



Moore. The new city regulations are expected to be finalized and published in February. 1990. The Texas Department of Health will then have 18 months to prepare and initiate their enforcement criteria, rules and procedures.

New regulations requirements include new fees to be paid to the state, \$.50 per ton, to pay for their new and increased enforcement activities. This would cost the City of Cisco some \$5,600 per year for its 4500 residents, according to Mr. Moore. Other new regulations would be 30 years monitoring of closed landfills, instead of the current five years, to include water monitoring wells; establishing a 30-year untouchable escrow account

Along with discussing the new EPA regulations, the council discussed alter-

collection and disposal of Cisco's garbage, and participating in a regional landfill with other Eastland Hector H. Mendieta, P.E.,

Director of the Texas Department of Health's Municipal Solid Waste Management program has estimated that a minimum service population of 50,000 people will be necessary to support a landfill operation. He said that with EPA's current target for adoption of the rules in December of 1989, with an effective date

18 months thereafter, it is extremely imperative that regional planning councils and local governments start developing tentative plans for consolidating activities and be prepared to refine those plans upon adoption of the rules so as to comply with the new requirements on the effective date."

After the effective date of the criteria, all landfills must meet the same stan-

dards. This means that the Type II and III and many smaller Type I landfills must close or upgrade to meet the criteria. All landfills will be subject to having to incorporate groundwater monitoring into their pro-

> gram. New EPA regulations will drive costs of solid waste proposal way up. It is estimated that the cost will at least double, and even triple for some landfill operations.

All the private proposals reviewed by the council were based on \$8 to \$10 a month for once-a-week residential pickup with commercial containers running from \$27 to \$35 per month. Unfortunately, according to City Manager Moore, none of these costs include the cost of providing for a transfer or convenience point for individual dumping. Such a transfer or convenience point would necessitate substantial additional cost to the city, meaning higher costs to the sanitation customer, Mr. Moore added. Mr. Moore said the council must have more detailed in-

formation on a regional landfill before making a decision. We don't have any problems with our landfill currently but the federal government is making new rules and we must comply." Mr. Moore said. "We knew this was coming, and that is why we went to once a week garbage collection to hold down costs this year," the city manager added.

Allcorn began working as a volunteer at the Paramount in 1980, with a primary interest of saving the building. There were rocky times ahead, but eventually the owner of the Paramount allowed him to do 100 percent of the historic documentation

- he wants to continue with Gary Ford's projects and then build on them. The Children's Film Series, with the next film being "It's a Wonderful Life," scheduled for Dec. 17-19.

Later Allcorn hopes to schedule a series of live performances, beginning with area organizations. He says he will look for variety, and performances tailored to fit the Majestic stage.

Allcorn says there were some differences in the restoration of the Abilene Paramount and the Eastland Majestic. In Abilene the professional people did not generally donate their services -People had t be paid to do most of the work.

"I have been so happy about the community involvement here in Eastland," he says. "This restoration is a wonderful job - and it makes the Theatre truly belong to the people who worked so hard on it. I know of no other situation like this - it is truly unique.'

Allcorn adds that he will be in his Majestic office from 1-5 p.m. Monday-Friday, and the front door will be un-



## **GUEST SLOT** BY: G.N.O.

(ED. NOTE - With Eastern European countries today in such a turmoil of Democratic change apparent, a number of these articles written during and after a visit there in 1974, are being excerpted to show the differences in circumstances).

Fortunately our departure from the Soviet Union was much more pleasant than our arrival in the Moscow Airport. The two and one-half hour flight from Kiev in the Ukraine to East Berlin's Schonefeld Airport was by Interflug (IF 311), a turbodrop East German plane that carried about 100 passengers. The ride was somewhat noisier than an Aeroflot, but very level and comfortable. The hostesses were friendlier, and we received much more attention than we did on Russian planes.

Interflug must have known what was in store for us so they served us a very good lunch in flight.

After clearing the East German customs, with Henri's, Maupin-tours and Intourists' help, our West Berlin guide met us in a modern, German-made Maupintour bus, and we headed toward the check points into West Berlin. Our bus stopped for the East German passport check, and a soldier entered, looking at some of us three or four times

to make sure we matched our pictures and then, seemingly reluctant, checked us off to enter the free world again. Outside guards were checking the bus, running mirrors underneath, etc. We breathed a sigh of relief as we entered West Berlin and "waved" passed the smiling guards on

the west side at "Check Point Charlie.' Our guide, Kristine, answered questions and pointed out places of interest as we traveled through West Berlin to our Hotel Kempinski.

West Berlin is a very modern, Americanized city for the most part. Kristine told us that West Berlin does not want to be reminded of the war, so they do not plan to leave any existing ruins. There is one exception, the strangely, beautiful tower of the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church with working clock and bells which was located a couple of blocks from our hotel.

Modern apartments are the primary housing of West Berlin. Red geraniums seemed to be blooming in every windowbox.

