

Regents Hear Committee Recommendations

Recommendations of a committee to make changes in activities as a means of reducing expenditures were approved by the board of regents of Cisco Junior College at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The changes in the normal program of activities included a number of deletions and a good many "keep but reduce cost" items. The college was faced with finding ways to reduce spending in preparation of a budget for the 1986-87 school year, according to Dr. Henry E. McCullough, president.

The board committee of Dick Woolley, Brad Kimbrough and Bill Reynolds met with a committee of college personnel, including Dr. McCullough, Vice Presidents Carroll Scott and Ralph Glenn, Dean John Muller, Secretary Watts and a committee from the Student Government Council.

Recommended for deletion were opera, junior miss competition, annual faculty dinner, annual staff reception, annual Christmas reception, CJC Band and Belle pre-school camps, president's dinner for board members, awards night reception, beginning of school reception and a Washington trip.

Other items to keep include parents day reception

but no luncheon, basketball clinic, drill team competition, drive-in band camp, student programs, reception for employees, Christmas dinner for employees, Ranch Day but charge for barbecue lunch and trail ride breakfast, basketball camps, band festivals, Blue Jackets, employee appreciation dinner and summer theater (reduce cost and make self-supporting).

Some items was "placed on hold", including the tri-college sports day programs and a New York trip.

The board approved a new \$20 student activity fee for students residing on campus in Cisco and this will cover the cost of the yearbook along with admission to sports events and the like. The yearbook, which had been costing about \$20 per copy, was an item under study for deletion. Under the new plan, the yearbook will be put out with volunteer labor.

Dr. McCullough told the board that a new public liability insurance has been obtained as a replacement for one cancelled. The new policy covers all employees and board members in the amount of \$1,000,000 and was obtained through the Texas Association of School Boards.

I marvel at how in times of disaster we all pitch in and help.

This time a fire was the

contributing factor. In Sweetwater not long ago it was a tornado. A year ago in Eastland it was a truck-train accident.

How many times have you come upon an accident along the highway and stopped to help, or thought about it, but so many had already stopped that there was no need. It seems that disaster or tragedy brings out a spirit of helpfulness in almost all of us.

On another note around town, the shopping center just east of downtown on Hwy. 80 is having a "Name the Center" Contest. If you have any good ideas or suggestions I'm sure the folks there would appreciate your input. And if you are a winner there are prizes and gifts to be awarded.

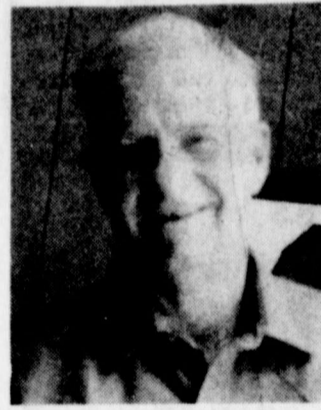

Cisco Voters Elect Pugliese, Bacon, And Heyser

Ruth Pugliese, Billy Bacon, Jr., and J.V. Heyser won election to public office as two 2,500 Eastland County voters, including 837 in Cisco, went to the polls last Saturday in the Democratic Party's second primary.

Mrs. Pugliese, veteran resident of Cisco, scored an impressive 1,490-to-964 victory in the runoff for county treasurer. Her opponent was Betty Cross of the Kokomo Community.

In the race for County Commissioner in Precinct Four, the Cisco area, Mr. Bacon received 481 voted to 402 for Danny Claborn. In Cisco, Mr. Bacon got 450 votes while Mr. Claborn polled 299 votes.

ed 376 votes on Saturday. There were 58 absentee ballots.

Mr. Heyser, the incumbent, won re-election as justice of the peace in Precinct Four by a vote of 488 to 347 for Bruce Speegle.

Elsewhere in the county, Norman Christian received 587 voted to win the Precinct Two (Ranger area) county commissioner's race over Roy Thackerson, who polled 299 votes.

Also in Precinct Two, Alford Bush defeated Donna Justice for the justice of the peace office by a vote of 461 to 397.

