The following article is reprinted from a just-published book, "Lone Star Christmas, Seasonal Editorials of Frank Grimes," edited by Charles H. Marler. The late Mr. Grimes was editor of "The Abilene Reporter-News" and was well known for his Christmas season editorials.

The 148-page volume contains 56 of Grimes' best writings on the spirit, culture and flavor of Christmas. ACU Press printed the book.

The Grimes' editorial we're sharing with you is entitled "Spirit Of The Occasion," and was written on December 7, 1951.

"Everybody has a least one Christmas he remembers more vividly than any other, and it is sometimes pleasant and profitable to recall those bright moments out of the past, and to contemplate with awe the marvelous faculty which enables us to remember things that happened long, long ago.

"The one we recall most vividly was fifty years ago. The kids were all bundled up snugly against winter's chill - a crisp, clear day it was - and packed into the back of the flat-bed wagon, with Pa on the spring seat driving, and Ma beside him hunkered against the cold. We were going to Aunt Mary's for Christmas, and the distance was only a few miles. We were making a lot of racket, as kids will especially around Christmas, and every now and then Pa would turn around with a fierce expression on his face

and say, 'I don't want to have to speak to you children again!' This alternation of racket and lecture kept up the whole way to Aunt Mary's - a moment of quiet after each admonition, soon to be broken by a fresh outburst of laughter and yells of sheer enjoyment.

"We don't recall any specific Christmas present handed out - probably the usual apple, orange and candy in the usual black ribbed cotton stocking. What we do remember is the spirit of the occasion, the moods of the moment, the nameless little thrills we always associate with Christmas.

"We oldsters may recapture these moments of bliss only in retrospect. We are reminded of them by the happy laughter and antics of children around us, and we praise God for the memories of childhood which they awaken in us.

"Well, we are some older now physically, and we worry about the condition of our remaining teeth, and wonder when our dentist is going to say, 'Let's just cut out this foolishness and have 'em out,' and our joints need oiling and it's a little difficult to get up in the morning, but as long as we can recapture even in hazy outline some of those childhood Christmases we're not going to be resentful and fearful of the creeping years, but just turn loose all holds and enjoy ourself come Christmas."

The Eastland County History Book is finally in Eastland, and it is being distributed to those who have paid for copies in advance.

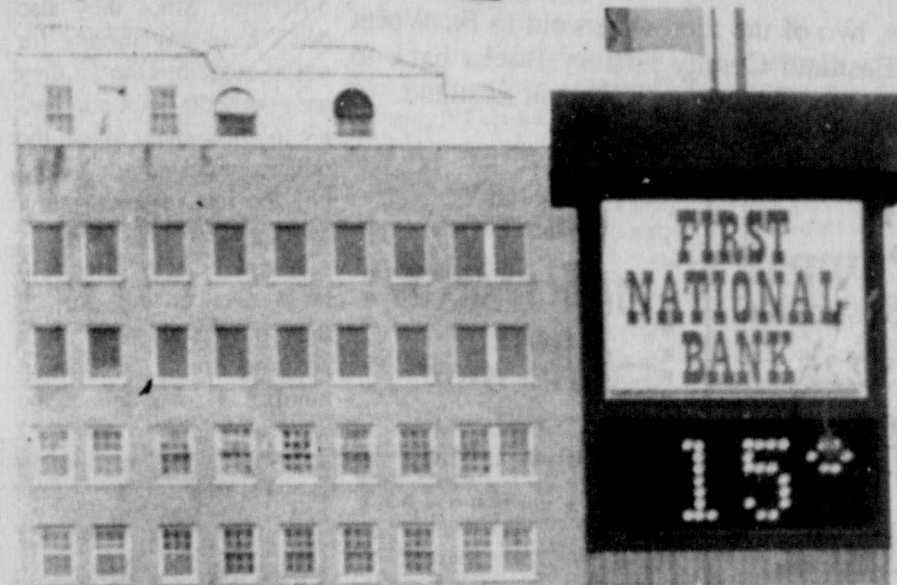

**CJC President Speaks To Chamber Breakfast Wed.**

Dr. Roger Schustereit, president of Cisco Junior College, was speaker at the regular quarterly breakfast of the Chamber of Commerce held Wednesday.

CJC has just received recertification from Southern Association of Colleges. This is done at 10-year intervals. The supporting federal dollars help fund scholarships, certification programs such as cosmetology, and the acceptance of credits and courses by other colleges and universities.

