The first is through volunteering your time at a rate of 3 hours per month to a service group that is approved by the Association. The second method is by donation of \$120.00 per year to the Association. This can be one annual donation or spread out over the year at \$10.00 per month.

This small amount given by many would do much to alleviate the needs of many people in a short time. We need your help in this effort to make Eastland County a better place to live. The meetings of the Assoication are the second Tuesday of each month at 12:00 noon in the Eastland Library. (ED. NOTE: When this article first appeared in mid-1974, its headline read: "Berlin Neighbors Seek Same Goal-But Walk Different Paths." With things changing so fast in East Berlin today, maybe today they're walking similar paths.)

By Gay Nell O'Brien Our East German guide told us in a "nice" way that the Communist plan to rule the earth some day.

When asked about the possible reunification of Germany, his answer: "No way, until West Germany is socialized. The socialization of the whole world is inevitable so some day Germany will be unified again," left little to the imagination.

The former World War II Nazi infantryman, Paul Baumgardner, 51, spent over a year in a prisoner of war camp at Huntsville, Texas, north of Houston. He said, "I fought for crazy Hitler in World War II and was happy to be captured. Then I came. back to East Berlin because

this is where I grew up." Irony of ironies, Don Reid, publisher emeritus of the Huntsville paper who was a member of our tour group, got the scoop story of the trip!

To understand the ideology of this devotee to communism, all one needs to do is to read the World Book's interpretation of Communism, Russia and Lenin. To understand that it has not worked out the way Karl Marx and Lenin, its founder, predicted, one needs only to look at history!

The Communists have not given up though. They hope to win us and our allies over by topping us politically, intellectually and economically.

Almost all governments today, by necessity and for humanitarian reasons contain some socialism, but America

from the "overskill" socialistic direction we are heading if free enterprise (the primary difference in Democracy and Communism) is to survive. Communism is complete socialism with all its undesirable side effects, and this is

what we must steer clear of! To some, the Communists' ideology may not seem bad. The methods used to put it into action are corrupt, and to our way of thinking, it can never be a really successful way of government.

There will always be political ambitious persons in any society, but in a Communist country when the wrong person reaches the top, there is no way to relieve him except by a possible revolution.

Also to us, it seems that Communism destroys so much initiative in people. One would have to be state oriented to ever excel professionally without threat of life.

It makes us wonder if our country's current trend toward shoddy workmanship and sagging productivity could possible be linked to our increased socialistic tendency.

It is interesting to see that only two percent of the population of the Soviet Union are registered Communists. The rest must continue to placidly live under it whether they agree or not. One reason for such a small membership in the party, they told us, was lack of time of ordinary working people for all the demands

They boast that their government takes care of everyone. We wondered (How?) when we saw very old women sweeping public squares and streets and other such examples.

Communism praises the equality of the people. Of course, all people should have equal opportunities, but as far

equally in Russia—this is simply not so. Those who do excel and find favor with the system certainly enjoy higher standards of living. We have no doubt that the higher a person ranks in the party, also, the higher his standard of

living! A West German editor did not express any doubt about the East German guide's statement of Communist intentions.

Alex Springer lives with the danger of the Communist threat. He built his huge and modern newspaper plant, the largest in Europe, against the west side of the Wall in the early 1960's as a symbol of "courage not defiance." Mr. Springer does not believe in "fooling around" with the Communists, and encourages a hard-nosed policy for noncommunist countries.

The newspaper has received several bomb threats, etc. We walked on to large balcony over a roof and right up to the wall below. Here and through the newspapers' windows we took pictures of the Wall and wreaths placed alongside it for those who were shot in fleeing East

Our guide of West Berlin old us that the reason the Communists built the wall when they did, was that they were losing all their factory workers with the flood of refugees into West Berlin every day.

Springer believes that "detente" is a "peaceful expansion of Communism" because of the Communist concessions that have gone along with it. Listening to an editor who knows that there are 160,000 Communist divisions right across that wall, we were speechless.

VA Pensions To Increase In December

More than 700,000 veterans and dependents will receive up to a 4.7 percent increase in Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Improved Pension checks payable Dec.

VA Secretary Edward J. Derwinski said he hopes to announce a similar increase in disability compensation rates for disabled veterans before the year is out.

VA pensions are paid to wartime veterans totally and permanently disabled circumstances from unrelated to their military service, and to needy survivors of wartime veterans.

The pension increase applies to 436,505 veterans of wartime service and 260,708 surviving spouses and children. Payment increases will also go to 31,311 parents of deceased veterans receiving Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC)

The increase in monthly payments is automatic and requires no action be recipients. Pension benefits range from annual maximums of \$6,767 for a veteran without dependents to \$15,222 for a veteran with three dependents who is in need of regular aid and at-

Unlike compensation. benefits paid to veterans disabled by illness or injuries related to military service, pensions are af fected by income from other sources, so the exact amount

of the increase varies. Increases in Improved Pension to wartime veterans and their dependents and DIC payments to deceased veterans' parents are set by law at the same rate and date as Social Security increases.