As a result of the runoff election, Mr. Bacon will face Jammie Fry, the Republican

\$200,000 Fire Destroys Lumber Yard Warehouse

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a building materials warehouse at Cisco Lumber and Supply Tuesday morning. The blaze broke out at about 5 a.m. and it was about an hour before Cisco volunteer firemen brought it under control.

Joe Wheatley, owner of the lumber and supply company, reported that damages would probably exceed \$200,000. Firemen said it was Cisco's worst fire since Austin's Furniture Company was destroyed by fire a few years ago.

One fireman, Jerry Daugeit, sustained a broken leg in a mishap while helping fight the fire. A Patterson ambulance was standing by and took Daugeit to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital where first aid and treatment were administered. Hospital attendants said his condition was satisfactory at

noon Tuesday.

It was reported that Royce Darr received painful burns on his arms as he rescued Daugeit. He was treated and released.

Fire Chief Richard Connell, Training Chief Gerald Jackson and Fire Company Captains Gerald Darr and Larry Wiekell were directing teams of firemen in fighting the blaze. Fireman Joe Jarvis reported that "the fumes were bad and the heat was terrific...we had to take occasional breaks to cool off and breathe good air."

The fire broke out in the brick storage building that contained substantial supplies of particle board, sheet rock, insulation material, cement, shingles and the like.

Burgess Manufacturing Company, located in Sandler Square across from the warehouse, provided a huge crane and City of Cisco

equipment was moved in to assist firemen. At 10 a.m. Tuesday, the back brick wall was still standing. Firemen said it was "wobbly" and they were considering "pushing it over."

Fire Marshal Billy Rains was expected to conduct an investigation in an effort to determine the cause of the blaze.

A burglar alarm at Dean Drug Company went off about the same time the fire started and authorities wondered whether there was a connection. Dean Drug officials said a back door was broken open but the alarm probably "scared off" the burglars as nothing of value appeared to be missing.

City police and firemen routed traffic away from the area of the Sandler Square entrance to facilitate the work of fire fighters. The ruins were still smoldering and smoking at noon Tuesday.

Spotlights & Sidelights

3-D HISTORY
The performance Saturday night (6/7) is a major contribution to our local history.

"What is past is prologue."
Sometimes we are prone to get so busy coping with the present and planning for the future that we forget the past which shaped both our present and future.

History always has been a favorite subject, but my concepts tend to be flat. This may be because of old films where the perspective was not great or because my depth perception is poor.

Whatever the reason for my tendency to consider historical figures as paper dolls, I like the stage productions of "the way it was" for any era.

Films, I think, are better at reproducing actions, but they don't give quite the feeling of reality that actors on stage manage.

The drawing of the black beans might be a more detailed production in Hollywood terms—certainly a more expensive one—than the show presented in Eastland.

Would a Hollywood show be any more representative of what happened? Which do you think is more impressive: the featured film in all the panoply of makeup and the resources of a studio's wardrobe department, or the varied regalia dug from cedar chests, borrowed from older friends, or hastily run up on a sewing machine for a "costume?"

Some of the garments weren't so "hasty" at that. Neither were some of them so 1836-ish: I saw one outfit that was pure 1936. It does something to you to see a match of your teenage garb happily sported as "real antique!"

There is no way to measure what perspectives on history such community efforts as "17 Were Chosen" give our current crop of history students, but their conceptions of the drawing of the black beans are unlikely to be flat.

There should be little doubt that the historical emphasis in this year of the Texas Sesquicentennial affects our future, too. If nothing else, it makes us more aware of our past.

Genealogy charts are being worked out by people who never before cared who their great-grandparents were. They may never find out as many pioneers had a good reason—like survival—for leaving the old home place with no forwarding address.

Others were merely fiddle-footed: they kept on the move because they liked it. They were not always consistent with the names they used. Sometimes, name changes were a precautionary measure; sometimes names changed

because of spelling. A couple of examples: why write "Talliferro" when "Tolliver" sounded the same? "Beauregard" easily became "Bogard." When people came through immigration offices where spelling often was more original than accurate, you can understand that names might get mangled.

