TAHC officials trace the animal to its new site for additional tests or condemnation. Producers whose cattle react positively to the card test may choose either to have the animals slaughtered, or keep them on their ranch until laboratory test results are provided.

Because there is no cure for brucellosis, infected cattle are slaughtered (the meat is safe to eat), and are exposed herds are tested and quarantined by the TAHC.

"In October, 675 herds were quarantined because of brucellosis-a record low. Testing is the key to finding and eradicating the disease and it's routinely done at the livestock markets," said Holcombe. "For private sales, testing also is required but often is avoided. Producers who buy directly should protect their interests by insisting that animals are tested."

"Ranchers are shocked when they learn that a new or 'purchased addition' cow has spread infection in their herd," he said. "It's a high price to pay for neglecting to test an animal, because movement and sale of animals from a quarantined herd is severly restricted for six months to a year, or

#### Texas`12th Graders Smoke Less Than Nat'l Average

Daily smoking rates for Texas 12th graders are eight percent lower than those for 12th graders nationwide, according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

Dr. Robert Bernstein, Commissioner of Health, said that more than 4,200 students in grades seven, eight, 10 and 12 were surveyed last spring by the University of Texas Health Science Center in Houston. Funds for the survey were provided by the TDH Office of Smoking and Health and the Texas Cancer Council. Fifteen Texas school districts participated.

The researchers found that daily smoking rates for the state's seniors were 4.5 percent lower for males and 8.4 percent lower for females than those reported at the national level.

Dr. Bernstein added that, compared with the national levels, a similar proportion of Texas students in the seventh, eighth and 10th grades said they had experimented with smoking 30

days before the survey. Of those surveyed in all grades, 23 percent of the males and 21 percent of the females reported having smoked at some time during the past year. Fifteen per-

cent of seventh graders, 24 percent of eighth graders, 25 percent of 10th graders and 29 percent of 12th graders reported having at least puffed on a cigarette at some time during the past year.


Smokeless tobacco use remains high in Texas, according to the survey, with 13.6 percent of the male students in grades seven, eight, 10 and 12 reporting some use in the past 30 days. Use of chewing tobacco among males increased by student age, from 7.9 percent among seventh grade students to 19.5 percent among 12th graders.

"Preventing tobacco use by young people is particularly important because those who begin using tobacco early are less likely to quit and are more likely to die from tobacco related diseases such as cancer and heart disease," Dr. Bernstein said.

"It is encouraging to see lower daily smoking rates among Texas 12th graders, and we certainly hope this trend continues. However, we cannot become complacent with our efforts to reduce tobacco use. Children are surrounded by cigarette advertising on billboards, in magazines, newspapers and at sporting events that depict smoking as a safe, if not healthful activity. It is unfortunate that we, as a society, allow the most common preventable cause of death to be one of the most heavily advertised contein said.

Smoking directly affects cholesterol levels, says the American Health Foundation. Tests indicate that each cigarette per day raises total cholesterol by half a point; quitting brings it down again.

People who take aspirin and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs in arthritis-fighting doses are more likely to be hospitalized for ulcers, the British Medical Journal reports. (The Food and Drug Administration now requires warning of this on labels.)

Instead of surgery to remove gallstones, doctors at Mayo Clinic have been injecting ether into the gallbladder to dissolve the stones.

Combination of medications seems to slow the progress of diabetic kidney failure and may even prevent it. Reported in the British Medical Journal, the treatment uses captopril, an antihypertension drug, and a thiazide diurectic. United States tests are starting.

Liquid dosages of acetaminophen should not be used interchangeably. Drops for babies have 500 mg. per teaspoon, children's elixir only 160 mg.

On the Texas front, several policies were adopted concering the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). One resolution stated the main purpose of TDA should be to promote agriculture in the state. Another called for TDA's new pesticide board to review pesticide regulations instituted during the past five years and amend or delete those guidelines deemed unworkable.

In other state matters, delegates proposed that the Texas Legislature designate the Texas Water Commission as the lead agency for water and water quality, that a public education program should emphasize that the U.S. has the world's safest food supply, and that all governmental agencies responsible for the maintenance of stateowned lands should use all means available to control the

Imported Fire Ant. On the national level, delegates called for a national farm program that provides efficient producers with a profit during years of normal production, and also controls agricultural production at "reasonable levels" needed for domestic and export markets and to prevent a buildup of excess stocks.

Other recommendations called for major changes in the Federal Crop Insurance program, a two-tier dairy price program, and for scientific facts to be used by lawmakers responsible for setting farm program regulations as a basis for setting environmental restrictions on agri-

Many other activities were held during the four-day convention, including naming of the Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher and youth contest winners.

