Citizens For Responsible Progress Make Statement

The people in favor of the 120 percent tax increase imposed on us by the Cisco Hospital District Board to keep E.L. Graham hospital open, would have you believe that this enormous increase would solve all the problems of our hospital. Unfortunately this is not the case. As we hope to point out to you. We are well aware that people signed our petition to roll-back this tax increase for many different reasons. Some because it made them furious that their vote against this tax increase was blatantly ignored, others because they never used the hospital anyway. A good many people have had to seek medical help out of Cisco due to a lack of doctors. If you use an Eastland doctor chances are you use the Eastland hospital. Still others had bad experiences with the local hospital. However, a large number simply cannot afford anymore taxes.

How do we know that this \$600,000 a year payroll etc. is really spent in our community. Even though their books, records, and minutes of their board meetings are supposed to be open to the citizens of Cisco during any normal business day. They take every precaution to keep this information a secret. If they have few or no patients in the hospital it is you the taxpayer that is contributing this \$600,000 to our economy by footing the bill for employee wages, operating expenses and etc. with your taxes.

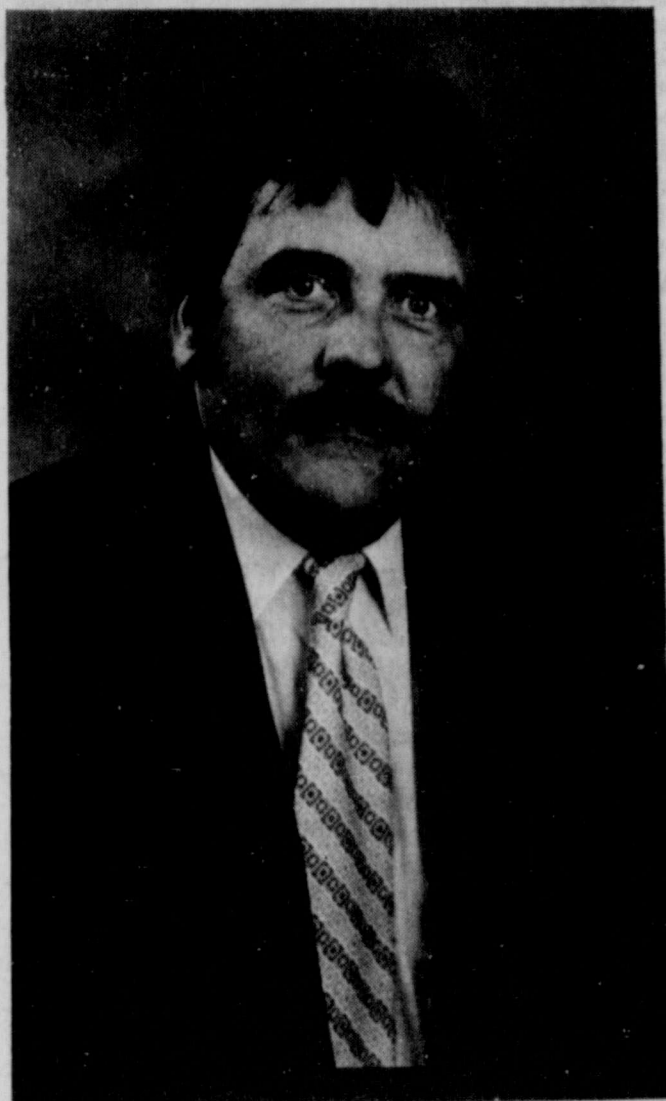
This "multiplier" effect that they would have us believe in is just another way to flim flam the public. The majority of us know next to nothing about multiplier effects, gross national products, and all these big

phrases politicians use to justify taxing us to death. That multiplier effect means nothing to a widow woman left totally alone, living on a fixed income that is in danger of losing her home because she can't pay her taxes. We do shed tears "crocodile if that term suits you" for her and her male counterpart. Every elderly person in our city does not have a loving son or daughter to fight for them.

Every year we have all watched our taxes, utilities, insurance, and every thing else rise alarmingly. To those people on fixed incomes alone in this world this earth shattering. To those of us still able to work, and make a modest living its nearly as bad. When you have to pay 9 different taxes just to try and make that modest living you get mighty tired of taxes and the people that think the only solution to every problem is to raise taxes.