Inflation is raging here. We noticed clothing prices in some ordinary shops near us. A plain pair of shoes may cost \$100 and a simple dress \$200. Food is also very expensive along with housing. Part of the reason for this, we reasoned, stems from the

isolated state of West Berlin. Everything, except what they

manufacture, has to be flown or trucked in through the few accessible routes. Unlike Russia, West Berlin has no shortage of commodities but like the Russians, the Berliners pay high prices for what they get. Fortunately, in Beriin, most receive high enough wages to afford their needs.

Kristine showed us John F. Kennedy Square (their court house is located here). This is where he delivered his famous speech after the wall was erected in 1961, "I am a Ber-

liner, too," in German. The Kempinski appeared to be the most famous hotel in Berlin. Advertisement on the front of their magazine was pictures of famous people who had stayed there. It was very nice and modern except for lack of air conditioning and plenty of noise from the streets. Usually air conditioning is not needed in European hotels, and it is not even necessary for comfort, to open the windows at night. We were told that Berlin has had an unusually hot summer, but

to us, the outside air was comfortable even in the day time.

The visit to Alex Springer Varlag Newspapers proved to be one of the most rewarding experiences in Berlin. Alex Springer built his huge, modern plant against the Berlin Wall of shame as a "symbol of courage not definace." He believes that Berlin is the link to 17 million East German's freedom to

#### democracy.

Editorial work on the newspapers is fundamentally free, but workers are merely bound to follow the four principles of the house: (1) to stand for the reunification of Germany (2) to advocate reconciliation between Germans and Jews (Springer was not a Nazi, but he believes all Germans should help the Jews, setting the example himself), (3) to reject all forms of political extremism (4) to support the system of social market economy. They also support NATO.

The plant lives daily with the communism threat, with 130,000 divisions across the wall. Bomb threats come their way too.

We took pictures of the Wall, East German guards in towers, swept sand, barricades, and wreaths for the dead who tried to flee, etc., from the journalist's club on the 10th floor, which boasts a fantastic view of all, as well as from the roof, which is a company parking lot, where we could look right down on the wall.

"Detente is a peaceful expansion of communism," one Irish Berliner's summation of the Springer papers' evaluation, left us rather startled. He explained their feeling that through detente we have given concessions to the communists. Other sectors of the Wall

of Shame were the most impressive sights of our bus tour of West Berlin. Proba-

bly, the ugliest and saddest part of the Wall is where brick and other types of buildings were torn down "so far" and used as part of the original wall. There are holes and boarded up places galore along this stretch and many wreaths, placed by West Berlin relatives, for loved ones who died while fleeing. We have slides of this section, and one where wreaths (with pictures as well as names) mark the place where four died together.

From the West, we viewed across the wall in the East the unmarked grass-covered

if Germany is ever reunified. We were happy to be in the free world and to hear UPI and AP news for the first time in eight days (through an American military radio station here). However, the longer we stayed here the more we felt a nagging discomfort on this "island of freedom" in the middle of East Germany. Berliners truly must be a special breed of people.

After getting through East Berlin once, we felt rather "nutty," going back again for our tour of the Eastern part. Kristine left us with our East German guide at the gate. The former Nazi infantryman, who spent over a year in a prisoner of war camp in Huntsville (one of our tour members was from Huntsville) proved to be the most interesting part of our tour.

Karl Marx Alce, East Berlin's showcase street and the communists only large

scale rebuilding project after the war, was a must for the tour. The communists are spending more money here recently, however, so other sectors are beginning to look up. It does not begin to compare with the West, though. From the West, we probably saw some of the worst of East Germany. Skeletons of bombed out buildings rise bleakly from the landscape. In the old salvaged apartment buildings facing the wall, people lean out of the windows with their eyes and perhaps their hearts toward the west. Since 1972, West Berlin-

ers have been able to visit Germany for prolonged periods, but sadly, East Germans are not allowed to visit the West until they are sixty-five years old. We saw some very heart-rendering scenes of families saying "goodbye" at the wall.

When asked about churches, Baumgardner, our

guide snapped "The communists do not want religion. We believe that we can improve and better ourselves only through our own efforts." Once when he was praising socialism as being the only

way Germany would be reunited, one member of or group asked, "You know we do not agree with you, don't you?" He never acknowledged the question, but seized upon it as an opportunity to tell us that the socialization of the whole world is inevitable, therefore Germany would be reunified!

After our guide's bleak prediction, the remainder of the monuments (one to Berlin's war dead) and buildings held little interest. Our hearts ache for all the

people of Germany and especially Berlin, but we did not wish to remain there any longer.

Most of the shelled pecan meats available in grocery stores come from native varieties. Generally, two and one-half pounds of native pecans in the shell with yield one full pound of meats-or about four cups-when shelled out.

Two pounds of the improved varieties, on the other hand, will yeild at least one pound shelled meats. Improved varieties are well suited for gift packages.

Pecans make excellent gifts since they ship easily without damage. Another nice feature is they don't require special storage if used within a few months.

However, unless canned or frozen properly, pecans can become rancid after being stored for several months.

Shelled pecans can be kept fresh for about a year if stored at 32-38 degrees.