#### Counseling Conference Focuses On Occult And Satanism At Hardin-Simmons

A counseling conference held Nov. 7 at Hardin-Simmons University focused on the occult and Satanism. The conference was sponsored by HSU's Department of Counseling and Human Development and the Office of Student Development Ser-

Roy Rodriguez, Jr. and Ismael Sanchez were the speakers.

"I believe it's important that we educate ourselves," said Rodriguez. "There are many types of occult practices.

"We are not here to create paranoia or a witch hunt. We're here to become more informed.

Rodriguez, a former narcotics agent for the Houston Police Department and the Federal Drug Enforcement Association, now owns a consulting firm. He also supervised civicl, criminal and undercover narcotics operations in North and South American countries and Caribbean countries

"The traditional form of Satanism is a very structured, secretive organization," said Rodriguez. "Part of their belief system is that everything you do is okay."

Rodriguez said the other forms of Satanism are the dabblers, the self-styled and the youth subculture.

"All of them will be involved in the drug scene, without exception," said Rodriguez.

The levels of involvement, according to Rodriguez, are fun and games, experimentation with a more serious interest, serious involvement and criminal involvement.

"In so many of the beliefs. criminal activity is a way of moving up in the group,"

said Rodriguez. "Law enforcement can get involved and investigate when criminal activity starts."

Santeria is the occult practice that has recently made America realize the danger of Satanic and occult activity. A form of Santeria called Brujeria practices human sacrifices, and made headlines with a case in New Mexico where many people were found murdered earlier

Rodriguez mentioned several warning signs that may reflect an interest in the occult or Satanism: obsession with black clothing, selfmutilation or markings on the body, drawings that depict occult symbols or deface Christianity, a hostile attitude toward God and Christianity, secretive or violent behavior, possession of albums and T-shirts with Satanic sumbols, possession of occult or Satanic books and fascination with blood, death or suicide

"Young people are looking for direction, but unfortunately, in our society that direction from parents is dropping off," said Rodriguez. "If we don't provide direction, they'ss find direction.

Rodriguez showed a video tape that empasized the impact of music on young people and the importance of encouraging children to choose music with positive themes. The video showed many bands, mostly heavy metal, whose albums and concert performances have an occult influence and depict graphic violence, sex, rape and drug

"Don't go home and burn all the rock'n roll albums

your kids have, but be aware of what they're listening to," said Rodriguez. "The medium of music is powerful. It can be positive or

The video briefly mentioned some popular bands whose messages are positive. The conference displays also included a list of contemporary Christian bands, with styles ranging from pop to heavy metal, emphasizing the point that these bands are a positive

alternative. Sanchez spoke about specific rituals, symbols, experimentation and roleplaying games. Sanchez, a former probation worker, is program coordinator in substance abuse education for the Scenic Mountain Medical Center in Big Spring. TX., and a criminal justice instructor at HSU.

"They infiltrate school systems and churches," said Sanchez. "They raise their own human sacrifices and abuse them in front of pictures of Jesus or a person dressed as a policeman or a priest. They also pick up hit-

Sanchez discussed some of the dates on the Satanic calender, including days where animal or people were sacrificed. The rituals are practiced by groups called covens, that range from nine to 40 members, but ideally have 13 members.

"The body of the victim is usually eaten," said Sanchez. "The coven eats the insides then gives the meat to a dog, who is ritualized.

"They will dry out the bones and wear parts of them as necklaces. Sanchez has found that

people are unwilling to

believe the occult is a real problem, though he has encountered it almost every place he has been, and despite the fact that 172 occult movements are currently in practice.

"The fastest growing religion in Europe is witchcraft." said Sanchez. "The fastest growing religion in America is Satanism.

"Our military acknowledges Satanic holidays. We have found teachers in public schools who like to teach their students occult rituals.'

Sanchez described many occult symbols: 666, FFF (Fis the sixth letter of the alphabet), three interconnecting symbols, a circle with darkness and light interlocked, pentagrams, hexagrams, swastikas, crescent moons with a star, the Egyptian ankh (good luck sign), inverted crosses and peace

'Peace signs are often used, but most people who wear them don't realize what they mean," said Sanchez. "The peace sign symbolizes the defeat of Christianity.

Sanchez warned that people are lured into the occult by the appeal of power and through role-playing games, magazines, channeling, astrology, music and movies. He urged parents to spend more time with their children

"Identify the problem," said Sanchez. "See what they're into. Look into their rooms. Stop and take note."

The medical center where Sanchez works has a recovery program for people involved in the occult. The toll free, confidential number is 1-800-592-ROAD.