Lets talk about Emergency room service. That service is often the critical difference between life and death. However if there is not the proper equipment, and supplies to operate this emergency room each minute wasted there decreases your chances of survival. Your tax money is being used for many things that would be better spent on a well supplied emergency room. Prestige seems to be more important to some than your life. The Prestige of being accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals is just not necessary. It cost and added expense of from 5 to 10 thousand dollars depending on the size of the

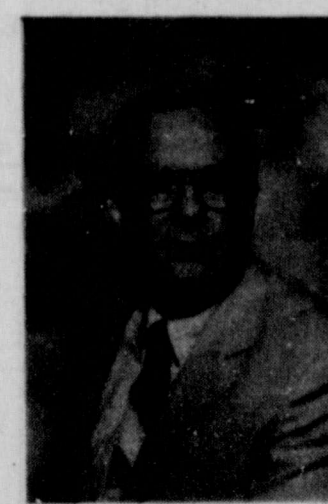

Dave Roever, a Vietnam Veteran began his speech by declaring to the student body that he, "was proud to be an American." The assembly was held at the Cisco High School Auditorium, Thursday, January 4, 1990. The audience which was made up of students, teachers, and local residents was captivated throughout the whole speech.

He spoke about drugs, peer pressure, drinking and driving. His response to "Everyone is doing it," is simple enough; he says "Not everyone is doing it." The same goes for drugs; just saying no is a good start but

stand tall when you say it, he said.

Mr. Roever recalled the date, July 6, 1969, which was the day he had his great misfortune in Vietnam. As he held a grenade in his hand, ready to throw it into a fox hole containing enemy soldiers, they began to shoot and a bullet hit the grenade, causing it to blow up in his hand. His suffered burns over 40 percent of his body, lost 60 pounds of flesh, and disfigurement of his face. When he saw his wife for the first time at Brooks Medical Center in San Antonio, Tx. she said she still loved him. And what he looked like did not matter. She then

welcomed him home.

He has written a book about his experiences, titled "Welcome Home Davey". The High School has purchased one and it will be available for students in the library; also available is a video cassette of his crusade.

He ended his speech by playing "Oh, Danny Boy" a song written by a father whose son never returned from a war. His skills on the piano are excellent and the song touched everyone in the audience.

Large Community Response To Tragedy

On Wednesday evening Dec. 27 a boat carrying three Eastland teenagers capsized on Lake Leon. One of the boys, Bryan Mannke, managed to swim to shore. But Aaron Bowles and Brad Nicholson struggled behind and sank in the icy water.

Shortly afterward a search was launched for Bowles and Nicholson, and it became one of the greatest outpourings of effort and concern ever seen in this county. The bodies of these two boys were recovered the next afternoon.

Many Law Enforcement Departments were involved in the search, as well as Fire Departments, various other groups, and hundreds of individuals.

The families of Aaron Bowles, Brad Nicholson and Bryan Mannke wish to express deep appreciation to the many organizations and people who responded to this tragedy. All gave freely of their time and means in an effort to locate these boys.

Eastland County Game Warden Kenneth Payne, Coordinator of the search effort, wishes to add his thanks to those of the families involved.

"The search was one of the smoothest-running operations of this kind I have ever seen," Payne says. "It seemed that ideas of the workers blended together. Everyone had the desire to help, and cooperation was great."

Payne says the Eastland County Dispatch alerted him about 7:20 p.m. Wednesday, and he arrived at the Lade around 7:30. Some people were already at the scene, attempting to locate the boys.

A coordinated search began, and lasted until 1:30 that night. It resumed at 7 a.m. Thursday morning, and ended after the bodies of the two boys were located.

Among those assisting during those long hours were the Emergency Medical Services, the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, Ranger Fire Department, two Game Wardens from Brownwood, one from Callahan County and one from Comanche County.

Also assisting was the Texas Ranger, the Department of Public Safety, the Eastland County Sheriff's Department, the Lake Patrolman, Eastland Police Department, the Eastland County Bass Club, other organizations, businesses and many individuals.