Dr. Schustereit told the chamber members about the Fitness Center which is currently under construction. He said the construction was possible without an increase in taxes or tax indebtedness. The steady student growth and their tuition and fees is what made this possible, he said.

The Clyde campus has 11 or 12 classrooms with about

600 students. It was designed for 200 to 300 students. Abilene classrooms are vocational. It is a possibility, according to Dr. Schustereit, that CJC can offer academic courses that can be transferred to other universities and colleges, and this will be a big boost to CJC.

CJC has a \$5.5 million budget. Of this \$230,000 is ad valorem tax, and this pays only local utilities and maintenance. There are 109 employees, 69 faculty members and administration. The total enrollment is 750 students at on the Cisco campus, 620 at Clyde, 615 at Abilene, and 25 at Coleman.

CJC anticipates training guards for the Abilene prison, and profits from these classes will come back to Cisco.

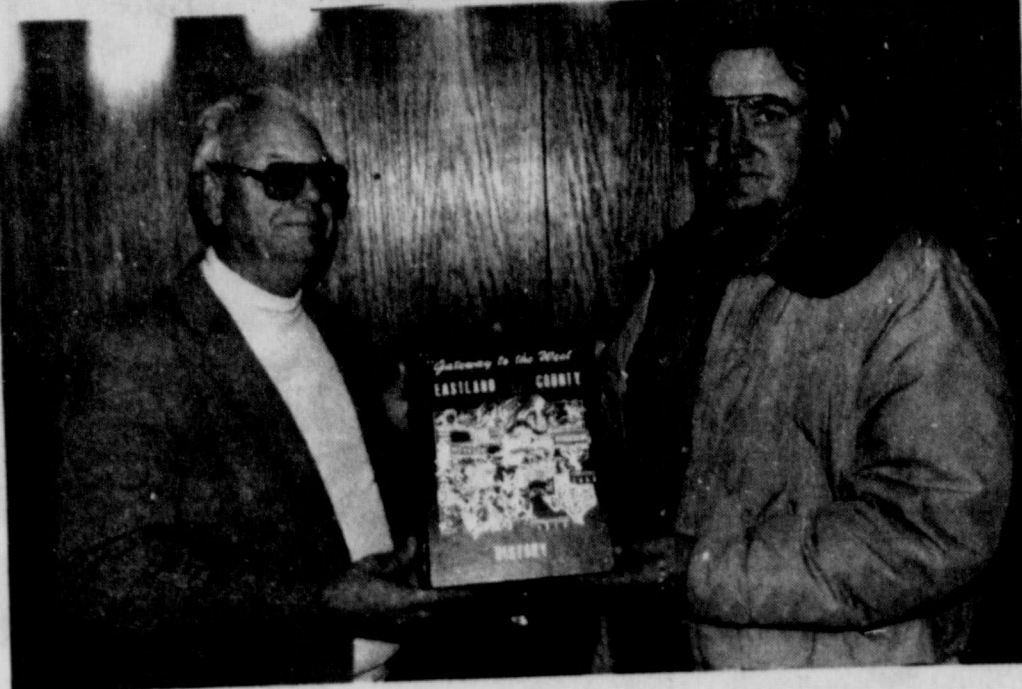
All war veterans and Vietnam War veterans in particular are especially invited.

**History Book-Con't.**

In their efforts to hold the cost of the History Book as low as possible, they projected the cost of printing the book a little low and sales a little high. The books ended up being bigger, and thus more expensive to print, than anyone estimated, so the books actually are costing more to print than what they have been sold for.

The Committee collected sales tax on the books, but they have since learned that since it is a historical book which is being published and sold by a non-profit group such sales taxes do not have to be paid to the state.

It just happens that the amount of tax collected on each book is equal to the additional printing cost incurred on each book due to its excessively large size. And postage costs on the books are now more than was collected.

The Committee, which has worked for free and hasn't received any profit from the History Book, now needs financial help to make up the difference. Since they also don't have any money for postage to refund the tax, they are asking the book purchasers to allow them to use the money collected for tax to pay the rest of the printing cost for each book.

And if the committee is to break even on this project, they must sell some more History Books. A limited number are available at the after publication price of \$72.50 plus \$5. for shipping and handling.

Boy, did I ever learn about Old Rip, the legendary survivor of 31 years of entombment in an old courthouse cornerstone. Today the famed toad is entombed under glass in the Eastland County Courthouse.

I was amazed at the large number of ex-Eastland County residents new living in the Texas Panhandle. What amazed me was how they all came to the defense of Old Rip's legend. Some were Irishmen, naturally, and were fighting mad that I would even question the story that eventually wound up on TV's

"Believe It Or Not Ripley" program.

