The instrumental feature of the concert will be a concerto for harpsichord and organ.

According to Mr. Peebles, the Friday performance was nearing the sold-out mark two weeks ahead of time. Though there were plenty of seats available for the Thursday performance, Peebles said that those who wish to attend should make their reservations as soon as possible.

Easy Actions Can Make Difference Between Safe Winter And Tragedy

Opening a window slightly can save a life. So can blowing dust out of a space heater or checking an extension cord. All these easy actions can make the difference between a warm, safe winter and tragedy.

The Texas Medical Association has issued a warning urging people to check heaters for hazards that could cause fire, explosion or suffocation.

TAM reports that one major mistake people make is to fire up their heaters for the first time this winter without checking them.

Gas heaters and hoses should be checked before being lit for the first time every winter and after they are accidentally hit. The old "simple" way of running a lighted match near a heater to detect leaks can cause explosions. Smelling for gas and letting a repairman inspect heaters are the best methods of checking heaters. If a gas smell is noticed, flames should be put out until the leak is found and fixed.

Gas heaters also need to be checked for major accumulations of dust. Often a filling station air hose can clear any excess dust out easily.

Electric space heaters need inspection for dust and worn electric cords. But most electric heater problems occur when the heater is running. Unless it has a switch that cuts the heater off automatically when it overturns, an electric heater can cause a fire if it is knocked over. Another electric heater danger involves shocks that can occur when water or household items hit the electric heating element.

Electric heaters share some fire hazards with gas open-flame heaters. They both can cause fire

niture, floors and drapes to burn if they are too close to such items. And they can catch clothing on fire if people stand too close too long.

Gas space heaters have unique hazards that kill several people yearly. These heaters can kill by burning up all the oxygen in an unventilated room or by filling a room with unburned gas if the flame goes out. Good defenses against such problems include keeping a window slightly open while using the heater and not sleeping with the heater on.

Texas Pecan Week Being Observed In Eastland County

Texas Pecan Week is being observed this week in Eastland County.

Activities begin with the County Pecan Queen Pageant, Monday night, at the Cisco Junior College. Fifteen contestants will be competing for the crown, now being held by the 1979 queen, Miss Shelly Gray of Rising star.

Activities will end next Friday and Saturday, with the 27th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show, at the Eastland County Courthouse. This week's activities will be sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The Eastland Chamber of Commerce will be co-sponsors of the Pecan Show and Bake Show.

Not counting the thousands of native pecan trees that shade yards of homes, the 1979 Texas commercial pecan crop is estimated to be enormous. According to figures from the Texas Pecan Growers Association, production of pecans in Texas has increased greatly in the past 50 years. In 1919, the Texas legislature declared the pecan as the official State Tree. The next year, Texas produced 2 million pounds of pecans. In 1968 pecan production for Texas was 69 million pounds. Last year, due to poor growing conditions, the crop was 26 million pounds. The 1979 crop, estimated to exceed 100 million pounds, will be the highest in the State's history. The production outlook is not so bright in the southern states, as Hurricane Frederick, severely damaged the pecan crops in those states.

Consumers should take advantage of the good crop of pecans in Texas and Eastland County. Pecans

SELECT TREE WITH CARE

Selecting your Christmas tree wisely and giving it proper care will help it last throughout the holiday season.

First, consider the tree species, says Dr. Michael Walterscheid, forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Common species grown in Michigan, Minnesota and Oregon and sold in Texas include Scotch pine and Douglas fir. There are also some spruce, noble fir and concolor fir. All make acceptable Christmas trees. They are cut in October, then stored and shipped south as Christmas approaches. Generally, these trees are in good condition when they arrive in Texas.

Recently, producers in southern states have started growing Virginia pines in plantations for Christmas trees. According to Walterscheid, Virginia

pinus make desirable Christmas trees because they have a pleasing fragrance, relatively short needles and can be pruned readily to a desirable shape. Texas growers, too, have established plantations of Virginia pines, but only limited supplies are available in certain areas. More Virginia pines will be available within two or three years and will have an advantage of freshness over trees shipped in from other states.

Buy your Christmas tree early so you can select the type of tree you want, advises the specialist. Check for signs of needle shedding and brittleness which indicate that the tree has become too dry. If a tree is too dry when purchased, it will continue to dry out even though it is set in water. Generally, trees are available on retail lots in Texas are fresh and can be expected to

remain usable in the home throughout the Christmas season.

When you get the tree home, cut one to two inches off its base on a slant. Stand the tree in water and store in a shaded area until you're ready to bring it inside. Keep water in the stand at all times and your tree will remain fresh.

In the home, place the tree away from all heat sources, such as the fireplace or

heating unit, cautions Walterscheid. Check the water level often; a tree may use as much as a pint of water a day. Keep your lighting system in good order by inspecting and discarding wires with frayed insulation, broken sockets and loose connections. Use only lights and cords that carry the safety seal of Underwriters Laboratory.