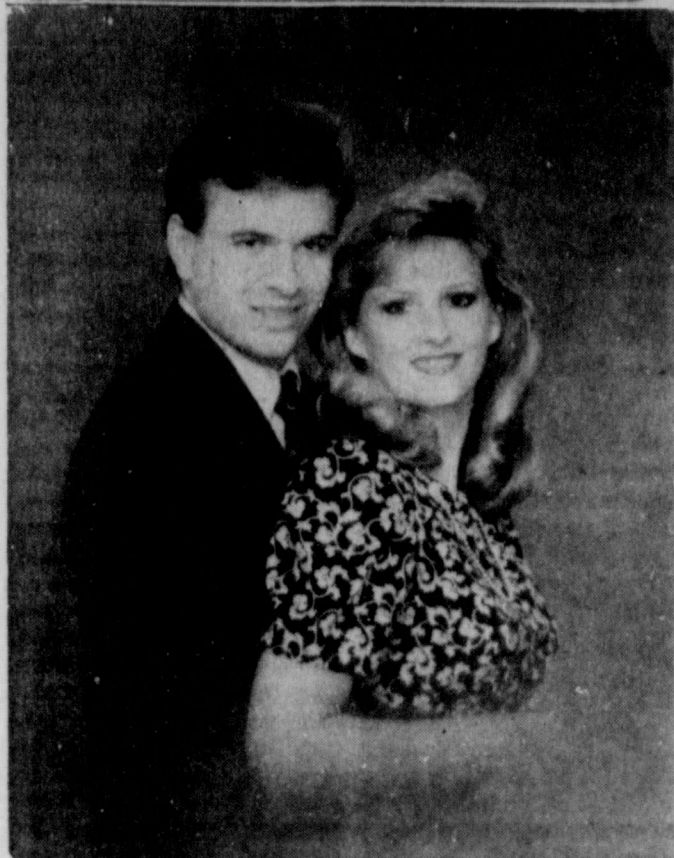

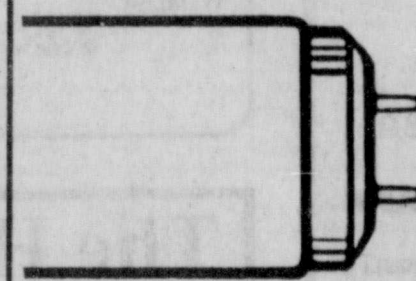

AARP News By Roy Cartee Health Issues And Views

I told you in 1989 that I would advise you to the Medicare benefit changes for the year 1990 as soon I have found out what they were. I have been advise the following changes have been passed by Congress:

1. The Part A and B Provisions will revert to 1988, that is Pre-Catastrophic levels of Benefits.
2. The Medicaid Buy-In and Spousal Impoverishment benefits will still be available to eligible beneficiaries.
3. Outpatient drugs (except immunosuppressives following Transplants), Respite Care, Mamographies and the part be cap, as well as Supplemental Premiums are all repealed.

4. The part B premium is protected at this time to be \$26.80 per month for 1990. Because of computer problems and 1990 adjustments, \$5.30 will be added each month until the computer can be adjusted. This will make \$32.10 to be taken from your Social Security until perhaps July. Beneficiaries will receive a lump sum reimbursement in May or later equal to the extra

charges paid. The best we can tell you is that any funds paid into the system due to Catastrophic will be refunded sometime during 1990.

5. Federal guidelines for minimum standards in Medicare Supplements will also be changed to match New Medicare Benefits. All policyholders must be notified by their Insurance company by January 31, 1990 about their new benefits and premiums.

6. Any patient in a hospital or Skilled Nursing Facility and covered under 1989 benefits will continue to be covered at that level until their discharge or maximum benefits are reached.

I am aware that the information that I am releasing is vague and may not answer your questions but we will go into detail on each segment of the information received at later news releases. Basically you can plan to go back to the benefits of 1988 and you will be safe. The only thing - we are finding the Supplemental Insurance Policies are rising at a rate of 25-50 percent. Still I encourage you to be slow about dropping any premium solely on the cost at this time

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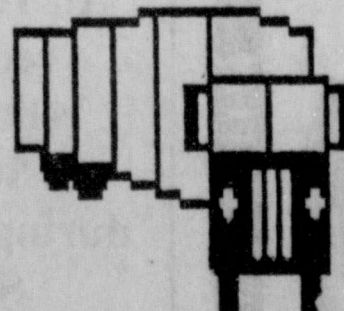

Carter attended Southwest Texas State University, Cameron State University, Washburn University and Pan

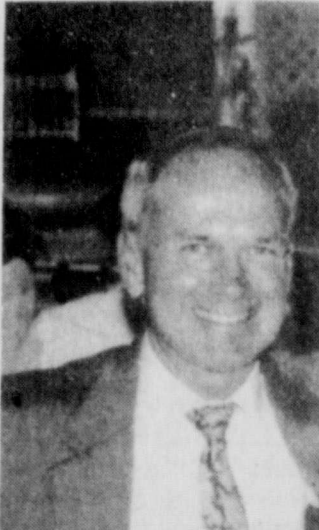
American University. She has served as pianist for many