True to his word, H. V. O'Brien Jr., Editor of the Eastland Telegram, sent me a copy of his intriguing booklet, "The Story of Old Rip, a Horned Toad That Slept for 30 Years." On the inside cover he had scribbled, "The Whole Truth!" H. V. O."

And, an Amarillo man, Elmer McGahan, who lived in Eastland when he was a boy, brought me a copy of a Fort Worth Star-Telegram story on Old Rip that was printed in May 1984, accompanied by a picture of the famed toad on display in a glass case in the Eastland County courthouse. (I didn't know this when I wondered

in my original column where he was buried and if a memorial to him had been erected).

"I saw him and he was definitely alive," said the 78-year-old Elmer, a retired traveling salesman, who for 55 years drove over all these Panhandle roads. Not only that, but Elmer also witnessed the hanging of one of the old Santa Claus gang that robbed the Cisco Bank in 1927, after the bank robber had shot the town marshal in an attempted escape from the Eastland jail.

At the time Elmer was a "soda fountain buster" at the Corner Drug store in Eastland. The Cisco bank job, so-called because one of the gang wore a Santa Claus suit, is yet another story. Sufficient to this day is the story of Old Rip, but you can see that Eastland County was creating a bunch of news back in the 1920's.

As Editor O'Brien says in his most interesting booklet, "There are two ways of looking at the story of Old Rip, the horned toad. There is the 'once upon a time, according to legend...' approach. Then there is the straight-forward, factual and documented account. The tale itself is simple - Old Rip, the horned toad, lived in a sealed tomb for 31 years!"

As the story goes, the horned toad was dropped into the hollow marble cornerstone of the courthouse that was built in 1897. I was opened on Feb. 28, when the present courthouse was started. O'Brien quotes Edwin T. Cox, who was present, about what happened:

"First to be removed from direct contact with the walls of the cavity of the cornerstone was a piece of galvanized iron, which snugly fitted the top of the cavity and under which were some newspapers and other articles. I then saw one of the party reach down and bring to sight a horned frog, which, seemingly, was dormant but after a few minutes showed signs of life."

A lot of things happened to

Old Rip after he breathed fresh air again. He was snatched from a local display window by a man who got as far as El Paso, with plans of exhibiting the toad in California, before he was nabbed and returned with Old Rip to Eastland. Later that year a man who had legal custody of Old Rip displayed him around the country. There was a report that President Calvin Colidge broke several engagements to view the toad.

On Jan. 20, 1929, the Eastland paper carried a banner story announcing, "Old Rip is Dead." His lifeless body was found in the glass bowl in which he was hibernating. Official cause of death was listed as pneumonia.

Old Rip lay in state at local funeral parlor before he was embalmed and placed in a special casket obtained by the mortician. Thereafter, he was entombed in a marble and glass case, still on display today in the courthouse lobby.

The former Eastland folks swamped me with confirmation of this tale.

In addition to Elmer Florine Forbes of Amarillo dropped a note verifying the Old Rip story (ironically, her maiden

(ED. NOTE: This is a copy of a letter saluting all the law enforcement officers in Eastland County.)

During the early morning hours of Sunday, October 29, 1989, the Narcotics Task Force executed a search warrant at a residence in Olden, Texas, in Eastland County.

At the execution of this search warrant, the Task Force was assisted by Eastland County Deputies, David Franklin and Joe Bishop, along with Cisco Police Officers, Larry Weikel and Darrell Shipman, and Texas DPS Trooper, Steve Tone.

This search warrant resulted in the arrest of two suspects for felony drug charges including Possession of Methamphetamine, Possession of Amphetamine and Misdemeanor Possession of

Marijuana.

These officers were of great help in the efforts of the Task Force to be able to accomplish our objectives in the drug war, and should be commended for their interest and professionalism exhibited in this investigation.

Since the Drug Task Force began in December of 1986, we have worked numerous drug investigations in Eastland County and have had the opportunity to work with law enforcement officers throughout Eastland County, including the Sheriff's Dept., Cisco Police Dept., Ranger Police Dept. and the DPS. We have received complete cooperation from these agencies each time we called upon them. This cooperation is of critical importance if the Task Force is to function effectively in Eastland County.

Certainly, the Task Force is limited in manpower and was designed to compliment the efforts of local officers in their pursuit of the drug problem.