One year a fellow teacher argued with me about family history. HIS point was that it didn't matter what his ancestors did; that what mattered was what he did. If he ever saw MY point that he did whatever he did because of the influence of those ancestors, he never admitted it.

Of course, I don't know how much heredity influences our lives and how much is laid to environment. I find it just as logical to think that the intangibles of courage or cowardice can be inherited as easily as the tangibles of curly hair or bowed legs!

Maybe we take a little more than usual interest in our past because we are dissatisfied about our present and uncertain of our future.

Is there some kind of reassurance in the fact that the adventures kept coming? That they still do?

Anyway, those pioneers kept on keeping on and here we are: throwing a birthday party as big as Texas.

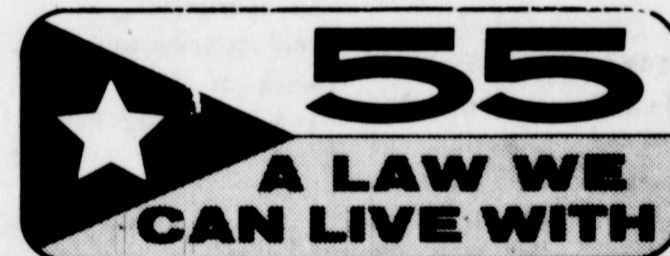

A Center would have enough sanitary facilities so it wouldn't matter that the courthouse wouldn't be available for "resting," a euphemism I feel sure will be understood.

Such a Center should be planned with use by Ranger, Cisco, and Carbon as well as Eastland in mind. Rising Star and Gorman might be a little far, but for county projects, the Center would be there. It would not have to be located in any city limits as long as it had plenty of parking space. It is not too far-fetched to consider a shuttle bus for special occasion times.

Oh, well...it was a dandy show, anyway. It's just that when your kids are making straight A's, you can't help thinking how nice it would be if they made A-pluses.

Bob Bullock Sends

Local Tax Checks

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$54.5 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Houston received the largest check—\$8.5 million—bringing 1986 payments to 73.4 million, down 4 percent from last year. Dallas' payment of \$6.8 million, down 5 percent from 1985, brought the yearly total for the city to \$53 million.

Eastland County received a total of \$37,977.35 in tax payments this time period. This total is down 5.31 percent compared to the same period in 1985 of \$45,305.86.

Cisco received a check for \$7,574.40 compared to \$10,360.65 in 1985; Eastland received \$17,775.29 and \$21,580.56; Gorman received \$1,016.77 and \$1,565.31 in 1985; Ranger received \$9,246.64 in 1986 and \$10,972.64 in 1985; Rising Star received \$2,384.25 in '86 and \$826.70 in 1985.

Totals to date in 1986 compared to 1985 are: Cisco - \$86,517.12 to \$92,064.64; Eastland \$167,308.83 to \$16,255.37; Gorman - \$13,363.07 to \$13,249.46; Ranger - \$56,409.78 to \$70,653.25; Rising Star - \$12,377.12 to \$10,610.43.

DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent, furnished the Eastland County Newspapers the information we requested on the brown recluse spider. This article was written by Extension entomologists from the Texas A&M University System.

Gordon is concerned about the fact that the brown recluse spider seems to be plentiful this year. He says the County Agent of Erath County was bitten by one of these spiders not long ago. Although not hospitalized, the Agent is having a lot of trouble with one arm.

A brown recluse inflicted this bite on the Agent's arm one night while he was asleep, making it hard for him to identify the type of spider. An unpleasant habit of these creatures is how they sometimes hid in bedcovers, closets, in shoes or in the sleeves of garments.

Mr. Gordon has heard that a number of these bites are being reported in the Stephenville area, and cautions Eastland County people to be very careful in places the spider might be hiding.

Janet Thomas, Extension Agent (Homemaking) is quite aware what the bite of a brown recluse spider can do. About six years ago, at her home near Lake Leon, she started to put on a pair of

shoes which had been sitting on her back porch. She felt a sting just above the toes.

