



ly came back to West Texas to Grandfather Jacob Autry's "Home Place" northwest of Cuthbert, on

Willow Creek. During the next 35 years, until his death, my father made only one try at living anywhere else. That was a disastrous two-year stint, during the worst of the depression, on stockfarms around Stanton. Coming back to Willow

Creek was like reaching the Promised Land-and I realized I would never care for a flat, treeless country.

At least, on Willow Creek, we had mesquite-with willows and hackberry and a few pecan trees. There were five children in

our family, and my father spent a lot of time with us. He taught us plain living, and a code of ethics which becomes more remarkable to me each year of my life. He was a strong characterone who would battle the whole community for something he thought was right. He had lingering skirmishes with a local school system, which had consolidated our County Line School during the years he lived near Stanton.

My father was a great story-teller-he could hold us spellbound with vivid descriptions and marvelous plots. From him I first learned the value of a story, and how to handle one. My Mother was an outwardly gentle and inwardly courageous person, and she had been brought up with all the refinements of the Old South. If she was discouraged over her battles in the pioneer-like environment in which we lived, no one ever knew about it. I am amazed that I grew up without hearing one harsh word in that home. The word "poor" was never mentioned-only thankfulness over what we had. It took me years to realize that we County Line people were all consisdered 'Underpriviliged'' characters!

My Fahter was Baptist and Mother my Presbyterian. Neither seemed too closely tied to the organization of their churches, but we grew up on Bi-

ble quotations.

The Bible-and a large Dictionary-were the most important books in my home, and I read them over many times. I still feel that this is a basic education a writer should not neglect.

I will always believe that human beings inherit a sort of genetic memory. How else can I account for my desire to play the violin? My father played the guitar and my Mother sang well, but I had heard no one of consequence play the violin when I-at age ten-decided that I must play. Later I learned that some of my ancestors had been Concert violinists.

But my first "playing" was done with two cottonstalks, which I rubbed together. Finally we ordered a violin, which had a dreadful tone.

When I was eleven years old I visited Mountainair, New Mexico, where I heard the legendary Bert Kayser play. I was amazed at his tone, which I can only describe as celestial. This incredible person lived on a ranch near the Manzano mountains with his wife and small children, but he occasionally played in different parts of the Southwest. At one time he had lived with the Spanish people on the Manzano Grant, where he learned many of their folk-

tunes. I knew that I must go back and hear Bert Kayser play, but it was four years before the chance came. In the meanwhile I studied the violin with a young man named John Edwards, a T.C.U. graduate who not lives in Ft. Worth. My Father bought a better violin for me from a local fiddleplayer sho had migrated up from Comanche County.

Ira School-in spite of my Dad's consternation-had a fine English teacher Margaret Pilcher, who gave me a thorough foundation in writing. She also encouraged me to win some Essay Contests. I did not take my writing seriously, but during those years I was absorbing the flavor of that 'Below-The-Caprock'' country, which would later appear in my book "Scurry County Style'

There the scenery was beautiful, the relatives agreeable, and music was a way of life among the Anglo ranchers as well as the Spanish people. I remember that all the people of that area had a great capacity for enjoying life-more, somehow, than the people I had known in western Texas. It was a routine thing for

several great teachers at the school, including Laura and Paul Masters. Paul Masters, Biologist, later became an author and authority on Southwestern Indian life.





Consumers Attitudes Depends On The Oil Squeeze Question

There is an "oil squeeze" on and there's no question about it. There is an energy squeeze on because of the oil squeeze, and there's no question about that either. Whether squeezes become crises remains to be seen and undoubtedly depends upon consumers' attitudes during the months ahead.

We have read-and writtena great bit about the high cost of spoilage, the "war on waste," the need to conserve, and the need to cut back where we have been rather cavalier in our excess usages. It's gratifying to learn at industry meetings and seminars around the country that these warnings are being headed. Money alone is not the issue.

Since our plants, our paper mills, and the factories manufacturing the materials we need in our businesses are strongly dependent upon energy directly or indirectly suphied by oil, our ears flap when we hear of the threatened shortages brought about by turmoil in the Middle East. We well remember the Arab oil embargo five years ago when we had to queue up at the pumps for driving-around gasoline and fuel oil delivery trucks limited their deliveries. We suddenly all got smart and did a lot less nonessential driving as we turned down our home and office thermostats. We're faced with a similar siutation again and it wouldn't hurt one bit to give serious thought to how we can avoid petroleum paralysis. We have just come out of particularly vicious winter that has been a drain on oil supplies. In March U.S. demand for oil passed 21 million barrels a day for the first time ever.