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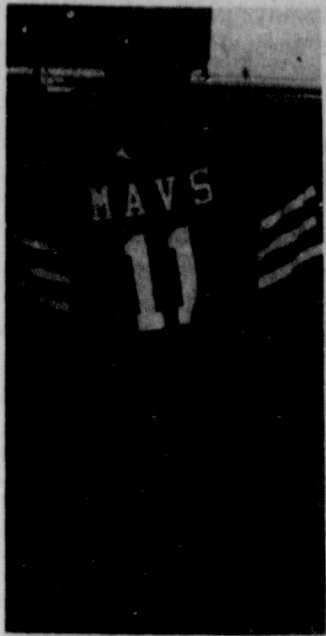

Fishing Outdoors

A new decade, were did it all go? Well hopefully everyone can look back and see growth and improvement. The fishing industry has moved forward in leaps and bounds, but in the same in-

stant the trend in lures seemed to revert to old standards. The jig, zara spook's, Johnson's swimming minnow, and the worm with a few new twist.

Fishing lines moved into the future with smaller di-

ameters, less abrasion, more backbone and a few new color pigmentation.

The 1980's may best be remembered for the move toward ultralight. Small line, small reels, light rods and a little bait with a funny but to the point name "The Gitzits."

But the 1990's are here and the trends will change and change again. Trophy bass will be popping up in many lakes in our area. Just look at Possum Kingdoms 16 pound lunker in 1989.

Especially worth mentioning for their many accomplishments is the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The T P & W's fish hatcheries had an excellent production year in 1989, with more than 17.7 million fingerlings of 18 species and about 95 million fry stocked in the state's waters.

Gene McCarty, assistant hatchery chief for the department's Fish hatchery Branch, said most of the game fish species stocked have seen increases in numbers over 1988. "Overall, the system has worked well, especially since the new A E Wood Hatchery in San Marcos and new ponds at the GCCA-CPL Marine Development Center went on line," McCarty said. He added that another suc-

cessful program was the first-ever stockings of more than 34,000 paddlefish into BA Steinhagen Reservoir in the departments only scientific area as part of the paddlefish restoration program.

The department has stocked almost 2.8 million Florida largemouth bass this year, McCarty said. New reservoirs such as Richland-Chambers and Ray Roberts received more than 1.8 million of the fingerlings.

"Production was extremely good again this year, allowing us to stock excellent-quality fingerlings," said Pat Hutson, Florida bass program leader.

The recent loss of two of our young outdoorsmen and conservationist at Lake Leon was truly a loss to us all. But I feel both of these young outdoorsmen would want us each to realize that accidents can happen anytime to anyone. With colder weather upon us why not take the time out to really give out boats and equipment a good going over. Check that drain plug out making sure it isn't lose in the hole, if you have a bilge pump is it working properly. When was the last time you pulled out your fire extinguisher and checked it. Are your running lights working, is the nut on your prop tight-

Too much caffeine may interfere with fertility, according to a preliminary study reported in The Lancet. Even one cup a day seems to cut the likelihood of getting pregnant.

Snake venom from Malayan pit vipers may prevent damage from strokes if used in time, early research suggests. Teaching hospitals around the country are conducting larger tests now.

Sodium-fluoride toothpastes help adults, too. In a new study of adults from 54 to 93, those who used fluorides had 67 percent less decay at the roots, and 41 percent less decay on tooth crowns.

Obesity may cause arthritis, researchers at Boston University found. Doctors suggest the problem may be metabolic changes as well as the strain of extra weight.

FAMILY FOCUS-DEVELOPING FAMILY PRIDE

In his book *Roots*, Alex Haley tells a moving story that has rapidly become an American classic. *Roots* is usually looked upon as a story about black people—a triumph of black pride. But when we stop to think about it, it is a story about families as well—a triumph of family pride.

Many people these days worry about America becoming a rootless society. Families who once lived in close proximity are today scattered all over the country, with few close relatives nearby and little opportunity to experience "family" in a wider sense.

Even within our immediate families, life is often so busy and overscheduled that family members have little time for each other. With the children in school, Mom and Dad at work, and grandparents living far away, Americans seem to identify more with their peer groups than with their family.

However, across America today, there are signs of a reawakening of family pride. We have begun, as a nation, to rediscover that a family is something special. As families learn to celebrate their own uniqueness, family life takes on a new richness and satisfaction. At the same time, the family begins to become a whole that is more than sum of its parts—a source of

strength and support to each individual family member.

Developing family pride is one of the most important things families can do to create a more satisfying life together. Family pride comes from knowing family history, carrying out family traditions, recognizing family achievements, and affirming family values.