As a final reminder, Walterscheid advises re-

moving gift wrappings and packing materials from around the tree once you have opened Christmas packages.

By selecting a fresh tree and following a few safety rules, everyone can have a safe and happy holiday season.

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
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
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

The Episcopal Church

The Episcopal Church of Eastland County is a member of the world-wide Anglican Communion, a historic Church whose influence has been felt in many lands.

In England the Church is called The Church of England. The Protestant movement which led to the formation of the Church of England under Queen Elizabeth I also brought the translation of the Bible into the English language.

The most widely acclaimed translation is the King James Bible, which was first published in 1611. Its literary

beauty and authenticity has made it a classic for the ages.

The thirty-seven Episcopalians in Eastland County are members of Holy Trinity Church, located on South Seaman St. in Eastland. The Minister of this Church is Raleigh Denison of Stephenville, who conducts services in Dublin as well as Eastland. The Minister is addressed as Father, Pastor, Reverend, or simply Mister. The Minister of an Episcopal Church is considered a Priest.

The lay members of the Eastland Church assist with

the work of the Church and worship services in various ways. Cleatus Rattan and Robert Dawn are Lay Readers - licensed to speak. Bailey Stark, Dr. Allen McGinness, Cleatus Rattan, Joe Housson and John Beil are members of the Vestry, the governing Board of the Church.

Cleatus Rattan is President of the Vestry, and Joe Housson is Treasurer. Bill Pryor is the Junior Warden of the Church.

The basic Christian doctrines of the Episcopal Church are shared by a number of other Churches in the area, but the Episcopal form of worship is distinctive. There is one main worship in the Church each week, beginning at 11:00 a.m. on Sunday.

The Children attend Sunday School while the adults

have a service which includes music, prayers, Scripture reading, Communion (each Sunday) and a sermon by the Pastor. Sometimes there are rituals designated for special occasions. The children return to the Sanctuary for the Blessing, or Beatitudes, by the Pastor, which concludes the service.

Besides the Bible and Hymnal used in the Church, Anglicans around the world use a standard Prayer Book, which they believe sets forth the highest form of worship.

This book consists of verses from the Bible, interposed with expressive prayers of supplication and thanksgiving. There are doctrines, and the form and order for Consecrations. The Catechism in the Prayer Book is simply instructional material used in teaching the main aspects of Church membership and Christian living. The Church usually acquires adult members by personal contact and individual study, rather than through large evangelistic campaigns.

Children are baptised in the Church, and confirmed when they are old enough to understand the Catechism. Baptism into the Church is by pouring, unless the Candidate requests immersion.

Episcopal Churches are autonomous, with local Churches calling their Pastors and attending to matters of business. Laymen who serve the Church are elected for one year terms. Tithes and offerings support the work locally and wherever needed. The Eastland Church is in the Diocese of Dallas, with A. Donald Davies as Presiding Bishop.

Members of the congregation are organized into Societies which work for the Church. The young people attend summer camps, have socials, and work on various projects. Women of the Altar Guild Society prepare the Church and Altar for worship, and engage in community services. Mrs. Betty McGinness is the head of the Altar Society. The men of the Church have monthly meetings. Members are urged to bring a Christian viewpoint to social issues, and to support all worthwhile community projects. They are encouraged to participate in education and politics, being

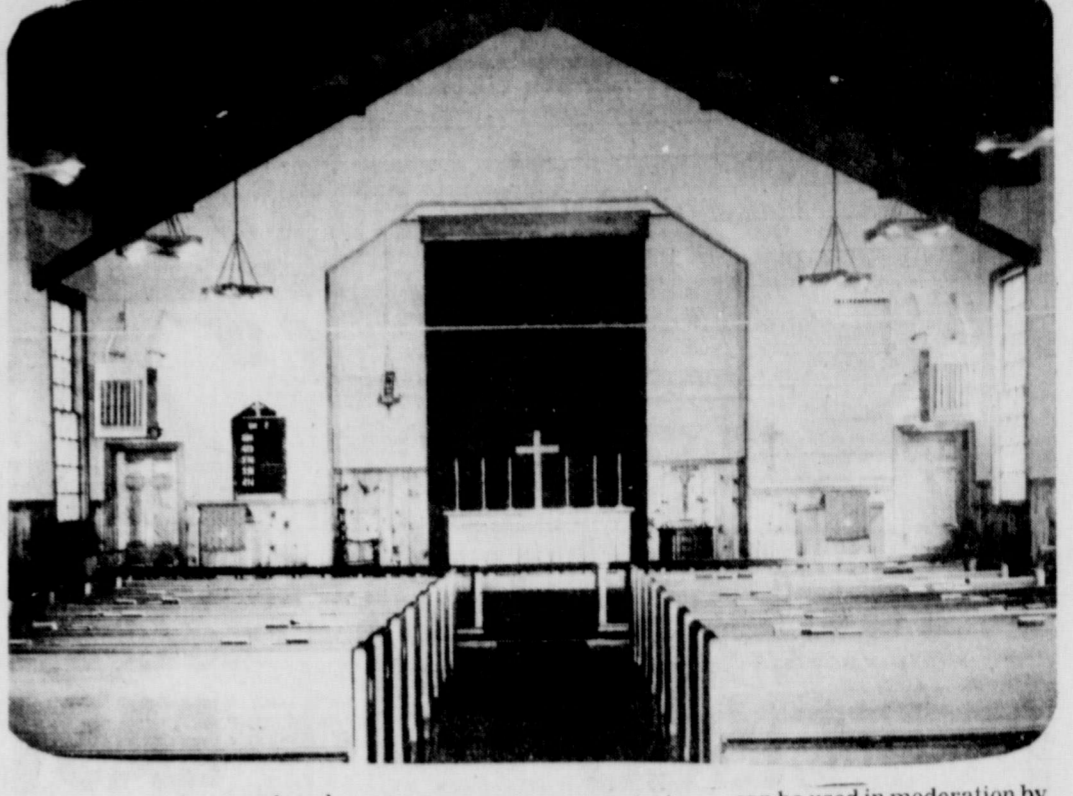
reminded that many Government leaders have been Episcopalians. This includes ten American Presidents, the first being George Washington, and the last Gerald Ford.