Freshly shelled pecans should not be put in airtight containers unless they are frozen immediately. Pecan kernels, when shelled in Oct.-Dec., have high moisture content and will mold if put in airtight containers and left at room temperature.

Pecans offer easy-to-prepare, tasty treats. Whether salted, sugared or spicedthey are excellent for family fun or youth get-togethers.

AUSTIN-While state legislators hotly debated workers' compensation reform last week, the official filing date for state elections opened and several players upped the political ante.

• The state's largest agricultural group formally declared war on agriculture commissioner Jim Hightower;

 Former Gov. Mark White announced a comeback candidacy and was immediately sued by a former contributor-appointee; and

• The top three state officials said they want lawmakers to make Texas judges appointive, rather than elective.

In the workers' comp battle, House members wiped out most of the trial lawyer/labor union amendments, restored much of the pro-business Hobby plan and sent it to the Senate.

As expected, the Senate refused to concur and prepared to wage the battle in conference committee. The vote was 17-14.

#### Farm Bureau's Enemy

At its convention, the Texas Farm Bureau vowed all-out war to defeat Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, whom its leadership regards as the number one enemy of Texas farmers and ranchcrs.

The Bureau worked hard to recruit Texas Rangers' pitching ace Nolan Ryan, who ranches near Alvin, to run as a Republican against Hightower.

But Ryan said he would stick to one more year of professional baseball before trying politics. Disappointed but still determined, Farm Bureau leaders said they will quit recruiting and support the winner of the GOP primary.

#### Mark White Returns

Mark White officially threw his hat into the gubernatorial ring, promising to pick up where he left off on public education reform and no-pass, no-play.

He immediately drew political flak.

Democratic opponent Attorney General Jim Mattox reminded voters that, as governor, White raised taxes, tuitions and fees higher than any Democrat in Texas history.

White, now a Houston attorney, was sued the same day he announced for failing to repay a \$75,000 campaign loan made in 1986.

White said the lawsuit filed by Lubbock physician Ray Santos, whom White once appointed to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission, was politically motivated.

#### Appoint State Judges

The Big Three in state government - Gov. Bill Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis - said Texas should change to a method of appointing state judges selected by a committee and approved later by voters.

A recent court order gives the state until Jan. 3 to change the election method to allow more minority judges.

The trio favors a plan whereby the governor will appoint judges from a list screened by a state judicial committee.

. Those appointees will serve a specified term, and then face a "retention election," when voters can re-elect or oust them.

Many see the plan as a compromise to minimize election politics in the judicial system and to protect voters from insulated judges who order expensive reforms resulting in higher taxes.

Crackdown on Taxes State Treasurer Ann Richards, a gubernatorial candidate, blasted

cigarette-tax cheats, and unveiled a plan for catching the tax evaders, noting that cigarette smugglers and tobacco-tax evaders cost the state \$100 million annually.

Last year, responsibility for collecting the tax shifted from the state comptroller to the treasurer, and Richards said she was warning cheaters a crackdown was coming. Meanwhile, her press secretary

took issue with a recent item in this column indicating Richards would embrace a state income tax, as a means of equalizing school funding.

"Ann Richards opposes a state income tax and has repeatedly stated her opposition to such a tax," said Monte Williams.

#### Brown AG Race Okayed

A state district judge ruled that state Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, is eligible to run for attorney general.

Judge J. Ray Gayle III, of Brazoria County, said the Texas Constitution does not bar Brown from seeking the office.

His candidacy was in doubt because, under the Texas Constitution, mid-term legislators cannot advance to higher offices that have recently received increases in salary or other "emoluments" from the Legislature.

The Legislature this year raised retirement benefits for the attorney general and other statewide officeholders. Judge Gayle ruled that retirement benefits are not considered emoluments.

#### **Other Highlights**

• As the workers' comp showdown continues, some observers speculated that Gov. Clements will keep lawmakers in Austin for the full 30-day term by opening the agenda to more issues, including selection of judges.

• Paul D. Meek, a Dallas oil executive, was elected chairman of the Public Utility Commission, replacing Marta Greytok who remains on the three-member board.

• The State Board of Insurance has appointed a panel to develop a plan for an insurance pool to cover Texans otherwise medically uninsurable.





vent feelings. Whether a conflict becomes a fight depends on how it is handled. There are constructive ways of dealing with conflict which lead to problem solving. Learning these skills can make family conflict a good

> the family atmosphere considerably. First, pick a time and place to deal with conflict. Avoid trying to deal with conflict during "hassel times" or when people are tired, tense, or preoccupied.

> deal less trying and improve

Second, use communication skills to help resolve

conflicts. When families listen well, describe their feelings clearly, and ask clarifying questions they are better able to solve problems.

Finally, know which conflicts to avoid. There are some family conflicts that cannot be resolved even with the

most sensitive handling. The thing that strong fami-

lies have going for them is not that they don't disagree, but that they know how to make up. Developing patterns of reconciliation is an important step in building family strengths.

A conflict is really no more than a problem to be solved. The goal is to solve the problem. Strong families keep this goal in mind as they deal with conflict.


