Cold Weather Causes Fatalities

Although Texas is not among the states noted for severe winters, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) warns that extreme cold can be a killer. Residents should beware of dangers, especially during unusually cold, windy periods such as occurred in

December. Dr. Clift Price, TDH Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services, said, "Already this winter, people have died from the cold in Texas, despite health agency warnings and more weather accurate forecasting from the U.S.

Weather Service. According to Leland Carmichael, of the Health Department's Statistics Bureau, "Two persons died in Texas from excessive cold in 1988, and 27 died the year before. Final figures for 1989 will not be available until the middle of 1990. Of the two 1988 fatalities, one of the victims was less than a year old and the other was between 50 and 54 years old," Carmichael

Dr. Price explained that the most frequent victims of hypothermia - dangerous loss of body heat - are extremely young children, the sick and the elderly. He said children's small bodies radiate reserved heat faster than adults'.

"People chronically ill, using medications, drugs, or excessive alcohol may have lower resistance to sharp temperature changes, and may react slowly in emergencies," he added.

Homeless people are further at risk where temporary shelter is not available. Also, beyond age 65, some persons begin to lose their natural refglex to shiver, which is both an automatic warming mechanism to stimulate the circulation and a means of alerting the individual to dangerous temperature.

Hypothermia starts when the deep body temperature drops to 95 degrees, just less than four degrees below normal. The victim becomes lethargic and confused. Drowsiness, slurred speech, falling blood pressure, shallow breathing and a bloated or pinkish tint to the skin develop. Unless the individual receives warmth, coma and death are imminent.


"Some victims die quietly in their own homes, before anyone realizes the danger." Dr. Price said.

Very few people "freeze to death," since death occurs long before the body temperature reaches the freezing point, although extremities may freeze if exposed to severe cold, Dr. Price explained.

"Even people who work outside in dangerously cold weather often underestimate the elements, particularly wind-chilld," Dr. Price added. "A brisk wind combined with a temperature slightly below freezing can increase the chilling effect on exposed skin by almost 50 degrees below the thermometer

reading," he said. Dr. Price warned that anyone who must be outside in extremely cold weather, especially when it is windy, should wear loose-fitting, layered clothing, gloves and face covering. They also should have emergency plans for staying warm if conditions worsen

Dr. Price added that common sense and at least a fundamental understanding of wind-chill are essential for anyone outdoors in severe cold. "The best advice is to stay home and stay warm. But if you must go out, know the dangers and prepare for them," he cautioned.



The percentage of the proposed increase is about half as much as the rate of inflation in the Dallas/Fort Worth area for the same period.

TU Electric's dedication to costcontrol, productivity and efficiency has brought abut estimated savings of about \$800 million dollars since 1984, Nye said. On Cults Informs Parents Over 250 people attended the program on satanism and cults in Breckenridge last Monday evening, January 15th. Investigator Bill Parrish, of the Mansfield Police Department, presented the material. The crowd examined ceremonial cloths, robes. books, a chalice, and other materials on display.

Parrish described the different types of religious groups. Some, practicing paganism or witchcraft, seldom commit criminal acts. Others, labeled criminal deviant movements, become involved in criminal conduct. Parrish defined destructive religious cults, which prey on young people, employing deceitful recruitment tactics. Examples of such groups include the skinheads, the KKK, the Moonies, satanic

the characteristics of a young person most vulnerable to recruitment: intelligent, of the middle class or up, underachieving, bored, not involved, isolated from peers, from an unstable home, and under litter supervision. Cults sometimes use drugs and heavy metal rock music to lure these young people. Parrish explained the meaning of various satanic symbols, such as the pentagram, the inverted cross, etc. Parrish presented a film,

The film gave a graphic account of the tactics of some heavy metal bands and rap performers to promote destructive behavior. The lyrics of many popular songs and the concert antics of these performers openly encourages alcohol and drug abuse, deviant sexual behaviors, extreme violence, and satanic involvement. The album covers and fold-outs, described as hardcore pornography, are readily available to children of any age in record stores everywhere. Parents can contact P. M. R. C. at the following address:

After the film presentation, Parrish stressed the importance of parental involvement in the lives of teenagers and young adolescents. The dangers of exposure to violent and satanic videos, such as the notorious The Faces of Death, requires vigilance on the part of parents. Parrish urged everyone to become educated about these issues. Through a stable home environment and open communication, parents can help protect their children from dan-

gerous cults. The Alpha Sigma Tau Sorority and the Breckenridge Police Department worked to bring the program to Breckenridge. Investigator Bill Parrish, who has attended cult investigation schools in Richmond, Virginia, Florida, and Killeen, Texas, lectures to law enforcement groups, health professionals, teachers, and parents.

Corpus Christi Meeting To **Focus On Various Subjects**

A statewide conference here Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 explores ways to ensure environmentally safe use of agricultural chemicals and pesticides.

Dr. John E. Bremer of Corpus Christi, a weed specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said while pest control can assure an adequate food supply, the presence of pesticide residues in food raises many concerns by growers and consumers.

Bremer said planners of the conference on "Chemicals. Agriculture and our Environment" will address many segments of the problem. The conference will be at the Corpus Christi Holiday Inn-Airport, 5549 Leopard. The keynote speaker will

be Dr. Elizabeth m. Whelan of New York City, the executive director of the American Council on Science and Health and author of 16 books. Her subject is "Are Agricultural Chemicals A Threat to Humans? Perspective of an Epidemiologist."

A panel of experts will speak on aspects of "Farming for America's Environmentally Sensitive Society," while

other major speakers will discuss "A Look at Farm Production Practices of the Future" and "Low-Input Sustainable Agriculture-Its Place in South Texas."

Opening day speakers also will discuss use of chemicals in agriculture, the economics of growing farm products without chemicals, agricultural chemicals and wildlife. the influence of the environmental movement on the upcoming farm bill, and how food safety can be assured.

Among presentations scheduled the second day are discussions on the latest chemical regulations, how water supplies will affect farming in the future, and how to farm organically with zero chemical input.

U. S. Rep. E "Kika" de la Garza of Mission, chairman of House Agriculture Committee, will address the Feb. 1 luncheon.

A 13-pound, six ounce largemouth bass caught at Choke Canyon Reservoir on New Year's Day is the Operation Share and Lone Star Lunker program's first entry

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said Fred Washington of Ingram hauled the fish to the Heart O' the Hills Research Station on Jan. 2, and a department crew transported it to the Tyler Fish Hatchery Jan. 3.

Washington said he caught the 25-inch long fish on a spinner in about eight feet of

The lunker program allows anglers to loan 13-pound-plus largemouths to department for spawning and research. Donors receive fiberglass replicas of their catch, and the fish usually are released alive after the spawning period.

Speak up when you're angry! Associate professor of psychiatry at the University of California/San Diego suggests that suppressing anger is a serious hyperiension risk. He recommends assertiveness training where needed.