"The bite felt like a scorpion," she says. "I knocked the thing out of the shoes as fast as I could, and saw it was some kind of spider."

"I should have caught it and put it in a jar and carried it to the doctor. I recommended that anyone who is bitten by any kind of spider do that."

"And go to the doctor immediately. This makes a lot of difference on how quickly you get well."

Mrs. Thomas says that the bite of the brown recluse spider was the worst thing she has ever experienced. "I had a bad reaction to the venom, and there was a terrific lot of pain for days. It was about five months before the wound was healed enough where I could take off the bandages."

Mrs. Thomas says that these spiders like dark, undisturbed places, which especially means closets and boxes with things packed away. She suggests that everyone try to clean out such places and watch carefully for anything resembling the spider.

"And don't ever put your feet in shoes without shaking out those shoes first!" she adds.

Eastland County Commissioners Discuss County Roads And The Recent Rains

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting on Monday, May 9. Quite a bit of the discussion centered on the recent rains and their affect on the county, especially regarding un-paved county roads.

Reports were that a lot of these roads were in bad shape, with a few actually impassable.

A number of other items were also considered at the two-hour meet. Commissioners present were Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Bill Riddell, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided, and County Clerk Joann Johnson recorded minutes.

The first item on the agenda was the opening of bids on surplus county equipment offered for sale. Richard Robinson of Pct. 1 was the only Commissioner receiving bids, and after looking them over he decided to take them under consideration but defer a final decision.

Jerry Gibbs, who lives near Simpson Cemetery N.E. of Kokomo, reported to the Commissioners that high water is blocking the entrance to the cemetery, making it impossible to reach it at this time.

He said this was not the first time this problem has existed and stated that the roadway hadn't been worked on in several years.

Richard Robinson, the Commissioner in charge of roads in that area, answered "I'm going to disagree with you."

Robinson said that \$3,000 and four days were spent last year in that vicinity.

"We have been working day and night to keep roads clear and there are people

who are old and sick who can't even get out," the Commissioner said. "That has to be our priority right now."

Gibbs replied that he understood that, but the people in his area would appreciate more maintenance on this road. He offered the use of an alternate route through his pasture if this would prove to be more workable. This site was used as a county road until 1959.

Next on the agenda was the signing of a contract between Texas Electric Service Co. and the County regarding the restored antique lights around the Courthouse. Commissioners were unanimous in their praise of the lights and how much they add to the beauty of the area. The cost to the County will be approx. \$91.40 per month for these eight lamps.

Emma Morris, County Auditor, came before the Court to request the lease of a computer with five times the capacity of the one presently used. This would cost \$1300 more monthly, but would include additional equipment which would tie in several offices not presently covered.

The Commissioners approved this request. They also appointed Mrs. Morris as Loss Control Coordinator for the County, a position involved with the handling of Worker's Compensation.

Emory Walton, District Attorney, brought a request to the Court for an increase in the salary of the Assistant District Attorney, Bill Dowell. He stated that the Assistant D.A. was a well trained and capable person who would be difficult to replace, and he did not want to lose him to offers of a

higher salary.

Walton was told that this matter would be considered when he presented the budget from his office for the up-coming year.

In another matter, Emma Morris brought a letter concerning the operation of his office by an Eastland County Justice of the Peace. She stated that she had attempted to resolve the problem with the J.P., but had not been able to do so. "It's now up to you," she said.

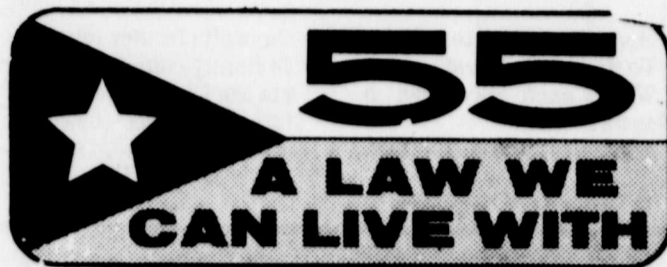
District Attorney Walton replied that if the matter

was not resolved in one week it would go to the Grand Jury.