VA pensions other than the Improved Pension remain fixed at the rates in effect in 1978. The income limits that control eligibility for theseprograms, however, also are increased by 4.7 percent, effective Dec. 1.

Recipients of these pensions may request transfer to the Improved Pension plan at any time. The VA reviews each request to advise beneficiaries which program would be most advantageous.



of illness. the signs in those cattle involved the following: general depression in appetance, signs of colic, severe constipation in one, diarrhea in another, variable degrees of blindness, and an abnormal gate in one.

The source in one case was found to be a deteriorated automotive battery in a coastal bermuda pasture. The cattle in this pasture were in good condition, the pasture was newly purchased and looked to be free of trash dumps or other obvious causes of poisoning. Only after a careful search of the pasture was the source found. The second case involved a herd of cattle that had been in a junk strewn pasture for several years with no problems. This year however, the pasture was severely overgrazed and the cows were in poor condition. These cows may have consumed lead from a source that they had ignored in years past. The source was not found in the

second case. There is a treatment plan available for lead poisoning but it is expensive and complex requiring intervenus drug therapy, oral purgatives and

binders, may require surgery to rid the stomach of lead trapped there, and intensive supportive care since most affected animals are emaciated, dehydrated, and won't eat. Cattle already exhibiting Central nervous system signs have a poor prognosis regardless.

Obviously, prevention is much more practical than treatment. Dispose of old batteries, used motor oil, lead painted boards, grease and greased equipment, linoleum and various other lead containing material where livestock can't get to it. Dr. J. C. Reagor of Texas Veterinary Diagnostic lab reported that automotive batteries are by far the most common source of lead poisoning. Don't allow overgrazing or malnutrition. Cattle that have adequate forage, protein, mineral and salt are seldom involved in poisonings. Malnourished cattle eat all sorts of junk.





Cisco Child Care Center Is In Need Of Contributions From Community

In 1969 the First Baptist Church recognized a need for a child care facility. They got busy and were soon issued a charter by the State of Texas to operate a center with a maximum of 30 children. The operation grew until there was a waiting list. As the operation grew, so did the operating expenses and they found it was not possible to continue without outside assistance.

Faced with the possiblity of discontinuing the service. they approached the churches and civic clubs to be sustaining members of the project. A new charter was issued in 1975, with control vested in a Board of Directors appointed by each of the sustaining groups. Each group may appoint two members to the board.

Present sustaining members and their representatives on the Board of Directors are as follows: First Baptist Church with Bill Philpott and Loretta Reynolds, East Baptist Church with Sheila Diggs and Mary Bailey, First Christian Church with Billie Jo Vickers and Hattie Weathers, Redeemer Lutheran Church with Lee Roy Witzsche and Linda Wende, First Presbyterian Women with Janice Ferguson, First United Methodist Church with Garl Gorr and Louise Cooper, Cisco Service Club with Carlene Conner and Sue Lacy, Cisco Lion's Club with Jerry McBeth and Jim Manning, Cisco Civic League

The Child Care Center was originally located in the Education Building of the First Baptist Church. Realizing the need for larger quarters, it was decided to seek a new location. The present facility, located at the corner of 8th Street and Avenue H, is the result of that need.

Through the cooperation of the First National Bank, financing was arranged and remodeling begun in late of the First Christian Church

at that time, was the leader in securing cash gifts and pledges. Churches, civic organizations, and many individuals gave generously until our facilities were completely paid for.

The present facility is licensed for a total of 68 children, and children from infancy through 13 years of age are cared for. The building is centrally airconditioned and heated, with adequate room for exercise on days when weather does not permit play and activities out of doors.

Winona Payne is director of the Child Care Center. with a dedicated staff whose first concern is for the children. They serve all races, colors and creeds without question. A balanced diet is served at meal time. with snacks in the morning and afternoon

The Cisco Child Care Center is a non-profit organization. It is fully licensed by the State of Texas and complies with all regulations set out by both state and federal governments. The Center received no state, federal or other governmental aid, and the fees charged for child care DO NOT cover the expenses of the operation.

The cost of operating the Child Care Center continues to increase. The price of groceries has almost doubled in the past few years. Cost of supplies, utilities and insurance are also increasing. Salaries will increase significantly when the new minimum wage goes into ef-

The only alternative to charging larger fees for child care is to receive additional income from other sources. Contributions from other churches, clubs or individuals, either on a regular or one time basis, would be greatly appreciated.

Conservation plans have been developed for 133 million acres, or 98 percent, of the nation's highly erodible cropland, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service reported today.

"Our goal is to have all plans done by Dec. 31, the deadline for farmers who want them and want to stay eligible for USDA program benefits," said SCS Chief Wilson Scaling. "We're right on target with that goal."

"We now have the biggest conservation effort in history ahead of us," Scaling said. "Over the next five years,

sions in the Food Security Act of 1985 for the first time linked farmer's eligibility for USDA farm program benefits to their conservation plan on their highly erodible fields by the beginning of calendar year 1990, if they want to stay eligible for USDA farm program benefits.