An essential step to develop family pride is spending time together. Research has confirmed that strong families spend time together. It is through spending quality time together that meaningful sharing can occur and a sense of family can grow.

2 lbs. squash, cooked and drained

2 medium onions
1 can chopped green chilies
2 eggs
Mash squash and season, mix along with other ingredients except stuffing and margarine. Melt margarine and pour over stuffing. Cover bottom of medium Pyrex dish with half of stuffing. Add the mixed ingredients and cover with the other half of stuffing. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

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USDA Announces 1990 National Peanut Poundage Quota

Under Secretary of Agriculture Richard T. Crowder today announced the national peanut poundage quota of 1,560,000 short tons, or 3,120 million pounds, for the 1990 marketing year. The quota is 120,000 short tons more than the 1989 quota.

Crowder said that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is required by law to announce the final national poundage quota for the 1990 marketing year by Dec. 15.

As required by the Agricultural Adjustment Act, as amended, that national poundage quota for the 1990 crop has been set at a level that is equal to the estimated

quantity for peanuts that will be devoted to domestic edible uses, seed and related uses in the 1990 marketing year. The marketing begins Aug. 1, 1990.

The 1990 crop national poundage quota will be allocated to each state based on the state's share of the 1985 crop national poundage quota.

Increases in a state's poundage quota will be allocated among qualifying farms in accordance with prescribed procedures.

In a January 1986 referendum, peanut growers approved poundage quotas for the 1986-1990 crops.

hospital (ours is 35 beds), and their accreditation is no more stringent than the one you have to have from the Texas Department of Health in order to open your doors. This accreditation is free, but no matter you have to have it to operate you do not have the J.C.A.H. accreditation.

We will continue to lose more residents of our population to runaway taxes than to the loss of a hospital. When you reach a certain age you are more concerned with how to keep living than how you will die. Statistics show that whether we have a hospital or not has had little effect on the population growth or decline in Cisco. According to the Texas Almanac Cisco reached its peak in 1920 with 7,422 people and no hospital. Dr. Grahams hospital was built by Humble Oil Co. for their employees, and remained so as long as they maintained operations in Cisco. The population has dropped

steadily since then; 1930-6,027; 1940-4,868; 1950-5,230 a little raise due to men coming home from service, 1960-4,499; 1970-4,950; 1980-4,517; and we wouldn't have that much if the students of the Junior College weren't counted with us.

We have checked again with Nancy Trouts office in Eastland, and she assured our committee on Wednesday, January 3, 1990. Her office is still working hard to get your voters cards to you. However you cannot be denied the right to vote if you are registered, but do not receive it by January 20, 1990, which is unlikely. In fact you can vote absentee now until January 16, 1990. The Primaries will be held on Tuesday, March 13, 1990, and the last day to register to vote in a Primary is February 11.

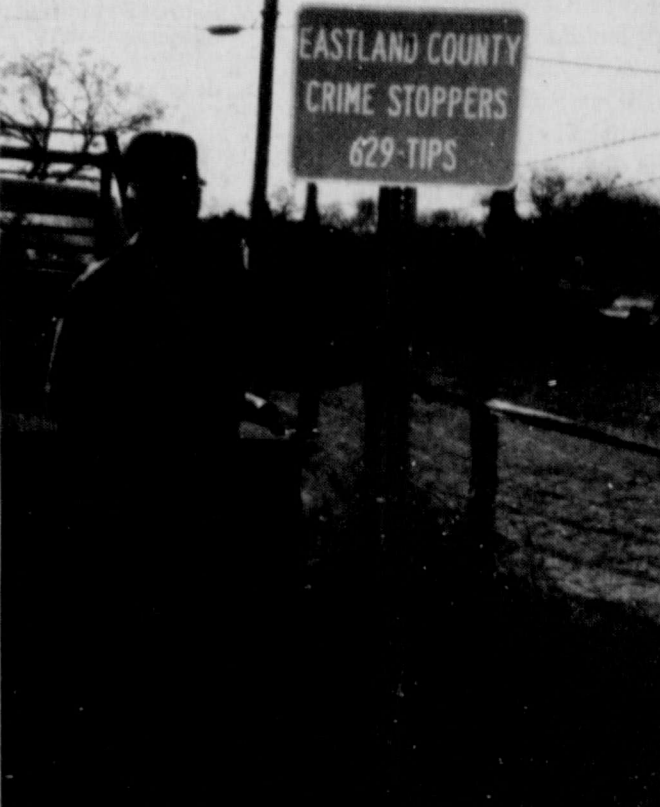
