

Club Christmas Program Given At Home Of Mrs. Bobo



Lubbock Area **Auto Sales Lead Entire Nation**

LUBBOCK, Dec. 18 -Automobile sales in the Lubbock Metropolitan ea lead all the United States' 162 Metropolitan areas in the rate of sales increase since 1939, it was revealed recently by "Sales Management" magazine's ten-year metropolitan growth survey.

The official survey was based on the 1950 census, and showed automobile sales in Lubbock up 655 per cent.

Other high rankings in percentage increase for the Lubbock Metro-Clitan area include second in the Mation in retail sales (up 430 per cent), sixth in food store sales (up 348 percent), eighty in general merchandise store sales (up 328 per cent), and second in furniture-household-radio store sales (up 604 percent).

To provide a clear ten-year comparison for its new metropolitan study, "Sales Management" used its final 1949 sales estimates computfrom all available sources with Le new 1948 census of Business as a guide. The 1949 totals for the Lubbock Metropolitan area show retail sales \$122,642,000; food sales \$18,054,000; drug sales sales \$4,876,000; furniture-household-radio \$6,615,000; and automotive sales sales \$34,472,000.

The retail sales increase of 430 percent for Lubbock is compared to a 279 percent increase for the entire state and a 205 percent inlease for the entire nation, the magazine reported.



Although many Hawaiians have seen ice only as frozen in mechanical refrigerators, the trees used by the islanders for Christmas decorations are painted white to simulate now

Gift-giving is the order of the lay as everyone exchanges inexpensive presents. Even the servants in hotels expect and receiv gifts from over-night guests.




Surrounded by myth by primitive peoples, the mistletoe was taken over by Christians who also wove fanciful legends around it.

In ancient mythology, the mistletoe was the instrument of evil. The Druids of Britain believed the ant possessed healing powers. Other primitive people thought that mistletoe found growing on oaks had magical powers.

Taken over into Christian tradition, the mistletoe was dedicated to the Christ Child. Adopted as symbolical of the healing power of our Lord, it was used to adorn the altars at Christmas. Monks of the monasteries called it the "wood of the cross" and attributed supernatural powers to it. The white berries vere said to reflect the radiance caught from the guiding star when the Wise Men were led to the manger.

Christmas Candles "The Christmas-New Year's holi-Have Been Used day season is the peak accident period of the year," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council, By Many Peoples

It would be astonishing, indeed. if no candles appeared in homes throughout the nation on Christmas Eve. The legend which surrounds the custom is believed to have started in Ireland.

There on Christmas Eve a large candle was burned which could be snuffed out only by one named Mary. As the Irish put it: "Who knows, on some Christmas Eve, Jesus and Mary and Joseph may come again, not to Palestine, but to the Holy Isle on the fartherest edge of Europe?"

Their first use for Christmas is not recorded in the annals of any nation, but that the "Christ Child Candle", burned in the window of Christmas Eve is, according to an old legend, placed there to light His way if He makes an earthly visitation and in atonement for the night of His birth when there was no room for Him.

Also among the legends is one about bayberry candles burned on Christmas.

During the early history of our country, animal fats were relatively scarce. The branches of the bayberry shrub were covered with waxgiving berries and children were given the task of gathering the berries when candles had to be made so that the animal fats could be conserved

According to tradition, one who burned a bayberry candle on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day would have long life and a happy one. An old verse reads:

"To learn you luck for the year they say, Burn a bayberry dip on Christ-

mas day. If the flame burns bright and

Christmas Tree Is 150 Years Old In This Country

A CHRISTMAS TREE will be put up in two out of every three American homes this year. Yet the trimmed Christmas tree, as it is known today, is only about 150 years old in this country. The Pilgrims forbade Christmas

celebrations on the grounds they were pagan. A Massachusetts law in 1689 subjected anyone to a fine who observed the day by feasting, refraining from work or in any other manner. It was not until near the end

of the American Revolution that the Christmas tree took hold. German immigrants, homesick for the tradition of their native land, put them up. The custom of the lighted Christmas tree, some historians tell, originated with Martin Luther. He was fascinated by evergreen trees, glistening with starlit-snow, pointing to the heavens at Christmas time. So he brought an evergreen tree into his house and lighted it with candles for his children.

Another old German legend credits St. Boniface with the origin of the Christmas tree. Having converted some oak tree-worshipping Druids to Christianity, he took them into a forest, cut down an oak and pointed to a stately fir along side. "Take this tree," he said, "into your homes as a sign of your new worship. Celebrate God's

committing the trees to a commu nity bonfire amid the chorusing of carols.



Just at midnight, when the boughs of the tree bowed down in homage to the Holy Infant, the mule was caught up on the rebound and found cradled high up in the branches by its returning master.

The youngest camel of the three ridden by the Wise Men was exhausted by the pressing journey and was blessed with immortality by the baby Jesus as it lay moaning near the Nativity scene.





exclusive audience of the author's own children, it is a child's life of Christ-a simple, moving narrative, understandable even to a child and yet touched by that incomparable Dickens genius which insures its place by the side of the famous 'Christmas Carol' among the great masterpieces of Christmas literature.

Because he felt such deep veneration for the life and lessons of our Saviour, he left instructions



that this particular manuscript should not be commercialized. Thus, the manuscript was a precious family secret for 85 years. It's difficult to understand, but the genial spirit of Christmas, Santa Claus himself, hasn't always had it easy. There have been occasions when laws or traditions or regulations have put certain curbs on the old gentleman. Here are some examples:

In Newark, N. J., Santa is required to pass a stiff physical examination before he can serve in a department store. And even then he is barred from kissing any of the children who perch upon his knee

In Charleston, S. C., charity Sansas have been forbidden to make · pitch on public streets on the grounds that children flocking in to see them may create a traffic



hazard. And in Washington a few years ago, when the postmaster general was asked to print a Santa Claus stamp at Christmas time he rejected the proposal with a scornful, "I should say not!"

Outside the U.S.A., Santa has had trouble, too. In Montreal, Canada, an influential organization fought against holding of the city's annual Santa Claus parade on the ground that it was "merely a display of grotesque and vulgar buffoonery." A prominent journalist in Rio de Janeiro fostered a movement to do away with Santa Claus (Papa Noel) in Brazil and substitute a toy-bearing grandfather Indian. In Mexico City the minister of education recommended that the Aztec god Quetzalcoatl, instead of St. Nick, should bring gifts to chil-






Grandpa Frost' Helps Russians Celebrate Midwinter Festival