Hopefully, the Task Force

has been an asset to the various law enforcement agencies in Eastland County, but the true measure of success of drug trafficking effort of Eastland County must be credited to the officers of these agencies, who are so conscious of this critical problem and work hand in hand with each other toward the common goal of making Eastland County drug free.

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# Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

They way to qualify as a private applicator of restricted-use or state limited-use pesticide is about to change in Texas. You can still be certified as a private applicator by the home study method at no expense up until January 1, 1990. The state legislature has made some changes in laws that govern private application of restricted pesticides.

The legislature has essentially made the old certification program a licensing program with a license fee and additional requirements for training.

Private applicators now fall into three categories, depending on when their certificates or licenses were issued.

1. Private applicators holding certificates dated before January 10, 1989, do not have to apply for new licenses at this time, but that may change in the future.

2. Private applicators who hold certificates dated after

January 10, 1989, but prior to January 1, 1990, must become "licensed" within five years if they want to continue using restricted-use pesticides.

3. For those who want to become private applicators after January 1, 1990, all provisions of the new law will apply.

To become a licensed private applicator, a producer must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program and make a passing score on the Texas Department of Agriculture examination. Then must submit an application along with the required \$50.00 fee. The license is good for five years.

For next week only, private applicators may pick up home study material from the Extension Service office, and complete and submit the fill-in exam to TDA in Austin under the existing certification program.

Eastland County farmers

and ranchers interested in doing a better job in record keeping in 1990 may want to enroll in a computer course in farm and ranch accounting.

A short course in "farm and ranch accounting with micro-computers" will be conducted January 8-10, on the campus of Tarleton State University at Stephenville. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Tarleton State University division of Continuing Education and the Department of CIS and Management.

The course is designed to teach farmers and ranchers the basics of financial and enterprise accounting. Topics will include: cash and accrual accounting methods, single and double entry accounting system, basics of accounting theory, setting up and managing a computerized system, considerations in selecting computerized accounting software, and other considerations, such as check writing, payroll, accounts payable, accounts receivable, and fixed assets and depreciation management.

The objective of the course is to instill knowledge and confidence in participants through lecture and computer hands-on experience, so that they will be able to return to their businesses and implement their management and financial information system. Regarding farm and ranch record keeping, producers can use a manual record system, use a computerized accounting software package, or pay for bookkeeping service. Each producer must evaluate his own situation to determine which option is most appropriate. No one system will fit all situations. Whatever bookkeeping option is selected, it should

aid a business in three ways: —Provide timely management information —Provide information required for filing timely income tax returns —Generate reports required by lenders

All of these functions are becoming important due to changes in tax laws, increased requirements from lenders for documentation to support loan requests, and the current economic conditions.

## Regional Pecan Show

Eastland County pecan exhibitors again won a large share of honors at the Central Texas Regional Pecan Show last week, according to County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon. The pecans were judged in Stephenville and displayed at a shopping mall in Temple. The Central Texas Region covers Central and East Texas counties from Eastland to the Louisiana border and from the Red River to Beaumont. The first place entries from all county pecan shows competed at the regional show, says Gordon.

L.R. Boch, who won Champion Classic in the Eastland County Show with an entry of Ranger pecans, also won Champion Classic in the Regional Show with the same entry. The Boch Orchard is located ten miles south of Ranger in the Chaney Community.

Boch also won first place with entries of Caddo and Comanche, and his Ranger was first in a class of all other varieties.

Dora Schaefer of Nimrod won first place in the Mahan class.

Dale Walker of Carbon had the first place entry of San Saba Improved.

Second place class winners were T.E. Robertson of Kokomo in the Tejas class, Ruby Williams of Cross Plains in the Texas Pacific class and Charles Walker of Eastland in the Barton class.

L.R. Boch had two third place ribbons in the Kiowa class and the Apache class. Other third place winners were Lorene Jennings of Cross Plains, in the Mohawk class, H.W. Patterson of Cottonwood in the Choctaw class, James Alexander of Pioneer in the Schley class, and Charles Walker in the Podsednik class.

Only first place winners in the county shows were eligible to compete in the regional show. All ribbon-winning entries at the regional

shows will be placed in frozen storage until the Texas State Pecan Show in July 1990.

## Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent—

During the holidays many people use candles in decorating and dining. What to do when candle wax gets all over everything?????

Remove hardened wax from candlesticks the easy way. Place them in the freezer for an hour or so; then peel off the frozen wax, wash the candlesticks, and dry them.

If you can't wait for the wax to freeze, run the candlesticks under very hot water; then cover your finger with a soft cloth and push the wax off.