During the morning the Commissioners approved a request from Christie Gas Transmission Co. to cross County Roads 336 and 321 in Pct. 3 with a pipeline. One crossing will be S.E. of Gorman about five miles, and two others northwest on the New Hope Road.

The Commissioners will meet again on June 16 to discuss the allocation of Revenue Sharing.

We are happy to have him meet with us.

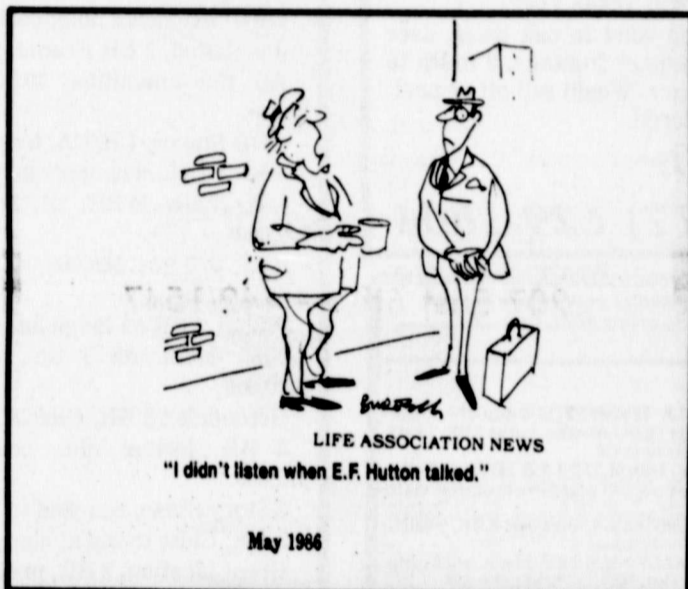

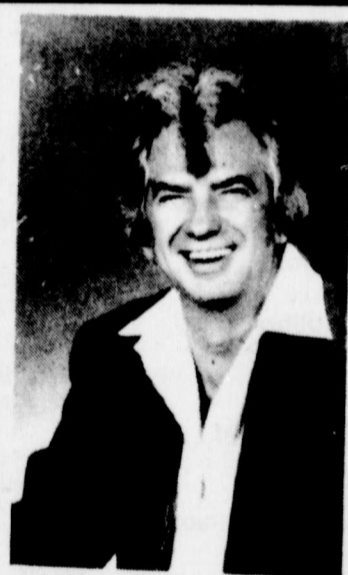

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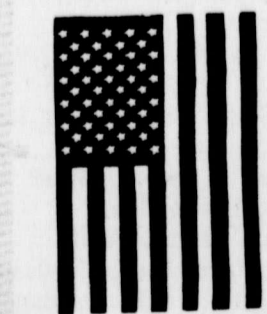

Delaying Cow Culling Could Cost In Long Run

DELAYING COW CULLING COSTS \$\$\$--Giving "Ole' Bossy" one more chance to have a calf is like tossing money out the window, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System. A recent demonstration in Calhoun County showed just how much money can be lost with this poor herd management practice. According to the study, holding an open cow over a 19-month period caused a loss of \$116.02 per cow. Even if the cows had con-

ceived the day after they were found to be open, at least a 15-month maintenance cost would

have been incurred--nine months for gestation and six months to weaning. That would have resulted in a loss of \$17.70 per cow. Selling an

open cow immediately after palpation will gross \$320 to \$420 depending on her weight and price per pound.

The Black Bean And How It Grew

If many of us learned a little history, had fun and maybe a goosebump or along the way, then Saturday's Discovery-Fest was a success.

Rarely have so many worked so hard for what they believed in, and judging from the comments now being heard, it all came together.

There were some rough spots due to a series of complications but in all, it seemed to come off as planned.

From concept to completion there were what appeared to be insurmountable obstacles. Most were overcome. Others were gone around.

The original concept was to dramatically tell the story of the man for whom Eastland County and Eastland City are named. A two or three-page outline was taken to the chamber of commerce board of directors and to instructors at the school who would be involved.