To date, farmers have fully implemented their plans on 38.6 million acres-29 percent of the nation's highly erodible land.

Record numbers of conservation practices are scheduled to be completed over the next five years, said Scaling.

"We've been helping farmers to switch to conservation tillage for over two decades and install terraces and waterways for over five decades-but never on the scale that we anticipate in the next five years," he said.

"We're working with farmers, contractors and their associations, and others in the private sector to find innovative and effective ways to tackle the conservation challenge and opportunity that lies ahead," Scaling said.



Smoking directly affects cholesterol levels, says the American Health Foundation. Tests indicate that each cigarette per day raises total cholesterol by half a point; quitting brings it down again.

People who take aspirin and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs in arthritis-fighting doses are more likely to be hospitalized for ulcers, the British Medical Journal reports. (The Food and Drug Administration now requires warning of this on labels.)


Instead of surgery to remove gallstones, doctors at Mayo Clinic have been injecting ether into the gallbladder to dissolve the stones.

Combination of medications seems to slow the progress of diabetic kidney failure and may even prevent it. Reported in the British Medical Journal, the treatment uses captopril, an antihypertension drug, and a thiazide diurectic. United States tests are starting.

Liquid dosages of acetaminophen should not be used interchangeably. Drops for babies have 500 mg. per teaspoon, children's elixir only 160 mg.

Special care, such as shelter and adequate nutrition, should be given to protect family pets from wintertime hazards during the cold months ahead.

Winter temperatures in Eastland County are not at such extremes that animals accustomed to staying outdoors will be hurt. If the pet can seek shelter that keeps

out chilling winds and covers cold ground, it will be adequately protected.

Animals that are never outside or are very old or young should not be kept outdoors.


Healthy animals can tolerate cold weather. More food may be needed because the pets need more calories to produce body heat



and Treasurer Ruth Hart. Other guests were Extension Program Council Chairman Charles Walker, 4-Leader Natalie Stevens, and newswriters Maybelle Trout, Abilene Reporter News, and Viola Payne, Eastland County Newspapers.

There was an interesting program to go along with the meal. There were reports on the year's Extension work, 4-H activities, and agriculture in general.

DeMarquis Gordon welcomed the group to the meeting, and introduced Scott Hodges. He told how pleased he and other Extension personnel were to have Scott join the work here.

Gordon also presented two certificates from A & M University for completion of Educational Courses related to work in County Government. One went to Joann Johnson, County Clerk, and the other to Ruth Hart, County

After this presentation Janet Thomas introduced Natalie Stevens of Eastland, an outstanding 4-H member. Mrs. Thomas said there were 10 active 4-H Clubs in Eastland County at this time, with one organized at Olden last month.

The Eastland County Commissioners had a number of items on the agenda for Monday, Dec. 11, but not all were finalized during this meeting. Some were tabled until the next session, which will be held on Wednesday, Dec. 27. This change to a Wednesday meeting is due to Christmas falling on the regular date.

One item unanimously approved was the hiring of Scott Hodges as the new Assistant County Agent. Hodges was highly recommended to the Court by County Agent DeMarquis Gordon and Ron Woolley, District Extension Agent of Stephenville. He will begin his term in Eastland County

There was considerable discussion of a smoking ban in the Courthouse, and the Commissioners agreed there should definitely be no smoking n the elevator. They also agreed that officials have the

ring," Walker said. "I'm looking forward to next year." Before the meeting ended Janet Thomas made a special presentation - copies of the Eastland County Homemakers Council' "Country Cookbook" to each of the County Commissioners.

She also presented books to Maybelle Trout and Viola Payne, saying that the Extension Service deeply appreciated the publicity in the newspapers these people repreright to control the use of tobacco in their own offices.

Smoking in other parts of the Courthouse will be discussed again at the Dec. 27 meeting, with a possible ban on smoking in, lobby and other public areas.

At Monday's meeting Commissioners again reported that the city was ticketing employees who park around the Courthouse, and they again complained about persons who serve on Juries receiving tickets for overpark-

A 1990 Holiday Schedule was adopted, and this will include 12 Holidays. County Clerk Joann Johnson reported there will be two election days during the year, with the State and County on March 13, and the General Election Nov. 6. There may also be a Primary run-off election.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, said there was currently 12 prisoners in the county jail, with 2 of these for TDC. Reports show that during the past three months the county jail has averaged 11 prison-

"The jail is real clean," Bacon told the Court. He added that in about two months there would be the annual state inspection, and he expected everything would be ready for it.

On other business, the Commissioners voted to amend the General Fund Budget to pay for road equipment for Pct. 4. This will be a total of \$25,500 to West Texas Equipment Co. of Abilene. On Dec. 27 a repayment schedule will be set up for Commissioner Billy Bacon.

One important part of Monday was the noon recess, which included lunch with the Eastland County Extension

Service. Good food and reports on yearly activities highlighted this annual occasion. It was also a time to visit and begin to wind down on some of the serious business of 1989.