Did the candles drip onto your good wood dining table? Scrape up as much as you can with a fingernail or a plastic spatula. Rub the remaining wax into the wood with a soft, clean cloth.

When candle wax drips onto the tablecloth, rub the wax with an ice cube to harden it and then scrape off the wax with a spatula. Cover any remaining wax with paper towels under and on top of the tablecloth, and press with a warm iron, changing paper towels as the wax is absorbed. Sponge off the residue with dry cleaning solvent, then rub gently with heavy duty liquid detergent. Launder the tablecloth as soon as possible.

### BREAKFAST MADE THE NIGHT BEFORE

6 eggs 6 slices of bread, cubed  
1 lb. pork sausage  
1 can cheese soup  
1 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt  
1 tsp. dry mustard  
2 cups milk

Brown and drain sausage. Mix all ingredients together and pour into a 9 x 13" pan. Refrigerate overnight. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes at 350 degrees. Let stand 10 minutes before cutting. With fruit or cantaloupe, this is a complete meal.



### Pharmacy Topics

Exercise, lifestyle changes and a low-fat diet can not only keep plaque from building up in arteries, but can even help reduce existing plaque, say researchers at the University of California/San Francisco School of Medicine. Ongoing study is getting impressive results.

Follow-up of the Harvard Nurses' Health Study indicates that women who have stopped taking birth control pills are at no higher risk for heart disease than women who've never taken them.

New screening method, transrectal ultrasound, is said to be able to spot prostate tumors before they can be detected by other means. It is also used in conjunction with a doctor's examination.

Two studies, in the United States and Canada, found that ticlopidine hydrochloride was more effective than aspirin or placebos in preventing stroke in high-risk patients.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved the use of methotrexate for the relief of rheumatoid arthritis.

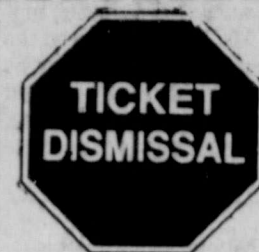

## Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

"When is Cold too Cold?"

If you are looking for some tough bass fishing, now is the time. The long cold spell we have been experiencing should make the bass some kind of tough. But don't give up, during the winter when you do find fish quite often they will be stacked like cord wood.

Some of the more obvious areas to begin your search would be creek channels and points. Lets try to narrow this down some.

In our area many of our creek channels have silted in pretty badly. But they are out there and still are productive. Look for the outside bends in the creeks. These areas tend to be washed out a little deeper and can harbour multiple stair steps in the bank.

Points at this time of year still act as a giant dinner table for the predators (bass). Look for points which run right out to the creek channel. Or ones which set at the out bend of the creek. Concentrate right where the last drop into the actual creek is.

Bait selection can be pretty simple this time of year. Jigging spoons, jig and pig, small worms, and of course some Little Georges. Work these baits slow and with great concentration. Remember when those old bucket mouths do bite it will be ever so slight, so heads up.

It is at this time of year that an angler can get full benefit from a quality paper graph or LCG Unit. Much time can be eliminated with these units. Look for the big bunches of shad and probably those lunkers will be close at hand.

The only accurate fishing report I have received is that its too cold to go. I guess I am getting soft, it only seems like yesterday when I would make it a point to go fishing on the worst day I could. The want to is still there, but I'll catch the next bad batch.

Richard Schmidt set the lake record for red drum at San Angelo's Lake Nasworthy twice within two days, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Biologist Billy Follis of San Angelo said the two fish,

caught during November weighed 17.31 pounds and 17.59 pounds. The department stocked red drum fingerlings at Nasworthy in 1984 through 1986. Schmidt caught both fish from deep water on a crankbait, Follis said.

Follis said seven red drum also were collected in a recent electro-fishing survey at Nasworthy, with the largest weighing 18.6 pounds.

Although the deer season is about over, there still may be time to find a place to hunt. But how?

One way is through the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Deer Hunting Lease Register, a listing of lands available for lease.

The list is maintained by the department and provided free upon request. It currently lists more than 1.7 million acres offered by 286 landowners.

Hunters wishing to obtain a copy of the list, or landowners who wish to list land, should write to the Wildlife Division, TPWD, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744 or call toll free 1-800-792-1112 or (512) 389-4505.

Here's hoping everyone's tree has a ten pounder under it. Till next year, MERRY FISHING!

The most important gift you can give is LOVE. A good relationship brings you closer to yourself as well as closer to the one you love.