The Episcopal Church follows a plan of worship called "The Christian Year", which designates Holy Days and special services. The Christmas Eve service is a high point of the year in Eastland. There are special services for Lent, Easter, and other traditional religious holidays.

There are no local records of the earliest Episcopal meetings in Eastland County. An early day Priest, Father Garrett, traveled across the area to hold services south of Abilene. A beautiful Church - St. John's - was constructed in Brownwood in 1892. But Eastland County apparently had few members until the oil-boom days, when members such as Joseph Weaver of the States Oil company moved here. In the 1920's a small group met in a house in Cisco near West 5th St., and others met in Eastland on Lamar Street. (The Eastland structure was a remodeled gun club building moved from north of town).

On July 7, 1946, the scattered membership in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Strawn joined together to form Holy Trinity Church. Rt. Rev. C. Avery Mason was the presiding Bishop. For awhile the group met on the Roof Garden of the Connelley Hotel.

In 1947 the Church called Rev. Jim McLain, who had been a nationally-known radio personality known as "Dr. I.Q.", to serve as its first Pastor. Father McLain, who had been making \$50,000 per year in radio, accepted the modest salary and challenge of pastoring the Eastland County Church his first. The Pastor had an outgoing, dynamic per-



sonality, and completed several projects during his three years in Eastland. One of these was the securing of a Church building for the congregation. The group purchased an Army Chapel from Ft. Wolters, at Mineral Wells, and moved it to the present location. The building, which will seat around 250 persons, was remodeled into an attractive place of worship.

Persons who attend the Episcopal Church find that it teaches the Bible is the inspired Word of God. It used the King James Version, the Revised Standard Version, the New English Bible and the Jerusalem Bible. The Church subscribes to the Apostle's Creed and the Nicene Creed, which describes God the Father, Christ the Mediator for sin, salvation by grace, and the work of the Holy Spirit. The Church teaches that Christ is sitting on the right hand of God, and from there he will come to judge the living and

the dead. The Church looks for the resurrection of the dead and for the life to come. The Church has two Sacraments - baptism and the Lord's Supper.

The Ten Commandments are considered valid for Christians today, especially as reinterpreted by Christ. There are two basic things learned from these Commandments - a Christian's duty to God, and duty to his fellow man. The Church member understands that he is not able to obey the Commandments in his own strength, but only by the grace of God.

The Church believes that God intends marriage as a life-time contract. It recognizes that some marriages and unfortunately, and advises that anyone having difficulty seek advice from Clergy or other professionals. In some cases, if the marriage has become intolerable, the Church recognizes that the relationship is dead.

The Episcopal Church teaches temperance in all things. It feels that alcohol

can be used in moderation by some persons without harm, but that Church members should consider the special needs of the community in which they live - and not do anything to harm a weaker brother.

Episcopalians have always worked for the separation of Church and State, and believe in tax exemption on property used in worship.

Although the Episcopal Church has never been numerically large in Eastland County, its people have made a sizable contribution to Civic, educational, and community life. Early membership Rolls included such names as Joseph Weaver, Mrs. V. Blal, Garvin Chastain, Roy Young, Dr. Paul, and John Ernst. Among the current members are leading citizens who serve the community in various ways.

"Christians," states Pastor Denison, "Reflect their love for God and love for others in their activities."

That, in essence, is the Episcopal creed.

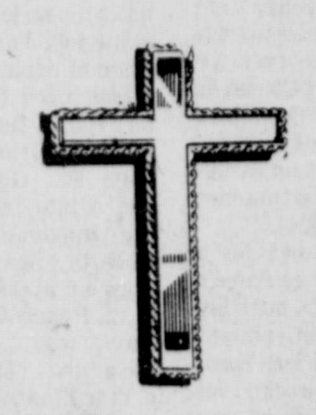