Go-aheads were given by all and the planning began. Originally conceived for the courthouse square, there developed hope that it could be expanded to the football stadium, so scripts were expanded and preliminary plans set into motion - with the hope that the new bleachers would be completed in time. Serious planning began in March, but then a May 10 date was set, and the busy-year-end school activities forced a re-set to June 7. Rehearsals began on Monday, June 2, and so did the rains.

From the beginning it was almost a case of proving that things can be done. Some wondered if the 30 by 50-foot flag could be built. Janet

Thomas and the women of the County Extension Clubs said "Yes," and did it. Some wondered if the giant flag could be flown. Phillip Arther said "Yes" and did it - not only at the stadium but also in the square where you saw it.

After the days of sloshing rehearsals with a sogged stadium, some wondered if the event could be moved and re-done with only the Thursday and Friday night rehearsals. Jeannie Griffin was the first to say "Yes," and set to work. Director Kathi Stapp was water-bound in Albany and couldn't get in for the moved-to-the-courthouse Thursday night work, so it was roughed out there, and then two good

dress-rehearsals came off Friday night under Kathi and Jeannie's direction and it just kept getting better.

After an elaborate sound system (originally scheduled for the stadium presentation) was scrubbed, Richard Rossander and James Wright came through with their own equipment. Carl Conger had brought out Casa Manana spotlights and he and his crew did an outstanding job.

Band Director Phil Hewett started the band concert promptly at 7:30 p.m. and the combined bands really pleased the audience.

Choir Director Wylie Peebles and the combined choir really entertained the record-breaking crowd on

the south side of the courthouse.

From the beginning the recorded history of Capt. Eastland and the drawing of the black beans always seemed such a visually-possible event, which if done with taste could be a vivid history lesson for local folks. To read it, is exciting; to see it, creates goosebumps. There were a lot of tears and handkerchiefs out Saturday night.

The original music (done so beautifully by Lyndell Cockburn and Richard Rossander) was written and set to music by Viola Payne and her son Marvin. It was felt that such vocals would brighten what otherwise is a very somber happening.

High Schooler Jim Don Andrews, an all-State Trumpeter, was the soloist for taps and he did an outstanding job.

Bandsman Rusty Maugh was drummer during the dramatic bean drawings as costumed Mexican Officer Al Folsom held the crock.

Especially outstanding in their rolls were Carl Elliott who did an outstanding job as Sam Houston. Did you recognize Arthur Comacho of Ranger as Santa Anna? And did you recognize the "modified" old Eastland band uniform? When he gave the order "Ready, aim, fire" in Spanish it was enough to make your flesh crawl.

The professional touches of the directors with the turning of the prisoners by Mexican Officer E.C. Ragland was very effective. (It's true that the Mexicans would not even let the 17 face their executioners.)

Also effective was the giving of last rites by Priest Scott Bradshaw just before firing. (In fact, few of the 17 would accept the Catholic last rites.)

And the little touches: Joyce Carey ironing; Clara White sweeping and protecting herself from the Indians; and a hundred and one little events that helped make it real.

Who can ever forget the black-powder firings. The results were loud and visual. No one could doubt but that it was a tragic moment.

Our Latin American friends are to be especially thanked for their important contributions to this event, and we've had so many people tell us how happy they were that Singer Tim Webb set the feeling for the event with his excellent "Streets of Laredo."

Voices for most of the characters included Narrators Emmett Lasater, Melba Aaron, Everisto Jimenez and Phil Hewett.

Authentic antique props were generously provided by Mrs. Pat. Gohlke of Gold Key Collectables in Ranger.

Not fully utilized at the courthouse but beautiful to behold are the sets built for the event. The Spanish

Veterans Benefits Handbook Now Available

According to James Wright, Veterans Service Officer for Eastland County, the 1986 edition of the Veterans Administration's benefits handbook, "Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents," has been published with up-to-date descriptions of the agency's programs and services.

