Avoid High Interest By Paying City Taxes Now

Did you know that you may pay as much as 84 percent annual percentage rate interest on your delinquent

The City of Cisco reminds all its citizens that have not yet paid their 1989 taxes that they have until January 31, 1990 to pay them before they become delinquent.

On February 1, 1990, all unpaid taxes become delinquent and a penalty and interest rate of 7 percent is automatically added to those taxes. (That 7 percent rate when carried out as an annual percentage rate actually amounts to 84 percent.) Then an additional 1 percent

interest per month is added

to delinquent taxes each and every month thereafter until the taxes are paid. Also, if your city taxes are not paid by July 1, 1990, an additional 15 percent for attorney's fee is automatically added on.

To avoid this extra cost, everyone who has not vet paid their 1989 City taxes are reminded and encouraged to do so before January 31,

The City of Cisco has many obligations and service requirements that must be met over the course of the fiscal year, and they can only be met by the timely collection of city property taxes. Please help your city serve you by paying your taxes on

Implantable defibrillator that shocks a heart back into action if it stops has saved lives at the University of California/San Francisco Hospital. After four years, doctors judge the implant more effective than drugs for those with serious arrhythmias.

New drug--flutamide--that blocks the effect of testosterone on cancer cells has prolonged the lives of patients with fatal prostate cancer in trials at the University of Colorado in Denver.

Memopause seems to cause changes in women's blood, researchers at the University of Pittsburgh found. HDL levels (the good cholesterol) dropped 4 points while

LDLs (the bad kind) went up 12. More rubber-band "surgery"--Doctors at the University

of Colorado and VA hospital are using the bands to tie off veins that protrude into the esophagus. Few complications are reported.

Eastland Memorial Hospital To Sponsor Breast Cancer **Detection Unit Feb. 5th**

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival

rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be made available to local women on Monday, Febru-

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services EASTLAND, TEXAS today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for early detection of breast

The program is voluntary

and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accredication program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation

Program. Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in EASTLAND, TEXAS on MONDAY, FEBRUARY 5. You may call 629-2601 for an appointment.

Number Of Convictions In 91st District Court

There were a number of cases heard in 91st District Court this week, with convictions obtained.



NUTRITION AND CANCER UPDATE TRAINING:

(5) Two more changes of note: RDA's have been set for the first time for Vitamin K (essential for normal blood clotting) and Selenium. Selenium is essential for proper functioning of the heart muscle. Eighty micrograms of Vitamin K for men and 65 micrograms for women are recommended. Green leafy vegetables are best source of Vitamin K.

Seventy micrograms of Selenium for men and 55 for women are recommended. Selenium is found in fish, meat, breads and cereals. Nutrition is very important

Another Texas hunting season is over. Hunting lease operators are preparing to close their books on this year's hunts and make plans for next year. Lease hunting occurs throughout Texas, but lease operations vary considerably. Many lease operators would like to know how others are providing services and facilities, managing game animals, protecting their operation, pricing their leases, and the range of lease charges. How can they obtain this information? Beginning January 22, 1990, all 12,500 hunting lease operators in Texas will receive a one-page survey that asks for answers to these questions. The survey is easy to complete but of most importance to hunting lease operators will be the results. Finally, they will be able to compare their lease operation with others in the county and state.

This study is a cooperative research effort between the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service. County agents are helping get an excellent response rate by supporting this study and answering questions their lease operators may have about it. The value of the information to

hunting lease operators will be directly related to the number of surveys returned. The Extension Service will provide county/state data results to each County Extension Agent for your area of interest. They will receive the results that compare their personal operation with others in the county and state. This information should help operators and land owners improve their hunting lease programs.

Hunting lease operators that have multiple permits will be sent a survey for each permitted area. Each area under permit is described on the survey by acres and/or name - exactly the way it was described in the permit application. Some operators or landowners may receive from two to 22 surveys in one day. It is important that each survey for each permitted area be completed as a separate acreage. All hunting lease operators that have four or more permitted areas have been contacted about the study and that they would be receiving a lot of mail the third week in January.

The Texas hunting lease system has been in operation since 1929. There has never been a statewide study of how

lease hunting contributes to wise management of the wildlife resource. Other states are beginning to consider lease hunting as an alternative to traditional agricultural land uses. The results of this study may demonstrate that lease hunting on private land is a practical and sensible alter-





Supervisor For most of us, an ambulance means not only emergency care but a trip to the hospital. It is natural to assume that when an ambulance is called, there is a need for prompt, if not emergency medical atten-

Emergency medical services are staffed and equipped to provide either basic life support or advanced life support to prepare and to provide care for a patient during the trip to the

A question that arises frequently concerns which hospital a patient will be taken to.

Because of the location of a family doctor, where a person has been a patient before, and just plain preference, ambulance personnel are requested to take a patient to a particular hospital, not the nearest medical facility.

When a patient, or family, asks to be taken to a hospital that is not the closest, they must be informed by the ambulance personnel that there are a number of rules and requirements that demand that a patient be taken to the closest appropriate medical

This is required by Medicare rules which state, "The patient is transported to the nearest appropriate



illness or injury Local medical protocol for the ambulance service requires the patient be taken to the closest, or local, hospital in order to get the patient to a hospital, and definitive medical treatment as soon as possible

Special Skilled Emergency Medical Technician Kerry Craig. Emergency Medical Service Supervisor, said, "Above all else, these tules and guidelines are established to help provide a patient the best medical treatment as soon as possible.

When calling an ambulance, it must be assumed that a person is asking the ambulance attendants to assume the responsibility of providing the best care possible. Training and common sense require that the nearest medical facility be used," Craig said.

In Eastland County there are four ambulance services, Cisco EMS, Eastland EMS, Ranger EMS, and Rising Star EMS. Each of these services are responsible for their areas and also for providing a back-up for any of the other services when needed. These areas of service or responsibility overlap in some areas and join in others.

It is sometimes difficult for someone to understand why a certain ambulance service responds to a call for help when that person, for whatever reason, might want another service. The same is true about which hospital the patient is taken

As Emergency Medical Service professionals, we understand that a person wants the best care available, especially those with a loved one needing immediate medical attention.


Many times, those extra few miles and minutes to a preferred hospital, rather than the nearest, could mean the difference between life

Over the past several months there have been instances in which the family of a patient taken to the nearest appropriate nospita has lodged complaints because the patient was not taken to the hospital of their

Emergency Medical Service providers understand the concern of the family and the patient. They also, however, understand the patient's need for care and the rules that must be followed in order to provide the patient with the proper medical care as soon as possible.

Cisco EMS supervisor Kerry Craig stated that he would be happy to try to answer any questions that a person might have about Medicare and other government programs as they relate to ambulance transfers.

Be Reissued

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday his office will reissue sales tax permits mailed to North Texas businesses on Monday that may have been lost or damaged when a mail truck crashed and burned near Austin.

Postal Service officials have estimated that as many as 150,000 pieces of mail from Austin and San Antonio destined mostly for ZIP Codes starting with 75 and 76 were destroyed in the fiery crash of an 18-wheel Postal Service truck on Interstate 35 north of Georgetown.

The Comptroller's Office mailed about 3,000 sales tax permits to businesses around the state on Monday and so far about 50 damaged pieces of mail have been returned to the Comptroller by the Postal Service.

'Our computers are running a check on the mail sent to those two ZIP Codes on Monday and we will reissue sales tax certificates sent to those areas," Bullock said.