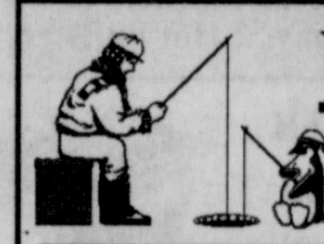

## The War Next Door

Eastland County residents, like the rest of the world, woke up Wednesday to find a small but deadly war going on in Panama.

President Bush, after a lengthy stalemate and declaration of war form Dictator Manuel Noriega, sent 9,500

soldiers and Marines to join U.S. troops on a 1 a.m. assault against the General's headquarters and army bases.

The military strike is regarded as successful at this time. Unfortunately about 18 U.S. Military personnel have been reported killed, and a

number wounded. Several Americans are missing, including one newsman.

And what do local people think of this turn of events? A sampling of opinions indicates that most tend to agree with the actions of President Bush, although some reservations were expressed.

"I'm very disturbed and worried about the situation in Panama," County Judge Scott Bailey said. "I'm alarmed that such a strategic place is in such turmoil."

"Of course the Panama Canal Zone is not as vital as it once was, for some big (modern) ships can't go through it. But it's important that we have presence there, and under military treaties, we have a right to be there."

"What irks me is the talk about the U.S. 'invading' Panama. I can't believe our country has 'invaded' that little place - I hope that's wrong! In war, an 'invasion' is when you bombard and shoot up everything."

"I wish the people in Panama thought more of us. Maybe things can finally be straightened out - and hopefully diplomacy can play a part."

Earl Bradley, President of EBAA Iron, said that the conflict in Panama seems very real to him. For one thing, he and Jim Keffer were there some time back, and stayed in the Marriott Hotel, one of the focal points of the battles.

In speaking of the Army assault, "All I can say is 'Finally,'" Bradley states.

"You remember what I said when Senator Phil Gramm was here, about two years ago? 'We'll take our stand in Central Am, else the Rio Grand!'"

"The strike President Bush

ordered - we had to do that. I'm glad it hasn't been as bloody as some other fighting."

"Things got worse there shortly after Jimmy Carter 'gave' the American Canal in Panama to the Panamanians. He paid them to take it, and they are paid money annually to run it."

"As for Noreiga - I speculate he's probably in Cuba or Libya right now," Bradley concluded.

County Auditor Ray Pruitt says he supports President Bush's actions in Panama. "Of course I hate to see us involved," he adds. "It's an unfortunate thing - but something had to be done, and I believe the President was

right. Hopefully we can get it settled and get out of there."

Pruitt had a taste of an 'invasion' in World War II, after joining the Navy on his 17th birthday. During the Philippine invasion he was on a tanker carrying octane gas to smaller tankers.

Nancy Trout, County Tax Collector, also had some thoughts about the fighting in Panama. She said she didn't know enough about the situation to make much comment. "But I think it's absolutely tragic that our boys are having to lose their lives over there," she stated. "Everybody had better get together and join in prayer that God will help us."

## Texas Health News & Views

During the past week we have had numerous calls in regard to the new Medicare Law and Supplemental Insurance. We have also had many calls concerning hospital and doctor bills.

Many of the problems will have to be held in reserve until we see what the Federal Government is going to do about the new Medicare Benefits. I have been advised I will receive a copy of the New Law and as soon as I receive it I will put it in this column.

In regard to the Supplemental Insurance, I have asked you to not drop the

policy that you have at present because we do not know the New Premiums and the coverage. Some of you have been calling saying you have received notice that the Supplemental Premiums have risen. One Insurance Company has increased their premiums from \$60 to \$121.00 per month. While another person called (She was 64 years of age) saying her premium had risen to \$1700.00 per quarter or to \$566.66 per month. It is obvious these people will have to change insurance carriers. However, we call to your attention: If you take out another Insurance Policy you will have a "waiting period" and you might not be covered in case of illness or accident.

It puts the people in a real hard position because such premiums as I have indicated are too high when you must carry another policy on top of that one so you will be properly covered. It takes a lot of discussion to arrive at a solution. If you are having this problem call 442-2024 or 442-2263 between the hours of 8-5 p.m. and perhaps we will be able to guide you.

1989 many changes have resulted in our access to Health Care. Not only is it expensive but it is becoming less and less available. Many doctors do not take assignments. The Medicare is decreasing its payment toward our claims. However, even though 1989 has been a difficult year there is no doubt 1990 will be even more frustrating!

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

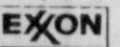