Among the VA benefits outlined in the 87-page handbook are medical care, education, compensation, pension, insurance, home loan guaranty, job training and burial assistance. It also provides information on medical benefits for veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and radiation, and for veterans suffering from post traumatic stress disorder.

Employment assistance and other Department of Labor benefits for the veterans are described as well as benefits provided by the Department of Defense, Small Business Administration and other Federal agencies.

The handbook contains sections on eligibility, obtaining information in Spanish, benefits for former prisoners of war, and information for women veterans.

Addresses and local phone numbers of all VA offices, medical centers, national cemeteries, Vietnam veteran counseling centers, and other VA facilities are also listed.

"Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents" is available for \$1.75 from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

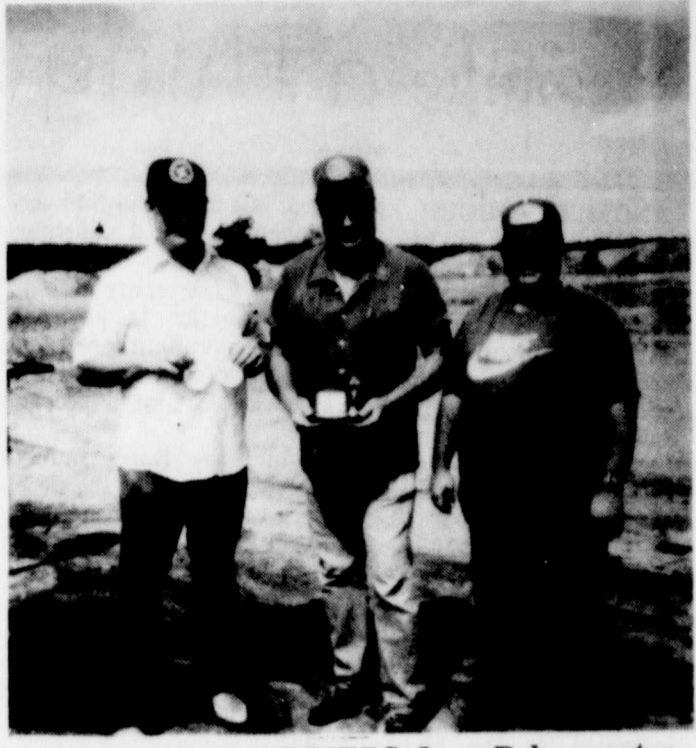

Cisco Rotary Club Learns About Bee Keeping

Bees that produce honey and the equipment needed to harvest it were demonstrated in a program by L.H. Rhodes of Cisco at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club last Thursday at the Colony Reasaurant.

Mr. Rhodes, who lives across the Lake Road from Cisco Junior College, is semi-retired after devoting many years to a hobby of beekeeping, including a

number of years in full time beekeeping. He and Mrs. Rhodes have lived here 25 years. Presently, Mr. Rhodes told Rotarians he has some 42 hives of bees at his place and other places in the area, including several at the Billy Wright Ranch north of town. Mr. Wright, the program chairman, introduced the speaker.

Soon after he was discharged from the Army Air Force following WWII, Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes became migrating beekeepers with up to 650 hives. They took their bees to the Rio Grande Valley in winter and let them gather honey in the fruit orchards. From the orchards, they moved north as weather permitted to the garden country around Uvalde and later to San Angelo and Coleman for honey made of mesquite, cactus and live oak.

Mr. Rhodes told Rotarians that his interest began when he was an 8th grader and a swarm of bees stopped in the school yard. An elderly man saw them and recruited Mr. Rhodes to capture the swarm and showed him how to carry them home to provide honey.

Over the year, Mr. Rhodes figured that he has had at least 1,000 bee stings, but he is immune and suffers no ill effects other than the pain of a sting. He wears a veil when robbing hives to avoid stings about his face, he said.

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Since the war years, Mr. Rhodes said he has always had a good many hives of bees. The Rhodes are the parents of one daughter, Linda Beebe of Cisco, and one granddaughter, Marcy. Dr. Steward Cleveland, local optometrist, was inducted into the club as a new Rotarian. President Henry E. McCullough reported the club had 92 per cent attendance.