While the Iranian fields are producing again and will help ease world shortages, this will be of little direct aid to the U.S., since we are far from being in their favor at the moment. Further, the Iranian government has already announced that it will restrict its output to half what it produced under the Shah, and to pick up the monetary slack, has increased its price per barrel from \$13.34 to around \$20, a neat 40 percent increase. The U.S. relies heavily on Venezuelan imports and its price, too, is on the rise for residual fuel used to generate electricty for our schools, factories, and other buildings. Even as we write this the Saudi government and the OPEC are planning price boosts this month with more to follow, no doubt.

With such indications of concern about us, the printing and publishing business continues to be upbeat. The paper industry produced a record 61.5 million tons of paper and paperboard in 1978, which was an increase of 3 percent over 1977. Imports were up by 23 percent to a record 9.14 million tons, according to the American Paper Institute. Most of the latter was newsprint from Canada but coated paper imports rose to 214,000 tons, almost double the imports of the year before. Orders for printing equipment and related supplies, bolstered by the showing at Graph Expo last month and concern over further inflation, have back-logged because now is a good time to buy. Prices will escalte as our energy friend. costs move steadily upward. By placing orders now we can circumvent the inevitable and at least avoid

some of the increases that







Peanut Growers Concerned Over GKist Contract Ranger, Texas Eastland, Texas Cisco, Texas

Peanut growers in the Southwest are viewing a recent announcement by Gold Kist Peanuts regarding 1979 crop contracting with great concern. Ross Wilson, Southwestern peanut growers Association Manager, said the Gold Kist offer of \$357 per ton for 50 percent of the farm additional production and \$305 for the remaining 50 percent is significantly below the contract prices being offered by other area shellers for additional peanuts for export. According to Wilson other shellers are offering prices generally from \$380 per ton to \$391 per ton The SWPGA Manager said

that Gold Kist officials had informed him on May 10 that

the Atlanta based firm did not plan to contract any additional peanuts in the Southwest. He said Gold Kist indicated at that time it planned to do its contracting of peanuts for export with growers in the Southwestern United States because of lower costs of acquisition and shipping.

The Association Manager emphasized that contracting peanuts at the level of \$357 per ton likely will work adversely to grower interest in two respects-(1) such contract price levels will encourage lower export market levels for shelled peanuts and (2) such a low contract price is an indication to USDA and the Congress that growers can and will grow peanuts for reduced quota support rates. Gold Kist officials who met

with Texas and Oklahoma growers recently are reported to have encouraged utlization of the Southwest Runner pool as an alternative to contracting in 1979. Wilson said that SWPGA currently is not advising gorwers to produce peanuts for pool participation. In areas where the tree roots are confinded due to street and curb conditions as well as other structural features, extra fertilizer is sometimes necessary. Tree fertilization is seldom needed more than once every three years ex-

The recommendations usually made are based on trunk diamter and make no allowance for the fact that the root zone may be confined to a a limited area. If these recommendations were followed, it could result in over fertilization and damge to some trees.

The safest method of computing the amount of fertilizer to use is to base it on the number of square feet included in the branch spread

analysis of 8-8-8 to supply the two pounds of actual nitrogen required. A fertilizer analysis of 16-20-0 would require 12 pounds of the materal to supply the needed nitrogen. The same complete fertilizer recommended for lawn use will be satisfactory for fertilizing trees in a given region.

If the root zone of the tree described above is confined for example, to an area of 12 feet by 20 feet due to buildings, curbs, walks, or streets, the fertilizer application should be computed on the basis of actual root zone-in this case 240

plete fertilizer with an square feet, rather than the 1,000 square feet; in this case 240 square feet, rahter than the 1,000 sq. feet; therefore, use only one-fourth as much fertilizer. To compensate for the

reduced root area, a second application should be made in late fall with the first application being made in late winter or early spring.

The fertilizer should be spread evenly beneath the branch spread of the tree and watered thoroughly.







It may mean some of these things to some people. But should it not mean, above everything else, a symbol of American Civilization, Enlightment and Liberty; a reflection of patriotism at it's finest?




